THE BILL OF RIGHTS

Amendment 1 - Freedom of Religion, Press, Expression. Ratified 12/15/1791.

Congress shall make no law respecting an establishment of religion, or prohibiting the free exercise thereof; or abridging the freedom of speech, or of the press; or the right of the people peaceably to assemble, and to petition the Government for a redress of grievances.

Amendment 2 - Right to Bear Arms. Ratified 12/15/1791.

A well regulated Militia, being necessary to the security of a free State, the right of the people to keep and bear Arms, shall not be infringed.

Amendment 3 - Quartering of Soldiers. Ratified 12/15/1791.

No Soldier shall, in time of peace be quartered in any house, without the consent of the Owner, nor in time of war, but in a manner to be prescribed by law.

Amendment 4 - Search and Seizure. Ratified 12/15/1791.

The right of the people to be secure in their persons, houses, papers, and effects, against unreasonable searches and seizures, shall not be violated, and no Warrants shall issue, but upon probable cause, supported by Oath or affirmation, and particularly describing the place to be searched, and the persons or things to be seized.

Amendment 5 - Trial and Punishment, Compensation for Takings. Ratified 12/15/1791.

No person shall be held to answer for a capital, or otherwise infamous crime, unless on a presentment or indictment of a Grand Jury, except in cases arising in the land or naval forces, or in the Militia, when in actual service in time of War or public danger; nor shall any person be subject for the same offense to be twice put in jeopardy of life or limb; nor shall be compelled in any criminal case to be a witness against himself, nor be deprived of life, liberty, or property, without due process of law; nor shall private property be taken for public use, without just compensation.

Amendment 6 - Right to Speedy Trial, Confrontation of Witnesses. Ratified 12/15/1791.

In all criminal prosecutions, the accused shall enjoy the right to a speedy and public trial, by an impartial jury of the State and district wherein the crime shall have been committed, which district shall have been previously ascertained by law, and to be informed of the nature and cause of the accusation; to be confronted with the witnesses against him; to have compulsory process for obtaining witnesses in his favor, and to have the Assistance of Counsel for his defence.

Amendment 7 - Trial by Jury in Civil Cases. Ratified 12/15/1791.

In Suits at common law, where the value in controversy shall exceed twenty dollars, the right of trial by jury shall be preserved, and no fact tried by a jury, shall be otherwise reexamined in any Court of the United States, than according to the rules of the common law.

Amendment 8 - Cruel and Unusual Punishment. Ratified 12/15/1791.

Excessive bail shall not be required, nor excessive fines imposed, nor cruel and unusual punishments inflicted.

Amendment 9 - Construction of Constitution. Ratified 12/15/1791.

The enumeration in the Constitution, of certain rights, shall not be construed to deny or disparage others retained by the people.

Amendment 10 - Powers of the States and People. Ratified 12/15/1791.

The powers not delegated to the United States by the Constitution, nor prohibited by it to the States, are reserved to the States respectively, or to the people.

ORDINANCE NO. 5997

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING THE 2015 OPERATING AND CAPITAL BUDGETS FOR THE EIGHTH TIME

WHEREAS, this ordinance incorporates the changes outlined on the attached fiscal note to amend the 2015 operating and capital budgets; and

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ENACTED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF FAIRBANKS, ALASKA, as follows:

SECTION 1. There is hereby appropriated to the 2015 General Fund and the Capital Fund budgets the following sources of revenue and expenditures in the amounts indicated to the departments named for the purpose of conducting the business of the City of Fairbanks, Alaska, for the fiscal year commencing January 1, 2015 and ending December 31, 2015 (see pages 2 and 3) [changes shown in **bold** font]. AN ORDINANCE ADOPTING THE 2016 OPERATING AND CAPITAL BUDGETS

WHEREAS, pursuant to City Charter Section 5.2, on October 31, 2015, Mayor Eberhart presented a recommended annual operating and capital budget estimate for 2016; and

ORDINANCE NO. 5999

AN ORDINANCE AUTHORIZING CONVEYANCE OF EASEMENTS REQUESTED BY THE ADOT FOR THE NOBLE STREET UPGRADE AND PEDESTRIAN FACILITIES PROJECTS

WHEREAS, the Alaska Department of Transportation (ADOT) has funding for right of way acquisition and construction for the NOBLE STREET UPGRADE PROJECT STP-000S (413)/61725 (the "Noble Street Project"), and the CITY OF FAIRBANKS PEDESTRIAN FACILITIES UPGRADE PROJECT STP-002(277)/62127 (the "Pedestrian Project"); and

WHEREAS, the Noble Street Project will reconstruct driving lanes, sidewalks, utilities, traffic signals, and other amenities from Gaffney Road to First Avenue, providing pedestrians and the traveling public with safer routes; and

WHEREAS, construction of the Noble Street Project will require ADOT acquisition of one permanent parcel of land on City-owned Lot 9, Block 12, Fairbanks Townsite, adjoining Noble Street at First Avenue, referred to as Parcel 28, and one temporary construction easement ("TCE") on Lot 9, identified as Parcel TCE 28, for the purpose of installing a new traffic signal pole and load center and for temporary work space, together with one TCE on Block 39, Fairbanks Townsite, adjoining the Downtown Parking Garage, identified as TCE 48; and

WHEREAS, ADOT has performed an internal appraisal of the property, which established the value at \$4,350.00, and will compensate the City in this amount; and

WHEREAS, the City Property Manager has reviewed the appraisal and finds the value reasonable and supported; and

WHEREAS, construction of the Pedestrian Project will provide ADA compliance at several locations and will require four temporary construction easements ("TCE's"), from the City, including Parcels TCE 15A and 15B, located on Lots 2 & 3, Block 42, Aurora Subdivision, adjacent the Aurora Drive Fire Station, and Parcels TCE 115A & 115B, located on Lot 6A, Block 66, Fairbanks Townsite, adjoining 5th Avenue and upon the pedestrian walkway at that location; and

WHEREAS, the permanent and temporary easements are depicted on "Exhibit A," and the easement documents are shown on "Exhibit B," both attached to this Ordinance.

WHEREAS, it is the sense of the City Council that a conveyance of the easements over the specified City-owned real property to ADOT for the purposes mentioned hereinabove is in the best interest of the public.

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT ENACTED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF FAIRBANKS, ALASKA, as follows:

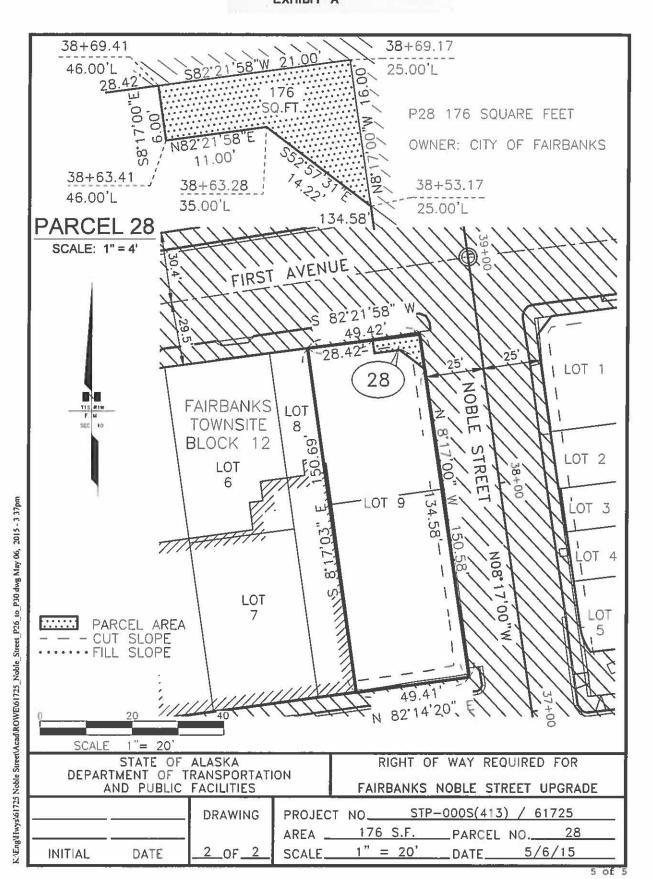

That the Mayor is hereby authorized to execute the Warranty Deed and easement documents shown on attached "Exhibit B" conveying one permanent easement and five temporary easements identified above, and to execute such other instruments as necessary to transfer the easements to ADOT, and the City Clerk is hereby authorized and directed to attest and affix the City Seal to said instruments.

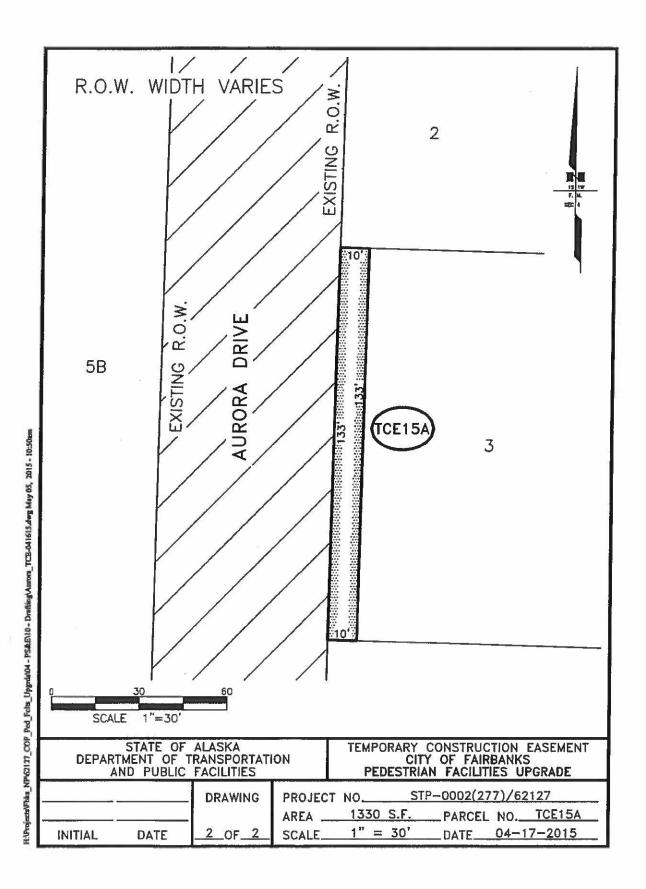

The CBA is amended to add the following language to Section 29:

Section 29.6. Student Interns. The City and PSEA agree to establish and maintain an efficient and effective internship program for students enrolled in qualified educational institutions. The purpose of the internship program is to develop, train and mentor students interested in law enforcement related careers covered by the existing CBA. Interns will not displace members within work areas covered by the CBA. Interns will not work more than 20 hours per week and will not receive wages or benefits. Interns must be actively enrolled in an undergraduate or graduate level degree program from an accredited university pursuing a degree relevant to a career in law enforcement or emergency management. RESOLUTION NO. 4704

A RESOLUTION IN SUPPORT OF FAIRBANKS METROPOLITAN AREA TRANSPORTATION SYSTEMS' COMPLETE STREETS POLICY

WHEREAS, on April 14, 2003, the Governor of the State of Alaska designated the Fairbanks Metropolitan Area Transportation System (FMATS) as the Metropolitan Planning Organization (MPO) and the Policy Committee as the policy body providing for the direction of transportation planning in the MPO in accordance with Federal Law; and

WHEREAS, Title 23 of the United States Code provides for funding to FMATS to coordinate the planning and construction of all urban transportation facilities with a continuing, cooperative and comprehensive transportation planning process; and

WHEREAS, in accordance with 23 USC Sec. 134, it is in the national interest to encourage and promote the safe and efficient management, operation and development of surface transportation systems that serve the mobility needs of people and freight and foster economic development within and through urbanized areas and minimize transportation-related fuel consumption and air pollution; and

WHEREAS, to accomplish this objective, the MPO, in coordination with the State, develops transportation plans and programs that provide for transportation facilities (including pedestrian walkways and bicycle transportation facilities) which will function as an intermodal transportation system for the State, the metropolitan area, and the nation; and

WHEREAS, FMATS developed and unanimously adopted a Complete Streets Policy on October 21, 2015; and

WHEREAS, the principles of Complete Streets are context-sensitive and should complement and support the adjoining land uses and community character, emphasize connectivity, ensure the right of way is planned, funded, designed and operated with consideration of safe access for all users of all ages and mobility and all users being equally deserving of safe facilities to accommodate their travel, encourage the use of the latest and best design standards, allow flexibility in balancing user needs including maintenance needs and temporary snow storage, meet performance standards and include next steps for implementation of the policy; and

WHEREAS, the Complete Streets Policy promotes the principles of Complete Streets to be considered at all phases of planning and project development in the establishment of a multimodal transportation system and is a commitment that future transportation projects will take into account the needs of everyone using the road right-of-way as early as practicable and throughout the process to integrate the needs of all users into everyday transportation planning practices so that a complete network of roads serves all users.

Resolution No. 4704 Page 1 of 2 **NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED**, that the City of Fairbanks City Council fully supports the FMATS Complete Streets Policy and will consider this policy in the design and implementation of projects within the City of Fairbanks, as applicable, and will encourage training and educational opportunities for the successful implementation of the FMATS Complete Streets Policy.

The Fairbanks North Star Borough/City of Fairbanks Chena Riverfront Commission (CRFC) met on Wednesday, September 9, 2015 Chair Plager presiding. The following Commission members were in attendance: Lee Wood, John Jackovich, Bob Henszey, Gordy Schlosser, Ian Olson and Buki Wright.

Absent Commissioners: Sue Rainey, Kelley Hegarty Lammers, Julie Jones and Carrie McEnteer.

Also present were: Christine Nelson; FNSB Community Planning Director; Lissa Hughes, TVWA; Barry Hooper, DOT; Donna Gardino, FMATS; Steve Taylor, FNSB Parks & Recreation; and Laura McLean, FNSB Recording Clerk.

1. CALL TO ORDER

Plager called the meeting to order at 12:07 p.m.

2. APPROVAL OF AGENDA

A motion was made by Henszey, seconded by Schlosser to approve the Agenda for September 9, 2015. There were no objections.

3. APPROVAL OF MINUTES OF July 8, 2015 and August 12, 2015.

A motion was made by Schlosser, seconded by Jackovich to approve the minutes for July 8, 2015. There were no objections.

A motion was made by Jackovich, seconded by Henszey to approve the minutes for August 12, 20145. There were no objections.

4. COMMUNICATIONS TO THE COMMISSION

Plager commented that the Commission received a letter from Representative Kawasaki regarding the letter which Ms. Wood sent to the Editor at the NewsMiner. This letter will be further discussed during "New Business."

Nelson addressed the Commission. She stated that the attorney assignments within the Borough have been shuffled due to changes within the Legal department. She stated that Wendy Doxey will now be the attorney for the CRFC.

Nelson further commented that it is Borough policy that all Boards and Commission members be provided Borough e-mail addresses so that personal e-mails and personal computers are not at risk. These new e-mail addresses will be established for each Commissioner in the near future.

Plager requested that the "packets" for the CRFC also be posted on the Borough web page. **Nelson** commented that this will be done.

It was determined that "packets" will be sent electronically to all CRFC members prior to each meeting and will also be posted online on the Borough web page.

Wood commented that she has issue with the public having access to documents that are "in the works."

Jackovich added that this is what the Open Meetings Act is all about to provide transparency to the public regarding items that are "in the works."

Olson stated that there is a difference between a "draft" that is available and a working copy that the CRFC is using to try and resolve issues. He suggested that the working copies not be out for public review.

After further discussion, it was decided that the Recording Clerk will distribute to the Commission a "packet" prior to the meeting date which contains the agenda, minutes to be approved and any correspondence that the Commission may have received so that the Commissioners may have ample time to print the documents and review them prior to attending the meeting. This "packet" will also be posted on the Borough web page for Commissioners to print and/or review prior to attending the meeting.

In conclusion, **Nelson** reminded the Commissioners that they cannot "Reply All" when responding to an e-mail from another Commissioner as that violates the Open Meetings Act.

Plager inquired when the Commission will be introduced to Ms. Doxey. **Nelson** responded that she will ask Doxey if she would be able to attend a CRFC meeting to discuss the Open Meetings Act and will let the Commission know as soon as possible.

5. PUBLIC COMMENTS

None

6. **NEW BUSINESS**

A. Downtown Neighborhoods zoning (Wood)

The Commission reviewed a letter written by Rep. Kawasaki about retaining the character of local communities and taking them into account when rezoning neighborhoods. This letter was written in response to a letter that was written to the NewsMiner Editor by Lee Wood.

Wood gave a brief presentation to the Commission explaining what has transpired to date to prompt her to write this letter to the Editor.

Nelson provided a copy of the Vision Fairbanks Plan and clarified that the neighborhood that Wood is referring to is outside of the Vision Fairbanks Plan area. It is designated as "Neighborhood Planning Area" but Vision Fairbanks did not do any neighborhood planning.

Plager asked if in the last Comprehensive Plan Update, was this area rezoned? **Nelson** clarified that the Comp Plan is different from the rezone. She further commented that there is the process for determining if this neighborhood is within a historic district, however being a historic district does not protect the neighborhood from rezones or the tearing down of historic structures. The only other "tool" that might be used to protect this neighborhood is the Comprehensive Plan, but all of the Comp Plan designations are so broad and vague that it most likely will not be effective. She stated that a Comp Plan amendment process by which people nominate areas and designations is a thought for change. She will continue to monitor this possibility and will check with the new Mayor when he takes office to see if an amendment to the Comp Plan might be a possibility. She will keep the CRFC apprised of this situation.

Jackovich added that there has been some effort through the Historical Society to identify any historic properties from Barnette to Lathrop.

Wood asked how much of the neighborhood between Barnette and Lathrop and First Avenue and Airport is designated "Urban development." **Nelson** responded that she believes most if not all is designated Urban development.

7. UNFINISHED BUSINESS

A. Plan Update scheduling of meetings (Durham)

Durham was not available for the meeting. **Nelson** advised the Commission that the CRFC Update is scheduled for hearing at the Parks & Recreation Commission meeting on September 21, 2015. After this meeting, the Plan update will then go to the Planning Commission on October 27, 2015 for review and approval. If it stays on this schedule, it could be heard by the Assembly in December.

B. Liaisons & Ex-Officio members – final review

Plager provided the Commission with a draft of Rule 17 to the CRFC Rules and Procedures which concerns Liaisons & Exofficio members. She highlighted the substantial changes and requested any additional changes from the Commission.

Nelson added that the document will need to be reviewed by the Legal department. She will forward this to Ms. Doxey for review and will report back.

C. Airport Way West update & thank you letter to Mayor / Assembly

Plager questioned if the CRFC was going to do a thank you letter to the Mayor for his support to allow the Borough to accept the property from DOT along the river in this area.

Plager volunteered Wright to draft a thank you letter to the Mayor.

Hooper addressed the Commission to answer some of the questions which they had about the process and how this project is expected to proceed. His input at the meeting was not audible.

Hooper commented that he may be able to give the Commission an update sometime after the first of the year.

D. Annual review report from August meeting

Plager provided the Commission with a list of accomplishments that she felt the CRFC has accomplished within the last year and a half. She stated that she would like to provide annual CRFC updates to the City Council and the Borough Assembly. She welcomed any suggestions as to how to make this happen.

Olson added that it should be akin to this document and delivered in a verbal form to the City Council and the Borough Assembly.

Nelson suggested talking with the new Mayor to see how he would like to accomplish this. Perhaps this could happen in a work session.

Taylor announced that with respect to the Pioneer Park river park, and with the Commissions' approval, he would be happy to see if Jason Avery, Park Manager, to attend a meeting to discuss his thoughts and plans for the riverfront area of the Park. **Jackovich** commented that this is a great idea. The Commission will look at inviting Mr. Avery for the November meeting.

E. Correspondence distribution process (McLean)

It was decided that any resolutions or letters or other forms of correspondence will be included with the e-mailed packets to the Commissioners each month should anything be sent to McLean for distribution to the Commission.

8. STAFF AND LIASION COMMENTS

Taylor announced that construction is underway at Snedden Park for a picnic pavilion which is funded by the Snedden Foundation.

Hooper announced that DOT is submitting for local planning approval for the Steese to Front Street connector and for the Wendell Street Bridge. His comments were not entirely audible. He stated that he will bring something to the next meeting to share.

9. COMMISSIONERS COMMENTS

Henszey thanked DOT for cleaning up pedestrian/bike path under the Peger Street bridge. He further commented that there is still sediment under the Cushman and Barnette Street bridges on the pedestrian/bike path. He further commented that he will be on vacation for the October meeting.

Jackovich commented that he will be out of state for the October meeting.

10. AGENDA SETTING FOR October 14, 2015 COMMISSION MEETING

A motion was made by Schlosser, seconded by Henszey, to adjourn the meeting at 1:30 p.m. There were no objections.

The Fairbanks North Star Borough/City of Fairbanks Chena Riverfront Commission (CRFC) met on Wednesday, October 14, 2015 Chair Plager presiding. The following Commission members were in attendance: Lee Wood, Sue Rainey, Gordy Schlosser, and Ian Olson.

Also present were: Christine Nelson; FNSB Community Planning Director; Kellen Spillman, FNSB Community Planning Deputy Director; Wendy Doxey, FNSB Assistant Borough Attorney; Jewelz Barker, TVWA; Jackson Fox, City of Fairbanks; Sarah Schacher, DOT Project Manager; Duane Davis, DOT Design Engineer; Leslie Daughtery, DOT Bridge Engineer; Fred Rohn; FNSB Computer Services; and Laura McLean, FNSB Recording Clerk.

1. CALL TO ORDER

Plager called the meeting to order at 12:00 p.m.

2. APPROVAL OF AGENDA

Plager suggested rearranging the agenda as Ms. Doxey's time is limited today.

A quorum was not established, therefore no motion was made.

3. APPROVAL OF MINUTES OF September 9, 2015

As there was not a quorum, Approval of the Minutes of September 9, 2015, will be deferred to the November meeting.

4. COMMUNICATIONS TO THE COMMISSION

Nelson introduced Fred Rohn with FNSB Computer Coordinator. **Rohn** presented Commissioners with information regarding the Borough-issued e-mail accounts that have been established for CRFC Commissioners. Legal will look into whether or not e-mail accounts should be established for Ex-Officios and Liaisons and will report back.

Nelson introduced Wendy Doxey, FNSB Assistant Attorney. **Doxey** spoke to the reason for the new Borough e-mail accounts. She stated that one of the reasons is so that personal and business e-mail accounts not belonging to the Borough could be subject to examination should any litigation arise.

Spillman addressed the Commission. He stated that the American Planning Association (APA) Alaska Chapter has recently been talking about nominating a place in Alaska to enter into the National APA "Great Places in America" competition. The APA Alaska Chapter Regional Representative for the Fairbanks Region is considering the Chena River for entry

into the "Great Public Spaces" category. Spillman will report back with additional information at a later date.

McLean distributed re-appointment memos to those members whose terms will be expiring at the end of the calendar year (handed out to Rainey, mailed to Henszey, McEnteer, Jackovich). It was requested that if a Commissioner wishes to renew their appointment to the Commission, they will need to indicate such on the memo and return it along with an updated application no later than November 13, 2015, so that Commissioners can be confirmed during the December 10, 2015 Assembly meeting.

7. UNFINISHED BUSINESS

- A. <u>Steese Expressway to Front Street Bicycle/Pedestrian Path Sarah Schacher, DOT Project Manager</u>
- B. Wendell Street bridge update Sarah Schacher, DOT Project Manager

Spillman addressed the Commission. He introduced Sarah Schacher from the DOT&PF and stated that she will be giving a brief presentation regarding these two projects and further commented that these are projects that the Commission has seen several times in the past. He distributed copies of a resolution of support and scoping comments that the Commission has previously offered and a letter of support from FNSB Parks & Rec Department. Staff reports are still being written for these projects. The projects will be heard before the Planning Commission on October 27, 2015.

Sarah Schacher addressed the Commission and further introduced Project Design Engineer **Duane Davis** who gave the presentations regarding both of these projects.

A question and answer period was held following the presentation.

Olson inquired if DOT&PF would be acquiring right-of-way property with the Wendell Street Bridge project. **Davis** responded that yes, they would, not only with this project but with the Graehl Park project as well. These acquisitions would be for temporary construction purposes only.

Rainey inquired how parking would be impacted at Graehl Park. **Davis** responded that they are looking at increasing the number of parking spaces between the boat launch and the bridge. Parking adjacent to the playground area will become parallel parking, which reduces the parking capacity. One solution to the reduced parking spaces by the playground would be to develop additional parking at Nelson Park on the other side of the Steese Highway, connected by the pedestrian/bicycle path under the bridge.

Olson asked if they would be repaving at Graehl Park. **Davis** stated that they just repaved the area two summers ago. They will do minor paving to repair what is damaged when they install curbs and gutters adjacent to the park.

Olson commented that parallel parking may create a situation where people will not want to park parallel therefore will not use the park. **Schacher** clarified that they are trying to make this so that it is parking for Graehl Park rather than for the businesses in the area.

Plager inquired about the plans for the existing trail that crosses through the park at this time. **Davis** reiterated that they are working closely with Parks & Rec to re-route the trail to remove it from the flood zone area. **Spillman** added that there is a letter within the items that he distributed today from Parks & Rec stating that they do support the dirt path being relocated as DOT is suggesting.

Davis reminded the Commission that when the Chena River is high, this area of the park becomes flooded.

Plager questioned if a different configuration was considered to maintain pull-in parking at the Park. **Davis** reiterated that they had.

Olson questioned if the playground equipment could be moved to accommodate pull in parking. **Davis** stated that to move it would place it in the flood zone.

Rainey questioned the acreage of Graehl Park. Davis replied that he did not know the size of the park.

Wood asked what the area difference was for parallel parking spaces versus nose-in parking. **Davis** responded that the minimum size parking space is 8.5 feet wide by 20 feet long. Spillman added that it is against State law to park within ten feet of the centerline of a road. Therefore, the parking situation as it is right now is in violation of this law. **Davis** added that parking statutes in this area have never been enforced. When they design a new facility, they cannot design it such that it encourages people to break the law.

Olson questioned if the road adjacent to the park was a single lane road. **Davis** replied that it is not a single lane road. There is sufficient space for a two lane road with parallel parking.

Plager commented that if they intend to create parallel parking, she would like to see Nelson Park developed to accommodate the additional parking.

Plager asked if there was sufficient radius for a bicycle to make the turn where the bike path comes up from under the Wendell Street Bridge near Play It Again Sports. **Davis** replied that there was ample space, approximately 16-17 feet.

Wood asked if there has been any thought about moving some of the activities and amenities at Graehl Park over to Nelson Park. **Davis** stated that there had not been any that he is aware of. **Spillman** added that this is something that Parks & Rec and the Park Commission could work through, further developing Nelson Park. **Davis** suggested that this would be a good project for the CRFC to pursue.

Davis concluded that they hope to have the Graehl Park project in construction next summer and Wendell Bridge will follow in 2017. Wendell Bridge will most likely be completely closed for two seasons as there is not enough room to construct a temporary bridge.

Rainey asked if the height of Wendell Street Bridge will be an issue like the height of the Barnette Street Bridge is. **Davis** replied that it will not have the same clearance height issues like the Barnette Bridge does. **Schacher** added that there was no way that they were going to get the Barnette Street Bridge any higher than it is without building an overpass due to the existing river bank in the area. The banks at Wendell Street are higher than the banks at Barnette.

Spillman encouraged any Commissioner who wanted to submit written comments regarding these projects, do so on their own. Comments may be directed to planning@fnsb.us. Any comments received will be presented to the Planning Commission. Verbal testimony will also be accepted.

Due to other commitments, Nelson excused herself from the meeting at 1:00 p.m.

C. CRFC Plan update – Durham

McLean conveyed to the Commission that the Plan update did go before the Parks & Recreation Commission on September 26, 2015. It is now scheduled to be heard before the Planning Commission on November 10, 2015.

This creates a problem as November 11th is the regularly scheduled date for the CRFC meeting. As this is a holiday, the CRFC can either meet on the 10th or the 12th. If the Commission chooses to meet on the 10th, the update will not have gone before the Planning Commission yet. If the CRFC meets on the 12th, the Plan update will have been heard at the Planning Commission and a report can be given to the CRFC.

The CRFC decided to meet on November 12th to receive updated information regarding the Plan update.

D. Airport Way West project update

Schlosser reported that he needs to meet with Hooper at this point. They are working on securing funding for the riverbank restoration in this area for next year. He will report back as this project progresses.

Wood asked if the change in Mayors' will have any effect on this project. **Schlosser** stated that he was not sure.

Plager questioned if the Commission was going to submit anything to the Borough Assembly regarding the acquisition of the parcel of land that was to be deeded to the Borough. It was agreed upon that as of last meeting, Wright would be drafting this letter.

8. STAFF AND LIASION COMMENTS

Barker announced that she will be resigning from TVWA effective December 31, 2015, but plans to continue to work on on-going projects under contract for another 9 months.

9. COMMISSIONERS COMMENTS

Olson thanked DOT for their presentation.

Plager distributed the draft Annual Report which will be discussed at the next meeting.

a) Meeting Minutes of October 13, 2015

Ms. Bailey, seconded by Ms. Richards, moved to APPROVE the Meeting Minutes of October 13, 2015.

GUEST SPEAKER

a) Christina Davies, Interior Alaska Center for Non-violent Living Prevention Coordinator: Green Dot Program

Christina Davis was not present due to a change in staffing. Instead the presenter was Ms. Kara Carlson. Hope Finkelstein and Karen Taber were also present representing the Fairbanks Wellness Coalition.

Ms. Carlson shared her background and spoke about what led her to the field of violence prevention. She spoke to changing the culture of violence in our community and to the Green Dot Program. Ms. Carlson led the group through an exercise on possible barriers to success of the program. A brief question, answer and comment session ensued following Ms. Carlson's presentation.

Ms. Finkelstein spoke briefly to the mission and activities of the Alaska Wellness Coalition.

Ms. Taber spoke to Fairbanks Wellness Coalition's focus on suicide prevention.

<u>UNFINISHED BUSINESS</u>

a) Diversity Action Plan

Chief of Staff Jim Williams spoke to the six goals in the draft of the diversity action plan (DAP). He reviewed the status of all the tasks listed under each goal.

Chair Eberhart encouraged FDC Members to come and speak to the City Council during their consideration of the 2016 City budget in support of not only the two FPD cold case investigator positions, but also in support of some funding for the FDC.

City HR Director Angela Foster-Snow spoke to the City's hiring process, specifically to the FPD oral boards. She asked anyone interested in participating to contact her.

Chair Eberhart asked members if there was any objection to inviting UAF Professor Rob Prince to come speak to the group. No members objected.

UAF Department of Journalism Chair Rob Prince spoke to their Dark Winter Nights Storytelling Program and shared that the date of their next event will be November 21, 2015, at 7 p.m. at the Hering Auditorium.

The group returned to the discussion on the DAP.

Ms. Foster-Snow spoke to the make-up of hiring panels in the past; she stated that panels can vary with each new hire. Mr. Cole expressed an interest in serving on a future panel.

Mr. Williams continued reviewing the updated DAP. Members elected to task the Policy and Procedure Committee with the initial drafting of an Affirmative Action Plan. Members

discussed ways to have FDC representation at City Council meetings. They talked about how the Education and Outreach Committee should make regular reports to the City Council.

Ms. Wattum expressed concern that Committee meetings have not been happening regularly. The group discussed alternative possibilities for meeting forums and locations.

Ms. Richards spoke to her concern that Ms. Frank has been absent for some time; she indicated that she has tried to reach her a number of times without success.

Chair Eberhart stated that he would attempt to contact Ms. Frank.

Ms. Wattum suggested combining the Media & Communications Committee and the Education & Community Outreach Committee.

Members discussed what may be considered appropriate or inappropriate use of email and social media as it relates to the City of Fairbanks and its employees. They requested a future presentation on the Open Meetings Act (OMA) and how it relates to the use of email and social media by members.

Mr. Walters asked if the group could have a proactive discussion about the Fairbanks Four case before a decision is made by Judge Lyle. Chair Eberhart agreed that the issue should be discussed by the FDC at a future meeting. Members discussed inviting an objective party to come speak to the FDC on the Fairbanks Four case. They talked about a number of possibilities for speakers.

Mr. Williams stated that he needs a final recommendation on the DAP tone and format from the Media & Communications Committee before he can finalize the draft and put it before the City Council for approval. Ms. Wattum stated that the Committee discussed the DAP and that she will relay a summary of that discussion to Mr. Williams.

FDC MEMBERS COMMENTS

Ms. Lenahan stated that she had no comments.

Ms. Borges spoke to the urgency in being prepared for the outcome to the Fairbanks Four case.

Mr. Walters welcomed Mr. Cole to the FDC. He spoke to the good meeting held with Chief Aragon and other members of the LGBT community. He invited everyone to attend the upcoming LGBT forum on Saturday, November 14 at the Unitarian Church from 10:30-3:30. He spoke to the alignment of the Media & Communications Committee and the Education & Community Outreach Committee and agreed that there should be a discussion on whether to combine the two groups.

Ms. Foster-Snow encouraged everyone check out "Humans of New York" on Facebook or Instagram. She stated that if members shared in that forum, it may be a nice way to tell the story of the FDC. She announced On behalf of Trina Bailey, Ms. Foster-Snow announced that Denali Elementary School PTA will host a Native Heritage Night on Friday, November 13 at 6 p.m.

She encouraged FDC members to get involved with the City HR Department and invited members to stop by her office.

Ms. Kan spoke to the success of the International Friendship Day event and requested feedback from anyone who attended. She spoke to the importance of getting the word out about the event.

Ms. Davis stated that it was a good meeting.

Ms. Wattum stated that she had no comments.

Ms. Rogers reminded everyone of the quote that Ms. Kan mentioned at the last meeting, to be "for something rather than against something."

Mr. Cole stated that he likes Alaska Wellness Coalition's handout promoting non-drinking among teens by looking at the positive teen drinking statistics in Alaska. He stated that the FDC needs to be proactive when it comes to the Fairbanks Four case; he stated that he loves Fairbanks and enjoys the diversity in the community. He emphasized the need to show respect to others.

Ms. Richards stated that she likes the idea of "Humans of Fairbanks" and suggested that it would be great for the FDC to own the idea. She stated that she will be out of town the week of November 22.

Chair Eberhart stated that he teaches a class on Saturdays and would not be able to attend the LGBT forum. He thanked Ms. Kan for the invite to International Friendship Day and stated that it was a great event that was very well-attended. He shared that Ms. May Green has resigned from the FDC and encouraged interested individuals to contact the Borough as Ms. Green's seat is Borough-appointed. He expressed his sadness that Chief of Staff Jim Williams will be taking a position as the FNSB Chief of Staff and will be leaving City of Fairbanks; he and FDC members congratulated Mr. Williams on his new position.

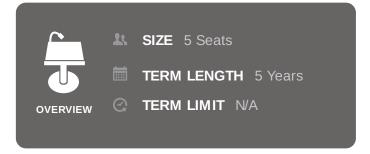

The Fact Finding Commission shall assist the City Council in the investigation, collection, assessment, and analysis of any issue referred to the Commission where facts are in dispute or are unknown. It shall establish facts and issue findings to the City Council. Matters shall be referred to the Commission as the City Council and Mayor deem appropriate; and when so referred, shall be referred by motion with a description of the scope and issues requiring factual determination. The Fact Finding Commission shall have the power to administer oaths, subpoena witnesses and compel the production of books, papers, and other relevant evidence. The Commission shall request the Mayor to issue subpoenas as required.



BOARD/COMMISSION CHARACTERISTICS

The Fact Finding Commission shall consist of five members appointed by the mayor, subject to confirmation by the City Council; each member shall serve a five-year term. At least three members of the Commission shall be residents of the City. The Commission shall consist of two members w ho are experienced in the fields of law or judicial enforcement and three members from the public at large. Meetings are called when the subject matter warrants. The chairman is authorized to call meetings, or a majority of the members may require that a meeting be called.

MEETINGS

All meetings shall be open to the public, except that closed meetings may be held as provided by law. A majority of the Commission shall constitute a quorum; three affirmative votes shall be necessary to carry any question. Minutes shall be kept as a permanent record of all meetings and shall be filed in the Office of the City Clerk.

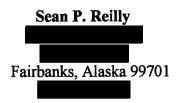

SUBJECT: Delegating a Lead Spokesperson for Labor Negotiations

DATE:

I am writing this memo at the request of Council Member Pruhs. He is proposing that the spokesperson responsibility for labor negotiations be transferred from the Mayor's Office to the City Attorney's Office. FGC Sec. 42-1 provides that the mayor has basic responsibility for labor relations unless the Council by majority vote selects a different spokesperson. By way of this memo, Council Member Pruhs is asking the Council to approve the transfer of the labor spokesperson responsibility to the City Attorney's Office.

The departure of Chief of Staff Jim Williams and the imminent departure of Amber Courtney has left the Mayor's Office shorthanded. Jim Williams played a major role in contract negotiations. It is likely that his replacement will need some time to get up to speed on the city's various collective bargaining agreements. Given this situation, Council Member Pruhs believes it makes sense to move the primary responsibility for labor negotiations to the City Attorney's Office.

If Council Member Pruhs' proposal is approved by the Council, Deputy City Attorney JB Brainerd and I initially would work in tandem as the City's lead negotiators for labor contracts. We would work in conjunction with the Mayor's Office, and I envision the new Chief of Staff becoming part of the negotiating team.

This memo will appear as a consent-agenda item (13e). If there are any questions or concerns about the transfer, this item should be pulled from the consent agenda. If it is not pulled from the consent agenda, then the transfer will be approved.

Today, Wednesday, December 9, I filed a Notice of Appeal and related documents with the state superior court. This filing is the first step in appealing the Alaska Labor Relations Agency (ALRA) Decision and Order No. 305 in PSEA v. City of Fairbanks, ALRA case no. 14-1658-ULP. Normally, I would not have filed the appeal documents without the approval of the council. However, under the circumstances (discussed below), I felt that in order to best protect the interest of the city, I could not wait until after the council meeting on December 14 to file the appeal.

This memorandum will be on the agenda of the December 14 meeting. The appeal can be withdrawn or go forward depending on the will of the council. While the memo will be listed as a consent-agenda item (13f), I would suggest that it be pulled from the consent agenda and a voice vote taken on whether to go forward with the appeal. That way the record is clear that the council approved the appeal or directed that it be dismissed.

You have previously received copies of the ALRA's Decision and Order No. 305. The three-member Board Panel found that the City had committed an unfair labor practice by ratifying the tentative agreement reached by the City and PSEA, then reconsidering its ratification and voting not to ratify the agreement. The Board Panel found that the City and PSEA had a valid and enforceable contract. The Panel ordered the City to execute the collective bargaining agreement.

Along with the Notice of Appeal, I filed a motion for a stay (of the implementation of the ALRA order) during the pendency of the appeal. I believe a stay is needed to clarify the legal standing of the parties and to prevent possible, unnecessary legal disputes. It has been reported that PSEA members are or were contemplating filing criminal charges against or even

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arresting members of the City Council if they took any action that PSEA viewed as a violation of the ALRA's order. I brought these concerns to the attention of PSEA's attorney on Friday evening. He received my email and responded that he would get back to me, but as of this writing, I have not heard anything. Hopefully, a stay will ensure that this matter is addressed in the proper manner and in the proper venue (the superior court).

If you have any questions, please let me know.

[UPDATE: On Thursday, December 10, 2015, Officer Ron Dupee, president of PSEA Local 803, came to my office and apologized for the email I had received from a Local 803 member concerning possible criminal charges for violation of ALRA orders. He stated that this email was not authorized by the union.]
