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The City Council convened at 7:00 p.m. on the above date, following a 5:00 p.m. Work Session on City Marijuana Regulations, to conduct a Regular Meeting of the Fairbanks City Council at the City Council Chambers, 800 Cushman Street, Fairbanks, Alaska, with Mayor Jim Matherly presiding and with the following Council Members in attendance:

City Clerk Danyielle Snider read the Mission Statement of the City of Fairbanks.

### **INVOCATION**

The Invocation was given by City Clerk Danyielle Snider.

### **FLAG SALUTATION**

Mayor Matherly asked everyone to join him for the Flag Salutation.

### **CITIZENS' COMMENTS ON CONSENT AGENDA ITEMS**

Victor Buberger, P.O. Box 58192, Fairbanks – Mr. Buberger spoke against Resolution No. 4830. He questioned how the Council could afford a grant when they were broke the week before. He stated the City should use volunteer fire fighters at the Fire Department to save money. He stated the City is too broke to build a public restroom, so they should not be accepting funds with strings attached.

Frank Turney, 329 6th Avenue, Fairbanks – Mr. Turney stated the only Council Member that had any principals was Lloyd Hilling, because he would reject all applications for federal grants. Mr. Turney echoed Mr. Buberger's thoughts about volunteer fire fighters.

Hearing no more requests for public comment, **Mayor Matherly** declared Public Testimony closed.

**APPROVAL OF AGENDA AND CONSENT AGENDA**

**Ms. Therrien**, seconded by **Ms. Rogers**, moved to APPROVE the Agenda and Consent Agenda.

**Mr. Cleworth** pulled Resolution No. 4830 and Resolution No. 4831 from the Consent Agenda.

**Mayor Matherly** called for objection and, hearing none, so ORDERED.

City Clerk Snider read the Consent Agenda, as Amended, into the record.

**Mr. Pruhs**, seconded by **Ms. Therrien**, moved to WAIVE PROTEST on the Liquor License Applications for Renewal.

**Mayor Matherly** called for Public Testimony and, hearing none, declared Public Testimony closed.

**Ms. Rogers** asked Police Chief Eric Jewkes for a staff report. Chief Jewkes stated that there were 280 calls to the Oaken Keg Airport Way location, but the call list encompasses all the businesses that share the parking lot. **Ms. Rogers** asked if the liquor license is creating a problem; Chief Jewkes stated he is not aware of Safeway doing anything wrong, and he added that it is a high traffic location. He stated there is a panhandling problem around the box store area of town, but it is not related to any specific liquor license.

**Ms. Therrien** stated there are a lot of trespass calls listed, and she asked if they were related to the Oaken Keg liquor license; Chief Jewkes indicated that most of the calls were most likely related to the Safeway store.

**Mr. Bagwill** stated there are a lot of theft calls, and he asked if they were a result of people stealing alcohol; Chief Jewkes stated alcohol is difficult to steal because the liquor store is watched closely. He stated general merchandise from Safeway is what is typically stolen, because it is not supervised as well; he stated they often report when small items are stolen.

## **MAYOR'S COMMENTS AND REPORT**

### a) Special Reports

Brittany Smart, 907 Terminal Street, Fairbanks – Ms. Smart introduced the new VISTA volunteers who will be serving Fairbanks over the summer. She reported that Mayor Kassel was sad to see the Masonic Temple fall, but he understood it was due to deferred maintenance; she stated that many of the Borough buildings are falling into disrepair as well. She reported on Mayor Kassel's budget and spoke to the many hard discussions to come.

Ed Malen, 101 Dunkel Street, Fairbanks – Mr. Malen stated he is the Senior Tourism Sales Manager for Explore Fairbanks, and he spoke to the marketing activities in the Japanese market. He stated Explore Fairbanks continues to champion Fairbanks as a destination.

**Mayor Matherly** spoke to the demolition of the Masonic Temple and indicated that he is sad about its collapse. He explained that the structure was deemed a hazard by the Engineering and Building Departments, and the owner was onsite and involved in the process. **Mayor Matherly** stated the danger was addressed, and the owner made the call to demolish the building. **Mayor Matherly** thanked Big Daddy's Bar-B-Q for providing food, hot cocoa, and coffee to everyone working onsite at the demolition. He reported that Ron Dupee was promoted to Lieutenant at the Fairbanks Police Department (FPD). **Mayor Matherly** welcomed the VISTA volunteers to Fairbanks and congratulated Jackson Fox for being nominated for the "Top 40 under 40" in Alaska. **Mayor Matherly** thanked everyone for participating in the Marijuana Regulations Work Session before the meeting.

## **NEW BUSINESS**

- a) Resolution No. 4829 – A Resolution in Support of Senate Bill 215, An Act Relating to Multi-Line Telephone Systems. Introduced by Mayor Matherly.

PASSED and APPROVED on the CONSENT AGENDA.

- b) Resolution No. 4830 – A Resolution Authorizing the City of Fairbanks to Apply for Funds from the United States Department of Homeland Security for the FY2017 Staffing for Adequate Fire and Emergency Response Grant Program. Introduced by Mayor Matherly.

**Ms. Therrien**, seconded by **Ms. Rogers**, moved to APPROVE Resolution No. 4830.

Chief of Staff Mike Meeks explained a handout on mutual aid, and he spoke to the recent high call volume for emergency services. He stated personnel has remained constant, but the number of emergency service calls has significantly increased. He explained that other local departments are pulling out of mutual aid which will increase the workload of the Fairbanks Fire Department (FFD). He stated that if nothing is done, there may be 200 or more stacked calls in 2018. He stated that the types of calls that have increased the most are those relating to sickness, falls, and incapacitated persons.

**Mr. Cleworth** asked what the criteria is to be categorized as “incapacitated.” Fire Chief Jim Styers stated most of the phone calls are received from drivers who observe someone lying down but do not stop to assess the situation.

**Mr. Pruhs** asked if the 62% increase in calls for incapacitated persons listed in the handout were for a certain area of town. Chief Styers stated many of the calls come from the downtown area.

**Mayor Matherly** stated he would like the Council to authorize applying for the grant; he stated grant acceptance would come back for Council for approval. He spoke to why it is wise to apply for the grant. He stated that FFD staffing does not factor in the increased population when tourism is in full swing.

**Mr. Pruhs** asked whether the grant application must be submitted by a specific date; Mr. Meeks stated it is due in April 27, 2018. Chief Styers stated the application has been available for the past five years, so he believes it is available every year. **Mr. Pruhs** asked about personnel distribution. Chief Styers stated that FFD has a minimum manning of nine; he explained how duties are shifted and handled by personnel depending on the types of calls coming in. He stated Dispatch is doing their best with the resources they are given to field calls. He stated that other area Fire Chiefs have agreed to continue offering mutual aid for major incidents.

**Mayor Matherly** asked Chief Styers to speak to the number of eligible retirees at FFD. Chief Styers stated that several people at FFD will be eligible to retire soon and reported that there are currently three vacant positions. He stated that the number of injuries seems to be increasing with the increasing average age of the department workforce. **Mayor Matherly** asked about the average age of FFD employees; Chief Styers reported that 43 is the average age.

**Mr. Cleworth** asked why the number of calls increased so much in 2016; Chief Styers stated there has been a big increase in incapacitated person calls, but the number of seizure and pregnancy calls has also increased since 2016. **Mr. Cleworth** asked about the student internship program; Chief Styers stated it is still in place, but nobody from UAF has applied for the fire portion of the course. Chief Styers stated there are 12 interns in the medic program; **Mr. Cleworth** asked if those interns are included in the statistics that were provided. Chief Styers stated the interns may assist with ambulance calls depending upon where they are in their training. **Mr. Cleworth** asked how they determine whether a person needs further medical assistance when they are responding to an incapacitated person call. Chief Styers stated that if a person knows who they are and where they are, they can walk away; if they need medical attention, EMS responds; if they are a harm to themselves or others, it becomes a police matter. **Mr. Cleworth** asked about the questions dispatchers ask before sending first responders; Chief Styers stated that would be a question better asked of the Dispatch department.

Dispatch Manager Stephanie Johnson came forward and stated that Dispatch had to re-evaluate their procedures after a person fell into the river and succumbed to his injuries. She stated that an ambulance responds whenever a call comes in reporting a person down, but the caller does not have any details about the situation. She stated that if a person is up and moving around, and there is no criminal element in the situation, Community Service Patrol (CSP) is dispatched. She stated if there is any kind of appearance of criminal activity, law enforcement is dispatched to the scene. **Mr. Cleworth** asked why there is such a steady incline in ambulance dispatch; he asked whether drug use could be a factor. Chief Styers stated there is no way to say whether drug use is a factor because there is no way to diagnose from the ambulance.

**Mr. Pruhs** asked whether the four additional positions in the grant would add one person per shift. Chief Styers stated it would fill one position per shift plus the one fire fighter position that eliminated in the 2018 budget. Chief Styers stated his goal would be to have 14 people per shift and a minimum manning of 11.

**Ms. Rogers** stated she is heartened to hear that people are reporting people down because lives have been lost when calls have not been made. She stated it shows that Fairbanks is growing in the capacity to look out for others.

**Mayor Matherly** stated it is possibly that the increase in calls is due to the opioid epidemic affecting so many in the community.

**Mr. Pruhs** stated he can only assume that calls for police and CSP responses are increasing at a similar rate; Ms. Johnson stated the call volume has increased overall.

**Mr. Bagwill** asked for clarification on whether the volume calculated based on phone calls or dispatched responses. Ms. Johnson stated the statistics are based on responses to the scene.

**Mayor Matherly** again asked the Council to authorize the City to apply for the grant. He stated the grant would help with the immediate staffing problems at FFD.

**Ms. Therrien** asked whether the City would retain the positions hired after the grant expires.



**Mayor Matherly** stated he believed the City would be able to retain the employees hired because of all the people approaching retirement at FFD. Chief Styers stated that if he hired fire fighters under the SAFER grant program, he would be able to offer them full-time employment within six months to a year because of all the upcoming retirements. Chief Styers stated the new-hires would sign a letter stating that they understand their employment is to end on a certain date, but they would likely be hired full-time before their termination date.

**Mr. Pruhs** asked whether the grant funds could be partially awarded; Chief Styers replied that the City would be granted the full grant amount or nothing.

**Ms. Therrien**, seconded by **Mr. Pruhs**, moved to SUBSTITUE Resolution No. 4830, as Amended, for Resolution No. 4830.

A ROLL CALL VOTE WAS TAKEN ON THE MOTION TO SUBSTITUTE RESOLUTION NO. 4830, AS AMENDED, FOR RESOLUTION NO. 4830 AS FOLLOWS:

**Mayor Matherly** declared the motion CARRIED.

**Mr. Cleworth** spoke against the resolution and referenced an article in the Fairbanks Daily News Miner speaking to the increase in call-outs in the last 24 months. He stated there are other options besides the SAFER grant and spoke to the internship with UAF as a way to save funds. He stated the Council was not able to discuss the grant at the Finance Committee meeting because it was cancelled at the last minute. **Mr. Cleworth** stated it is a significant monetary commitment that should be further discussed. He stated running a private ambulance service could be a lucrative business, and he questioned whether the increased calls were from people without insurance. He stated the City is required to have a minimum manning of nine, but the City budgets for 13 positions on two shifts and for 12 on another at FFD. He stated that means 30% of the workforce has to not show up, be out on an injury, serving in the military, or out for other reasons in order for the department to be at minimum staffing. **Mr. Cleworth** stated he did not know of any organization that could survive with 30% of the workforce absent. He stated the Council needs to address the problem because the City could run more ambulances if there were regularly 10 or 11 employees on shift. He stated that if the City gets in the position where they have to lay someone off, they cannot do so if the grant is in place. He stated the City would be locked into maintaining those positions for three years, and history shows that when the grant term expires the SAFER positions are not eliminated. He stated the people who were previously hired with SAFER grant funds are still employed by the City with the exception of one. **Mr. Cleworth** stated the funds come with too many strings attached, and if the City gets into a bind it would be forced to eliminate positions from other departments. He stated the City has looked into hiring volunteer fire fighters, but they cannot because of the labor contract. He stated that snow removal is at a critical level, and the hard pack must come up or the City may end up in a flooding situation. He spoke to the Council's efforts to save one fire fighter position in the 2018 budget.

**Mayor Matherly** stated that saving money and reducing manpower at the department was the reason for the proposal to cut two fire fighter positions in 2018. He stated the loss of mutual aid

has put the department in a different situation. **Mayor Matherly** stated public safety is his main concern, and long emergency response times puts the public at risk. He stated Chief Styers explained that there may be six upcoming retirements. **Mr. Cleworth** pointed out that if someone retires at FFD, the City is required to replace that position per the terms of the grant. He stated it is likely that if the City applies for the grant, they will be successful.

**Ms. Therrien** stated she is concerned that someone could have a stroke, not be able to explain to Dispatch the severity of the situation, and not get a prompt response. She stated that just because the City applies for the grant, it does not mean the funds have to be accepted.

**Mayor Matherly** stated it is his intention to apply for the funds, and he understands the Council would still have to approve acceptance of the funds at a later time. He encouraged the Council to approve the resolution since the deadline is near. He stated would like to meet with other organizations to discuss other options, but he wants the funds to be an option.

**Mr. Bagwill** stated he is also concerned for public safety, but he does not have the longevity on the Council to understand the history with SAFER grants. He shared his concern for what may happen in three years when the grant funds run out and the Council has to make tough decisions.

**Mayor Matherly** stated that with the number of retirements coming up, a future Council would not have to worry about laying the people off who were hired under the SAFER grant.

**Mr. Pruhs** stated there is no good answer but that he believes the resolution is premature. He stated there are other options the Council should consider because 60% of the emergency call-outs are to help an incapacitated person.

**Ms. Rogers** stated that after listening to everyone, it is a difficult decision. She stated that she agrees with Mr. Cleworth that if they approve the application, it is likely they will approve the grant. She stated she did like the term “stacking” calls, and the City needs to find a solution to slow response times. She stated that the resolution is a good way to open discussion on the issue.

**Mayor Matherly** stated the Council will find out if the City gets any revenue sharing funds from Juneau before the grant funds have to be accepted, and spoke in favor of the resolution.

**Ms. Rogers** stated that if the City applies for the funds, she wants to have an understanding of the difficulty facing future Councils. She stated the Council needs to make a commitment to deal with all of the issues facing the department.

**Mayor Matherly** stated that there will be salary savings in next year’s budget, and he would seek Council approval to accept the funds.

**Ms. Therrien** stated that the high percentage of call-outs pertaining to incapacitated persons must be related to the opioid epidemic; she stated she hopes the Council will support the grant.

**Mr. Bagwill** stated he thinks the Mayor’s request is fair given because it gives the Council until July to decide whether to accept the funds or to explore other options. He stated that whenever there is a problem, throwing money at it is not the solution. He stated that the community needs to work together to address the issues.

**Ms. Therrien** stated that City Lobbyist Yuri Morgan is confident that the City will receive some State revenue sharing funds, and those funds were not accounted for in the 2018 budget.

**Mr. Pruhs** stated with the Mayor imploring the Council to apply for the funds that he could accept the resolution while looking for other options in the meantime.

**Mr. Cleworth** stated that a ballot measure was put forward in 2017 to increase property taxes, and it was soundly defeated. He stated that he knows if the City is approved for the grant, there will be pressure to accept the funds; he stated that is why he will not vote for the resolution.

A ROLL CALL VOTE WAS TAKEN ON THE MOTION TO APPROVE RESOLUTION NO. 4830, AS AMENDED, AS FOLLOWS:

**Mayor Matherly** declared the MOTION CARRIED.

- c) Resolution No. 4831 – A Resolution Approving the Purchase of Certain Lots in Block 6, Bjerremark Homestead Subdivision. Introduced by Mayor Matherly.

**Mr. Cleworth**, seconded by **Ms. Therrien**, moved to APPROVE Resolution No. 4831.

**Mr. Pruhs** declared a conflict of interest because he is representing the seller of the property. The conflict of interest was sustained.

**Mr. Cleworth** asked City Property Manager Patrick Smith to come forward for a staff report. Mr. Smith stated that he is interested in the City acquiring the whole block of land to help with snow removal issues. He explained that the acquisition of the property would double the City's snow storage capacity at that site. He stated there will be future demolition costs, but the City can use the back lot for snow storage right away. He stated he is satisfied with the condition of the title, that he had a successful negotiation, and that he recommends approval of the resolution.

**Mayor Matherly** asked Mr. Smith how many years he had worked for the City; Mr. Smith stated almost 30 years. **Mayor Matherly** thanked Mr. Smith for his service to the City; Mr. Smith stated this would be his last visit before the Council in his capacity as a public servant.

**Mr. Cleworth** stated he worked with Mr. Smith on the acquisition of the land south of the site when he was Mayor and that this is a great opportunity for the City.

**Mayor Matherly** declared the motion CARRIED.

He stated it is difficult to create a new entity because everyone involved has to come to a financial agreement. He thanked City staff for the work they have done to help the process.

Sister City Committee – **Ms. Rogers** thanked Julie Jones for working with the committee and changing the regular meeting date to work with her schedule.

### **CITIZENS' COMMENTS**

Frank Turney, 329 6th Avenue, Fairbanks – Mr. Turney spoke to the Council women who reprimanded him for using certain terms like “drunks” and “good old boys.” He stated he would not be forced to be politically correct.

Floyd Terry, P.O. Box 73514, Fairbanks – Mr. Terry spoke to the need for Fairbanks to have a roller rink; he stated he is going to leave the task up to someone else in the community.

**Ms. Rogers** thanked Mr. Terry for his love for Fairbanks and for his wonderful spirit.

Julie Jones, 516 2nd Avenue, Fairbanks – Ms. Jones, speaking on behalf of Festival Fairbanks, reported that Chef Sean Walklin at the UAF Community & Technical College traveled to

Fanano, Italy and brought Mayor Matherly a letter and gifts from the Mayor of Fanano. She read the letter which related to fostering the Sister City relationship through sporting events.

Victor Buberger, P.O. Box 58192, Fairbanks – Mr. Buberger thanked Mr. Terry for coming to the meeting and questioned whether the Big Dipper could be converted into a roller rink/ice rink combination. He stated there is no reason to have so many emergency vehicles respond to an incapacitated person call. He asked why the Council would not allow public consumption of marijuana but will allow for public consumption of alcohol. He asked why the Council was not directing marijuana tax revenues somewhere other than the General Fund.

### **COUNCIL MEMBERS' COMMENTS**

**Mr. Bagwill** thanked the VISTA volunteers for staying through the whole meeting, and he thanked Mr. Terry for attending.

**Mr. Cleworth** asked Mayor Matherly about next steps for the proposed cannabis regulations.

**Mayor Matherly** stated there may be more public meetings to discuss the ordinance, and he will meet with both sides of the industry to discuss the proposed changes. He stated there would also be a Finance Committee meeting for the Council to discuss the proposed changes.

**Mr. Cleworth** indicated that there are things in the ordinance that need to be changed, but he would like to have public comment on the issue prior to Council discussion. He shared his concern that people may get stuck in their neighborhoods when melting of the hard-packed snow occurs. He stated some areas in town flood if the hard pack is not removed, and he used Hamilton Acers as an example. He stated he spoke with Public Works Director Jeff Jacobson about using just the blades on the weekends to address snow removal.

**Mr. Pruhs** requested to be excused from the Regular Council Meeting of April 9, 2018. Hearing no objection, **Mayor Matherly** excused Mr. Pruhs from the April 9 meeting.

**Mr. Pruhs** stated he appreciated the discussion on mutual aid and the increase in emergency phone calls. He stated he enjoyed the work session on marijuana regulation, but it was a one-sided discussion; he indicated that he would like to hear from others in the industry. He stated he appreciated the City's rapid response when the Masonic Temple collapsed, and he shared that the owner of the building would be on his radio show the following Friday to address questions about the collapse.

**Ms. Therrien** spoke to the recent opportunity she had to travel to Nome to see the Iditarod winner cross the finish line. She stated she loves dog mushing so much that she took her grandkids to the start of the race and reminisced about the times when mushers took off from 2nd Avenue. She stated she received a call from a citizen who reported that his street had not been plowed since December 2, 2017, and he was worried about breakup.

**Ms. Rogers** thanked everyone who attended the cannabis work session, and she shared that she has learned a lot during the process. She stated there is still a lot of work that needs to be done, but she is impressed with the progress made so far. She asked Mr. Terry to submit another community perspective to the Daily News Miner because his early day perspective is important.

**Mr. Bagwill**, seconded by **Mr. Pruhs**, moved to ENTER Executive Session to discuss FFU & IBEW Labor Negotiations.

**Mayor Matherly** called for objection and, hearing none, so ORDERED.

**Mayor Matherly** called for a brief recess.

**EXECUTIVE SESSION**

**ORDINANCE NO. 6070, AS AMENDED**

**AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND FAIRBANKS GENERAL CODE CHAPTER 14, BUSINESSES, BY ADDING ARTICLE VI REGULATING MARIJUANA ESTABLISHMENTS**

**WHEREAS**, the Fairbanks City Council is the local regulatory authority for licensing marijuana establishments in the corporate limits of the City of Fairbanks, per state law and City Council Resolution No. 4740; and

**WHEREAS**, guidelines are needed for the review and approval of applications for marijuana establishment licenses within the city.

**NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ENACTED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF FAIRBANKS, ALASKA, as follows:**

**Section 1.** Fairbanks General Code Chapter 14 is hereby amended by adding a new Article VI. Marijuana Establishments as follows:

**CHAPTER 14. BUSINESSES**

**ARTICLE VI. MARIJUANA ESTABLISHMENTS**

**Sec. 14-211. Local Control.**

The city council may exercise local control of marijuana establishments to the fullest extent allowed by state law.

**Sec. 14-212. Number of licenses authorized.**

(a) The number of marijuana establishment licenses authorized within the city limits is the number authorized by state law or as set forth below:

- (1) Retail marijuana store: 12 allowed within the city limits.
- (2) Marijuana cultivation facility: as authorized by state law.
- (3) Marijuana testing facility: as authorized by state law.
- (4) Marijuana product manufacturing facility: as authorized by state law.

**Sec. 14-213. Restrictions on marijuana establishments.**

(a) No onsite consumption of marijuana at any marijuana establishment is allowed in the city, even if authorized by state law.

(c) No retail marijuana store may be located within ~~750~~4,000 feet of a school or within ~~750~~4,000 feet of a drug or alcohol rehabilitation facility. As used in this section, "school" means a building whose primary use is for instruction, on a daily basis, of students grades K through 12, and "drug or alcohol rehabilitation facility" means a building whose primary use is for treatment of persons seeking rehabilitation and recovery from drug or alcohol abuse or addiction.

(d) Any distance requirement in this section shall be measured ~~by using a straight line from the closest points of the primary structure of the referenced marijuana establishment and the primary structure of the dwelling, school, or rehabilitation facility~~ **as follows:**

**(1) For subsection (b), the distance shall be measured by using a straight line from the closest point of the primary structure of the referenced marijuana establishment to the nearest border of the zone.**

**(2) For subsection (c), the distance shall be measured by using a straight line from the closest points of the primary structure of the referenced marijuana establishment and the primary structure of the school or rehabilitation facility.**

(e) **The restrictions in subsections (b), (c) and (d) above do not apply to** ~~M~~marijuana establishments licenses approved by the state Alcohol and Marijuana Control Office (AMCO) or previously considered by the City Council and pending before AMCO prior to the effective date of this ordinance ~~shall not be subject to the restrictions in subsections (b), (c), and (d) above.~~

**Sec. 14-214. Procedure for review of licenses.**

(a) Upon receipt of notice from AMCO that it is considering an application for a transfer, renewal, or new marijuana establishment license of any type, the city

clerk will direct the fire and police chiefs, the building official, and the chief financial officer to make appropriate investigations within their respective areas of responsibility and to forward written statements to the clerk's office of any reasons why the city should object to the approval of the application.

(b) The city clerk will report to the city council any objections to approval of an application which have been submitted.

(c) For all new marijuana establishment licenses and license transfers referred to the city by AMCO:

- (1) The city clerk will duly advertise in a newspaper of general circulation in the Fairbanks area the date, time, and place where the city council will consider the proposed application and in addition, for all new marijuana establishment licenses, will send copies of such advertisement by mail to all owners of record of land within 1,000 feet of where the marijuana establishment will be located under the proposed new license; and
- (2) On the date and time set for consideration of the proposed application, the city council will hear all interested citizens who may wish to express their opinions on the application.

(d) The city council will determine by motion whether or not to object to the approval by AMCO of the application for the transfer, renewal, or new marijuana establishment license. The city council will consider any written objection, protest, suggested condition, petition, and any testimony received at the public hearing when it considers the application. If the city council objects to approval of the application, the city clerk will prepare and lodge an appropriate protest with AMCO within 60 days of receipt of the proposed application.

**Sec. 14-215. City council review of license issuance, renewal, or transfer.**

(a) Upon receipt of notification from AMCO that it has before it an application for the issuance, renewal, or transfer of a marijuana establishment license, the city council will determine whether to protest approval of the application. The city council may protest the issuance, transfer, or renewal of a license if it determines any of the following conditions exist:

- (1) Noncompliance with any of the restrictions set forth in Sec. 14-213.
- (2) The business operated under the license is, on the date the city council considers the application, delinquent in the

payment of any sales tax or penalty or interest on such taxes arising out of the operation of the licensed premises.

- (3) There are delinquent property taxes or local improvement district assessments or penalty or interest arising out of real or personal property owned in whole or in part by any person named in the application as an applicant where such property is used, or is to be used, in whole or in part, in the business conducted or to be conducted under the licenses.
- (4) There is a delinquent charge or assessment owing the city by licensee for a municipal service provided for the benefit of the business conducted under the license or for a service or an activity provided or conducted by the city at the request of or arising out of an activity of the business conducted under the license.
- (5) The business to be operated under the license would violate the zoning code of the borough.

(b) The city council will also consider the following factors in determining whether to protest the approval of the application:

- (1) The character of the surrounding neighborhood and whether the issuance of the license would adversely impact the health, welfare, or public safety of the neighborhood in which the marijuana establishment is proposed to be located, or otherwise would not be in the best interest of the public.
- (2) Actual and potential law enforcement problems, including the proximity of the premises to law enforcement stations and patrols.
- (3) The concentration of other marijuana licenses in the same vicinity.
- (4) Whether the surrounding area experiences an unacceptable rate of crime.
- (5) The adequacy of parking facilities.
- (6) The safety of ingress to and egress from the premises.
- (7) Compliance with state and local fire, building, and health and safety codes.

- (8) The degree of control the licensee has or proposes to have over the conduct of the licensed business.
- (9) The history of convictions of the applicants and affiliates of the applicants for:
  - a. Any felony involving moral turpitude;
  - b. Any violation of AS 11.71 (Controlled Substances) or AS 17.38 (Regulation of Marijuana); and
  - c. Any violation of the marijuana laws of another state as a licensee of that state.
- (10) Whether the applicant or the applicant's affiliates are untrustworthy, unfit to conduct a licensed business, or constitute a potential source of harm to the public.
- (11) Any other factor the city council determines is relevant to a particular application.

**Sec. 14-216. Access for enforcement; penalties.**

(a) All marijuana establishments must provide the Chief of Police with their current hours of operation.

(b) Owners of marijuana establishments, their employees, and all patrons in such establishments must permit and aid the entry of any law enforcement officer during all hours of operation and at any other time when there are two or more persons in the licensed establishment.

(c) Any person who violates or fails to comply with the provisions of subsection (b) of this section will be guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction will be fined as provided in FGC Sec. 1-15.

(d) Lack of knowledge, lack of intent, or absence from the premises is not a defense to any criminal action brought under this section against any employee in charge of a marijuana establishment.

(e) The following evidence will constitute a prima facie case of violation of this section in any criminal action against any employee in charge of the establishment or against any owner:

- (1) A law enforcement officer knocked heavily at the public entrance of the establishment and the entrance was not opened within one minute thereafter to permit entry; and

- (2) The officer heard sound emanating from within the establishment that was consistent with the sound of two or more persons in the establishment.

**Sec. 14-217. State law incorporated.**

(a) The city hereby incorporates by reference Alaska Statute 17.38 inclusive as if set forth fully in this chapter.

(b) If a conflict should arise or exist between the provisions of AS 17.38 and this Article, the requirements of this Article will take precedence and will be deemed the applicable law within the City of Fairbanks.

- (8) The degree of control the licensee has or proposes to have over the conduct of the licensed business.
- (9) The history of convictions of the applicants and affiliates of the applicants for:
  - a. Any felony involving moral turpitude;
  - b. Any violation of AS 11.71 (Controlled Substances) or AS 17.38 (Regulation of Marijuana); and
  - c. Any violation of the marijuana laws of another state as a licensee of that state.
- (10) Whether the applicant or the applicant's affiliates are untrustworthy, unfit to conduct a licensed business, or constitute a ~~potential~~ source of harm to the public.
- (11) Any other factor the city council determines is relevant to a particular application.

**Sec. 14-216. Access for enforcement; penalties.**

(a) All marijuana establishments must provide the Chief of Police with their current hours of operation.

(b) Owners of marijuana establishments, their employees, and all patrons in such establishments must permit and aid the entry of any law enforcement officer during all hours of operation and at any other time when there are two or more persons in the licensed establishment.

(c) Any person who violates or fails to comply with the provisions of subsection (b) of this section will be guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction will be fined as provided in FGC Sec. 1-15.

(d) Lack of knowledge, lack of intent, or absence from the premises is not a defense to any criminal action brought under this section against any employee in charge of a marijuana establishment.

~~(e) The following evidence will constitute a prima facie case of violation of this section in any criminal action against any employee in charge of the establishment or against any owner:~~

~~(1) A law enforcement officer knocked heavily at the public entrance of the establishment and the entrance was not opened within one minute thereafter to permit entry; and~~

~~(2) The officer heard sound emanating from within the establishment that was consistent with the sound of two or more persons in the establishment.~~

**Sec. 14-217. State law incorporated.**

(a) The city hereby incorporates by reference Alaska Statute 17.38 inclusive as if set forth fully in this chapter.

(b) If a conflict should arise or exist between the provisions of AS 17.38 and this Article, the requirements of this Article will take precedence and will be deemed the applicable law within the City of Fairbanks.

## On-site Consumption

Honorable Board Members;

This letter is issued with the support and approval of the AACOP Board of Directors.

It is the mission of the Alaska Association of Chiefs of Police (AACOP) to support law enforcement agencies around the state and to advocate for the safety of all persons, including first responders. It has been brought to our attention that the Marijuana Control Board is accepting public input on whether onsite consumption, smoking and vaping of marijuana, should be allowed on licensed premises. Alaska is currently the only state considering this option and as such it should be carefully considered by all parties. We oppose this proposition based on a variety of applicable standards.

On a substantive level and using tobacco smoking as a parallel; nearly all localities in the State have enacted codes that prohibit smoking in restaurants, bars and other public places. This is based largely on the health impacts of second-hand smoke but also on social platforms to enhance accessibility of public to all persons without the fear of health hazards. To allow on-site consumption of marijuana is counter-intuitive. Smoking is banned in nearly all public areas. This should apply to both tobacco and marijuana. In the same vein, the Marijuana Control Board has rejected the proposal for marijuana smoking clubs. In many ways, the 'on-site smoking rooms' proposal is a repackaging of the same concept. It should be recognized as such.

In terms of health risks: any 'second-hand smoke' poses a health risk to people other than the primary consumer. Due to the lack of extended research, many of the risks of marijuana smoke are unknown. What is known is that exposure to 'second-hand marijuana smoke' includes both tar and byproducts of combustion, but also to the psychoactive properties of marijuana.

As public policy, it is contrary to customary care standards for the State to sanction a known hazardous practice that exposes first responders to the inhalation of a substance that currently has unknown second-hand smoke health implications. National Institute on Drug Abuse (NIH) has shown that THC was present in the blood of non-smokers who have spent time in a "well-ventilated space with people casually smoking marijuana." First responders will inevitably be required to respond to these locations to handle unruly patrons, incapacitated patrons, and or health emergencies and these "smoke rooms" pose an unacceptable risk of exposure.

These establishments would be open to the public. And like any other location, police, fire and medics may likely respond to these locations for any number of emergent issues. AACOP opposes on-site consumption in any public locations on the grounds that second hand marijuana smoke is hazardous to the health of anyone who comes in contact with it – including first responders.

In terms of regulation, both marijuana and alcohol have intoxicating effects. The mantra of the pro-marijuana lobby is for the similar regulation of marijuana and alcohol. AACOP is in agreement that there should be parallels to regulation. Neither should be consumed by minors; consumed in public; or marketed in areas where minors may be present. In the same manner, public education on the effects of these substances should be a foremost concern in terms of State policy.

However, marijuana and alcohol can't simply be regulated the same. They are different substances that are introduced into the body in different ways. In this regard, AACOP does not oppose the on-site consumption of marijuana edibles. Just as a person is able to consume alcohol in a liquor establishment; people should be able to consume edibles in a marijuana establishment. These behaviors are parallel and have no external effect on others, including first responders.

It is for these reasons that the AACOP Officers and Board of Directors oppose on-site smoking rooms in marijuana establishments.

We are available and interested in participating in dialogue about this issue. The people of Alaska have voted to allow the sale and consumption of recreational marijuana. However, we strongly advocate that the State remain within the confines of the original proposition as presented: personal use in a private setting.

On behalf of the Alaska Office of Substance Misuse and Addiction Prevention, we respectfully submit comments on proposed regulation 3 AAC 306.370 and 3 AAC 306.990 (b) to allow retail marijuana licensees to apply for an onsite consumption endorsement, and to define "marijuana consumption area", respectively. This proposed regulation raises concern for Alaskans' health and safety; therefore, we oppose the onsite (public) consumption of smoked, vaped, aerosolized, and edible marijuana products on retailer premises because of the potential health harms to users and non-users.

**Public consumption of marijuana was intended to remain illegal.** The language in Ballot Measure 2, voted on by the public and now enacted in AS 17.38.040, does not allow for public consumption of marijuana and includes a \$100 fine for this activity. Regulations—first adopted by the Board in February 2015 to define the term "public"—support this restriction. Sec 17.38.020 of the initiative stated: "...nothing in this chapter shall permit the consumption of marijuana in public."

**Many local communities lack the health powers to enact smokefree laws.** The proposed regulations 3 AAC 306.370 (a) (2) (A) states that these regulations would be in effect "unless prohibited by a local ordinance or state law." Currently, approximately half of Alaska's population is covered by a local smoke free workplace law and many of those communities have updated their local ordinances to include marijuana secondhand smoke. However, some boroughs, such as the Matanuska Susitna Borough and the Fairbanks North Star Borough, would be unable to choose to prohibit onsite consumption if they wanted to because they are organized as second class boroughs without health powers.

**Marijuana is known to impair reaction time, hand-eye coordination, and perception of time and distance, all of which increase the risk of being involved with motor vehicle crashes.** Marijuana affects people differently. The high from smoking marijuana can often be felt right away. However, the effects of marijuana can take longer to develop and last longer when eating or consuming marijuana. It is known that marijuana can make it unsafe to drive, bike, and do other activities, and the effects of marijuana edibles can last longer than users think. A person may feel safe to drive after a few hours; however, impairment can last much longer.

In a recent report released by the National Academies of Science, Engineering and Medicine, “substantial evidence of the statistical association between cannabis use and increased risk of motor vehicle crashes” was identified as one of the primary conclusions. Our concern with this proposal is that an increase in public consumption of marijuana may lead to increased driving under the influence, a significant public health area of concern.

**Exposing others to secondhand smoke (SHS) is a public health hazard.** In 2006, the U.S. Surgeon General concluded that there is no safe level of secondhand tobacco smoke. Because marijuana is illegal under federal law, there have been a limited number of studies examining health risks associated with second marijuana smoke exposure. However, peer-reviewed and published studies indicate that exposure to secondhand marijuana smoke may pose health risks for the public, especially due to its similar composition to secondhand tobacco smoke. According to Moir, et al, (*Chem Res Toxicol* 2008;21:494-502): “Secondhand marijuana smoke contains many of the same cancer-causing substances and toxic chemicals as secondhand smoke. Some of the known carcinogens or toxins present in marijuana smoke include: acetaldehyde, ammonia, arsenic, benzene, cadmium, chromium, formaldehyde, hydrogen cyanide, isoprene, lead, mercury, nickel, and quinolone. Moir, et al. also found significant amounts of mercury, cadmium, nickel, lead, and chromium in marijuana smoke. Comparing it to tobacco smoke, there was 20 times the amount of ammonia and 3-5 times more hydrogen cyanide in marijuana smoke.”

Additionally, a recent study published in the Journal of the American Heart Association concluded that “second hand smoke can exert similar adverse cardiovascular effects regardless of whether it is from tobacco or marijuana.” (Wang X, et al; *J Am Heart Assoc* 2016; DOI:10.1161/JAHA.116.003858)

**No type of ventilation system will protect the public from the effects of secondhand smoke, vapor or aerosol.** The proposed regulations contain a requirement for separate ventilation systems, separated by a “secure door”. Filtering the air or using ventilation systems will not completely protect the public’s health from marijuana smoke. This is supported by the 2006 U.S. Surgeon General report entitled “The Health Consequences of Involuntary Exposure to Tobacco Smoke: A Report of the Surgeon General.” The report stated that the scientific evidence now supports the following major conclusion:

“Eliminating smoking in indoor spaces fully protects nonsmokers from exposure to secondhand smoke. Separating smokers from nonsmokers, cleaning the air, and ventilating buildings cannot eliminate exposures of nonsmokers to secondhand smoke.”



Furthermore, American Society for Heating, Refrigeration, and Air-Conditioning Engineers (ASHRAE), the standard setting body for the ventilation industry, affirms that mechanical solutions like ventilation cannot control for the health hazards of secondhand smoke, and it recently amended its ventilation standard in 2016 for acceptable indoor air quality to address marijuana. The proposed ventilation requirements in the regulations would cause businesses to invest money in structural changes, and yet not eliminate the health risks of exposure to marijuana secondhand smoke.

*Based on these concerns for the health and safety of Alaskans, we recommend the Board not allow smoked, vaped, aerosolized, or edible marijuana consumption in public. Thank you for your time and consideration in supporting the health and safety of all Alaskans.*

On behalf of the Division of Behavioral Health, I respectfully submit the following comments and recommendations on proposed regulations 3 AAC 306.370 and 3 AAC 306.990 9 (b) to allow retail marijuana licensees to apply for an onsite consumption endorsement, and to define "marijuana consumption area", respectively.

**We request the Board strike all allowance for smoked, vaporized or aerosolized marijuana consumption in any indoor spaces. Further, regulations should not allow for any reference to HVAC engineer sign off.**

*Exposure to second hand smoke is a serious health hazard.* It is of concern marijuana is most commonly smoked and marijuana smoke is hazardous to lung health. Marijuana smoke contains many of the same carcinogens and toxins as tobacco smoke (Moir, et al, 2008; Wang, et al, 2016). Additionally, there is evidence that smoking marijuana causes chronic bronchitis and contributes to other health problems. Let it be known to the Board that smoking in indoor places poses a serious health risk for workers, customers and all others in the building. The American Society for Heating, Refrigeration, and Air-Conditioning Engineers (ASHRAE) has concluded that cleaning air, ventilation and separating smokers from nonsmokers does not eliminate health hazards of second hand smoke for either nicotine or marijuana products.

*Smoking is a serious health issue for people with behavioral health disorders.* The Division recognizes that approximately 50% of people with mental illness and addictions smoke, compared to 23% of the general population. Further, smoking-related illnesses cause half of all deaths among people with behavioral health disorders. The Division is particularly

concerned about the disproportionate number of our behavioral health consumers that shall be impacted by allowing indoor smoke in marijuana facilities.

*Alaskans are invested in increasing the percentage of nonsmoking adults and youth. The Division endorses the Healthy Alaskans 2020 goals to increase the percentage of adults and youth who currently do not smoke cigarettes. Whether they are nicotine or marijuana, all combustible products pose health hazards to those exposed. Allowing indoor smoking in any form will jeopardize these goals but more importantly the health and safety of all those exposed.*

*There is concern for the risk to public safety. It is known that marijuana impairs reaction time, hand-eye coordination and perception of time and distance, all of which can increase the risk of being involved with motor vehicle crashes, (National Academies of Sciences, Engineering and Medicine, 2017). The Division is concerned an increase in consumption in marijuana retail outlets could increase driving under the influence of marijuana.*

**Ballot measure 2 when passed, intended to prohibit public consumption of marijuana. Public consumption as proposed by the board shall have unacceptable and unavoidable negative impacts on the public. The Division strongly opposes the allowance of public consumption as described above. Thank you for your consideration in supporting policies that protect the health and safety of all Alaskans.**

## Marijuana Control Board

My name is Karen Perdue. I reside in Fairbanks Alaska. I have 25 years of experience in State government, including 14 years as a Deputy Commissioner and Commissioner of the Alaska Department of Health and Social Services. I have been involved in the development and adoption of numerous statutes and subsequent regulatory projects. I have served on various State boards that developed regulations including AHFC, the Denali Commission, the Suicide Prevention Council, and the Alaska Mental Health Trust Authority (ex officio).

I am providing comment on draft regulations 3 AAC 306.365 onsite consumption of marijuana at licensed retail stores.

### **Alaska is not ready to implement onsite consumption**

No other state in the United States allows legal onsite consumption or marijuana bars. Actually it is rarely sanctioned anywhere in the world. It may be possible in the future that states will move to limited forms of onsite consumption, but this is likely several years away. Why do we want to be the first?

MCB board members should exercise a position of caution and do no harm when approaching this issue. The MCB should undertake more examination of the issues around onsite consumption and work in concert with other jurisdictions in learning about those issues and developing more detailed statutory and regulatory framework.

The current proposed regulations do not provide anywhere close to the detail needed in a regulatory framework necessary to protect the public health, protect public safety, ensure compliance with existing limits on sales. In fact, amendments to the regulations in round two increased the supply of product that could be purchased or retained at a marijuana bar through a series of transactions.

MCB board members are appointed with various backgrounds and expertise, but each member has the duty and responsibility to look beyond only the commercial interests and ask the question- have we done all we can to balance personal liberties with the protection of public health and safety in implementing this rule? I think the answer to that is a resounding NO.

For instance, how do we know if the training provided to handlers will be able to adequately detect impairment? Is it peer reviewed? Has this training been used widely in other jurisdictions and if so what is the reliability?

How will law enforcement be prepared to deal with impaired driving impacts? There is no quick test. Advocates of marijuana bars say that DUI's go down and there is limited impairment problem with cannabis. Okay, lets look at the data in more detail.

Does the MCB understand what the effects of smoking and second hand smoking mean to patrons, employees, pregnant women, those exposed to second hand smoke whether in the establishment or linked by a common ventilation system. The ventilation standards only require odor to be considered

not toxins and particulates which are present in marijuana smoke. Do we need to go back to the 60's in terms of our policies on exposure to smoking in group settings indoors?

Does it trouble the Board that it may not be possible to purchase adequate liability insurance for marijuana bars?

What is the staffing burden to enforce yet another entire category of licensed activity? Has the board quantified the staffing needed and the added workload to enforce its rules?

The answers to all these questions and more may not change the mind of individual board members, but because we are FIRST and LIKELY THE ONLY JURISDICTION that marijuana bars will be allowed in the near future, shouldn't we discipline ourselves to ask ourselves the tough questions.

**Other States have statewide smokefree laws to protect the public from harmful effects**

A great percentage of onsite consumption will be by smoking.

Virtually all of the states that have passed decriminalization or legalization of cannabis have legal statewide bans on smoking indoors, except for private residences. Thus places of commerce like restaurants and bars already ban smoking. This would include California, Oregon, Colorado and Washington. Most of these laws would include any kind of smoking including tobacco, cigarettes and cannabis. It would be useful to the MCB members and the public to inventory how permissive our draft regulations are in light of this fact.

Alaska currently does not have this statewide law although many cities and boroughs do have such ordinances. If the MCB board does authorize onsite consumption, the next thing that will happen is that local smokefree laws will be assailed to be weakened.

**We have to do this for the tourists is a very poor reason to implement a year round public norm**

Jurisdictions that have as much or more tourism as Alaska do not permit onsite consumption. It is not a compelling argument.

**Onsite consumption should be a separate licensure category rather than an endorsement for a retail marijuana store and it should be authorized by state statute.**

In my experience endorsements have been used by the Department of Revenue for purposes of tracking and collecting revenue. Endorsements do not have the teeth of licenses and I do not believe have been used by the State of Alaska to regulate consumed products for the purposes of public health, public notice, zoning or public safety.

I understand endorsements will now be used to provide some tools in alcohol licensing. However, the very idea of an endorsement is to provide an ancillary activity to the core business line. For instance if a brew pub does not get an endorsement to serve food, they can still operate as their main business- a

brew pub. There will be some marijuana retail licensees that depend greatly on an attached marijuana bar to sell their product. Onsite consumption or dispensing is a licensure category. It would be a grave mistake to append onsite consumption establishments on the to retail license especially since no other jurisdiction in the United States currently allows this.

Endorsement is wholly inadequate for the category of commerce that will likely not be a small revenue source to a retail licensee. It is my understanding that the Board does not have the authority to issue onsite consumption licenses for marijuana bars or cafes. It should therefore not issue endorsements for this activity and wait for guidance on this from the Legislature. What happens if a significant portion or majority of the retail licensee's revenue is derived from the existence of onsite consumption? The board is setting a regulatory framework for decades to come.

Apparently retail stores already have regulatory authority in 3AAC 306.305 (a) (3) to allow onsite consumption in the retail setting—presumably to try samples of products. To expand this authority to a separately doored area implies that patrons are expected to consume over a longer period of time much like a bar.

Some members of the MCB articulated they believe that patrons will use the separately doored onsite consumption area to very briefly sample a product and then leave the premises and that the onsite consumption area will be very small as compared to the retail operation. Since this onsite consumption does not legally exist anywhere in the US, how it would develop is speculative. However, it would be easy to see that onsite consumption may account for a majority of the square footage and the majority or a significant portion of the revenue of a retail operation.

Consider the following which will make patrons want to extend their time similar to a bar or cafe:

- Hours of operation may extend from 8am to 5am
- One gram of flower or bud to any one person in a single transaction, but individuals may share products or serially purchase up to a daily limit of one ounce each(serial purchases would only occur as a product of having a place to sit)
- Food and nonalcoholic beverages may be served-Including a fully operational restaurant license.
- Marketing to tourists who want to make the visit to a marijuana bar or café a destination visit. Retail operations with an attached marijuana bar could easily be located in densely populated tourist areas with little parking making them unattractive for use by locals except as a consumption destination.
- Onsite consumption sites could group up as alcohol sites do to encourage bar hopping.

**The regulation of onsite consumption outlined in the regulations is vague and inadequate. It is wholly inadequate as compared to alcohol beverage licensing.**



Many cannabis advocates have said marijuana should be regulated similar to alcohol. That is clearly not being done here with these regulations.

There are at least 14 types of licenses to dispense alcohol in Alaska. These license types offer the public a clear understanding of the types of products sold, and the consumption allowed.

For instance to possess a restaurant or eating place alcohol license REPL , the licensee must prove through receipts that no less than 50 percent of the gross receipts are from food sales.

Breweries are allowed to sell to individuals and provide small free samples but have restrictions on seating at a bar (to discourage consumption onsite presumably) and hours 9am- 8pm. Similarly distilleries have the same restrictions.

Title 4 does not allow package liquor stores to have onsite consumption of liquor. So do the rules that the MCB have issued most closely approximate- a brewery or distillery handing out samples( if so why have hours til 5am?) , an REPL, or a package liquor store( dispensing not allowed).

None of that clarity is outlined in the State's draft regulations on onsite consumption of marijuana.

In addition, alcohol laws are evolving through a rewrite of Title 4. This process has not concluded. It will take time for the public to understand these changes and how they impact consumption at the community level. Because there are new pending rules for alcohol it seems important that the MCB take the time to understand these rules and provide that information to the public in a way that puts marijuana laws and rules in context. A cross walk prepared by the expert staff the Board has would be helpful. In my involvement in local government testimony, there is a lot of misunderstanding about alcohol rules and the comparison with marijuana- in relation to onsite consumption.

Some may argue that alcohol regulation should not be taken into account in regulating marijuana but alcohol laws represent more than 60 years of public input and careful consultation with communities and industry.

Once marijuana bars are authorized the board can expect the industry to request more and more venues and methods of consumption distribution endorsements such as special events. What is the framework for those requests.

### **Sections of the regulations are unenforceable, difficult to enforce or inadequate to protect public health**

As stated earlier, we can expect a significant portion of marijuana consumption to be by smoking.

It would be interesting to know what the expected ratio of edibles versus smoking will be based on the experience of other jurisdictions. Washington, Colorado and Oregon all have statewide no smoking laws on the books so if they consider marijuana bars that is an important factor for us to consider.

The draft regulations require the licensee to “maintain a ventilation system that directs air from the onsite consumption area to the outside of the building through a filtration system adequate to reduce odor.”

What does that mean, reduce odor by 10%, by half? so a bystander cannot smell it? It will be very difficult for an investigator or enforcement officer to determine a standard. What is the fine or remedy if ventilation or separation are not maintained?

Of course toxins in the combustible products also pose not only a public nuisance but a substantial health risk to workers in the establishments and to bystanders. Retail shops and marijuana bars or cafes in buildings with common ventilation systems will likely find it very difficult to prevent particulates from getting into the common air system. The only way to prevent secondhand exposure is to contain these establishments in stand-alone buildings with vented systems to the outside.

Many jurisdictions have smoke-free ordinances that regulate smoking in a broad array of public places including bars, restaurants and stores. Some of these ordinances specifically apply to all kinds of smoking, including e cigarettes, tobacco and marijuana. Some do not.

A vast majority of businesses who are not in regulated municipalities have voluntarily gone smoke free. The major focus of this public health initiative has been to “take it outside”. This of course will not be permitted with marijuana smoking since it is not legal to consume marijuana in public. This will likely incent people to smoke indoors-- both marijuana and tobacco, either mixed or separately. The harms from second hand smoke are real and detrimental to public health.

Onsite consumption of smoked products will incent advocates to weaken local municipal nonsmoking ordinances and voluntary efforts by businesses. It will turn back the clock on indoor air efforts.

In summary:

- The MCB Board has the duty to weigh all sides of the onsite consumption issue to ensure that public health and safety are protected as well as commercial interests are advanced. The public’s confidence in the final decision would be enhanced if we could see that the Board adopted consideration of public health and safety concerns and gathered more information in an organized, scientific and professional fashion before making its decision. Shouldn’t the standards of inquiry that we hold ourselves to be high when looking at pioneering efforts that other jurisdictions have not undertaken?
- What is the enforcement burden on the staff to enforce its rules on onsite consumption establishments and how will that be met given budget constraints. What are the sanctions on stores that are found out of compliance?
- The endorsement is inadequate to govern an area of commerce that should be licensed.
- The public needs more clarity to understand how marijuana bars would be regulated, in relation to alcohol. This is fundamental to helping communities understand what community norms to expect. The MCB should ask the staff who are experts in both to prepare an analysis of how onsite consumption of marijuana bars would compare to alcohol licensing categories.

- Since these regulations would be the most permissive consumption regulations in the United States, North America and even perhaps in parts of Europe including the Netherlands, the MCB needs to request an impartial analysis of how jurisdictions who allow these businesses or who are contemplating these businesses are addressing issues of second hand smoke, tobacco smoke, public safety and the combination of retail and consumption sites.
- Due to the constraints of the regulatory process, there has been limited opportunity to understand the thinking of the Board on onsite consumption and no opportunity for exchange of expertise or examination of lessons learned in other jurisdictions. This does not enhance public confidence in the process.
- Given the fact that the initiative did not authorize onsite consumption the matter should be dealt with by statute. The Legislature should pass a law specifically authorizing this activity.
- If onsite consumption of marijuana is a reasonable idea it will stand up to reasonable examination and considered public discourse over a period of time.

**ORDINANCE NO. 6070, AS AMENDED  
(PROPOSED SUBSTITUTE "B")**

**AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND FAIRBANKS GENERAL CODE CHAPTER 14,  
BUSINESSES, BY ADDING ARTICLE VI REGULATING MARIJUANA  
ESTABLISHMENTS**

**WHEREAS**, the Fairbanks City Council is the local regulatory authority for licensing marijuana for the corporate limits of the City of Fairbanks, per AS 17.38.210 and City Council Resolution No. 4740; and

**WHEREAS**, the Fairbanks North Star Borough Assembly spent a year reviewing its zoning classifications in light of marijuana legalization and adopted Ordinance No. 2015-41, which allows for marijuana establishments as permitted and conditional uses; and

**WHEREAS**, the Fairbanks City Council adopted Ordinance No. 5964 on February 23, 2015, which prohibits and penalizes the consumption of marijuana in a public place and provides a definition of "public place"; and

**WHEREAS**, on October 3, 2017, the City of Fairbanks held an election to ban the retail sale and cultivation of marijuana, and this proposed ban failed by a wide margin; and

**WHEREAS**, guidelines are needed for the review and approval of applications for marijuana establishments and license renewals within the city limits.

**NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ENACTED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF FAIRBANKS, ALASKA, as follows:**

**Section 1.** Fairbanks General Code Chapter 14 is hereby amended by adding a new Article VI Marijuana Establishments as follows:

**CHAPTER 14. BUSINESSES**

**ARTICLE VI MARIJUANA ESTABLISHMENTS**

**Sec. 14-211. Local Control.**

The City Council may exercise local control of marijuana establishments to the fullest extent allowed by state law.

## **Sec. 14-212. Fairbanks City Council Site Approval.**

(a) A marijuana establishment which intends to operate under a state license will go through the following approval process:

1. Within 10 business days of the issuance of a Zoning Permit by the Fairbanks North Star Borough, the applicant shall schedule an inspection by the Fairbanks Building Department and shall pay the appropriate fees for such.
  - (A) If an applicant fails to schedule an inspection by the Fairbanks Building Department within 10 business days of the issuance of a Zoning Permit by the Fairbanks North Star Borough, its license application to the City shall be denied upon receipt.
  - (B) In the above situation, the applicant may request that the City Council reinstate its application.
2. Once the building inspection has been completed, the City Clerk shall place the state license application on the City Council agenda for public comment, review of all City Departments, and the City Council's approval or denial of the proposed location of the facility as reflected in the Zoning Permit.
3. The City Council shall consider all factors to be considered by the State of Alaska under 3 AAC 306.020, as well as all items noted on the building inspection.
4. If application receives final approval by the State of Alaska for a license, the City of Fairbanks will place entire State of Alaska license application on the City Council agenda for public comment, review of all City Departments, and City Council protest or waiver.
5. The City Council will determine any and all information it deems relevant to a particular application for protest or waiver under 3 AAC 306.060.

## **Sec. 14-213. City of Fairbanks Building Department Review.**

(a) All Cultivation and Product Manufacturing Facilities shall install a carbon air filter system or equivalent. The system design will be approved by the Fairbanks Building Department in accordance with an amendment to the 2015 International Mechanical Code, once proposed and approved by the Building Code Review and Appeals Commission. The plans for the carbon air filter system or equivalent shall be included with the license application package that goes before the City Council.

(b) If a Marijuana Retail Facility receives complaints of odors from neighbors, adjacent properties, or passersby, the Building Department shall investigate the complaint.

**Sec. 14-214. License Renewal or Transfer.**

(a) Upon receipt of notification from AMCO that it has before it an application for the issuance, renewal, or transfer of a marijuana establishment license, the city council will determine whether to protest approval of the application. The city council may protest the issuance, transfer, or renewal of a license if it determines any of the following conditions exist:

- (1) Noncompliance with any of the restrictions set forth in Sec. 14-213.
- (2) The business operated under the license is, on the date the city council considers the application, delinquent in the payment of any sales tax or penalty or interest on such taxes arising out of the operation of the licensed premises.
- (3) There are delinquent property taxes or local improvement district assessments or penalty or interest arising out of real or personal property owned in whole or in part by any person named in the application as an applicant where such property is used, or is to be used, in whole or in part, in the business conducted or to be conducted under the licenses.
- (4) There is a delinquent charge or assessment owing the city by licensee for a municipal service provided for the benefit of the business conducted under the license or for a service or an activity provided or conducted by the city at the request of or arising out of an activity of the business conducted under the license.
- (5) The business to be operated under the license would violate the zoning code of the borough.
- (6) Together with the renewal application, the City Clerk shall provide to the City Council for its review all complaints on each licensee which have been filed with the City of Fairbanks, the Fairbanks North Star Borough, or AMCO.
- (7) All licensees which are seeking renewal or transfer approval shall have had a satisfactory building inspection within 60 days of the application.

(b) The city council will also consider the following factors in determining whether to protest the approval of the application:

- (1) The character of the surrounding neighborhood and whether the issuance of the license would adversely impact the health, welfare, or public safety of the neighborhood in which the marijuana establishment is proposed to be located, or otherwise would not be in the best interest of the public.
- (2) Law enforcement problems, including the proximity of the premises to law enforcement stations and patrols.
- (3) The concentration of other marijuana licenses in the same vicinity.
- (4) Whether the surrounding area experiences a high rate of crime.
- (5) The adequacy of parking facilities.
- (6) The safety of ingress to and egress from the premises.
- (7) Compliance with state and local fire, building, and health and safety codes.
- (8) The degree of control the licensee has or proposes to have over the conduct of the licensed business.
- (9) The history of convictions of the applicants and affiliates of the applicants for:
  - a. Any felony involving moral turpitude;
  - b. Any violation of AS 11.71 (Controlled Substances) or AS 17.38 (Regulation of Marijuana); and
  - c. Any violation of the marijuana laws of another state as a licensee of that state.
- (10) Whether the applicant or the applicant's affiliates are untrustworthy, unfit to conduct a licensed business, or constitute a source of harm to the public.
- (11) Any other factor the city council determines is relevant to a particular application.

**Sec. 14-215. Access for enforcement; penalties.**

(a) All marijuana establishments must provide the Chief of Police with their current hours of operation.

(b) Owners of marijuana establishments, their employees, and all patrons in such establishments must permit and aid the entry of any law enforcement officer during all hours of operation and at any other time when there are two or more persons in the licensed establishment.

(c) Any person who violates or fails to comply with the provisions of subsection (b) of this section will be guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction will be fined as provided in FGC Sec. 1-15.

(d) Lack of knowledge, lack of intent, or absence from the premises is not a defense to any criminal action brought under this section against any employee in charge of a marijuana establishment.

**Sec. 14-216. State law incorporated.**

(a) The city hereby incorporates by reference Alaska Statute 17.38 inclusive as if set forth fully in this chapter.

(b) If a conflict should arise or exist between the provisions of AS 17.38 and this Article, the requirements of this Article will take precedence and will be deemed the applicable law within the City of Fairbanks.

**RESOLUTION NO. 4832**

**A RESOLUTION TO EXTEND THE SUNSET DATE FOR THE  
INCENTIVE BONUS PROGRAM WITH THE FAIRBANKS POLICE  
DEPARTMENT FOR RECRUITMENT AND HIRING**

**WHEREAS**, an Incentive Bonus Program for recruitment and hiring at the Fairbanks Police Department was established by the City Council on June 19, 2017, with the adoption of Ordinance No. 6050; and

**WHEREAS**, the ordinance specified that the program would sunset on July 1, 2018, unless extended by Resolution of the City Council; and

**WHEREAS**, Fairbanks Police Department (FPD) currently has five officer vacancies and anticipates a significant shortfall in officers over the next three years; and

**WHEREAS**, it currently costs the City of Fairbanks a minimum of \$19,728 in salaries and benefits to send one employee to the Police Academy, which does not include additional field training costs; and

**WHEREAS**, a one-time sign-on bonus of \$20,000 for a lateral hire would help attract applicants and would constitute a significant cost savings to the City; and

**WHEREAS**, all lateral hire bonuses will be funded through savings from budgeted salaries as available.

**NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF FAIRBANKS, ALASKA, as follows:**

**SECTION 1.** An applicant who is a certified police officer in the State of Alaska or is able to meet Alaska Police Standards Council (APSC) certification standards without attending a basic officer academy will be paid a \$20,000 “sign-on bonus” in their first paycheck following completion of Field Training, subject to the payback provisions specified in the attached Sign-on Bonus Agreement.

**SECTION 2.** If an active FPD employee recruits a new officer (as defined in Section 1) who successfully completes the hiring process, the employee will receive a recruitment bonus of \$5,000.

**SECTION 3.** The bonuses established in Sections 1 and 2 of this ordinance will be funded through savings from budgeted salaries as available. This program will sunset on December 31, 2019 unless extended by Resolution of the City Council.

**SECTION 4.** That the effective date of this Resolution shall be the 7th day of May 2018.

## Fairbanks Police Department Sign-On Bonus Contract

This agreement is made between the CITY OF FAIRBANKS (“City”) and \_\_\_\_\_ (“Employee”).

WHEREAS, this contract will apply to an Employee who begins employment for the City in the Police Department (“Department”) for the first time as a POLICE OFFICER and meets the City requirements as a lateral-hire Police Officer; and

WHEREAS, the Department wishes to bestow upon the Employee a “Sign-on Bonus” as an incentive for the Employee to accept employment at the City and to remain satisfactorily employed in the Department for at least three full years;

THEREFORE, the City and the Employee agree to the following terms:

1. The City, acting through the Department, agrees to bestow upon the Employee the amount of \$20,000.00 as a Sign-on Bonus in return for the Employee accepting City’s offer of employment. This amount shall be paid directly to the Employee on the Employee’s first paycheck following the successful completion of field training.
2. The City will apply all required federal and state tax deductions and will report all payments made under this Agreement as required by federal and state law. Taxes shall be withheld as bonus earnings from the Sign-on Bonus and reported to the Internal Revenue Services as income on the Employee’s Form W-2. The Sign-on Bonus is not considered “salary” and shall not be included for purposes of retirement benefit calculations or salary increases.
3. The Department will adhere to all relevant City and Department policies during the hiring process and in making bonus payments to employees.
4. In return for accepting the Sign-on Bonus as provided in paragraphs 1 and 2 above, the Employee agrees to work for the Department on a regular and full-time basis for at least three years beginning “Start Date” and ending on “3 Year Date”. Should the Employee resign, quit, or be terminated for cause before the above stated ending date, the Employee shall repay a prorated amount of the Sign-on Bonus as provided in the following paragraphs.
5. The Employee’s failure to remain employed by the Department for three years will trigger the Employee’s duty to repay, pro-rata, the amount paid by the Department pursuant to paragraph 1, above. (This amount may be more than the Employee received due to tax or other withholdings.) For example, if the Employee leaves one year prior to the end date, he/she will repay 12/36 of such amount. To facilitate this repayment, the Employee, by signing below, expressly gives City a lien on all his/her salary, wages, and other sums payable to him/her by City. In addition, the Employee hereby authorizes City to withhold all amounts so due from any sum payable to the Employee by the Department and the City. The Employee also agrees that any tax consequences resulting from the repayment of the Sign-on Bonus or any portion thereof will be the sole and exclusive responsibility of the Employee.

6. If the Employee fails to remain employed by the Department for three years for reasons beyond his/her control (e.g. injury, illness or death), other than just cause termination, the Department may in its sole discretion waive all or part of the liability owed by the Employee. Any such waivers must be approved in writing by both the Chief of Police and the Mayor.
  
7. If any part of the Agreement is found to be invalid or unenforceable, the other parts shall remain valid and enforceable and Employee agrees, represents, and warrants that he/she will be held to any applicable repayment of the Sign-on Bonus.

BY SIGNING BELOW, the Employee certifies that he/she has not accepted a financial incentive for accepting employment at the City, other than as described in this Agreement.

Brandy reported the fund value was \$134,697,575 on January 25, 2018. The portfolio performance resulted in a 13.18% year-to-date return and a 3.63% third quarter return. The combined equity allocation returned 5.47% while the fixed income allocation returned .62%. She indicated that there were four themes over the past year that fundamentally drove equities higher than anticipated:

- Positive Profits-Earnings grow the above expectations shielded equities from global risk
- Synchronized Growth-84 of the 86 reporting countries experienced positive real GDP growth
- Easy Monetary Policies-Major central banks injected an additional \$1.0 trillion into the global economy during 2017
- Low Volatility-Average volatility over the year was 43% below the long-term average

While the economy is recovering it is still below the levels prior to the Global Financial Crisis (GFC). Stock prices are high and there are lofty earnings expectations. Both business and consumer confidence are significantly higher than the GFC low. However, there are four times more flows to bonds than to equities in 2018. In the long-term, global cyclical upturn in growth will be challenged by high debt levels (235% of GDP) and deteriorating demographics. Productivity could improve this outlook should relevant cyclical forces provide a boost.

Alaska Permanent Capital Management does not recommend changes to our portfolio at this time; maintain a modest overweight to international stocks, gradually move towards a neutral as the cycle matures, rebalance regularly to harvest gains and control risk, and expect modest returns relative to history.

There were no compliance issues to report during the quarter.

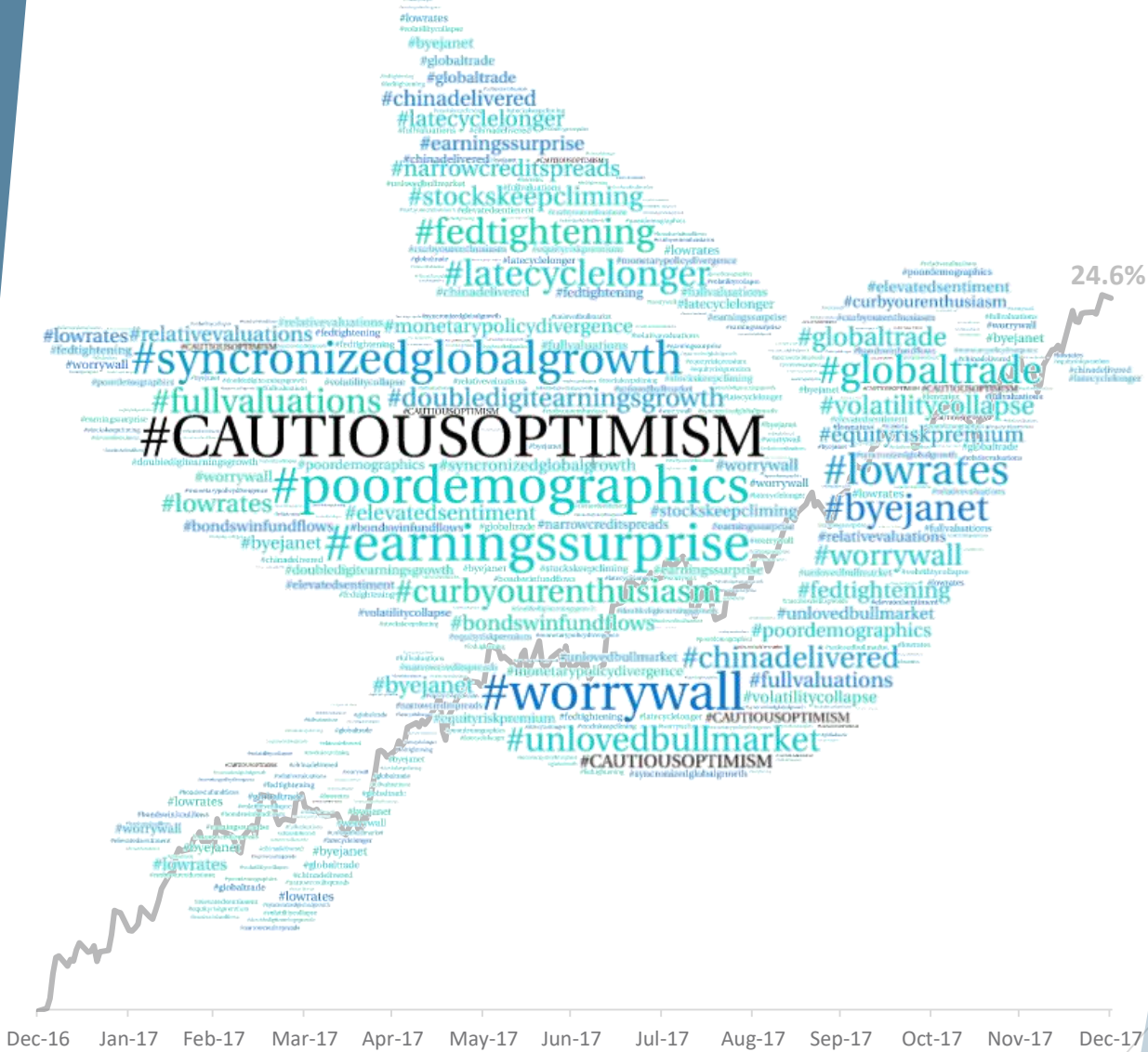

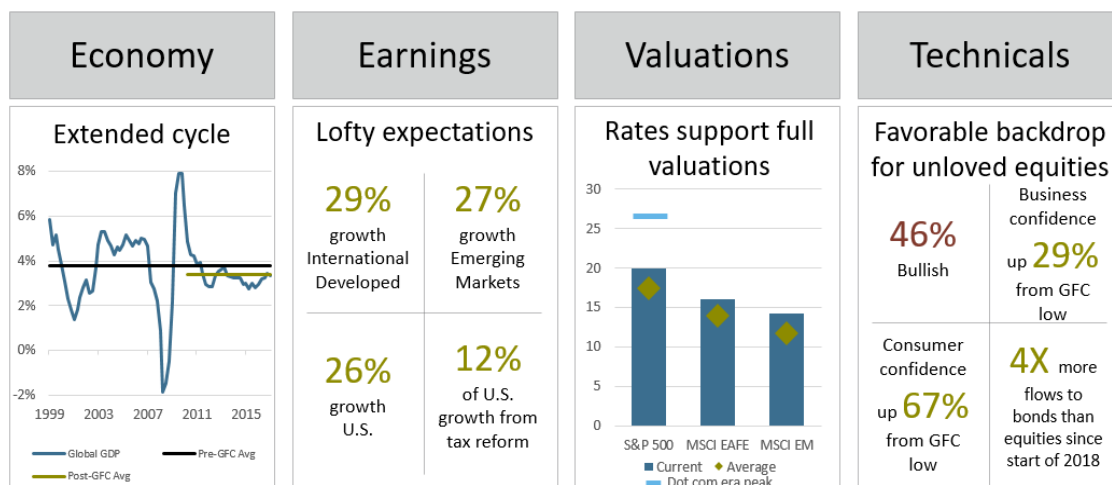

# In Brief

As we compile this addition of APCM Views, there are signs that the synchronized global economic expansion will continue suggesting that the global economy seems to have finally shrugged off the ghosts of the 2008 financial crisis. Our assessment of economic growth, unemployment levels and inflation indicates that the stage of recovery varies across the globe. Although challenges and risks to the recovery leave us cautious, we are optimistic that the global economy will continue to heal. Longer term we note that this cyclical upturn will eventually face headwinds due to high debt levels and deteriorating demographics. Improvements in productivity can help offset these headwinds. Our investment team is currently researching timely industry advancements to address key challenges in our cyclical and secular outlook. We look forward to sharing our conclusions with you in the spring of 2018.

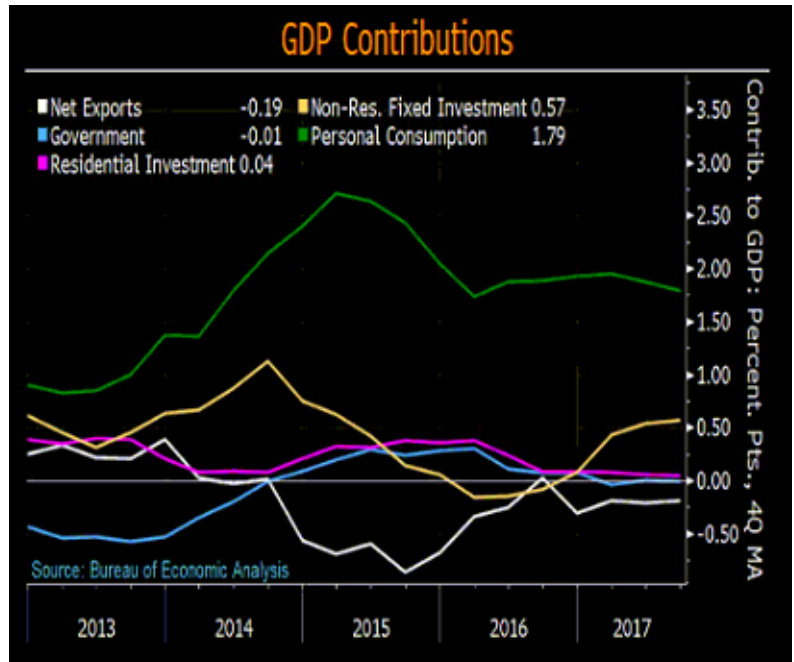

# United States: Late-cycle For Longer...

## 2017 Recap

- After a weak first quarter, the U.S. economy gained momentum throughout 2017 helping achieve Q3 growth of 2.3% yoy, which was in line with initial expectations. Increasing private investment more than compensated for consumer spending, which leveled off. Strong retail spending supported Q4 growth of 2.5% yoy.
- The labor market continued to tighten, with unemployment of 4.1% reaching levels not seen since 2000. However, wage inflation remains muted at 2.5% (LT average 3.5%), dampening consumer spending, which is nearly 70% of the U.S. economy. The personal savings rate continued to decline (2.6% vs. LT average 8.5%), which could be a headwind to future consumption as households rebuild their savings.

- Headline inflation ticked up to 2.2%, but the Fed’s favorite indicator, core PCE, remains below target at 1.4%. According to the latest dot plot, the Fed is not expecting a resurgence of inflation until 2019.

## Consensus Outlook

- Financial conditions (availability and cost of credit) remain accommodative, odds of a recession are in line with historical averages (15%), and implications of tax reform (1.0%+ over several years) are all tailwinds for growth. The IMF is forecasting GDP to be 2.6% in 2018, which is above the estimated long term potential of 2.0%. The Fed plans to raise rates three times in 2018, while the market is pricing in two. Wages are expected to increase to reflect the tightness of the labor market. 10 year inflation breakevens have broken out to the upside recently and remain just above 2%.

## APCM’s Cyclical View

- We look for financial conditions to remain supportive of economic growth while reflecting the Fed’s policy normalization. A slowdown in high frequency economic indicators, widening credit spreads, and an inverted yield curve would signal a higher probability of an oncoming recession. Monetary missteps remain a risk to the growth outlook, while tax reform could result in 3.0%+ growth in the near term and could contribute to upward pressure on wages.

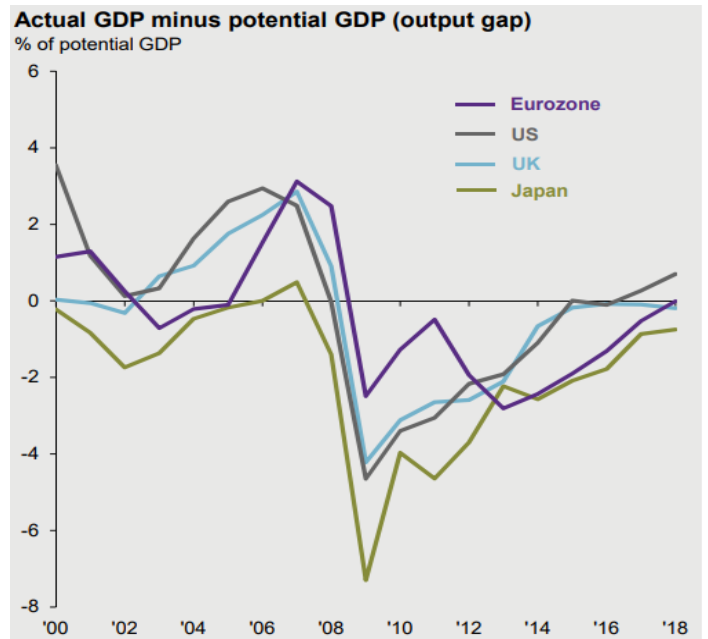
## APCM’s Secular View

- Longer term, unfavorable demographics and high debt levels create headwinds for growth. However, meaningful investment stemming from tax reform has the potential to be a catalyst to increase productivity levels.

# Developed Markets Exceed Expectations

## 2017 Recap

- Better than expected economic growth in developed international economies can be attributed to the cyclical upturn in global trade and manufacturing, as well less fiscal austerity in some countries (i.e. Europe). While consumption and investment have been the drivers of growth, individuals and businesses overseas continue to be supported by unprecedented amounts of monetary and/or fiscal stimulus (Japan).
- Overall growth improved in the EU with 2017 GDP expected to be 2.4%, above 2017 estimates of 1.6%. The dispersion between countries is wide in both level of recovery and future growth expectations. The output gap has closed in Germany and growth is accelerating in Ireland and Spain (2.5%+), while Italian growth is below 1% and UK growth is slowing. The ECB faces the challenge of unwinding stimulus while remaining accommodative to select economies.

- Japan’s economy continues its two year uninterrupted expansion with 2017 GDP expected to be an impressive 1.7%, relative to a 0.8% projection. A weaker yen against key trade partners boosted exports, while low rates continue to spur investment. In spite of 2.7% unemployment, a lack of wage pressures are holding back consumption.

## Consensus Outlook

- Weak inflation in international developed economies suggests monetary policy will remain supportive and the continuation of the cyclical upturn in global trade is expected to produce growth above long term potential. The pace of growth in Japan should slow to 1.2%, but remain above trend (LT potential 0.85%), while EU economies are expected to grow at 2.2% (LT potential 1.0%). The UK is operating close to long term potential (1.5%), while uncertainty surrounding BREXIT negotiations dampens the near term outlook.

## ACPM’s Cyclical View

- We look for trade and manufacturing growth to remain steady throughout the year. Inflation spikes could result in departures from continued policy support. As such, we are we are monitoring high frequency trade indicators (PMI and FX data) and breakeven inflation expectations. Global trade remains important to the near term outlook, while protectionist policies pose risks.

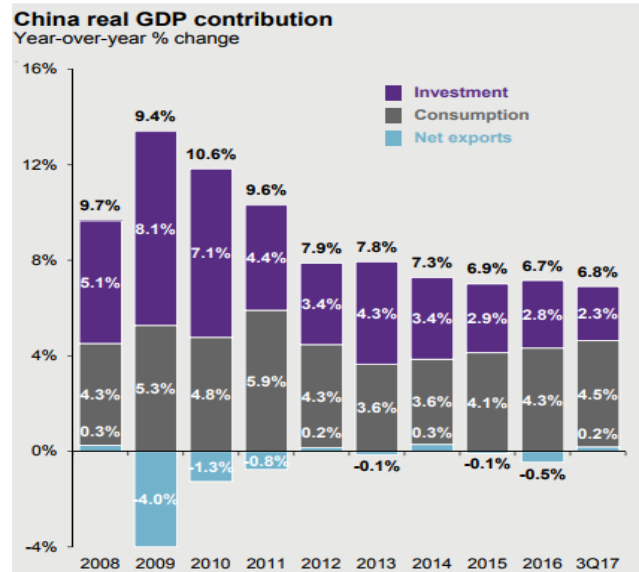
## ACPM’s Secular View

- Longer term, unfavorable demographics and high debt levels create headwinds for growth. The cyclical upturn creates an opportunity for policy makers to promote higher productivity and investment in human capital.

# Emerging Markets Deliver Solid Growth

## 2017 Recap

- China continued to meet their growth target with GDP increasing by 6.8% yoy, driven by an increase in consumption. Investment growth has slowed to reflect structural reforms to eliminate excess capacity, particularly in the steel and coal industries. Political events resulted in a wide range of reforms to mitigate financial sector risks as banking sector assets are now over 300% of GDP, up 240% since 2012.
- Robust growth in China and the cyclical rebound in global manufacturing and investment boosted global trade (4.3% yoy) to the benefit of many emerging market economies, particularly in South East Asia. Under Modi India has benefited from structural reforms, lower inflation, and accommodative monetary policy, which has provided a positive backdrop for growth.

- Russia and Brazil, key commodity exporters, rebounded from 2016 recessions to post positive growth, which is expected to be 1.8% and 0.7%, respectively. While oil prices increased over 10% to end the year just above \$60, this is still a substantial decline from 2014 highs of \$100+.

## Consensus Outlook

- Emerging Asia are expected to grow at 6.5% in 2018. The region should account for over half of global growth. China's growth will taper toward 6.5% next year, while India accelerates to 7.4%. Collectively, emerging market economies will continue to benefit from the broad pick up in economic activity with 2018 GDP expectations at 4.9% yoy.
- The upturn in global growth and a lengthy continuation of easy financial conditions create medium term risks as this backdrop can lead to financial excesses, particularly in China. In the event of a stumble, the lack of global integration in China's financial system reduces the magnitude of systematic financial contagion, but the level of economic integration would spur a slowdown in global GDP. While not an immediate threat, curtailing the buildup of these excesses is important to the outlook.

## APCM's Cyclical View

- In China, we are monitoring the ability of policy makers to balance the need for deleveraging (particularly in state owned enterprises), while meeting growth targets. The current reserve balance (\$3.1T) can provide support should the economic growth picture change.

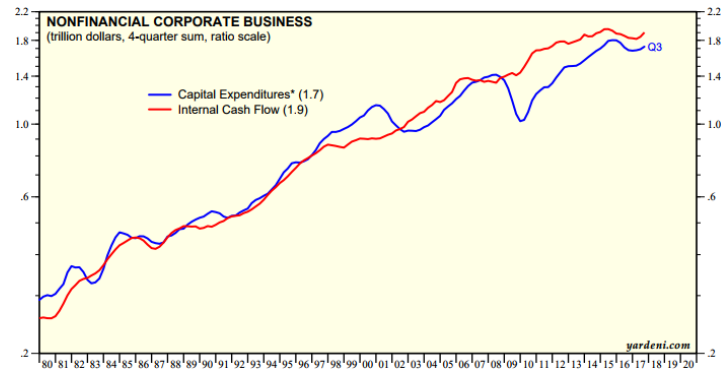
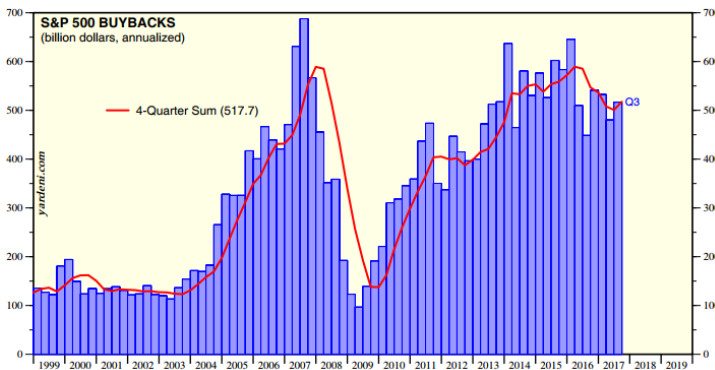
## APCM's Structural View

- Longer term, as a whole, emerging markets are expected to outpace developed economies given more favorable demographics and room for productivity improvements. However, some key emerging economies (China, Russia) face demographic and structural challenges, highlighting the need for reforms.

# Will U.S. Tax Reform Help Repair Balance Sheets?

## 2017 Recap

- Corporations continued to increase debt throughout 2017, albeit at a slower pace than previous years. The low rate environment still made debt issuance attractive.
- While gross leverage remained elevated at 25 year highs, interest coverage ratios (ability to service debt) were stable throughout the year and rating downgrades hit cyclical lows.
- Share buy backs slowed throughout the year while investment spending increased. This signals movement toward a successful shift from unsustainable levels of debt financed share buybacks.
- Corporate tax reform lowered the marginal corporate tax rate (35% to 21%), reduced incentives for companies to keep cash abroad, limited the deductibility of interest expense, and allowed immediate expensing of capital investments.

- Markets are pricing in higher earnings expectations as a result of tax reform. The change to the tax law will have redistributive effects with some sectors benefiting more than others. The effects on operating cash flows should be marginal, the cost of debt will increase, and there will be incentives for business reinvestment and capital spending. However, surveys are mixed as to how companies will deploy the cash windfall from tax reform. This capital can be allocated toward share buybacks, capital expenditures, M&A activity, or paying down debt.

## APCM's Cyclical View

- Corporate health in the year to come will be based upon key capital allocation decisions. We look to monitor the overall leverage in the system, how much companies reinvest (capital expenditures), how well they reinvest (return on investments is greater than the cost), and uses of repatriated cash.

## APCM's Secular View

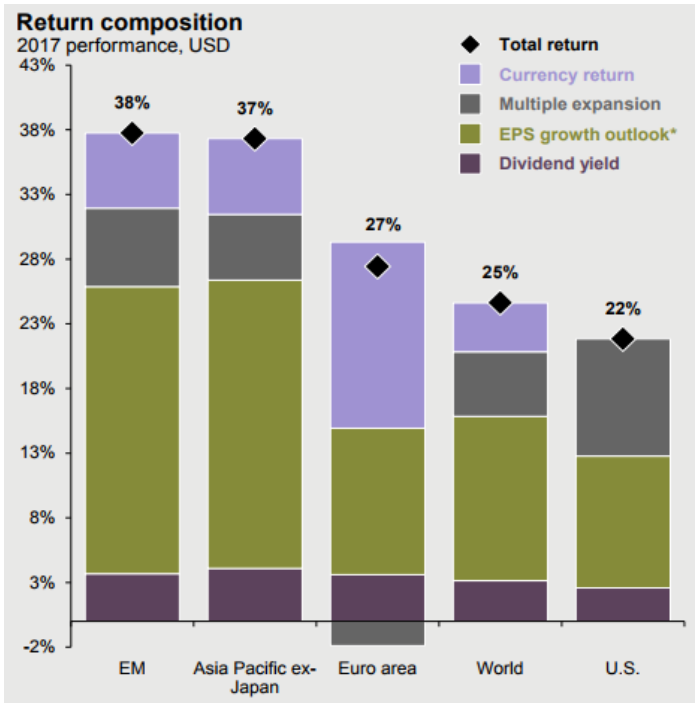
- Longer term, meaningful investment to increase production capacity by replacing aging equipment and structures is crucial to reversing the trend of weak productivity in both advanced and emerging economies.

# Markets Keep Going Up, Data Keeps Backing it Up

## 2017 Recap

- In 2017, the cyclical economic rebound supported earnings as global trailing earnings increased by over 16%. Earnings growth accelerated in developed international markets (22%), while emerging markets posted a second year of double digit gains (19%).
- Earnings in the U.S. provided the much needed support given current price levels. Large and mid sized companies, which have more international exposure, benefited from the global expansion and weakening dollar. Both large and mid stocks posted 10% earnings growth yoy, while small stocks lagged with earnings of 6% yoy.
- In spite of the impressive rebound in earnings, EPS still remain below previous peaks in Europe and many EM countries.

## Consensus Outlook

- In the U.S., tax reform is being reflected in earnings expectations with smaller companies seeing the largest revisions. Large cap earnings are projected to increase by 26%, with approximately half of the growth attributed to tax cuts. Mid and small cap companies are expected to grow by 34% and 44%, respectively.
- International companies are expected to have another year of double digit earnings growth stemming from both an increase in top line revenue and margin expansion. Developed countries are projected to increase 29%. Emerging market earnings will grow by 27%, driven by China, Russia, and Brazil.

## APCM's Cyclical View

- Lofty earnings expectations pose a key risk given current valuations should companies fall short. Operating margins in the U.S. remain elevated at 13%, expectations of higher wages will put downward pressure on earnings. To monitor this risk we are watching inflation prints most associated with wage growth. There is room for margin expansion overseas as operating margins peaked at 11% before the financial crisis and are currently projected to be 10%. We monitor earnings revisions and key drivers of ROE for signs of a reversal from the current optimistic outlook.

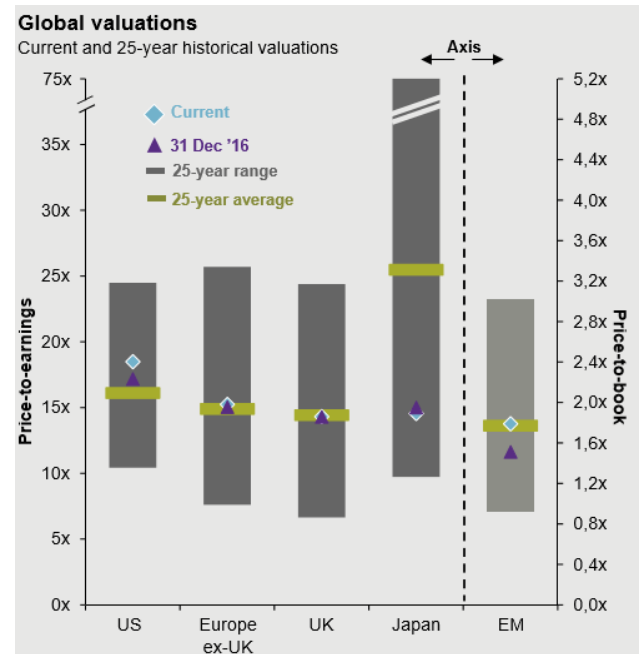
## APCM's Secular View

- Longer term, the earnings outlook is important to support asset prices as valuations leave little room for multiple expansion, thus supporting subdued return expectations. Over a 10 year horizon (our long term capital market forecast), international equities stand to benefit from lower relative valuations and currency tailwinds of a weaker dollar for U.S. investors.

# Equity Risk Premium Supports Stocks

## 2017 Recap

- Equity returns can be decomposed into dividends, earnings growth, and multiple expansion (prices rise faster than earnings). In 2017, earnings and dividends were the primary driver of returns, although the U.S. and emerging markets were aided by multiple expansion. Stocks in developed international economies did not experience multiple expansion (i.e. Europe), but U.S. investors benefited from currency returns.
- Overseas, relative valuations are more appealing with the MSCI EAFE Index trading at a forward P/E of 15.0x vs a 14.7x at the start of the year and the MSCI EM Index ended with a forward P/E of 12.5x vs 12.0x in January.
- Baa credit spreads in the U.S. compressed throughout the year to end 178 bps above Treasuries (60 bps more expensive than the LT average) as the search for yield has overwhelmed growing uneasiness about balance sheet strength and increased debt issuance.

- Term premiums also continued to compress as the curve flattened. The 2-10 spread declined 70 bps to end at 52 bps (LT average 95 bps) and the 10-30 spread declined 27 bps to end at 33 bps (LT average 58 bps).
- Both earnings yields and corporate bond yields declined throughout the year. The S&P 500 earnings yield of 4.3% is still above the Baa corporate bond yield of 3.7%, making stocks relatively attractive to bonds.

## Consensus Outlook

- Expectations for the continuation of economic expansion, tame inflation, modest upward pressure on U.S. rates, and unprecedented easy monetary policy overseas suggest valuations in the stock and bond markets can remain at elevated levels in the near term. We monitor indicators that could trigger a sharp correction in valuations such as inflation and rate expectations, reported earnings, volatility, and sentiment. To quantify this risk given consensus earnings estimates (\$151), a return to the historical valuation average (16x) indicates a price correction of 15%.

## APCM's Cyclical View

- Today's high valuations provide less of a cushion to absorb shocks leaving the markets vulnerable to unpredictable geopolitical events, adverse economic or financial shocks, as well as other "unknowns". However, unless recession risk picks up, such drawdowns should be less severe.

## APCM's Secular View

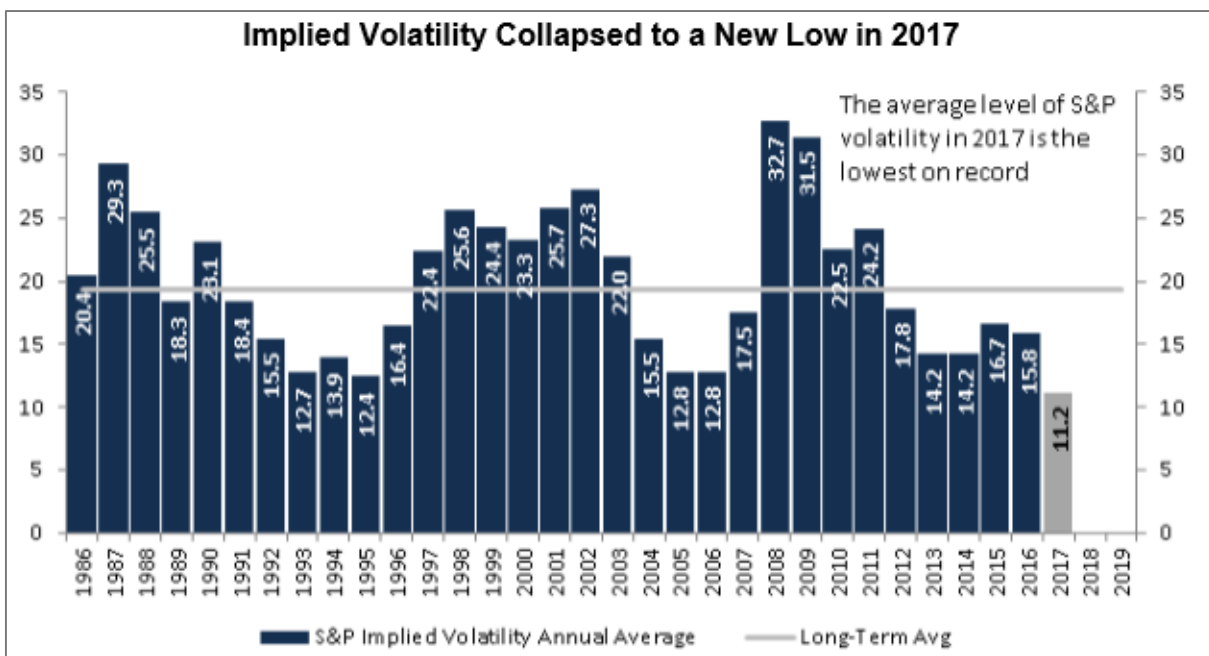
- Longer term, valuations indicate returns have been borrowed from the future and gains are likely to be more modest going forward. However, the global equity risk premium still suggests investors will be adequately compensated for the risk of stocks.



# An Unloved Equity Bull Market

## 2017 Recap

- Realized volatility in equity markets was exceptionally low with the S&P 500 averaging just above 6%, less than half the normal average and the lowest since 1964.
- In spite of elevated business and consumer sentiment, investors remained cautious with surveys conveying an equally bullish and bearish outlook on markets for most of the year.
- Fund flows also highlighted caution as investors poured more money into bonds vs. stocks. Flows were negative within the domestic stock market while positive inflows demonstrated investors favored international stocks.

- The projected continuation of the favorable backdrop for risky assets (positive growth, limited upward pressure on rates, and modest inflation) is currently priced into the markets. Implied volatility for the U.S. stock market (VIX) and bond market (MOVE) remain below historical averages at 11.5% and 52 bps, respectively.

## APCM’s Cyclical View

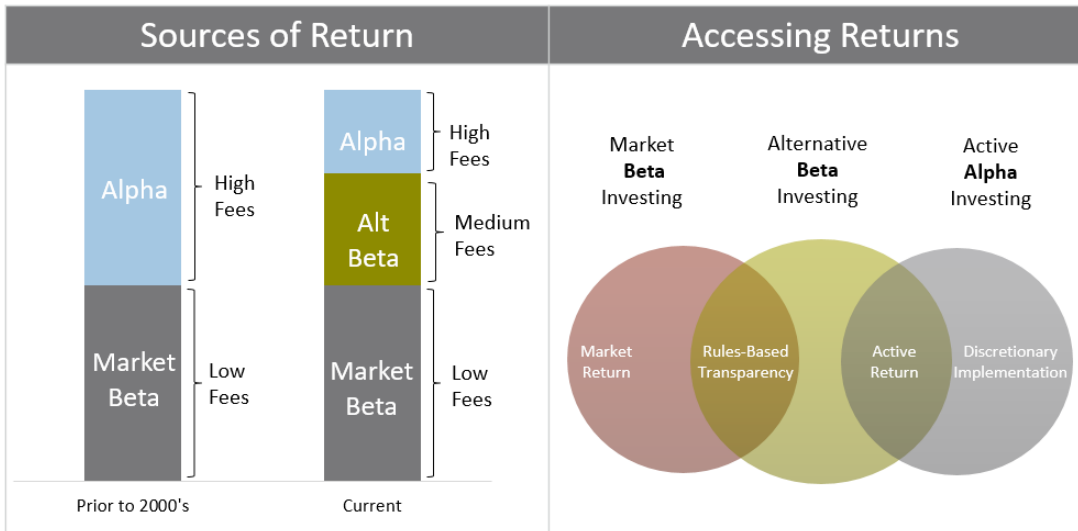
- The market environment for risk is positive when volatility is low, dispersion is high, and correlations are low. We look for a directional change in fundamental high frequency indicators which would trigger a pick up in volatility and correlations.

## APCM’s Secular View

- The eventual transition out of this low volatility regime should not derail a sound investment strategy. APCM integrates reasonable future volatility projections for portfolio construction and strategic planning purposes.

# Parting Thoughts

Over the past several years, APCM’s investment committee has been monitoring two key industry advancements which are creating interesting investment opportunities for our clients.



The industry’s broader understanding of sources of return has enabled fund providers to create exchange traded funds (ETFs) which capture exposure to new asset classes and strategies in a way that enables investors to pursue investment performance and/or help manage portfolio risk.


**Ms. Jones**, seconded by **Ms. Erickson**, moved to APPROVE the Regular Meeting Minutes of March 7, 2018.
