#### FAIRBANKS CITY COUNCIL REGULAR MEETING MINUTES, JANUARY 29, 2018 FAIRBANKS CITY COUNCIL CHAMBERS 800 CUSHMAN STREET, FAIRBANKS, ALASKA

The City Council convened at 7:00 p.m. on the above date, following a 6:00 p.m. Work Session for the Permanent Fund Annual Report, to conduct a Regular Meeting of the Fairbanks City Council at the City Council Chambers, 800 Cushman Street, Fairbanks, Alaska, with Mayor Jim Matherly presiding and with the following Council Members in attendance:

City Clerk Danyielle Snider read aloud the Mission Statement of the City of Fairbanks.

#### **INVOCATION**

The Invocation was given by City Clerk Danyielle Snider.

#### **FLAG SALUTATION**

Mayor Matherly asked Ms. Huntington to lead the Flag Salutation.

#### **CEREMONIAL MATTERS**

**Mayor Matherly** called firefighter Keith Berrien forward and presented him with a gold pan; he thanked him for his 27 years of service to the City of Fairbanks. **Mayor Matherly** spoke to Mr. Berrien's contributions to the Fairbanks Fire Department (FFD) and to the City of Fairbanks. He asked everyone to give Mr. Berrien a round of applause in appreciation of his dedicated service.

#### CITIZENS' COMMENTS ON CONSENT AGENDA ITEMS

Mayor Matherly called for Public Testimony and, hearing none, declared Public Testimony closed.

#### APPROVAL OF AGENDA AND CONSENT AGENDA

**Mr. Pruhs**, seconded by **Ms. Huntington**, moved to APPROVE the Agenda and Consent Agenda.

**Mr.** Cleworth pulled Resolution No. 4820 and the Memo Regarding City Fire Department Manning and Mutual Aid from the Consent Agenda.

Mr. Pruhs pulled Resolution No. 4822 from the Consent Agenda.

Mayor Matherly called for objection and, hearing none, so ORDERED.

City Clerk Snider read the Consent Agenda, as Amended, into the record.

**Mr. Pruhs**, seconded by **Ms. Huntington**, moved to WAIVE PROTEST on the Liquor License Applications for Renewal.

<u>Jessica Lissow</u>, 2703 Chief Alexander Drive, Fairbanks – Ms. Lissow thanked the Council for their service to the community and stated that her father, Mr. Mensik, is a dedicated member of the community. She stated her father is a great parent and grandparent, and the recent negative attention surrounding him is not warranted. She reported Mr. Mensik employs 150 local residents, and he cares about each one. She stated Mr. Mensik is a hands-on business operator, and he stops by each of his businesses daily. Ms. Lissow stated Mr. Mensik is a busy man, but he always makes time for his family. She stated she has read negative and untrue things about her father recently; she stated that he is a quality man and business man. She stated her father has given a lot to the community, and she provided some examples.

**Ms. Rogers** asked Ms. Lissow where she had read negative things about her father; Ms. Lissow stated she read news articles and social media posts. Ms. Lissow stated she grew up in Fairbanks and that she has heard negative comments about bar owners her whole life.

Rick Mensik, 115 Chief Evan Drive, Fairbanks – Mr. Mensik asked the Council to give consideration to all of the circumstances surrounding Kodiak Jack's. He stated he contributes to the community not just by employing people but also in paying his sales tax; he added that he donates to many local organizations. He spoke to the police callout report and stated that many of the calls took place while his establishment was closed. Mr. Mensik compared other liquor establishments to Kodiak Jack's, specifically Fred Meyer and Safeway. He stated he places a lot of emphasis on his security team and spends a great deal of money on payroll to keep them well-staffed and educated. He stated the safety of his patrons is very important to him, and he asked the Council to consider all factors when deciding whether to protest his license.

**Ms. Rogers** asked Mr. Mensik if he was still working with Police Chief Eric Jewkes to increase security at Kodiak Jack's. Mr. Mensik stated he has had several meetings with Chief Jewkes and has relayed the information to his security staff.

**Ms.** Therrien asked Mr. Mensik if he has implemented any new procedures since working with Chief Jewkes and, if so, whether there has subsequently been less police activity. Mr. Mensik reported his head of security now wears a body camera just like the type police officers wear. He stated he has been working with the military base to help reduce the number of incidents that occur at his business.

**Mr. Cleworth** asked about the hours of operation for Kodiak Jack's; Mr. Mensik stated the hours of operation are Thursday from 8 a.m. till 2 a.m. and Friday and Saturday from 8 p.m. to 3:30 a.m. **Mr. Cleworth** asked whether the BoomTown liquor license is adjacent to Kodiak Jack's; Mr. Mensik replied affirmatively and stated that it is owned by the same owners who own the Lemongrass Restaurant. Mr. Mensik stated that BoomTown Grill & Bar has different operating hours, but they open the space in the evenings when Kodiak Jack's is open because it is also the pull tab parlor.

**Ms. Huntington** asked how many people are on the security staff and how many security staff work on shift at the same time. Mr. Mensik stated he has 13 total security staff working Friday

nights, and he employs a total of 20 security staff. **Ms. Huntington** asked Mr. Mensik if he has metal detectors; Mr. Mensik stated they have metal detectors, and they pat each person down upon entry or reentry to Kodiak Jack's. He stated that females pat down the female customers, and males pat down the male customers. **Ms. Huntington** asked if lighting in the parking lot has improved; Mr. Mensik stated he has the letter that former Police Chief Randall Aragon signed after he made the requested lighting changes to the property.

**Mr. Pruhs** asked Mr. Mensik if he resides in City limits; Mr. Mensik replied affirmatively. He stated he moved to Fairbanks in 1983 and that he has been operating various businesses in Fairbanks since 1992. He reported he has complied with the requests of several different police chiefs over the years in order to increase the safety of patrons. **Mr. Pruhs** asked Mr. Mensik if he has ever been denied a liquor license; Mr. Mensik reported that he has not.

Nicholas Nyquist, 558 Gaffney Road, Fairbanks – Mr. Nyquist stated he is the landlord at 537 Gaffney Road, the location of Kodiak Jack's. He stated that, as the property owner, losing Mr. Mensik as a tenant would create a hardship. He stated Mr. Mensik has a great deal of knowledge of the building because he has occupied the space for so long. He stated there are other tenants in the building that would be affected if Kodiak Jack's was to lose its liquor license.

**Mr. Pruhs** asked Mr. Nyquist what he would do with the building if he lost Mr. Mensik as a tenant. Mr. Nyquist stated he did not know what he would do with the facility because it would need a significant amount of remodeling, and it would not be feasible. **Mr. Pruhs** spoke to the vacant businesses and buildings on Cushman Street; Mr. Nyquist spoke to the hazard of Kodiak Jack's being vacant and the amount of taxes that the bar generates for the City of Fairbanks.

Sean White, 899 Senate Drive, Fairbanks – Mr. White stated anytime a large number of people get together and consume alcohol someone is going to do something stupid. He stated if Kodiak Jack's closes, the crowd will simply migrate to another bar and cause the same kind of problems. He reported that Mr. Mensik has been responsive to all requests from safety officials and that shutting his business down would be curtailing commerce. Mr. White stated he works for the FFD, and he has only been called for incidents in the parking lot of the establishment, never inside of the bar. He stated the Council should work on the bigger issue with alcohol; he suggested that there be a requirement for a non-alcohol designation to appear on an individual's State identification card to prevent the purchase of alcohol by someone who is not allowed to do so. He further stated that the Council should enact an ordinance requiring that all alcohol purchases, no matter the age of the purchaser, be subject to an identification check to verify whether the individual has any alcohol-related convictions.

<u>Frank Turney</u>, 329 6th <u>Avenue</u>, <u>Fairbanks</u> – Mr. Turney stated he is against putting alcohol into his body but that the government should not be regulating what he puts into his body. He stated he appreciated hearing Mr. Mensik's daughter report on the good things he has done for the community. He stated that when he was younger he used to enjoy going out and having fun and that if the Council shuts down entertainment venues, the City will "go to hell in a handbasket." He echoed Mr. White's idea about an identification check for all alcohol purchases.

<u>Victor Buberge, P.O. Box 58192, Fairbanks</u> – Mr. Buberge spoke in support of an ordinance regarding an identification check but stated that it will not stop someone from having a friend

purchase alcohol for them. He stated he has been to Kodiak Jack's a few times and that Mr. Mensik seems to be doing the best he can with his security team. He stated it is a well-run business and that nothing is going to prevent people from acting like humans.

Hearing no more requests for public comment, **Mayor Matherly** declared Public Testimony closed.

**Mr. Bagwill** stated he is impressed with the amount of homework Mr. Mensik did prior to the Council meeting.

**Mayor Matherly** stated it is hard to compare Fred Meyer and Kodiak Jack's because of the tens of thousands of people who shop there each week compared to the limited hours of operation of the bar. He stated that he and the Council are concerned about public safety. He stated he works closely with Chief Jewkes to address public safety concerns and that there is nothing personal behind the questions being asked about Kodiak Jack's.

**Mr. Pruhs** thanked Mr. Mensik for coming to the Council meeting to testify both personally and professionally about his business.

**Ms. Huntington** thanked Mr. Mensik for attending and for giving an overview of the safety precautions that are already in place. She stated that when the Council receives the callout information, it is hard to determine what happened at a property. She stated businesses need to be held accountable, and she is happy to see that Mr. Mensik has addressed all safety concerns.

**Ms. Rogers** thanked Mr. Mensik for attending and for speaking about his liquor license renewal. She shared concern that other liquor license owners were not present to speak on behalf of their respective liquor license renewals.

#### MAYOR'S COMMENTS AND REPORT

#### a) Special Reports

Amy Geiger, 101 Dunkel Street, Fairbanks – Ms. Geiger spoke to the 2018 Visitor's Guide and stated that it is the main marketing tool for Explore Fairbanks. She stated Explore Fairbanks used a picture of the aurora borealis on the cover of the guide because it has been such a popular destination marketing tool. She stated Explore Fairbanks' website now has a midnight sun tracker that allows visitors to see how many daylight and twilight hours there are during the year.

<u>Brittany Smart, 907 Terminal Street, Fairbanks</u> – Ms. Smart reported on community meetings focused on air quality and on the Sandbox 2.0 meeting that will be a continuing discussion about

the Fairbanks North Star Borough Budget (FNSB) the budget. She stated the Borough needs to make budget cuts, and they want to gather community perspective.

**Mayor Matherly** shared the importance of attending and being involved in community decisions. Ms. Smart stated that Mayor Karl Kassel would like as much community involvement as possible because they are trying to determine which facilities to keep in operation.

Public Works Director Jeff Jacobson reported on a pipe leak that occurred in the basement of City Hall and spoke to the need to consider steam pipe replacement. He provided a picture of the rotten pipe and explained that it will not be able to be patched. He stated he is working with Development Manager Patrick Smith to obtain drawings of the existing heating system for future use. Mr. Jacobson stated two heat pumps failed at the parking garage over the weekend and staff had to be sent home due to the cold temperature in the building. He stated the cold weather has been taking a toll on the garbage packer trucks and other equipment at Public Works. He reported that his department is working on snow removal, and it is a long process because of the amount of snow that has fallen and because of the rain that turned into ice. He reported that the snow removal schedule is updated on the City's website weekly.

**Mr. Bagwill** asked if garbage pickups were delayed; Mr. Jacobson reported that crews had been behind in the morning because of the weather, but they caught up in the afternoon.

**Mayor Matherly** stated that he and Chief of Staff Mike Meeks have been dealing with some vehicle impound issues and that people need to know it is expensive to get a car out of impound. He stated the Work Session about the Permanent Fund was informative and shared that he is happy the balance has increased so much over the past few years. **Mayor Matherly** reported he attended the Project Homeless Connect event at the JP Jones Center, and there was increased turnout over prior years. He cautioned the public to drive safely and to slow down because of poor road conditions, and he mentioned the 23-vehicle pileup on the Johansen Expressway.

#### **NEW BUSINESS**

Mayor Matherly called for objection, and hearing none, so ORDERED.

**Mr.** Cleworth requested a staff report on the changes in Resolution No. 4820, as Amended. Chief Styers stated the original match funding was removed, because a match is not required. He stated they also arrived at better overtime calculations.

**Mr. Pruhs** spoke to the supreme sacrifice of Sergeant Allen Brand. He stated that the Council needs to do right by Sgt. Brandt's family, and he asked for a moment of silence.

**Ms. Huntington** expressed agreement with Mr. Pruhs.

#### **DISCUSSION ITEMS**

a) Committee Reports

<u>Permanent Fund Review Board</u> – **Ms. Therrien** stated the Permanent Fund Review Board met earlier in day, and she shared that the fund is doing well. She stated that they may look at some different investment categories in the future.

<u>Public Safety Commission</u> – **Ms. Huntington** stated the Commission would hold a special meeting the following day at the Fairbanks Police Department (FPD) to discuss marijuana regulations. She reported the Commission discussed the high number of homicides in Fairbanks in 2017, a record high of 13. She stated the Commission discussed whether it was a fluke or a trend and that they want to renew their mission to help the Mayor and Council.

<u>Polaris Work Group</u> – **Mr. Pruhs** reported the group met on January 23 and discussed teaming up with the Fairbanks Downtown Association to help raise the \$115,000 needed to buy the note on the building.

<u>Legislative Advocacy Group</u> – **Ms. Rogers** stated the group met telephonically with Lobbyist Yuri Morgan and discussed the state bill regarding smoking; she stated the group will meet again on Thursday.

<u>FMATS Policy Committee</u> – **Mr. Cleworth** stated there were large cost overruns on the Noble Street project, and reallocating funds was discussed. He stated he was concerned that the City has been asked to increase their match of funds and explained that there is a Council-approved limit for matching funds. He spoke to the importance of putting limits on dollar amounts when projects are being approved. He stated it is unfortunate that funds may be taken from the Barnette Street project, and he stated that it may get pushed back.

#### WRITTEN COMMUNICATIONS TO COUNCIL

a) Memo Regarding City Fire Department Manning and Mutual Aid

**Mr. Pruhs**, seconded by **Mr. Cleworth**, moved to ACCEPT the Memo Regarding City Fire Department Manning and Mutual Aid.

Mr. Cleworth requested that Fire Chief Jim Styers start providing the Council with the reports given to the Public Safety Commission on call statistics. He asked the Chief to explain what the different call categories mean: alpha, bravo, charlie, delta, echo. Chief Styers stated that for calls regarding a fire, "alpha" means smoke in an area, and the scale progresses with severity; he stated that "echo" means a structure is on fire with flames in the building. Chief Styers explained that dispatchers determine the importance of calls and let the department know the level of an emergency based on the information they are given. Mr. Cleworth asked Chief Styers to speak to mutual aid for ambulances; Chief Styers stated that when no City ambulance is available to respond to a call, the Computer-Aided Dispatch (CAD) system automatically dispatches the call to the next closest available ambulance. Mr. Cleworth asked how many ambulances there are at FFD; Chief Styers stated there are three in the station and a fourth one in storage for backup. He stated that only two ambulances can be run with minimum manning of nine personnel. Mr. Cleworth referenced the high number of mutual aid responses provided to the City by the Steese and University Fire Departments.

**Mr. Pruhs** asked if there is a way to generate a report that shows the different classifications of emergency calls FFD responds to. Chief Styers stated he could generate a report on all past data, and he could start giving the Council regular updates.

#### **CITIZENS' COMMENTS**

<u>Frank Turney</u>, 329 6th Avenue, <u>Fairbanks</u> – Mr. Turney reported he attended the opioid event at the Westmark Hotel and that the Mayor's story about his daughter is heartbreaking. He spoke to transgender issues and asked why the media was not reporting on the potty project. He stated he would like to know what is going on behind the scenes with the Fairbanks Diversity Council.

<u>Victor Buberge</u>, P.O. <u>Box 58192</u>, <u>Fairbanks</u> – Mr. Buberge stated he has lived in Fairbanks permanently since 1977; he stated that he has never seen a Native Indian or Eskimo on the Fairbanks Police force. He spoke to the wages of FPD employees and asked why they get so much overtime. He suggested the Council follow Detroit's lead and cut FPD wages by 10%.

<u>Sean White, 899 Senate Drive, Fairbanks</u> – Mr. White stated that his salary appears inflated because he earns overtime; he stated that when the City calls, he goes to work. He stated the number one way to reduce overtime is to staff adequately; he stated the City will not staff departments sufficiently. He stated he has worked for the City for almost 25 years and that every

year the overtime budgets are out of control due to inadequate staffing. Mr. White reported he just took a 4% pay decrease because the Council chose not to fund the Fairbanks Firefighters Union (FFU) contract. He stated each ordinance has a fiscal note attached, and it was wrong for the Council to amend the budget on with floor without discussing it in a Finance Committee meeting. He stated nobody knows how much the Council took from the FFD when they non-funded healthcare, took away their 1% raise, and cut one position. He stated the Council should not approve the AFL-CIO contract because that would be treating one union better than another.

Charles Renner, 3080 Greenbrier Way, North Pole – Mr. Renner stated he has worked for the City for three years, and he read aloud the City's mission statement. He stated that Fairbanks has become a less desirable place to work and live. He spoke to the history of labor negotiations between the City and the FFU. He stated the morale at the department dwindled during labor negotiations, but got better when the Council funded the arbitrator's award. Mr. Renner indicated that when the Council chose to non-fund the contract, morale decreased. He stated that the department's call volume has increased by 20% since he was hired, yet they continue to be understaffed. He stated he has stated looking for new employment because the Council continues to dump money into the Permanent Fund and go back on agreements with the union. Mr. Renner spoke to a Council member's recent comment about the current Council being the best Council to work with; he stated he does not believe that to be true.

<u>Michael Farrell, P.O. Box 83327, Fairbanks</u> – Mr. Farrell stated he has been looking into a blockchain; he stated that a lot of people do not know what peoples' wages are.

#### **COUNCIL MEMBERS' COMMENTS**

**Ms. Huntington** thanked everyone for attending the Council meeting and for all of the hard work done at the meeting.

Ms. Rogers spoke to the reason for the purposeful high cost of fees for a DUI; she stated that the fees serve as a deterrent to drinking and driving. She stated that people who lose a family member to a DUI feel the impact for years and years. She stated she turns a deaf ear to people when they complain about the cost of their vehicle impoundment because of the choices they made. Ms. Rogers thanked Mayor Matherly for his continued effort to fight the opioid crisis devastating the community. She stated she was charmed by all the people who showed up to support Mr. Mensik and the Kodiak Jack's liquor license. She stated she enjoyed seeing people support for their employer and coworkers. She welcomed Ms. Therrien back from vacation and shared that she was missed.

**Ms.** Therrien stated it is good to be back, but it was refreshing to have the break. She stated she did not speak much to the liquor license renewals but that she was impressed by Mr. Mensik's work with Chief Jewkes; she stated it changed her mind on the vote.

**Mr. Pruhs** stated the that North Pole identified their water contamination issue seven years ago and are just now addressing it. He stated that the City of Fairbanks identified the Fire Training Center contamination issue in August 2016 and started construction to fix the issue in December 2016.

**Mr.** Cleworth stated he attended the memorial service of Charlotte Wilbur, a well-known Fairbanks pioneer who led an incredibly interesting life. He thanked Mr. Jacobson for the Public Works update and for the work in restoring City Hall. He spoke to the reasons why the Council puts money into the Permanent Fund, and he stated that the Fund is not inflation-proof. He stated the Council rarely puts extra money into the Permanent Fund, and it takes the maximum draw each year to fund daily operations. He spoke to the importance of protecting the Fund.

**Mr. Bagwill** thanked everyone for their comments, for being involved in local government, and for having their voice be heard. He asked people to be mindful of pedestrians when they are out and about. He reminded everyone of the prescription drug depository at the FPD and stated that the opioid problem remains constant. He encouraged parents to talk to their children about drugs and alcohol. He spoke to events he attended since the last regular Council meeting.

**Mr. Pruhs**, seconded by **Mr. Bagwill**, moved to go into Executive Session for the purpose of discussing FFU Labor Negotiations.

Mayor Matherly called for objection and, hearing none, so ORDERED.

Mayor Matherly called for a brief recess.

#### **EXECUTIVE SESSION**

a) FFU Labor Negotiations

The City Council met in Executive Session to discuss FFU Labor Negotiations. Direction was given to the negotiating team, and no action was taken.





#### An Act

To amend the Communications Act of 1934 to require multi-line telephone systems to have a configuration that permits users to directly initiate a call to 9-1-1 without dialing any additional digit, code, prefix, or post-fix, and for other purposes.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,

#### SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.

This Act may be cited as the "Kari's Law Act of 2017".

SEC. 2. CONFIGURATION OF MULTI-LINE TELEPHONE SYSTEMS FOR DIRECT DIALING OF 9-1-1.

(a) IN GENERAL.—Title VII of the Communications Act of 1934 (47 U.S.C. 601 et seq.) is amended by adding at the end the following:

"SEC. 721. CONFIGURATION OF MULTI-LINE TELEPHONE SYSTEMS FOR DIRECT DIALING OF 9-1-1.

"(a) SYSTEM MANUFACTURE, IMPORTATION, SALE, AND LEASE.—A person engaged in the business of manufacturing, importing, selling, or leasing multi-line telephone systems may not manufacture or import for use in the United States, or sell or lease or offer to sell or lease in the United States, a multi-line telephone system, unless such system is pre-configured such that, when properly installed in accordance with subsection (b), a user may directly initiate a call to 9–1–1 from any station equipped with dialing facilities, without dialing any additional digit, code, prefix, or postfix, including any trunk-access code such as the digit '9', regardless of whether the user is required to dial such a digit, code, prefix, or post-fix for other calls.

"(b) SYSTEM INSTALLATION, MANAGEMENT, AND OPERATION.—A person engaged in the business of installing, managing, or operating multi-line telephone systems may not install, manage, or operate for use in the United States such a system, unless such system is configured such that a user may directly initiate a call to 9–1–1 from any station equipped with dialing facilities, without dialing any additional digit, code, prefix, or post-fix, including any trunk-access code such as the digit '9', regardless of whether the user is required to dial such a digit, code, prefix, or post-fix for other calls.

"(c) ON-SITE NOTIFICATION.—A person engaged in the business of installing, managing, or operating multi-line telephone systems shall, in installing, managing, or operating such a system for use in the United States, configure the system to provide a notification

to a central location at the facility where the system is installed or to another person or organization regardless of location, if the system is able to be configured to provide the notification without

"(d) EFFECT ON STATE LAW.—Nothing in this section is intended to alter the authority of State commissions or other State or local agencies with jurisdiction over emergency communications, if the exercise of such authority is not inconsistent with this Act.

"(e) ENFORCEMENT.—This section shall be enforced under title V, except that section 501 applies only to the extent that such section provides for the punishment of a fine.

"(f) MULTI-LINE TELEPHONE SYSTEM DEFINED.—In this section,

(b) EFFECTIVE DATE.—The amendment made by subsection (a) shall apply with respect to a multi-line telephone system that is manufactured, imported, offered for first sale or lease, first sold or leased, or installed after the date that is 2 years after the date of the enactment of this Act.

#### REAL ESTATE PURCHASE and SALE AGREEMENT

THIS AGREEMENT is made between the Parties:

Jorge Correa-Merlos, whose address is 6522 Homer Drive, Anchorage, Alaska, 99518, hereinafter referred to as "SELLER"; and

The City of Fairbanks, a municipal corporation of the State of Alaska, whose address is 800 Cushman Street, Fairbanks, Alaska, 99701, hereinafter referred to as "PURCHASER."

For and in consideration of the mutual promises set forth below, SELLER and PURCHASER agree as follows:

1. PURCHASE AND SALE OF REAL PROPERTY. SELLER agrees to sell to PURCHASER, and PURCHASER agrees to buy from SELLER, that certain real property more particularly described as:

Lots 1, 2, 11, 12, 13, 14, 15 and 16 of Block 6, Bjerremark Homestead Subdivision, according to the plat filed June 30, 1950 as Instrument Number 119.146.

- 2. EARNEST MONEY DEPOSIT. FIVE Thousand and 00/100 Dollars (\$5,000.00) evidenced by: Check payable to Yukon Title Company of Fairbanks Alaska, upon execution of this Agreement, received from PURCHASER, as part payment of the purchase price, set forth below.
- 3. PURCHASE PRICE: \$200,000.00.

Payable as Follows:

All cash to SELLER, at time of closing of this transaction.

- 4. CONDITIONS PRECEDENT. The following conditions must be satisfied by the Parties as designated below prior to and as a condition of closing of this transaction:
  - 4.1 Due Diligence Investigations

PURCHASER has inspected the property and accepts same in its as-is, where-is condition.

5. TITLE. At closing, SELLER shall convey marketable title to the property to the PURCHASER subject only to benign covenants and easements of record, none of which affect the marketability of the SELLER's title. PURCHASER shall obtain a policy of title insurance insuring the title of the PURCHASER in the full amount of the

purchase price, and the premium for said policy shall be paid by PURCHASER. If SELLER cannot furnish marketable title, this transaction may be terminated by PURCHASER at its discretion.

- 6. EASEMENTS and ENCUMBRANCES. Rights reserved in Federal Patents, Territorial or State Deeds, Zoning Regulations, benign easements, and subdivision covenants, if any, shall not be deemed as encumbrances to be discharged. All properties shall be delivered to the PURCHASER at time of closing free of all mortgages, liens, judgments, and any taxes or assessments in default or arrears. The amount of any such encumbrances which are now known liens on the property shall be paid by SELLER.
- 7. PRORATING. Real property taxes shall be pro-rated as of the date of closing of this transaction.
- 8. CLOSING COSTS. Closing costs, meaning those costs ordinarily incidental to closing a real estate transaction such as escrow fees, and preparation and recordation of documents required for closing, shall be paid for by PURCHASER.
- 9. CLOSING AND ESCROW. The closing of this transaction shall be held at the earliest practical date consistent with the terms and conditions herein. However, closing shall be held no later than 30 days from the date of acceptance shown below. Such closing shall be escrowed with and processed by Yukon Title Company of Fairbanks. A copy of this Agreement shall be deposited with the escrow agent by SELLER, which Agreement shall serve as the escrow instructions.
- 10. CLOSING DOCUMENTS. SELLER shall execute and deliver to the escrow agent a Statutory Warranty Deed conveying the referenced real property to the PURCHASER.
- 11. POSSESSION. PURCHASER shall have possession at close of sale. SELLER shall have 30-days after closing to remove personal effects.
- 12. RISK OF LOSS. Risk of loss due to fire, flood, earthquake, acts of God, or other calamity shall rest on the SELLER until closing, and the PURCHASER has the option to rescind this Agreement if such event shall occur or close the transaction as provided hereafter. If the PURCHASER chooses to proceed with the closing, the SELLER agrees to reduce the total purchase price and the amounts due to the SELLER at closing by the amount of the loss. Such loss shall be determined in accordance with such reasonable methods of valuation as may be agreed upon between the parties at the time of loss.
- 13. WAIVER OF ALASKA STATUTE 34.70. The parties agree that AS 34.70 does not apply to this transaction and waive the applicability of AS 34.70.
- 14. AGENTS, COMMISSIONS AND PROFESSIONAL ADVICE. Neither party is

represented by a real estate broker or other person to whom a commission is owed in connection with this transaction. Each party has consulted with, or has had an opportunity to consult with, the party's own independent advisors, including experts, attorneys and tax advisors. Other provisions of this Agreement notwithstanding, each party shall bear its own costs under this section.

- 15. TIME. Time is of the essence of this Agreement and performance in accordance with the terms and conditions hereunder shall be given the highest possible priority by the parties hereto.
- 16. SURVIVAL AND SUCCESSION. The terms and conditions of this Agreement shall survive the completion of the transaction that is the subject of this Agreement and shall be binding upon the heirs, successors or assigns of the parties hereto.

#### **ORDINANCE NO. 6073**

### AN ORDINANCE AUTHORIZING THE LEASE OF GOLDEN HEART PLAZA TO FESTIVAL FAIRBANKS

**WHEREAS**, the City of Fairbanks is the owner of Lots 3 and 4, Block 4, Fairbanks Townsite, also known as "Golden Heart Plaza," and the improvements thereon, as shown on attached "Exhibit A" Real Estate Lease, and

**WHEREAS**, Festival Fairbanks, a not-for-profit community agency, has for many years promoted the public use, management, and maintenance of Golden Heart Plaza, all of which benefits the City of Fairbanks, its residents, and visitors; and

WHEREAS, management of the Property by Festival Fairbanks is deemed consistent with the provisions of Fairbanks General Code, Section 70, Article III, "Golden Heart Plaza"; and

**WHEREAS**, lease of the Property to Festival Fairbanks will provide the basic rights necessary for it to effectively and legally manage the Plaza; and

**WHEREAS**, Festival Fairbanks has requested a lease for the management purposes stated above; and

**WHEREAS**, Fairbanks General Code Section 70-44 provides that the City may lease without public offering whenever the lessee is a not-for-profit organization; and

**WHEREAS**, the lease of the Property described above is in the best interest of the community.

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT ENACTED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF FAIRBANKS, ALASKA, as follows:

<u>SECTION 1</u>. That a lease instrument substantially in the form shown in attached "Exhibit A" is hereby authorized by Council for the purposes herein stated, providing for an initial two-year lease term with a one-year extension at the discretion of the City Mayor.

<u>SECTION 2</u>. That the Mayor is authorized and directed to execute the lease on behalf of the City, and the City Clerk is authorized to attest and affix the City Seal to said instrument, the execution of which shall take place not less than 30 days after the effective date of this ordinance, as prescribed by section 8.3 of the City Charter and Sec. 70-56 of the Fairbanks General Code.

#### **REAL ESTATE LEASE**

Stre	THIS LEASE, made and effective as of the day of 2018, by the y of Fairbanks, a municipal corporation of the State of Alaska, with address of 800 Cushman eet, Fairbanks, Alaska 99701, hereinafter called Lessor, and FESTIVAL FAIRBANKS, INC., a address of 514 Second Avenue, Fairbanks, Alaska 99701, hereinafter called Lessee.
	<b>IEREAS</b> , the City of Fairbanks, as trustee for the public, and pursuant to Ordinance 6073, eby authorizes lease of the property described below, under the conditions stated.
	W THEREFORE, Lessor and Lessee, in consideration of the rent specified and of the rual covenants and agreements expressed herein, agree as follows:
	<u>Lease of Property</u> . The Lessor leases to Lessee, and Lessee leases from Lessor, the real property located at Fairbanks, Alaska, more particularly described as follows:
	Lots 3 and 4, Block 4, Fairbanks Townsite, also known as "Golden Heart Plaza", and the improvements thereon, as shown on the attached "Lease Exhibit 1 of 1".
	Term. The term of this Lease shall be for three years, beginning 2018 ending, 2021.
	Option. This lease may be renewed for one additional year, at the sole discretion of the Mayor.
	<u>Use</u> . Lessee shall use the Property in compliance with Fairbanks General Code of Ordinances Sections 70-96 through 70-99, "Golden Heart Plaza."
5.	Rent. As compensation for use of the Property during the life of this lease, Lessee shall pay

- 5. <u>Rent</u>. As compensation for use of the Property during the life of this lease, Lessee shall pay the sum of One Dollar (\$1.00) per year, paid in advance. Payments will be made at Lessor's Office of the City Clerk, 800 Cushman Street, Fairbanks, Alaska 99701.
- 6. <u>Prohibited Uses</u>. Lessee shall not use or permit the use of the Property or any part thereof in violation of any applicable law, ordinance, or regulation.
- 7. <u>Maintenance and Expenses</u>. Lessee shall perform routine cleaning associated with the leased Property proper, keeping the Property in a clean, safe condition, free of litter and debris. Lessee shall notify Lessor of hazards or safety concerns on or about the Property in a timely manner. Lessor shall provide repairs or alterations as it deems necessary, at its expense.
- 8. <u>Termination.</u> In the event of Lessor's sale or redevelopment of the property, Lessee's rights hereunder shall terminate, and Lessee shall vacate within 60 days of written notice.

#### 9. Exculpation and Indemnity.

- a. Exculpation of Lessor: Lessor shall not be liable to Lessee for any damage to Lessee or Lessee's property from any cause. Lessee shall bear all risk of loss as to all personal property of the Lessee stored or remaining on or near the Property, including without limitation, inventory, equipment, fixtures, and employees' personal effects.
- b. Indemnity: Lessee shall defend and hold the Lessor harmless from all damages arising out of any damage or injury to any person or property occurring in, about, or on the Property.
- c. Public Liability and Damage Insurance: Lessee at its sole cost shall at all times maintain public liability and damage insurance with a single combined liability limit of \$1,000,000, insuring against all liability of Lessee and its authorized representatives arising out of and in connection with Lessee's use or occupancy of the Property.

All public liability insurance and property damage insurance will insure performance by Lessee of the indemnity provisions provided herein. Lessor shall be named as an additional insured.

- 10. <u>Prevention of Waste and Nuisance</u>. Lessee shall not use the Property in any manner that will constitute waste, nuisance, or unreasonable annoyance to Lessor or the owners or occupants of adjacent properties. Violation or breach under this section shall be determined at the sole discretion of the City Mayor.
- 11. <u>Assignment and Sublease</u>. Lessee shall not assign or sublet its rights under this Lease without written consent of Lessor, which consent shall be at Lessor's sole discretion.
- 12. <u>Liens</u>. Lessee shall keep the Property free from any liens, including without limitation those liens arising out of any work performed, materials furnished, or obligations incurred by Lessee.
- 13. <u>Consultation with Attorney</u>. Lessee acknowledges that it has the right to review this Lease and all other documents relating to the Lease with its own attorney. Each party electing to have this Lease reviewed by an attorney shall bear the costs and expenses so incurred.
- 14. <u>Right of Entry</u>. Lessor and its agents and authorized employees, shall have the right to enter the rented Property to examine it and to make repairs, alterations, improvements, or additions, as Lessor may deem necessary or desirable during Lessee's business hours. All such entry shall be preceded by 72-hour advance notice to Lessee, except that immediate entry will be allowed in event of emergency, as determined by the City Engineer.
- 15. <u>Default</u>. Failure to occupy and operate the Property for two consecutive weekends or failure to perform any provision of this Lease shall constitute default by Lessee. Upon Lessee's

- default, Lessor shall give Lessee 10 days notice to cure the default. No default notice shall be deemed a forfeiture or a termination of this Lease unless Lessor so elects in the notice.
- 16. <u>Notice</u>. Any notice, demand, request, consent, approval, or communication that either party desires or is required to give to the other party or any other person must be in writing and either served personally or sent by prepaid, first class mail, addressed to the other party at the address set forth in the introductory paragraph of this Lease. Either party may change its address by notifying the other party of the change of address.
- 17. <u>Attorney's Fees</u>. If Lessor brings or maintains an action for enforcement of any of the covenants, terms, or conditions of this Lease, Lessee shall pay all costs incurred by Lessor for such action, including attorney's fees in the event Lessee is found to be at fault.
- 18. Time of Essence. Time is of the essence of each provision of this Lease.
- 19. <u>Successors</u>. This Lease shall be binding on the parties and their successors.
- 20. <u>Severability</u>. The unenforceability, invalidity, or illegality of any provision will not render the other provisions unenforceable, invalid, or illegal.

The Fairbanks Diversity Council (FDC) convened at 5:30 p.m. on the above date to conduct a Regular Meeting at the City Council Chambers, 800 Cushman Street, Fairbanks, Alaska, with Vice Chair Walters presiding and with the following members in attendance:

#### CALL TO ORDER & READING OF THE FDC MISSION STATEMENT

Vice Chair Walters welcomed everyone to the meeting. He explained that Mayor Matherly is absent because he is attending the Hanukkah Festival of Lights celebration. He asked Ms. Taylor to read aloud the FDC mission statement.

#### PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE

Vice Chair Walters led the group in the Pledge of Allegiance.

#### APPROVAL OF AGENDA

Mr. Toelle, seconded by Ms. Webb, moved to APPROVE the Agenda.

Vice Chair Walters took a voice vote on the motion to APPROVE the Agenda. The motion PASSED unanimously.

#### <u>CITIZENS' COMMENTS</u> (Limited to 3 Minutes)

Robert Shields, 145 Marten Drive, Fairbanks – Mr. Shields stated that he was asked by Ms. Borges to attend the meeting. He commended the work of the FDC and stated that he would like to plant two seeds with the FDC: 1) consider working with the Fairbanks Climate Action Coalition to put together a diversity parade at the Earth Day event; and 2) recommend that the City of Fairbanks participate in identifying and making available renewable energy for tax-challenged organizations and underserved community members. He stated that converting to solar energy may cost \$15,000 – \$20,000 per household, but that everyone should be looking at renewable energy in the current climate. He spoke to local support for the project.

<u>Frank Turney</u>, 329 6th Avenue, Fairbanks — Mr. Turney referenced the magazine article he distributed prior to the meeting regarding privacy in public restrooms. He read aloud parts of the article which spoke out against the bathroom mandate. Mr. Turney stated that the mandate invades the privacy of individuals and is harmful in other ways. He expressed his opinion that gender questioning is a mental health issue. Mr. Turney briefly spoke to discrimination in the jury pool. He mentioned that the industrial hemp bill passed the Senate.

<u>Sharon Hunter</u>, 322 <u>Cross Way, North Pole</u> – Ms. Hunter stated that when she heard about the FDC she went online to find out more. She stated that the most recent meeting minutes she found were from June or July and that she was told by City staff that there were no more recent minutes available.

Clerk Snider stated that there is a time lag in posting minutes due to the approval process but that meeting minutes through September are available. She stated that she would make sure the website is updated.

Mr. Butler asked Ms. Hunter what she thought of the site. Ms. Hunter suggested that the Diversity Action Plan (DAP) be linked to the Fairbanks Diversity Council webpage, not just the City's homepage.

Hearing no more requests for comment, Vice Chair Walters declared Citizens' Comments closed.

#### CALENDAR OF EVENTS

Vice Chair Walters talked about upcoming holiday events he saw posted on the Explore Fairbanks website; he mentioned the Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. holiday weekend and events in January. Mr. Lee stated that No Limits will hold its 4th annual Night of Hope event on December 23 from 6-8 p.m. at the JP Jones Center. Ms. Taylor shared that FNA will hold its Christmas party on December 13 from 5-8 p.m. at Pioneer Park, and everyone is welcome.

#### APPROVAL OF PREVIOUS MINUTES

a) Regular Meeting Minutes of October 10, 2017

Mr. Toelle, seconded by Ms. Taylor, moved to APPROVE the Regular Meeting Minutes of October 10, 2017.

Vice Chair Walters took a voice vote on the motion to APPROVE the Minutes. The motion PASSED unanimously.

#### FAIRBANKS POLICE DEPARTMENT & HUMAN RESOURCES REPORTS

Police Chief Eric Jewkes stated that the Fairbanks Police Department (FPD) has been busy. He shared that two officers recently came out of field training and are doing well on their own. He stated that three officers have just returned from the academy, two with military backgrounds and one local young man. He stated that FPD is gearing up to fill a February police academy, and they still have seven officers left to hire. Chief Jewkes stated that Officer Lewis retired at the end of November, and there is a constant ebb and flow in staffing. He expressed hope that 2018 would be quieter than 2017. In response to a question from the Vice Chair regarding

diversity, Chief Jewkes stated that one of the new officers is a female and another is Hispanic. He added that the Dispatch Department is struggling also with seven vacancies.

Members asked the Chief questions about diversity training efforts, translation resources, interactions and involvement with other local law enforcement agencies, and cultural immersion in the community.

Ms. Foster-Snow shared that the City has been working through its 2018 budget, and it was approved by the City Council on December 11. She stated that the City's negotiating team continues to work through labor negotiations with the various unions. She stated that HR has been busy hiring temporary operators at Public Works for snow removal. In regard to the earlier comments about the City's website, she announced that the City is collecting bids for a new website design and there are plans to move to a new website soon.

Vice Chair Walters noted that City Attorney Paul Ewers was present. He requested that a discussion on the powers and duties of the FDC be added under Unfinished Business; no members objected.

#### DIVERSITY TOPIC OF THE MONTH

Mr. Butler suggested inviting the Borough Mayor to an FDC meeting since the body has a direct impact on both the City and the Borough. Vice Chair Walters stated that for January and February diversity topics, he has noted to invite students from the African-American clubs in the FNSB School District and Mayor Karl Kassel. Ms. Rogers stated that she would like to invite elders "of a certain age and experience" to participate in a future meeting; she commented that elders are an important part of the community. Ms. Borges stated that she would like to extend an invitation to representatives of the NAACP Bennie Colbert and Ruby Sutton.

#### UNFINISHED BUSINESS

a) Powers and Duties of the FDC - City Attorney Paul Ewers

City Attorney Ewers stated that the limitations of the FDC's authority may depend on the issue; he referenced his recent, written memo to the City Clerk which was forwarded to the membership. He stated that, in general, the FDC may continue with its public outreach and support for certain projects without governing body approval. He stated that if the FDC would like to take a position on an issue the City Council or Borough Assembly has the authority to act upon, the FDC would have to make a recommendation to the governing body. In response to a question from Vice Chair Walters, Mr. Ewers explained the difference between the FDC's authority to get involved with projects like the "potty project" versus it taking an official position on a bill in the state legislature.

Members provided comments and asked questions of Mr. Ewers related to the FDC's powers and authority. Attorney Ewers clarified that the FDC is an advisory body to the City Council and the Borough Assembly, and he again referenced his memo which quoted FGC Sec. 2-234. He stated that the FDC has the authority to write position papers to advocate for certain things in the community. Members indicated they would like to see more involvement and communication between the FDC and the FNSB.

Mr. Ewers closed by stating that he welcomes future questions from the FDC as issues arise.

#### **NEW BUSINESS**

a) City Ordinance No. 6064 – Changes to Chairperson Position

Vice Chair Walters read aloud the changes in FGC 2-233(a). He asked members to begin considering whether they are interested in serving as a Chair, and he suggested that the item be addressed at the January meeting. He spoke about what is expected of the position.

#### FDC COMMITTEE REPORTS

<u>Education & Outreach/Media & Communications Committee</u> — **Vice Chair Walters** stated that there were no November or December meetings, and there is nothing to report.

Accessibility Committee – Mr. Toelle stated that he was the only member present at the meeting, and he has nothing to report.

<u>Policies & Procedures Committee</u> – Ms. Sanford stated that she is proposing to cancel the January 4 meeting and instead do a "trifecta" of meetings starting later in January focused on policy writing. She stated that she is looking at noon meetings on January 18, 25 and February 2, 2018. She asked committee members to respond to the email she sent.

At Ms. Borges' request, Vice Chair Walters invited Ms. Tanya Coty to come forward to speak since she did not speak under Citizens' Comments. No members objected.

Tanya Coty, 616 Steele Creek Road, Fairbanks – Ms. Coty introduced herself as the Equal Opportunity and Educational Coordinator for the FNSB School District. She stated that she would be regularly attending FDC meetings instead of Wendy Tisland, the former Executive Director for the District. She stated that she looks forward to working with the FDC but that she would be unable to attend the January 9 meeting. She stated that she has been working with Mr. Walters on some issues. Ms. Coty shared that the District just finished its Affirmative Action Plan, and she will be presenting statistically-significant findings in the Plan to the School Board in January. She spoke about recent changes to the District's Diversity Committee, and she invited folks to apply to serve by visiting the School District website. She shared that the next Committee meeting will be held on January 18, 2018.

#### FDC MEMBERS COMMENTS

Mr. Lee apologized for not being physically present. He stated he has no other comments.

Ms. Kan commented on the short and sweet meeting. She asked how the FDC understands the definition of the term "transgender."

Vice Chair Walters stated that he would speak with Hayden Nevill to see if he could provide the FDC with a definition of the term.

Ms. Rogers stated that it was a good meeting with a good turnout. She stated she is eager to advance with a more involved communication and relationship with the FNSB.

Ms. Sanford thanked Ms. Slayton for providing everyone with the packet of information, and she encouraged everyone to read it. She stated she is amazed at how much local folks misunderstand Alaska Native culture and community. She stated that the project "Native Truth" expels some of the myths about Native Alaskans. She expressed disappointment in the City Attorney's opinion; she stated that she fundamentally disagrees with his interpretation of the City ordinance. She stated she will push the limits on the issue of FDC authority and power for the remainder of her term.

Ms. Webb thanked everyone who spoke and presented. She also expressed appreciation for the packet Ms. Slayton provided. She asked whether anyone had looked into the possibility of appointing a student representative to the FDC.

Mr. Toelle spoke to the Diversity and Inclusion Committee which he serves on. He stated that the group recently met for their first meeting and suggested that the FDC interface with that group. He stated that he also serves on the National MS Society group.

Ms. Taylor stated that she is involved in many events, but no other members besides Ms. Rogers have ever really taken interest. She indicated she would like to see the FDC get more involved with events and activities.

Ms. Rogers expressed agreement with Ms. Taylor. She stated that it is difficult to get people involved, and she would like members to rethink participation at community events.

Mr. Butler agreed that the FDC should do its best to bring in the FNSB as an equal participant like the City of Fairbanks because the body represents the entire community. He spoke to how Native Americans acquired medical care through a treaty in the 1800s and to how it was rudimentary and subpar for many years. He stated that, fortunately, Alaska has become intelligent and organized and is now an example for the rest of the nation. He spoke to his own experiences in using medical services in Alaska. He encouraged everyone to visit his Facebook page and read his writing over the last few weeks. Mr. Butler stated that the nation, state, and community are under terrific political strife currently and commented that the majority of everyone present is likely directly impacted by what is going on politically. He stated that he is becoming increasingly optimistic about the FDC, and it is up to the FDC to firm up its infrastructure and progress.

Ms. Slayton stated that it would be good to learn more about the Southern Poverty Law Center and the services they provide. She stated they have resources for councils and committees like the FDC. She suggested that FDC members sign up for their productions and mailings.

Vice Chair Walters suggested that Ms. Slayton send a link to the information to Clerk Snider to forward to the membership so they could learn more about it.

Ms. Borges apologized for missing several meetings. She expressed sadness that the FDC lost another member. She stated that FDC members should attend each other's functions as the group is there to represent. She questioned whether the FDC has any promotional items on hand. She asked whether there had been any funds budgeted specifically for the FDC.

Ms. Foster-Snow stated that they could get more bookmarks. She stated that there is not a line item in the budget specifically for the FDC, but that the Mayor has asked members to make requests to him as necessary for needed items.

Ms. Borges wished everyone a Happy Holiday season.

Ms. Foster-Snow stated that she would be happy to send a letter to local high schools to see if there is any interest in serving on the FDC. She stated that she has served at the Night of Hope with Mr. Lee's group in the past, and she encouraged people to attend the event. She stated that she feels the FDC should revisit the "potty project" and clarify its support of the project. She stated that there has been some misrepresentation of the project—even at the City Council level.

Ms. Rogers stated that Ms. Foster-Snow made a heartfelt and passionate statement about the importance of having private restroom space available to everyone. She agreed that some clarification should be provided. Ms. Foster-Snow stated that members of the public have spoken to the issue at City Council meetings and have misinterpreted what the project is about.

Vice Chair Walters stated that the "potty project" is about asking local businesses to make single toilet restrooms unisex. He stated that FDC's title is on the letter of support for the project. He mentioned the PFLAG survey that he asked Clerk Snider to send out to the membership; he stated that there were about 85 responses from community members. Vice Chair Walters stated that there was a recent town hall-type meeting at the Unitarian Church on LGBTQ issues, and over 60 people attended. He stated that there has been an outpouring of support and interest lately for PFLAG and that there will be a follow-up meeting at the Noel Wien Library on December 16 from 2 – 3:30 p.m. He mentioned some recent emails from a lady in California to the FDC regarding the Supreme Court case about the wedding cake; he questioned whether it is something the FDC would like to address. He spoke to materials provided by the City on behalf of the FDC for various events. Vice Chair Walters expressed his regret that Mr. Cole resigned from the FDC, and he indicated that he would like the Mayor and the FDC to send him a nice note to thank him for his service. He stated he would try to bring a thank you note to the next meeting for everyone to sign.

Ms. Slayton questioned how many people present had done the ancestry.com DNA test. She stated that she did one and was surprised by the results. She encouraged everyone to take the test and commented that it makes one sit back and think.

The Fairbanks Diversity Council (FDC) convened at 5:30 p.m. on the above date to conduct a Regular Meeting at the City Council Chambers, 800 Cushman Street, Fairbanks, Alaska, with Vice Chair Walters (Seat M) presiding and with the following members in attendance:

#### CALL TO ORDER & READING OF THE FDC MISSION STATEMENT

Vice Chair Walters called the meeting to order; he stated that Mayor Matherly is speaking at another event. He stated that there is no quorum present, so no action can be taken. He asked Mr. Butler to read aloud the FDC mission statement. Mr. Butler read the statement aloud.

Welcome to New Members Kathryn Ottersten and Svetlana Nuss a)

Vice Chair Walters welcomed the new member present, Ms. Kathryn Ottersten. Ms. Ottersten stated she is a native of Brooklyn, New York with a great deal of experience in social justice. She spoke to her background and experiences and stated that she deliberately spent three years as a homeless person in New York so that she could remain an activist; she stated she also worked with the homeless and those with HIV. She stated she helped to change the needle exchange law in New York. Ms. Ottersten stated that she was born intersexed, and doctors made decisions without her parents' involvement when she was born. She indicated she has had to deal with some long-term consequences of that.

Vice Chair Walters and members took turns introducing themselves to Ms. Ottersten.

#### PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE

Vice Chair Walters led the Pledge of Allegiance.

#### APPROVAL OF AGENDA

Ms. Foster-Snow requested that New Business item (a) be postponed to the next meeting.

No members objected to Ms. Foster-Snow's request.

#### **CITIZENS COMMENTS** (limited to 3 minutes)

Tonya Coty, Director of Employment & Educational Opportunity at Fairbanks North Star Borough School District (FNSBSD) – Ms. Coty stated she is pleased to see Black History Month on the FDC agenda. She stated there were many entries by students in the Black History Month contest in the district. She stated that the FNSBSD Diversity Council held a meeting recently. She shared that the FNSBSD Board will consider a resolution to recognize International Women's Day and Month on February 20.

Ms. Foster-Snow asked Ms. Coty if she could help the City get the word out to gain interest from local youth in serving on the FDC. Ms. Coty stated that she is willing to help. Ms. Rogers mentioned the students from West Valley who attended an FDC meeting. Ms. Foster-Snow suggested that she and Mr. Walters attend one of the student meetings at West Valley.

Vice Chair Walters asked what other months like Women's Month are recognized by the FNSBSD. Ms. Coty stated that there are about a dozen of them, and she can get a list for the FDC.

<u>Helen Marie Matesi</u> – Ms. Matesi stated that there was a question about the FDC's autonomy at the last meeting. She stated she is proud that the Fairbanks community has a diversity council, and she understands that the FDC is still in the formative stages. She expressed her personal opinion that the FDC should act in harmony with but somewhat independent of the City Council. She stated that people come to the FDC to seek help and support; she stated the City Council needs advice from the FDC. She stated that the decision on whether a request is supported needs to belong to the FDC, and the body needs the freedom to decide those things.

Hearing no more requests for comment, Vice Chair Walters declared Citizens' Comments closed.

#### **CALENDAR OF EVENTS**

Ms. Kan stated the Chinese New Year event would be held on February 17 at the UAF Wood Center Ball Room with dinner at 5:30 p.m. She stated tickets are \$16 to purchase in advance.

Mr. Butler stated that the Festival of Native Arts is coming up soon. He stated that the Fairbanks Native Association (FNA), Tanana Chiefs Conference (TCC), and Doyon annual meetings are all approaching soon as well. He stated that information about the FNA and TCC meetings can be found on Facebook.

Ms. Slayton stated that a Fabulous Feminist Fundraiser is coming up in April, and she will bring more information to the next meeting.

#### APPROVAL OF PREVIOUS MINUTES

a) Regular Meeting Minutes of December 12, 2017

The FDC was unable to approve the meeting minutes due to lack of a quorum.

#### FAIRBANKS POLICE DEPARTMENT & HUMAN RESOURCES REPORTS

Deputy Police Chief Dan Welborn reported that the Fairbanks Police Department (FPD) has 45 sworn positions, six of which are currently vacant. He stated that there are some new officers still in training, and one new hire will go to academy later in the month. He stated that a new lateral hire from Florida

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will start March 1. He stated that there are three expected retirements within the department in 2018. He expressed hope that the FPD is at full staffing levels by 2020. Deputy Welborn stated that the FPD offers Comprehensive Officer Preparation Seminars (COPS) as often as possible for people looking into law enforcement as a career. He stated the seminars will be held on February 28, March 28, and April 28, and there are not many people signed up yet; he spoke to other recruitment efforts by FPD. He explained that DDACTS is data-driven approaches to crime and traffic safety, and he would like to see the program implemented at FPD; he stated the department is going to start focusing on trouble areas in Fairbanks. Deputy Welborn stated that he and Chief Jewkes continue to meet with Rodney Gaskins and Brenda McFarlane at the Fairbanks Rescue Mission to address homelessness in Fairbanks. He shared that he and Chief Jewkes hosted a recent webinar with FPD's chaplains on "Protecting Places of Worship." He stated that the partnership between chaplains, law enforcement, and churches is timely because of all the incidents that have taken place in churches nationwide.

Ms. Slayton questioned whether safety in places of worship has been an issue in Fairbanks. Deputy Welborn replied it has not been an issue, but with all the mass shootings it is a worthwhile effort.

Deputy Welborn spoke to the recent shooting of a young lady in Fairbanks. He stated it was a tragic event, but a success story came out of it. He explained that an employee of a local dance studio received a Nixle alert and was able to assist the police in apprehending the suspect. He stated that at one point, the gunman tried to enter Randy Smith Middle School, but the building was already on lockdown.

Ms. Slayton asked what proactive measures are being taken to address domestic violence issues. Deputy Welborn replied that there used to be a domestic violence program coordinator at FPD, but there no longer is. He stated that domestic violence is prevalent in Fairbanks, and those are the most dangerous calls for the FPD. He stated that with low staffing levels, the FPD is currently in reactive mode in regard to domestic violence issues. Ms. Slayton indicated that she would like to see more attention given to being proactive with domestic violence issues in Fairbanks. She indicated that outreach to churches is not as much of a priority in Fairbanks as the issue of domestic violence. She stated that she would like to see the prevalent problems addressed, and she would like to bring back a domestic violence coordinator.

Mr. Butler asked how the Fairbanks community is doing with substance abuse issues. Deputy Welborn stated that he does not have statistics available at the moment. He spoke to the implementation of Senate Bill 91 and to some of the problems law enforcement has experienced with it. Mr. Butler asked about the working relationship between the FPD, the Alaska State Troopers (AST), and the military police (MPs). Deputy Welborn stated that the FPD has a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) with the MPs; he stated that generally the FPD handles civilian issues on Fort Wainwright, and the MPs handle issues when military personnel is involved. Mr. Butler and Deputy Welborn spoke to MP and FPD turnover. Deputy Welborn stated the FPD has a good relationship with the military bases.

Ms. Kan spoke to domestic violence in Fairbanks and agreed that education is good place to start. She stated that the FDC and the City should find a way to recognize International Women's Day.

Vice Chair Walters spoke to helping the police force be as representative of the community as possible. He asked Deputy Welborn to address whether the department is seeing diversity in new recruits. Deputy Welborn stated that when he started at FPD, hiring groups were made up of about 200 people; he stated that now there are about 10. He remarked that the department would love it if more people would apply, and he spoke to police recruitment issues statewide. He stated that he and the Chief come to work in uniform because they need go out on calls; he stated that is not standard for command staff in most departments.

Ms. Rogers expressed concern about the image that the title of the event, "Run from the Cops" portrays. Deputy Welborn acknowledged Ms. Rogers' concern and explained what the event is all about. He stated that he could address that with Chief Jewkes.

HR Director Foster-Snow stated that things have been busy in HR. She stated the City filled an Engineer position last week and recently hired 2.5 new Dispatchers and 3 new Firefighters. She stated that the City is currently filling the Risk Management/Purchasing position and is recruiting for an Accounting Specialist and an Operator at Public Works. She stated that the City has to open the recruitment process internally first, then it may go out to the public. She stated that the City Engineer position and a Lead Mechanic position at Public Works will open in about a week.

#### DIVERSITY TOPIC OF THE MONTH

a) Black History Month - Representative(s) from Fairbanks NAACP

Benny Colbert, NAACP President, Fairbanks Chapter - Mr. Colbert thanked the FDC for the invitation to speak. He told a little about his background and about the NAACP. He stated that the organization is not a "Black" organization and explained that it is inclusive of all people. He invited folks to join the NAACP; he shared that the Executive Board meets every third Saturday, 10:00 a.m. and the general membership meets the same day at 11:30 a.m. downstairs from Fairbanks Neighborhood Housing. He spoke to the need for transparency and to the need to get word out about the organization into the community. He stated that in October, Domestic Violence Awareness Month, the NAACP brought up Dr. McCoy, an actress/singer who did 7-10 different caricatures of different types of domestic violence. He stated that they held events at the Morris Thompson Cultural and Visitor's Center and at UAF. Mr. Colbert spoke to the importance of education in helping solve the problem of domestic violence. He stated that he is tired of youth being taught by social media and stated that it is shocking that young people are fighting for causes that they know little to nothing about. He stated that many do it to feel like they belong or because someone told them to. He expressed hope that people begin knowing and understanding more about other cultures and differences. He stated that people all different, but they are all human. Mr. Colbert clarified that the February 17 NAACP meeting would be held at a different location, the Mt. McKinley Bank conference room. He spoke to the Black History Month contest at the FNSBSD and to the great participation by students throughout the district.

Ms. Kan extended to the NAACP an invitation to the International Friendship Day event held in October; she stated it would be nice to have the organization represented there. Mr. Colbert stated that he would be open to the event. He spoke about other events throughout the year that the NAACP puts on, including Juneteenth and the Freedom Fundraiser.

Mr. Butler invited Mr. Colbert to attend the Festival of Native Arts on March 1, 2, and 3. Mr. Colbert suggested that different groups coordinate an event calendar containing all the various events throughout the community. He spoke briefly to the issues of racism and inequality in the community and stated that it is time to heal and fix the problems. He stated that he would like to see high school teachers broaden what they teach because so much more history exists than what students are taught.

#### **NEW BUSINESS**

- a) Appointment of Second Vice Chair (This item is to be discussed at the March 13 FDC meeting)
- b) Review of Diversity Action Plan

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Vice Chair Walters stated that Ms. Jackson had requested a review of the DAP to make sure the FDC is following it. He explained a little about the Plan and its history. He asked the group to review the six main goals of the Plan by reading them aloud.

Mr. Butler stated that he spoke with the Mayor earlier in the week. He indicated that the original purpose of FDC was to focus on discrimination in employment, and that changed with the DAP. He commented that there are many things in the Plan that require action, and he has not seen any sign-off on the items the FDC has completed. He stated he feels like the Mayor and more members need to be present in order to begin the DAP review process, and suggested that the item be tabled until the next meeting. He stated that the DAP should be the primary topic of the meeting. He indicated that he has a lot of comments and notes on the DAP.

Mr. Lee stated that most members who were around when the Plan was drafted are no longer on the FDC. He stated that it is easy to come along after the fact and pick the DAP apart. He expressed his belief that the FDC needs to accomplish things in the DAP before revising it. He commented that it would be good to review the goals of the Plan.

Mr. Butler stated that members should study the document then step into the review process. Ms. Ottersten commented that she reviewed the Plan and found it enormously confusing.

Ms. Davis agreed with Mr. Lee. She stated that she is an original member of the FDC and that when former Mayor Eberhart formed the FDC, he wanted to help the local government reflect the Fairbanks community. She stated that there was some chaos with the FDC at first but that it has come a long way. She stated that the group needs to start doing instead of picking the DAP apart.

Members took turns reading aloud the six goals in the DAP.

c) Committee Assignments for New Members

Ms. Ottersten indicated that she would be well-suited for the Education/Outreach Committee.

#### FDC COMMITTEE REPORTS

Vice Chair Walters stated that he and Mayor Matherly were the only ones who attended the last Education/Outreach Committee meeting.

Mr. Butler stated that the Policies and Procedures Committee had planned to meet for three weeks in a row, but the question arose as to what the FDC's goals were. He stated that the group wanted to wait until the DAP was addressed by the FDC before digging back in to policies and procedures. He stated that the group hopes to come back to the FDC with some suggestions.

#### FDC MEMBERS COMMENTS

Mr. Lee welcomed the new members and stated that he has been travelling a lot. He commented that he enjoys being a part of FDC, and he wants the group to stay on target. He stated that he likes that the FDC was started to make more fair situations for people.

Ms. Slayton thanked new members joining the FDC. She distributed a handout on terms relating to the gender spectrum and another on domestic violence in Alaska. She stated that she brought other Southern Poverty Law Center magazines and newspapers that are free for anyone to take.

Mr. Butler stated that he read the thick handout on Alaska Natives that Ms. Slayton brought to the last meeting. He stated it was a compilation of essays and such written by the scholarly. He stated that the piece indicated that the primary focus of Alaska Natives is to preserve their culture. He stated he felt the handout wrongly stated the makeup of Alaska Native traditions. He spoke to Alaska Native cultural traditions that continue and stated that the culture is teaching its people how to succeed in the cash economy. He stated that point was missed in the handout. He stated that Alaska Natives are intent on training each other, and there are a lot of highly-trained and highly-skilled Alaska Natives.

Ms. Kan stated that the FDC touched on important topics at the meeting. She stated that she hopes to see International Women's Day and the DAP on the next meeting agenda.

Ms. Foster-Snow welcomed Ms. Ottersten to the FDC.

Ms. Davis stated she is happy to be back.

Ms. Ottersten stated she is looking forward to learning. She stated that nowhere in the DAP is there anything about showing the rest of the world how diverse Fairbanks is. She stated that Fairbanks is a great place to live and that people who live in Fairbanks should be proud of their community; she stated that Fairbanks should let the rest of the country know about it.

Vice Chair Walters thanked Mr. Colbert for attending the meeting. He stated that he attended the Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. celebration, and it was wonderful to see the Alaska Native dancers at the event.

Ms. Rogers spoke to Fairbanks being a welcoming place. (Much of her comments were inaudible).
