CITIZEN'S COMMENTS

Frank Turney 329 6th Avenue, Fairbanks – Mr. Turney addressed the Council regarding Resolution No. 4286. He advocated for private funding for a fishing dock for the handicap. Mr. Turney stated that the dock secured by Festival Fairbanks does not grant handicap access and he wanted to know if that issue had been brought up during the planning of the new dock. He shared his concern for discriminating against people who are wheelchair bound, particularly for veterans. Mr. Turney stated he researched other docks in the State and stated that other cities have docks that are wheelchair accessible. Mr. Turney stated that he was happy to see Chief Aragon downtown earlier in the day and stated he wished he had a camera with him. Mr. Turney reported he was pleased to walk down 2nd Avenue next to the Chief of Police. Mr. Turney stated he believes that the FPD needs to have an internal affairs department. Mr. Turney stated his disappointment over no public bathrooms in the City.

c) Oath of Office – City Clerk

City Attorney Paul Ewers swore into office recently-appointed City Clerk Danyielle Snider.

MAYOR'S COMMENTS AND REPORT

Mayor Eberhart congratulated Ms. Snider for her new position as City Clerk; he stated she has done a great job so far and will continue to do so. **Mayor Eberhart** stated that April is national volunteer month; he thanked all the people who volunteer throughout the community. He presented a proclamation and called for C.B. Bettisworth to come forward; he listed the vast projects that Mr. Bettisworth has worked on throughout the City. **Mayor Eberhart** proclaimed Mr. Bettisworth as Outstanding Citizen of 2014 throughout the City of Fairbanks and he then

congratulated him on his retirement. He presented Mr. Bettisworth with a gold pan and offered him the opportunity to speak.

Mr. Bettisworth stated he was honored and humbled by the recognition. He stated he and his wife retired the past fall and he introduced his wife, Ms. Karen Perdue. Mr. Bettisworth stated they will not be moving out of State because their roots are in Fairbanks. He stated his concern for the loss of population in the City of Fairbanks. He stated his concern for Fairbanks having the highest housing vacancy rating within the State. He stated that one of the reasons population is waning in Fairbanks is because it not an attractive place; he said it lacks an economically vibrant downtown. He announced his excitement for the Cushman Complete Street project and applauded the Mayor for attending the Mayor's Institute of City Design. He encouraged the Council to focus on economic development with a specific focus on public/private partnerships. He stated the project he is most proud of is the Fairview Manor/Raven Landing project as it is an example of a good public/private partnership.

Mayor Eberhart introduced new HR Director Angela Foster-Snow and asked her to share a little bit about herself with the Council. Ms. Foster-Snow stated she has lived in Alaska for ten years and that during that time, she worked as senior management with the Fairbanks Native Association (FNA). Ms. Foster-Snow stated she was the director of Head Start and most recently the Director of Planning & Development. She stated that prior to moving to Alaska she was the housing director for the South Eastern Idaho Community Action Agency. She stated her supervisory experience and training are in the areas of reflective supervision. Ms. Foster-Snow stated she has experience with goal setting and was the primary grant writer at FNA. She stated she is excited about working for the City and that she is happy to be part of the team.

Mayor Eberhart addressed Mr. Turney's request for the FPD to have an internal affairs department. He stated that he and Chief Aragon have been in intense discussions about forming an Office of Professional Responsibility. **Mayor Eberhart** stated a person has been designated for the position. He stated that person will take citizen complaints and requests for internal affair reviews and work directly with the Police Chief. He stated working directly with the Police Chief will create a point of contact and eliminate confusion.

Mayor Eberhart emphasized the importance of the F-16 and F-35 scoping meetings and encouraged the Council and public to attend. He stated that if the community can keep the F-16's and get the F-35's then military construction over a four-year period would be in excess of \$300 million dollars and would bring a \$2 billion a year financial injection to the community. He stated the addition of the two squadrons would bring more than 3,000 new personnel to the community and that the life of the aircraft is 30 to 40 years.

Mayor Eberhart provided a summary of events, meetings and activities he and his staff had been involved in since the last City Council Meeting. He stated the cold case relating to the murder of Mahogany Davis 12 years ago has been reexamined, and he thanked Chief Aragon for the attention to the case.

Mayor Eberhart called for Public Testimony and, hearing none, declared Public Testimony closed.

Mr. Cleworth requested that Mr. Soileau come forward. Mr. Cleworth asked Mr. Soileau to provide an update regarding encumbrances in the budget. Mr. Soileau stated that encumbrances in the budget happen when cash is committed to a vendor but does not change hands during that calendar year. Mr. Soileau stated that incorporating encumbrances in the budget is done so that the current year's budget is not affected; he stated the funds carry over from the previous year. Mr. Soileau stated the encumbrance accounting has been approved by the auditors and it follows the principals of accounting. Mr. Cleworth thanked Mr. Soileau for clarifying what was in the budget.

Mayor Eberhart called for Public Testimony and, hearing none, declared Public Testimony closed.

Ordinance No. 5969 ADOPTED.

d) Ordinance No. 5970 – An Ordinance Amending Fairbanks General Code Section 46-42 Disturbing the Peace by Adding a New Subsection Relating to Marijuana Smoke. Introduced by Council Member Pruhs. SECOND READING AND PUBLIC HEARING.

Mr. Pruhs, seconded by Mr. Cleworth, moved to ADOPT Ordinance No. 5970.

Mayor Eberhart called for Public Testimony.

Frank Turney 329 6th Avenue, Fairbanks – Mr. Turney stated he did not know how the Ordinance could be workable and he hoped the Council would reconsider passing it. Mr. Turney stated the term marijuana is racist and that he prefers to call it cannabis. Mr. Turney stated there is no scientific proof that airborne byproducts of cannabis cause any harm in close proximity. Mr. Turney stated there is scientific data released by the Harvard Medical School and the National Institute of Health relating to the harmful effects of barbeque smoke. He asked if the Council would consider a disturbing the peace violation for barbeque smoke. He stated that Ordinance No. 5970 is a waste of police time. Mr. Turney stated a person should talk to their neighbor if they are offended by cannabis smoke and not send the police over. Mr. Turney stated that if Joe Vogler were here he would call it a posy sniffer Ordinance.

Mr. Gatewood stated the issue was not the smell of marijuana but that a person could possibly be affected by a contact high as a result of smelling it. Mr. Turney stated he was not buying it; he stated something that is airborne outside cannot result in a person getting a contact high. **Mr. Gatewood** clarified he has heard people complain about getting a contact high from marijuana smoke and that is what the Ordinance is addressing. Mr. Turney stated he wanted scientific data to prove that airborne smoke can cause a contact high.

Mayor Eberhart hearing no more requests for public comment declared Public Testimony closed. He called upon the Council for questions or comments.

Mr. Pruhs stated Ordinance No. 5970 was an extension of a prior Ordinance; he stated that it bans the use of marijuana in public but allows use on private property. **Mr. Pruhs** read aloud

from the Ordinance, Section 46-42 (1)(g), "in a private place, consume marijuana with the intent to disturb or in reckless disregard of the peace and privacy of others after having been informed that the conduct is disturbing the peace and privacy of others not in the same place." He noted Mr. Turney's request to speak with a neighbor and stated that would be the correct thing to do; he clarified the Ordinance was not designed so that if one smells marijuana it is wrong. He stated the intent is to address use with reckless disregard for others. Mr. Pruhs stated Section 46-42 (h)(4) of the Ordinance explains that an individual using marijuana would first be informed by a police officer that the marijuana was reported as a disturbance and only then if they refused to abate would they be issued a disturbing the peace violation. Mr. Pruhs directed attention to item four of the Ordinance and read, "to disturb the peace and privacy of others, the consumption of marijuana must be of such a nature that it would disturb a not unduly sensitive individual." He stated that if the consumption of marijuana was to disturb, a \$100 fine would be issued and could be paid to the Clerk or fought in Court.

Mr. Gatewood in reference to Section 46-42 (h)(4) asked Mr. Pruhs if the disturbing the peace violation could be issued if the person making the request to cease and desist was in the same place as the user. **Mr. Pruhs** stated the intent of that language was to address use and disturbances across property lines. **Mr. Gatewood** questioned what might happen in a condo situation that would be considered the same place and not a public location. **Mr. Pruhs** responded the owner of the condo could call the police and report a disturbing the police violation.

Mr. Cleworth thanked Mr. Pruhs for the work he had done on Ordinance No. 5970; Mr. Cleworth handed out an amended version the Ordinance. Mr. Cleworth stated that when he was Mayor had a hard time with disturbing the peace reports; he explained they were usually regarding multiple animals on a property with an owner that would not clean up after them. He stated property owners would call and report the overwhelming odors were disturbing the peace and would want the City to fix the problem. Mr. Cleworth stated he would research the code to see what grounds the City stood on to tackle the issue but the language was not specific enough. He stated another complaint he ran into was of people littering in their yards and trash blowing across property lines causing property owners to call in about the public nuisance. Mr. Cleworth stated it was difficult because he would not want to go overboard making all types of rules because he believes it to be counterproductive for government. He stated that over the years many things had been eliminated from the code book that did not need to be regulated. Mr. Cleworth stated that a violation based on smell is a dangerous path and recommended an amended version of the Ordinance. He cited the smell of the coffee roasting companies stating that some are offended by it while others are not. He stated he did not want to create a quagmire by approving an Ordinance that did not make sense to everyone. He requested the Council take a holistic approach to disturbing the peace and have marijuana fall under a broader category.

Mr. Cleworth, seconded by **Mr.** Walley, moved to POSTPONE Ordinance No. 5970 to the Regular Meeting of April 20, 2015.

e) Ordinance No. 5971 – An Ordinance Authorizing a Limited Real Property Tax Exemption for the Retirement Community of Fairbanks – Raven Landing Expansion Project and Setting an Effective Date. Introduced by Mayor Eberhart. SECOND READING AND PUBLIC HEARING.

Mr. Matherly, seconded by **Mr. Gatewood**, moved to ADOPT Ordinance No. 5971.

Karen Parr, 949 McGown Street #3E, Fairbanks - Ms. Parr stated Raven Landing was built by a non-profit named Retirement Community of Fairbanks that was incorporated in 2004. Ms. Parr stated Raven Landing was built to provide independent living for unsubsidized seniors in the community. Ms. Parr stated Raven Landing was a good example of public/private partnership and used the 10% tax exemption the City granted over a 10-year period as an example. Ms. Parr stated the people involved in the planning were all volunteers and that many businesses helped as well. She stated that without the help of CB Bettisworth the project may never have come to fruition. Ms. Parr spoke about the success of Raven Landing and noted it has been at full occupancy since the time the project was complete. Ms. Parr stated there is a 100-person waiting list and as soon a unit vacates it is immediately occupied by another senior from the community. Ms. Parr stated Raven Landing is a great resource to help prevent the decline in the Fairbanks population because seniors have a decent place to live in the community. Ms. Parr expressed appreciation for the help and support the City Council has provided. Ms. Parr stated the Ordinance the City Council passed in 2010 only covered the four existing buildings and Raven Landing is now struggling for funding to build the final apartment building. Ms. Parr requested that the City Council extend the exemption until the project is complete for the rest of the property. Ms. Parr stated Community Development, Inc. (CDI) is not the correct owner as is listed on page three of the ordinance; she stated the correct owner is SWELL, LLC.

Mr. Cleworth asked Ms. Parr if the developer of the project was successful in finding additional commercial property. Ms. Parr stated Mr. Bettisworth would be a better person to answer the question. Mr. Bettisworth stated the developer never planned to use the property for any commercial development outside of affordable senior housing. Mr. Bettisworth stated one of the goals of the development is to build an assisted living facility on the property. Mr. Bettisworth stated retail and commercial units were never intended for construction on the property due to the limited access off Cowles Street. Mr. Bettisworth stated SWELL, LLC owns the property because CDI, an Idaho based company, sold their interest in Weeks Field Development. Mr. Cleworth asked if any future expansion was planned. Ms. Parr stated the plan is to complete one more senior living facility that would house 35 apartments for local seniors and, if her dreams could come true, eventually build an assisted living facility would be constructed. Mr.

Bettisworth stated the goal is to get the Retirement Community of Fairbanks in property control for the development of the remainder of the property.

Hearing no more requests for public comment, **Mayor Eberhart** declared Public Testimony closed.

Mayor Eberhart requested Pat Smith come forward and give a staff report. Mr. Smith stated he likes to take a step back and look at this project as a whole while also considering the City's bottom line. Mr. Smith spoke in favor of Ordinance No. 5971. He stated that when Fairview Manor was occupying the property it was a constant drain of City funds due to the high volume of police visits. He stated that the final calendar year that Fairview Manor paid taxes the City's tax share was \$19,470.00. Mr. Smith stated that for the year of 2014 the City's tax share was \$70,000.00, he noted that was including the 50% tax exemption. Mr. Smith stated that amount was an astonishing return on the investment. Mr. Smith stated that if the Ordinance passes and new building is constructed, that \$85,000.00 in tax revenue will be the City's proposed share. Mr. Smith shared the other positive impacts of the Weeks Field project to include affordable and safe housing, the community center and the injection of funds to the construction industry.

Mr. Cleworth stated Mr. Smith's testimony brought forth many memories of the Fairview Manor. He stated that it was the premier housing facility when he was growing up in Fairbanks. Mr. Cleworth stated that in his 10 years working in accounting he saw many retired couples moving away from the community, specifically to the Seattle area. Mr. Cleworth stated school enrollment is declining but the Fairbanks population is remaining stagnant due to seniors staying within the community. Mr. Cleworth stated when he looks around his neighborhood many homeowners are staying even after their children leave because there is an option for affordable care after retirement.

Mr. Pruhs, seconded by **Mr. Walley**, moved to AMEND Ordinance No. 5971 by replacing "Community Development, Inc. with "SWELL, LLC" in Section 7.

Mr. Cleworth pulled Resolution No. 4666 and 4669 and Ordinance No. 5974 from the Consent Agenda.

Mayor Eberhart called for objection and, hearing none, so ORDERED.

City Clerk Snider read the Consent Agenda, as Amended, into the record.

CITIZEN'S COMMENTS

Dawn Murphy, 101 Dunkel Street, Fairbanks – Ms. Murphy stated Explore Fairbanks passed an official audit of the books. Ms. Murphy stated June Rogers of the Fairbanks Arts Association won the Golden Heart Award for her support of the visitor industry. Ms. Murphy stated Mayor Luke Hopkins won the Aurora Award for his contributions toward the developments of the Fairbanks visitor industry. Ms. Murphy stated the Jim and Mary Binkley Award went to Hoodoo Brewery for their creation and innovation of the new attraction they have opened in the community. Ms. Murphy stated the Raven Award went to Alaska Skylar Travel for promoting a distinct local, statewide, national and international interest in Alaska among travelers. Ms. Murphy stated Hilda McDonald was awarded the Golden Heart Greeter Award for her dedication to making sure visitors' experience is special and memorable. She stated Explore Fairbanks won silver in the Destination Video category from the North American Travel Journal Association. Ms. Murphy stated that the Annual Walk for Charity will take place May 8, 2015, and that all funds from the proceeds will go to local non-profits. Ms. Murphy thanked the Council for reinvesting City bed tax funds into destination marketing.

Marylee Bates, 1290 St. Anton Drive, Fairbanks – Ms. Bates stated she is the Director of Fairbanks Youth Advocates; she stated The Door is a facility that houses homeless youth ages 12-18. Ms. Bates shared the various reasons youth come to stay at the shelter. Ms. Bates stated that many of the youth that come to the shelter do not have supportive adults in their lives and so the staff steps in and helps fill that role. Ms. Bates stated on behalf of the Fairbanks Youth Advocates that she would like to publically thank the City of Fairbanks for making a difference in the lives of teens and families in the area. Ms. Bates invited the Council to the public presentation hosted by the Greater Fairbanks Women's Club on April 28, 2015 at the Noel Wien Library.

Mr. Gatewood thanked Ms. Bates for her community service. Mr. Gatewood asked Ms. Bates how she determines a youth's need for shelter. Ms. Bates stated that it is a process over time that determines why a youth has sought The Door for shelter.

<u>Jeff Whipple, 441 Keeling Road, North Pole</u> – Mr. Whipple stated he was in attendance to share his disappointment in the IBEW negotiations and the proposal the Council has offered employees. Mr. Whipple stated he was offended that City employees were not offered cost of living raises. Mr. Whipple stated that when Mr. Cleworth was Mayor he sent out an email titled swan song, in which he broke down how the City should be operated. Mr. Whipple stated Mr. Cleworth's email sited the good financial standing of the City. Mr. Whipple stated he did not understand why City employees are forced to pay an astronomical amount for no opt-out, required insurance. Mr. Whipple stated he was disappointed that the Council does not take care of valued, professional employees.

Mr. Cleworth asked Mr. Whipple if the package the Union offered employees four years ago would have better spent if it was applied to healthcare rather than a wage increase. Mr. Whipple stated this year alone his out of pocket medical cost went up 5% and the 2.5% package that the Union offered would not cover the cost of that increase. **Mayor Cleworth** asked Mr. Whipple if he would be interested in plans outside of the IBEW plan. Mr. Whipple stated the IBEW has a no

opt out clause and that he would be interested in hearing other options to the IBEW healthcare plan.

<u>Dominic Lozano</u>, 1101 Cushman Street, Fairbanks – Mr. Lozano stated he was the president of the Fire Fighters Union and that he was attending the Council meeting to urge the members to allow for changes to the current insurance contract. Mr. Lozano expressed his disappointment in the Council for not holding good faith arbitration tactics. Mr. Lozano stated the high cost of health care has nulled and voided any promotion pay he has received.

Doug Fournier, 105 Oak Drive, Fairbanks – Mr. Fournier stated he has worked for the Fire Department for 22 years. He stated he likes to look at life with a "glass-is-half-full" kind of attitude but that some of the recent decisions of the Council he is developing negative feelings. Mr. Fournier stated that when he was hired in 1993, he was immediately given a pink slip because the City hid money in an attempt to only fund the Fire Department for half of the year. He stated that he has a lack of trust for the members of the Council. Mr. Fournier stated that when he got hired his healthcare was funded at 100%; he stated that his paycheck amount has not gone up because of the increased cost of employee paid insurance premiums. Mr. Fournier stated that the fire department and police department are continually at risk while on the job and that the City should fund more of their healthcare. Mr. Fournier stated that when the Council takes away an employee's ability to care for themselves, they are putting that employee at risk.

Hearing no more requests for public comment, **Mayor Eberhart** declared Public Testimony closed.

MAYOR'S COMMENTS AND REPORT

Mayor Eberhart stated that the F-16's would be staying at Eielson Air Force Base. Mayor Eberhart expressed the importance of revenue sharing and stated his concern for future fiscal declines. Mayor Eberhart spoke to the healthcare issues that are affecting employees, specifically the firefighters' Superior Court case and the arbitrator's suggestions. Mayor Eberhart spoke to the various meetings and activities he had participated in since the last Council Meeting.

Mayor Eberhart expressed his gratitude to Mike Schmetzer for his 9 years of service to the City of Fairbanks. He stated Mr. Schmetzer was a tremendous asset and that he will present Mr. Schmetzer with his goldpan at a future date.

Mr. Pruhs shared his concern with the language in the Ordinance regarding a five minute time limit per topic. **Mr. Pruhs** asked Mr. Ewers if a citizen would they get multiple five minute increments to testify if they had multiple topics to speak about. Mr. Ewers stated that the practice has always been limited to five minutes in total.

Mr. Cleworth requested that Deputy Police Chief Jewkes to come forward to answer some questions. Mr. Cleworth stated he has some confusion about personnel positions at FPD. He asked Mr. Jewkes to clarify which positions have been eliminated and what positions are still active. Mr. Jewkes stated there are two Clerks in the data management office and one Clerk in the administrative office. Mr. Cleworth asked Mr. Jewkes which positions were eliminated by the Union; Mr. Jewkes replied one-and-a-half officers were eliminated in exchange for the Clerk positions. Mr. Cleworth asked Chief of Staff Williams if he could clarify which positions were current and which had been eliminated. Mr. Williams stated at the end of 2014, three temporary Public Safety Assistants (PSA) were eliminated. Mr. Cleworth stated that in looking at the grants the Student Resource Officers' (SRO) funding stopped in May of 2014; Mr. Jewkes stated they are funded through August of 2015. Mr. Cleworth stated his confusion at the grant-funded positions and shared his concern that the SRO's went from grant-funded to payroll employees. Mr. Jewkes stated there are two officers retiring in May of 2015 and that the grant funding is

hard to track. **Mr. Cleworth** stated he no longer believes the grant-funded positions are lucrative for the City.

Mr. Gatewood expressed confusion with Mr. Cleworth's comments regarding the grant-funded positions. **Mr. Cleworth** stated that the positions that were added several years ago were funded at 90% by the grant and now the positions are funded at 25%. **Mr. Gatewood** agreed that it did not make good sense to him either.

Mr. Walley asked whether the 2015 budget would need to be increased by \$45,000 if Resolution No. 4666 were approved. He also asked how much the budget would increase for 2016. Mr. Jewkes quoted a \$137,500 increase for 2016. Mr. Jewkes also stated that it would be a shame to hire someone, train them, increase then give them a pink slip on January 1; he said it would make more sense to look to the future and fund them for 2016.

Mr. Cleworth stated the traffic unit is a four person unit; he asked if the City could apply for the grant and use it toward the two existing officers that are on the force now. City Grants Administrator Margarita Bell stated that would not be possible.

Mr. Cleworth, seconded by **Mr.** Walley, moved to AMEND Resolution No. 4669 by changing the project ranking so that Item #1 is moved down to become #4 and the other Items are moved up accordingly.

f) Ordinance No. 5974 – An Ordinance Amending the 2015 Operating and Capital Budgets for the Third Time. Introduced by Mayor Eberhart.

Mr. Gatewood, seconded by Mr. Cleworth, moved to ADVANCE Ordinance No. 5974.

Mr. Cleworth spoke to the financial matters regarding revenues and expenses. He spoke to what adopting Ordinance No. 5974 would do to the City's budget. He stated that if all obligations were met there would only be \$22,000.00 left in the General Fund. Mr. Cleworth stated there is a real problem leaving the General Fund so close to the bottom line and that Ordinance No. 5974 would leave the City with virtually nothing to work with on a day-to-day basis. Mr. Cleworth stated the City needs to be more self-sufficient and needs to not dip into savings. Mr. Cleworth spoke to Mr. Lozano's comments during public testimony; he quoted his statement that no effort was made by the City to meet the FFU halfway. Mr. Cleworth stated that the City made a proposal and the Union made a proposal; the City rejected the Union's pricey proposal. Mr. Cleworth stated that the City did make a second offer to pay 80% of the expenses that would incur in 2013, which the Union again rejected. Mr. Cleworth stated that the City funds all unions equally and that the FFU proposal would have been an astronomical increase in costs leaving other City employees out. Mr. Cleworth stated that the City's proposal was not allowed to be presented to the arbitrator. Mr. Cleworth stated that the City made an

effort to negotiate but that the Union refused to respond to the City's counter-offer. **Mr. Cleworth** stated that the PSEA contract proposal the past calendar year included a force reduction of 10% with a City healthcare contribution increase of \$250 a month per person, equating to \$3,000 per year per employee. **Mr. Cleworth** stated if the City approved that increase they would have to increase all healthcare contributions for all employees by the same amount to make it equal and fair. **Mr. Cleworth** stated that if every employee was funded at that rate that would create a \$600,000 a year increase to the City budget; he stated it is not a sustainable increase. **Mr. Cleworth** stated that the Code requires a balanced budget and shared his concern for funding Ordinance No. 5974 because it would create an unbalanced budget. **Mr. Cleworth** stated his disapproval of the Ordinance.

<u>FMATS Policy</u> Committee - **Mr. Walley** stated the FMATS Policy Committee agreed to convert Federal Community Transportation Program (FCTP) funds that FMATS uses to operate the office and the Unified Planning Work Program (UPWP) into planning funds. **Mr. Walley** shared his concern of low funding. **Mr. Walley** spoke to plans for a bike path from Fairbanks to North Pole. **Mr. Walley** stated he is in support of rebuilding bridges that have structural deficiencies.

<u>Fairbanks Diversity Council (FDC)</u> - **Mr. Gatewood** stated that the FDC met on April 14, 2015; he stated it was a good informative meeting but that there was not a quorum in attendance. **Mr. Gatewood** stated that the Chief of Police spoke about community oriented policing and that he captured the attention of attendees with the information he provided. **Mr. Gatewood** thanked Chief of Staff, Jim Williams and Communications Director Amber Courtney for their work dedicated to the Diversity Action Plan (DAP). **Mr. Gatewood** stated the FDC has been aggressive in identifying the six main goals they want included in the DAP and the importance of diversifying the work force of the City. **Mr. Gatewood** stated the next meeting would be on the second Tuesday in May and that he hoped the FDC would have a quorum to vote on the DAP. **Mr. Gatewood** stated the FDC wants to make a difference in cross cultural relations and they hope to live up to that expectation.

COUNCIL MEMBERS' COMMENTS

Mr. Gatewood requested to be excused from the Regular Council Meeting of May 18, 2015.

Mayor Eberhart called for objection to Mr. Gatewood's request to be excused on May 18, 2015 and, hearing none, so ORDERED.

Mr. Walley stated his concern for the increasing cost of healthcare. **Mr.** Walley thanked Mr. Cleworth for sharing the numbers and stated that it helped put into perspective what the actual cost would be. **Mr.** Walley stated he would miss Mr. Schmetzer and that he had relied on his wealth of knowledge on the FMATS Committee; he wished Mr. Schmetzer the best.

Ms. Staley apologized for being out of town so long; she stated it is flooding on the east coast. **Ms. Staley** echoed Mr. Walley's statements on Mr. Schmetzer and shared that she too would miss him. **Mr. Staley** spoke to funding issues for the Community Service Patrol (CSP) and that she was concerned that the funding will go away. She stated that she wants to explore measures that could be taken to extend funding.

Mayor Eberhart stated he had a discussion with Mr. Vandenberg and the Chief of Police at the Downtown Association Mixer regarding CSP. He shared that they discussed having a meeting and inviting top-level businesses in Fairbanks in the hopes of raising funds to support CSP for FY2016. **Mayor Eberhart** shared his disappointment that Ordinance No. 5974 was struck down.

Mr. Matherly gave condolences to the family of Dale Carlson. **Mr. Matherly** shared that he was given a wonderful recommendation for Jackson Fox by a citizen who worked on an issue with him. **Mr. Matherly** shared another citizen's story who had an issue with standing water on their property the year before. He stated the City took care of the issue last year and showed up this year without being called. **Mr. Matherly** attributed that great service to Mr. Schmetzer and shared that he hated to see him leave. **Mr. Matherly** stated the weather has been nice but that there are still icy spots; he cautioned the public to drive safe.

Mr. Cleworth echoed the Council's comments on Mr. Schmetzer and stated he was a great asset and had excellent customer service skills. Mr. Cleworth asked if the IBEW and the City were still in negotiations; Mr. Whipple replied affirmatively. Mr. Cleworth stated the IBEW chooses to put the CPI increases toward hourly wages and has never put an increase toward healthcare. Mr. Cleworth stated that the issue is the Union's problem, not the City Council's. Mr. **Cleworth** stated the CPI is generated in Anchorage and that it does not properly address the cost of living in Fairbanks. Mr. Cleworth stated he hoped to go back and revisit proration to get the amount adjusted. Mr. Cleworth asked Mayor Eberhart if he addressed Explore Fairbanks when he attended the gathering a few weeks ago. Mayor Eberhart stated he attended the awards Mr. Cleworth asked if Mayor Eberhart made a comment expressing his banquet. disappointment that no City Council members attended the F-35 hearing. Mayor Eberhart stated he did make a comment of that nature. Mr. Cleworth spoke to his defense and that he has attended so many military scoping meetings over the years that he could no longer track. Mr. Cleworth stated Ms. Staley presented at one of the meetings and that she did a great job. He stated that the F-16 Scoping meetings became Mayor Eberhart's responsibility with office and that he appreciated his attendance. He asked that he not state his disappointment because he cannot attend every single meeting because of other conflicts. Mr. Cleworth asked Mayor Eberhart if the PSEA grievance for the use of outside contractors for background checks had been filed yet. Mayor Eberhart stated it has been filed and that the City has responded to the grievance.

Mr. Pruhs spoke to the Polaris Building and how to secure funding to demolish the building down. He discussed the legalities of taking the property back and to future possibilities for the property. **Mr. Pruhs** stated Mr. Marlow has been given plenty of time to do something with the building and that nothing has been done. **Mr. Pruhs** stated he thought it would be a good idea to hold a future work session that at the Pioneer Home.

Mr. Matherly stated he meant to say during his comments that he had spoken with Mr. Marlow earlier in the day; he stated he remains skeptical that he will be able raise the necessary funds.

Mayor Eberhart led the Flag Salutation.

CITIZEN'S COMMENTS

<u>Frank Turney, 329 6th Avenue, Fairbanks</u> – Mr. Turney stated he has a few issues to address, the first being the old dairy on 2nd Avenue; he stated it is an eye sore and should be demolished. Mr. Turney thanked the Mayor and the Diversity Council for allowing him to speak to public restrooms

being placed downtown. Mr. Turney stated he believes it is a racial issue that the City does not have public restrooms. Mr. Turney voiced his amazement that cannabis can be made legal but that a \$100 fine could be imposed if the smoke travels off private property. He stated barbeque smoke is more harmful than cannabis; Mr. Turney stated he believed the cannabis ordinance to be a waste of time.

Mr. Cleworth asked Mr. Turney if he has seen people living over night at the old dairy. Mr. Turney stated he did not spend all day every day there and in turn asked Mr. Cleworth when he last visited the old dairy. Mr. Turney stated that the problem with the old dairy has spanned five Mayors and that something needs to be done with the structure. **Mr.** Cleworth stated that the dairy was discussed in the work session just before the meeting and that the Dairy was a low priority because nobody was inhabiting it or camping out in the structure.

<u>Victor Buberge</u>, P.O. Box 58192, Fairbanks – Mr. Buberge stated what a loss the City has experienced by losing Mr. Schmetzer and that he will really miss him. Mr. Buberge reported a few potholes he has seen around town. Mr. Buberge spoke about the old dairy; he stated that he has a few friends that live near there and that it was always a mess. Mr. Buberge stated he has seen too many political payoffs and that it has become expected. Mr. Buberge stated he believed there should be an Ordinance against crack, cigarette and cigar smoke. Mr. Buberge spoke to the lack of public restrooms in the City limits; he stated there are nice vandal-proof restrooms and that he has given Council Members information on them. He stated the City does not want chronic inebriates sleeping in restrooms but that he thought it would be a safer place for them to sleep.

Jerry Evans, 1641 Kassi Court, Fairbanks – Mr. Evans stated he used to go to school in The City Hall building. Mr. Evans spoke on behalf of Explore Fairbanks and talked about the services they offer. Mr. Evans stated that he became the Public Relations Manager on December 1, 2014. He stated the two most important things he deals with in his position are press releases (locally, nationally and internationally) and media tours. He stated that he is the liaison for writers, reporters and others coming to Fairbanks. Mr. Evans stated he has done six press tours since he started working at Explore Fairbanks. He stated that everyone that has come to town has been very impressed with what the City has to offer.

MAYOR'S COMMENTS AND REPORT

a) 2014 Independent Audit Presentation

Garry Hutchison came forward to present the 2014 Audit information. He stated he was pleased to be in attendance and report that the audit is complete. Mr. Hutchison reported no compliance deficiencies and that all financials were in good working order. Mr. Hutchison gave an overview of the financial reports from 2014. He commended the City employees for their organization and timeliness.

Mayor Eberhart thanked Mr. Hutchison for the financial presentation. Mayor Eberhart congratulated Mr. Soileau and Ms. Randle for earning their certificate of achievement in financial reporting. Mayor Eberhart reported the Mayor's Office has been very busy and listed many meetings and events he has attended since the last Council Meeting. Mayor Eberhart stated the downtown foot patrol will begin very soon. He reported that a group of high school students walked to City Hall to raise awareness for youth suicide. Mayor Eberhart spoke against Ordinance No. 5977 and stated he hopes there is not a motion or a second to adopt the ordinance.

UNFINISHED BUSINESS

a) Ordinance No. 5975 – An Ordinance Authorizing the Release of an Easement in Lemeta Subdivision. Introduced by Mayor Eberhart. SECOND READING AND PUBLIC HEARING.

Mayor Eberhart called for Public Testimony and, hearing none, declared Public Testimony closed.

Mr. Pruhs stated Mr. Smith did a good job of preparing the ordinance.

b) Ordinance No. 5976 – An Ordinance Authorizing the Engineering Department to Enter into a Developer's Agreement for the Construction of the Bentley Retail Area Loop Road and for the Public Works Department to Take on Additional Road Maintenance Responsibility in the Bentley Retail Area. Introduced by Council Member Pruhs. SECOND READING AND PUBLIC HEARING.

Mr. Pruhs, seconded by Mr. Gatewood, moved to ADOPT Ordinance No. 5976.

Mayor Eberhart called for Public Testimony and, hearing none, declared Public Testimony closed.

City Engineer Robert Pristash and Property Manager Pat Smith provided a Staff Report. Mr. Pristash stated the Ordinance allows for the continuation of the project to alleviate congestion in the area of the Old Steese Highway. He stated it was in the original plan but it was dropped because the Northern Region Director did not think the Loop Road would be built. Mr. Smith stated that at the first reading of the ordinance, the Developer's Agreement was not ready; he stated they are now ready to move forward. Mr. Smith stated the City will be issued a bond for the entire cost of construction of the loop and that is assurance that no matter what the Loop Road will be constructed.

Mr. Pruhs asked Mr. Pristash if the road design will be built to City standard. Mr. Pristash stated it would be and it would be inspected by City Engineers. **Mr. Pruhs** stated he looked at the ordinance and weighed out the cost versus the revenue income and came to the conclusion that he supports the Ordinance because it makes economic sense.

Mr. Walley asked what the maintenance cost of the new Loop Road would be. **Mr. Pruhs** replied that it would be roughly \$1,200-\$1,500 per year.

Mr. Cleworth complemented Mr. Pruhs on his work on the Ordinance. Mr. Cleworth stated he had issues that go way back because when the area was developed the roads were to remain private. Mr. Cleworth stated that all of the businesses that bought property in that area knew that the roads were to be constructed by the private developers. Mr. Cleworth shared his frustration with the DOT for pulling the roundabout from the original project. Mr. Cleworth stated that the City then agreed to take over the Bentley Trust Road and Helmricks maintenance in exchange for a new snow dump area. Mr. Cleworth stated that in the trade some money was left over and now the developers are concerned that the money will be used for a different project. Mr. Cleworth stated that now that the property is the City's that the roundabout should be put in to tie the roads together and that no stipulations should be put on the developer except that the cost should be on the developer. Mr. Cleworth stated he is not excited about the City taking on additional road maintenance without any kind of remuneration.

Mr. Gatewood stated that he thought that Lowe's had a contract with an outside agency and that the maintenance with the outside company was poor. **Mr. Gatewood** stated it is the City's residents that are driving on those roads and that they should be maintained to the City's standard. **Mr. Gatewood** stated he would be supporting the Ordinance.

Ms. Staley stated she thinks taking on the additional maintenance project would benefit the citizens of Fairbanks.

Mayor Eberhart stated he attended meetings and work sessions and that many big box stores will not come to Fairbanks without natural gas. He stated that Fairbanks is closer than it has ever been before to that happening. **Mayor Eberhart** stated this economic development would attract new businesses and that there would be an eight to ten percent increase in tax revenue each year.

A ROLL CALL VOTE WAS TAKEN ON THE MOTION TO ADOPT ORDINANCE NO. 5976 AS FOLLOWS:

YEAS: Pruhs, Gatewood, Staley, Matherly, Walley

NAYS: Cleworth

Mayor Eberhart declared the MOTION CARRIED and Ordinance

No. 5976 ADOPTED.

c) Ordinance No. 5977 – An Ordinance Amending Fairbanks General Code Section 2-118.1 to Provide for Council Appointment of Public Members of the Finance Committee. Introduced by Council Member Matherly. SECOND READING AND PUBLIC HEARING.

Mr. Matherly, seconded by Mr. Cleworth, moved to ADOPT Ordinance No. 5977.

Mayor Eberhart called for Public Testimony.

<u>Frank Turney</u> – Mr. Turney stated that he thinks this Ordinance looks like grandstanding by Mr. Matherly because he will be running for Mayor.

Hearing no more requests for public comment, Mayor Eberhart declared Public Testimony closed.

Mr. Pruhs asked Mr. Ewers if there any other committees where the City Council chooses the members. Mr. Ewers replied that he did not believe so.

Mr. Matherly stated that long before he spoke of running for Mayor that the subject of having two public people on the Finance Committee came up. **Mr. Matherly** stated everyone was excited about the suggestion and that it was not his intent to grandstand. **Mr. Matherly** stated he would support the ordinance at any time and that its intent was just to get two citizens appointed by the Council, not just by nomination of only the Mayor.

Mr. Gatewood stated he remembered the discussion about having a second Finance Committee Member but that he was not clear as to why they could not be appointed by the Mayor and confirmed by the Council.

Mayor Eberhart stated that this Ordinance would take away the power of the Mayor to nominate the members, which is unlike any other board or commission.

Mr. Cleworth stated the Finance Committee was formed in the early 2000's with only two Council Members and that others were added later. Mr. Cleworth stated the controversy came in several months ago after Jeff Johnson was not asked to remain on the Finance Committee; he expressed his disappointment with the situation. Mr. Cleworth stated that the Mayor nominated someone to the Committee that nobody on the Council knew and the Council voted it down. Mr. Cleworth stated that Mr. Matherly presented a compromise of the nomination of two members when the nomination was introduced again. Mr. Cleworth stated he has been frustrated with the process because normally when a member's term is up they are given a courtesy offer to keep serving; he stated now that is not the case. Mr. Cleworth stated that Mr. Johnson has done so many good things that have saved the City money. Mr. Cleworth reported several cost savings that came from Mr. Johnson's intuitional knowledge; he expressed disappointment that Mr. Johnson was overlooked for the nomination.

Mr. Gatewood agreed with Mr. Cleworth's assessments of Mr. Johnson and that he should have been offered the opportunity to continue to serve. Mr. Gatewood stated that developing new talent is also important because institutional knowledge eventually moves on. Mr. Gatewood stated that Mayor Eberhart has done a good job of bringing in new blood and that it is a good thing. Mr. Gatewood stated that he did not believe that every time a member of a committee terms out that they should automatically be reappointed. He stated that is how one would end up on a committee for 30 years. Mr. Gatewood stated he sees value in both institutional knowledge and with new blood; he complimented Mr. Matherly on the great idea for compromise he came up with. Mr. Gatewood stated he was not interested in punishing the mayor for not automatically reappointing Mr. Johnson to the Finance Committee.

Mr. Cleworth stated nobody is being punished and that the Mayor is part of the Council. He stated everyone gets a vote and that the whole Council is part of the decision.

Mr. Pruhs stated he has issues with the separation of powers. **Mr. Pruhs** stated the Mayor has the power to nominate a person and the Council has the power to reject the candidate. He stated the process as it stands is the best way to operate because it is much easier for one person to nominate than an entire Council coming to an agreement on a candidate. **Mr. Pruhs** stated that Mr. Johnson was an excellent source of knowledge but that it is time for fresh blood on the Finance Committee.

Ms. Staley stated she was uncomfortable with the fact that they were not able to appoint someone to the Finance Committee during the last round of appointments. She stated she liked the idea of adding a second public member. **Ms. Staley** agreed with all members that Mr. Johnson was a wonderful source of knowledge and he helped the City immensely; she also agreed that it is time for fresh blood and that is why she thinks adding a second member would be vital for the community. **Ms. Staley** agreed that it is not a punishment but that the body needs to pull together and make the decision as a unit.

Mr. Walley spoke to all Council Members' points of view and stated he sees where everyone is coming from. **Mr.** Walley stated creating the second position would allow the new blood to be mentored by the person with institutional knowledge.

Mayor Eberhart stated that when Mr. Johnson's term expired that he had made the decision to look for someone new for the position. He shared that the City is in good shape and that now would be a good time to bring in new blood. Mayor Eberhart stated he asked Ms. Snider to advertise on the City website and also on social media for the open position and that Ms. Sisto applied. Mayor Eberhart stated that he was not present at the meeting that she was to be nominated and that it was his understanding that it was pulled from the Consent Agenda but that no action was taken. Mayor Eberhart stated that in the meantime Mr. Matherly came up with the Ordinance that adds a second public member. Mayor Eberhart stated that Mr. Woolf applied and that the Council approved his appointment so now the issue of the additional member is moot. Mayor Eberhart stated he asked Ms. Courtney how previous mayors found candidates for boards and commissions and she told him by picking up the phone and calling who you know might be interested in the position. He declared that he wanted every citizen to know of the position and have the opportunity to apply. Mayor Eberhart stated as the Mayor he can receive multiple applications and meet with multiple possible candidates. He stated that Council Member's can only meet with two other members and any more than that would violate the Open Meetings Act.

Mr. Matherly asked Mr. Ewers if Mayor Eberhart's comments about the Open Meeting Act were correct. Mr. Ewers stated that there would have to be a public meeting to hold interviews of the candidates if the Council wished to make nominations.

Mr. Cleworth stated that when he became Mayor his Council seat was left open. He stated that he gave the Council Members the applications for the open seat and had them choose who the best candidate was. He stated at that time they chose Mr. Eberhart.

Mayor Eberhart stated that if there is a vacancy on the Finance Committee in the future he would love to hear input and feedback from the Council Members. He stated Mr. Johnson did a wonderful job but that it was not right to have the same person serve indefinitely. **Mayor Eberhart** stated that the Council still has the power to turn down someone that he nominates. He stated the normal procedures for boards and commissions should be no different for the Finance Committee.

<u>Permanent Fund Review Board (PFRB)</u> – **Mr. Gatewood** stated the PFRB met and that the balance of the City's Permanent Fund as of May 5, 2015 was \$124,131,980.00. He stated the Fund is performing decently and spoke to how the funds were invested. **Mr. Gatewood** stated the funds are in safe, low risk investments and the plan managers are doing a good job. He stated the next meeting will be July 22, 2015.

Mr. Cleworth asked if there is any discussion of taking some of the profits and reinvesting them. He questioned, for example, whether there is any talk of investing while the price of oil is so low.

Mr. Gatewood stated the committee did not discuss reinvesting because he believed it to be too risky. **Mr. Gatewood** stated that Jason Roth is the lead and that he is not as conservative as the past person in charge but that they do not discuss high-risk/high-reward investing.

Mr. Cleworth spoke to more investment strategies. He suggested that capitalizing on an investment that is at the top of its market in order to purchase something that is at the bottom of the market is a good investment strategy.

Mr. Gatewood stated he gets the feeling that the investors are intrigued by international markets but that the City is not in the position to dump a lot of money in that area.

COUNCIL MEMBERS' COMMENTS

Mr. Pruhs requested to be excused from the Regular City Council Meeting of June 8, 2015.

Mayor Eberhart called for objection to Mr. Pruhs' request to be excused on June 8, 2015 and, seeing none, so ORDERED.

Mr. Pruhs stated he thinks the Council should look into the cost for the City of Fairbanks to be self-insured. He stated he did not know if it would be a viable alternative but it should be checked into. **Mr. Pruhs** stated he would send Mayor Eberhart a request for staff to put together a cost/benefit analysis of becoming self-insured by November 1, 2015. **Mr. Pruhs** spoke to the amount of money employees have to pay for health care and that it would be cost prohibitive to find out if there are other options. **Mr. Pruhs** stated the City was self-insured up until the mid-1990's and it is something that should be revisited.

Ms. Staley stated she will be back in town on May 22, 2015 and thanked the Mayor and the Council for their patience while she calls in.

Mr. Cleworth stated Mr. Williams has been looking into the City becoming self-insured and that he may already have some information about it. Mr. Cleworth asked if there was a Finance Committee meeting the following morning. Ms. Snider stated there was and read the agenda for the meeting. Mr. Cleworth asked the status of the Buzz Otis property off Badger Road. Mr. Ewers stated that paperwork has been filed with the Local Boundary Commission (LBC) and that it is under review. Mr. Ewers stated it has been a slow process but that it is now up to date and it should not take too much longer because it is a smaller matter than annexation. Mr. Cleworth asked if hours spent on this project were being tracked and Mr. Ewers replied affirmatively. Mr. Cleworth stated the Abatement Work Session went well and shared his frustration with the old dairy property. He stated he heard what the Building Official had to say but that it is time to abate that structure. Mr. Cleworth stated the email he received on revenue sharing was scary because of the 4% hit that the City will be taking next year and possibly more the in the future. Mr. Cleworth stated that the City has become dependent on that money.

Mr. Matherly stated he attended the Borough Assembly meeting where he pitched funding for the Community Service Patrol (CSP) but that no vote was called on it. He encouraged the City Council to attend the Borough Assembly meetings and visa-versa. Mr. Matherly reported that Clean-up Day was well attended but that there is still more work to do. Mr. Matherly spoke to the Senior Citizens lunch that the Borough puts on every year and how well organized and fun it was. He stated Mr. Buberge was correct that Mr. Schmetzer is a tough guy to lose with big shoes to fill. Mr. Matherly stated he appreciated the Mayor sharing great news about the Apache helicopters.

Mr. Walley stated he was pleased by the efforts of the community to clean up Fairbanks. **Mr.** Walley shared his excitement for the Bentley Trust area project going forward. **Mr.** Walley stated he was happy to see the Permanent Fund growth and shared Mr. Cleworth's concern for the decline of State funds. **Mr.** Walley asked if the Chili's building had been purchased yet and **Mr.** Pruhs confirmed that it is still up for sale. **Mr.** Walley stated he hopes to attend the Town Hall meeting the following evening at Pioneer Park.

Mr. Gatewood stated he would not be at the Finance Committee meeting the following day because he is heading out of town. He reminded the Council that he would not be at the next Regular Council Meeting because he has a graduation to attend that evening. **Mr. Gatewood** congratulated all the graduates and their proud parents and wished them the best on the new chapter in their lives.

Mr. Pruhs, seconded by **Mr. Matherly**, moved to go into Executive Session for the purpose of discussing Labor Negotiations: Fairbanks Fire Fighters Union (FFU) and the International Brotherhood of Electrical Workers (IBEW).

Mayor Eberhart called for objection and, hearing none, so ORDERED.

Mayor Eberhart called for a five minute recess.

EXECUTIVE SESSION

a) Labor Contract Negotiations

The City Council met in Executive Session to discuss labor negotiations. Direction was given to staff and no action was taken.

ADJOURNMENT

Mr. Matherly, seconded by Mr. Gatewood, moved to ADJOURN the meeting.

Mayor Eberhart called for objection and, hearing none, so ORDERED.

Mayor Eberhart declared the Meeting adjourned at 10:02 p.m.

ORDINANCE NO. 5987

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING FAIRBANKS GENERAL CODE SECTIONS 2-260 AND 2-261 REGARDING THE AUTHORIZED INVESTMENT SELECTIONS OF THE CITY PERMANENT FUND INVESTMENT POLICY

WHEREAS, the City Council established the investment policy of the City Permanent Fund by terms codified at Fairbanks General Code Sections 2-260 and 2-261; and

WHEREAS, current policy allows investments in "international equities" (IE) which is defined as replicating the FTSE Developed ex North America Index (FTSE DNAI), and the performance measurement for the IE allocation is measured against the target weighting using the FTSE DNAI for the benchmark; and

WHEREAS, current policy allows investments in "emerging markets equity index funds" (EMEI) which is defined as replicating the FTSE Emerging Markets Index (FTSE EMERGING), and the performance measurement for the EM allocation is measured against the target weighting using the FTSE EMERGING for the benchmark; and

WHEREAS, in 2012 the City's exposure in the IE eliminated the benchmarks, requiring the City to amend its investment policy, and these benchmarks will be eliminated again requiring another amendment; and

WHEREAS, the City's Permanent Fund Investment Manager, Alaska Permanent Capital Management (APCM), recommends a more consistent approach by amending the investment policy to replicate the IE and performance against the Morgan Stanley Capital International Europe, Australasia and Far East (MSCI EAFE) index and (b) replicate the EM and performance against the Morgan Stanley Capital International Emerging Markets (MSCI Emerging) index. The amendment will not materially change performance and will provide the City Permanent Fund Review Board (PFRB) and APCM flexibility in selecting an appropriate index; and

WHEREAS, the PFRB supports and recommends these amendments.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ENACTED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF FAIRBANKS, ALASKA, as follows:

<u>SECTION 1</u>. Fairbanks General Code Section 2-260 Permanent Fund Investment Policy, Procedure and Governance, is amended as follows [new text in <u>underline bold</u> font; deleted text in <u>strikethrough</u> font]:

Sec. 2-260. Permanent fund investment policy, procedure and governance.

- (a) *Purpose of fund.* The purpose of the permanent fund is to maximize income for capital and operating expenses of the city and preserve in trust assets of the city for present and future generations of city residents. The principal goal shall be to preserve principal and maintain purchasing power.
- (b) *Investment policy*. The investment policy of the city is to allow only the following investment vehicles.
 - (1) Obligations of or obligations insured or guaranteed by the United States or agencies or instrumentalities of the United States;
 - (2) Bonds or other taxable yield U.S. dollar denominated debt instruments of this state, its agencies, municipalities, any other state, or corporation which at the time of investment have an investment grade rating of a nationally recognized rating agency; if the rating of a bond becomes less than investment grade and has a maturity greater than one year, it must be sold in an orderly manner within 90 days of down grading;
 - (3) Bank certificates of deposit which are insured or secured as to the payment of principal and interest;
 - (4) Corporate obligations of investment grade quality as recognized by a nationally recognized rating organization. If, after purchase, these obligations are downgraded below investment grade, they shall be sold in an orderly manner within 90 days of down grading. In no circumstance shall any bond be purchased after January 1, 2009 with a yield to maturity that exceeds 600 basis points above a comparable duration treasury note/bond at the date of purchase.
 - (5) Short term investment funds (STIF) which are limited to investments set forth in subsections (b)(1)-(4) of this section or the Alaska Municipal League Investment Pool as set forth in state statute; and
 - (6) Domestic equities, which taken as a whole, attempt to replicate the Standard & Poor's 500 Index, including both mutual funds and exchange traded funds (ETF's).
 - (7) International equities, which taken as a whole, attempt to replicate the FTSE Developed ex North America Index or Morgan Stanley Capital International Europe, Australasia and Far East (MSCI EAFE) or a substantially similar index, including both mutual funds and exchange traded funds (ETF's).

- (8) Equities, which taken as a whole, attempt to replicate the universe of domestic real-estate investment trusts, including both mutual funds and exchange traded funds (ETF's).
- (9) Domestic equities, which taken as a whole, attempt to replicate the S&P 400 MidCap Index, including both mutual funds and exchange traded funds (ETF's).
- (10) Commodities, which taken as a whole, attempt to replicate a broad based commodity index, such as the Dow-Jones UBS Commodity Index, including mutual funds, exchange traded funds (ETF's) and exchange traded notes (ETN's).
- (11) Emerging markets equity index funds, which taken as a whole, attempt to replicate the FTSE Emerging Market Index or Morgan Stanley Capital International Emerging Markets Index (MSCI EMERGING) or a substantially similar index, including both mutual funds and (ETF's).
- (12) International Bond index funds, which taken as a whole, attempt to replicate Barclays Global Aggregate ex-USD Float Adjusted RIC Capped Index, including both mutual funds and ETF's.
- (13) U.S. Treasury Inflation Protected Securities (TIPS), and/or mutual funds or ETF's which attempt to replicate the Barclays Capital U.S. Treasury Inflation Protected Securities Index.
- (c) *Limitations*. The following investment practices are prohibited and shall constitute limitations to fund investments:
 - (1) Options and futures may not be purchased or sold; complex derivatives and complex structured notes which provide for uncertain payment dates and amounts are prohibited without the express, written consent of the city council, as are practices which involve the use of leveraging through reverse repurchase agreements;
 - (2) Investments in U.S. dollar denominated obligations of corporations shall be limited to a percentage level as provided for by the city council from time to time. Investment grade to be defined by at least one nationally recognized rating service. The investment in the lowest level of investment grade securities is to be limited to no more than ten percent of the marketable debt securities:
 - (3) No investment shall be made in any one individual security or issuer in excess of five percent of the total investment portfolio, measured by

Ordinance No. 5987 Page 3 of 7 market value, except for obligations of the U.S. government and its agencies.

- (4) No investments, cumulatively, shall be made in any one industry in excess of 25 percent of the total investment portfolio except for obligations of the U.S. and its agencies without quarterly disclosure to the Review Board for consideration.
- (5) Effective January 1, 2009, no commercial residential mortgaged backed securities (MBS, etc. but not to exclude securities issued by a U.S. government agency) and no further commercial mortgage backed securities (CMBS, etc.) may be purchased.
- (d) *Transactional records.* The board shall maintain on file within the offices of the city, monthly reports which indicate the following:
 - (1) All transactions affecting the investment account, to include purchases and sales of securities, transfers of cash into and out of the account, interest or dividends received by the account; and
 - (2) A listing of all assets held in the investment account, including identification of the security, original purchase price, and current market price.
- (e) Fund performance evaluation. The city council and the board may have an objective performance evaluation of the investment program every year. The board may retain a performance measurement consultant whose contractual purpose will be to provide objective measurement of the performance of investment managers and the portfolio against appropriate indices, universes and/or benchmarks as recommended by the consultant and adopted by the city council and the board. Portfolio performance may be reviewed by the consultant at least semiannually with the city council and the board. Such consultant may not manage in any capacity any portion of the portfolio.
- (f) Custodian bank. The city council and the board shall retain a bank custodian to hold all investment cash and securities in the name of the city's permanent fund. The custodian shall render monthly reports to the city council and the board regarding assets held at both book and market values, and individual transactions which have taken place. The bank shall have adequate fidelity insurance. A written contract will be entered into between the city and the custodian bank.
- (g) Investment managers. The city council and the board shall retain one or more professional investment managers to design portfolios and invest funds in accordance with the written investment policies adopted by the

Ordinance No. 5987 Page 4 of 7 city council. The investment managers must be registered financial advisers with both the United States Securities and Exchange Commission and the state and may not serve in any multiple role as investment manager or securities broker custodian. They must agree to serve as a fiduciary to the fund and carry professional liability insurance in the minimum amount of \$5,000,000.00. A written contract must be entered into between the fund and the investment managers.

- (h) Fiduciary status; conflict of interest. The board shall be considered to have the responsibility of a fiduciary to the fund and shall be indemnified by the city in any action brought against them collectively or individually while acting in this capacity. No board member may act on behalf of the board in any manner involving the investments of the portfolio or its management pursuant to this policy, except as specifically authorized by the city council in writing.
- (i) Prudent investor rule. The city council, the board, the staff, the investment managers and the bank custodians shall exercise the judgment and care under the circumstances then prevailing which an investor of ordinary prudence, discretion and intelligence exercises in the management of large investments entrusted to it, not in regard to speculation, but in regard to the long-term investment of funds considering the probable safety of capital as well as probable income.
- (j) Balance available for appropriation. The city council may only appropriate from the permanent fund as follows: In any fiscal year, an amount not to exceed four percent of the five-year average fund market value, to be computed using the five prior years' year end audited market value, for the city operations, and an additional 0.5 percent solely for capital needs.

SECTION 2. Fairbanks General Code Section 2-261 Permanent Fund Asset Allocation Plan and Performance Measurement Targets, is amended as follows [new text in **underline bold** font; deleted text in **strikethrough** font]:

Sec. 2-261. Permanent fund asset allocation plan and performance measurement targets. The target for equities is 45% of the portfolio with an allowable range of 30% to 60%. The target for fixed income is 55% of the portfolio with an allowable range of 40% to 70%.

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND ORDINANCE NO. 5986, AS AMENDED, AN ORDINANCE ENACTING A RETAIL SALES TAX ON MARIJUANA AND REFERRING THE ORDINANCE FOR RATIFICATION AT THE NEXT GENERAL ELECTION

WHEREAS, on July 20, the City Council passed Ordinance No. 5986, as Amended, An Ordinance Enacting A Retail Sales Tax On Marijuana and Referring The Ordinance For Ratification At The Next General Election; and

WHEREAS, this ordinance was passed so as to give voters the chance to approve a retail sales tax on marijuana before the legal sale of marijuana began in 2016; and

WHEREAS, the Fairbanks North Star Borough Assembly is in the process of considering a similar retail sales tax, which will be considered at two special meetings of the Assembly scheduled in August; and

WHEREAS, the ordinance under consideration by the Assembly tracks Ordinance No. 5986, as Amended, but includes additional language concerning "marijuana products"; and

WHEREAS, the Borough feels that such language is needed to clarify any possible ambiguity about whether the tax applies to both marijuana and marijuana products; and

WHEREAS, to clarify that the tax that would be imposed in the City would be the same as the tax that would be imposed in the Borough, Ordinance No. 5986, as Amended, should be amended;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ENACTED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF FAIRBANKS, ALASKA, as follows:

SECTION 1. The definition of "marijuana" in Fairbanks General Code, Chapter 74, Article VI, Section 74-200, as enacted by Ordinance No. 5986, as Amended, is hereby amended as follow [new text in **bold/underline** font; deleted text in strikethrough font]:

Sec. 74-200. Definitions.

The following words, terms and phrases, when used in this article, shall have the meanings ascribed to them in this section, except where the context clearly indicates a different meaning:

Marijuana means all parts of the plant (genus) Cannabis, whether growing or not, the seed thereof, the resin extracted from any part of the plant, and any compound, manufacture, derivative, mixture, or preparation of the plant, its seeds, or its resin, including marijuana concentrate; marijuana does not include fiber produced from the stalks, oil or cake made from the seeds of the plant, sterilized seed of the plant that is incapable of germination, or the weight of any other ingredient combined with marijuana to prepare topical or oral administrations, food, drink, or other products. As used in this article, the term marijuana includes "marijuana products" defined as concentrated marijuana products and marijuana products that are comprised of marijuana and other ingredients and are intended for use or consumption, such as, but not limited to, edible products, ointments, and tinctures.

<u>Section 2</u>. The City Clerk is directed to place the following revised ballot language on the ballot for ratification by the voters of the City of Fairbanks at the next general election, with the ballot proposition to read as follows:

Ballot Question No
Information: On July 20, 2015, the Fairbanks City Council passed Ordinance No. 5986 as Amended, which enacted a five percent retail sales tax on Marijuana sold within the City of Fairbanks. Fairbanks Charter Section 6.5 provides that any new or additional sales tax levied by the City Council must be approved by the voters in a general election

amended the definition of "marijuana" to clarify that the proposed retail sales tax

Jim reported on the Service Organization Control 1 Report (SOC1) for the Permanent Funds custodian. The City's independent auditor received the report during the audit and reported it to Finance in April 2015. The report identified weaknesses in the control objective that provides reasonable assurance the account statements reflecting cash and security positions are accurate and complete and provided to clients timely. The City's Permanent Fund statements during the year were accurate and agreed with APCM's valuations except for the normal minor variances and timing differences. After reviewing the deficiencies and the management's response to the deviations, we determined no further action was necessary. The deficiencies did not affect our audit or financial position.








Historical Market Value as of March 31, 2015





Subject: Compliance

During this year's audit of the Permanent Fund the question was raised as to exactly how does the Finance Department know the Fund was in compliance with the various restrictions contained in the authorizing ordinances and resolutions. While the auditor's questions were answered it became apparent that a more formalized compliance system would make this question mute.

Nine specific compliance questions have been identified and it is recommended that a compliance appendix be included at each quarterly meeting illustrating that the Fund meets all of the respective criteria. The identified nine items are as follows:

- Equity and Fixed-income limitations as wells range limitations within the two categories.
- 2. Corporate debt limitation of 30% of total portfolio market value.
- Limitation on the purchase of any bond in excess of 600 basis points above a comparable duration US treasury.
- 4. Limitation on the purchase of any CMBS after January 1, 2009.
- 5. Ratings and downgrade limitations on corporate securities.
- 6. Five percent limitation on any one security (total portfolio).
- 7. Ten percent limitation on Baa rated securities (fixed income portfolio).
- 8. Duration constraint of between 80-120 percent of the Barclays Aggregate.
- 9. Twenty-Five percent industry limitation (total portfolio).

In the attached packet each of the nine limitations are addressed by either a specific report or calculation based upon an enclosed report to illustrate compliance. Should the Board approve of the format; the Compliance Report will become a regular appendix presented at each quarterly meeting.











- Personal Consumption Expenditures Excluding Food and Energy (Chain-Type Price Index)



Volatility Well Within Historical Norms





CLAY STREET CEMETERY COMMISSION REGULAR MEETING MINUTES, JULY 1, 2015 FAIRBANKS CITY COUNCIL CHAMBERS 800 CUSHMAN STREET, FAIRBANKS, ALASKA



The Clay Street Cemetery Commission convened at 5:00 p.m. on the above date to conduct a Regular Meeting at the City Council Chambers, 800 Cushman Street, Fairbanks, Alaska, with Chair Bill Robertson presiding and with the following members in attendance:

APPROVAL OF PREVIOUS MINUTES

a) Regular Meeting Minutes of June 3, 2015.

Ms. Snider stated that she will correct the "excused" notation by Mr. Erickson's name on the June 3 minutes.

Ms. Castle, seconded by Mr. Stone, moved to APPROVE the Meeting Minutes of June 3, 2015, as Corrected.

Chair Robertson called for objection and, hearing none, so ORDERED.

APPROVAL OF AGENDA

Chair Robertson explained that since Rotary Club members were in attendance to present a donation to the Commission, he would like to move the "Rotary Club of Fairbanks Donation" item to be heard under Citizen's Comments.

Ms. Castle, seconded by Mr. McCrea, moved to APPROVE the Agenda, as Amended.

Chair Robertson called for objection and, hearing none, so ORDERED.

CITIZEN'S COMMENTS

a) Rotary Club of Fairbanks Donation

The following Rotary Club members were in attendance to present a \$4,000 donation to the Clay Street Cemetery Commission: Mike Cook, Althea St. Martin, Peggy Pollen and Aisha Tinker Bray. Commissioners and Rotarians took a photo together to commemorate the event.

Mr. Cook stated that the Rotary Club has done a fair amount for the Commission. He explained that the donation will be the Rotary's last donation from its service fund as it was formed.

Chair Robertson explained that the Rotary Club's Service Fund was established in 1992 with the death of the first woman Rotarian in the Club, Ms. Dorothy Sugg. He stated that Ms. Sugg left about \$85,000 in assets to the Rotary Club when she passed. Chair Robertson stated that all the officers for the Service Fund are past presidents of the Club. He stated that the Fund has grown over the years to about \$330,000. He explained that because of a change in the non-profit 501C3 rules, the Club has had to abandon the Service Fund and form a new one.

Chair Robertson called for Public Testimony and, hearing none, declared Public Testimony closed.

UNFINISHED BUSINESS

a) Work Group & Date for Marker Replacement

Chair Robertson stated that he will be out of town the last part of July, but indicated that the group will need to set a date for working at the cemetery.

Mr. Stone stated that the will check with the Boy Scouts leader to see what their schedule looks like for the rest of the summer.

b) Update on New Kiosk

Chair Robertson announced that the construction of the new kiosk has been completed. He stated that the new map boards still need to be installed with some woodworking and trim work. He stated that he has all the materials needed for the project, but will have to find someone to help him cut the plexi-glass. Chair Robertson passed around a plaque recognizing Eagle Scout Kyle Williams for his work in design and construction of the kiosk; he stated that another plaque recognizing Spenard Builders Supply will also be fixed to the kiosk for donating all the building materials. Chair Robertson and Ms. Castle discussed placement of the maps and plaques on the kiosk.

c) Status of Concrete Base Block Delivery

Chair Robertson stated that he is waiting for the concrete blocks to be delivered to the cemetery. He stated that Mr. Turney will do the heavy lifting. He stated that the bases stayed within the estimated cost of \$43.00 each. He suggested that the donation from the Rotary Club go towards a 2016 marker order and stated that he would contact the Rotary Club to see if they

have a preference in a section of the cemetery. **Chair Robertson** stated that there will be enough bases to place the markers already at the cemetery and for the 2015 markers on order.

Ms. Castle stated that in the future, it may be best to not earmark funds for certain sections of the cemetery as it ties the hands of the Commission. She stated that the Commission may run into a problem if they cannot identify enough information about burial sites within a certain section for the amount of funds allocated to that particular section.

d) Discussion on Cemetery Policy & Possible Changes

Chair Robertson shared photos of the Anchorage Memorial Park Cemetery where he recently visited. He stated that the Anchorage Cemetery has some great ideas that the Clay Street Cemetery Commission may want to consider. He distributed a pamphlet that the Municipality of Anchorage produces and makes available to visitors in the cemetery. He shared photos of how each section within the cemetery is marked; he stated that the Commission may want to consider doing something similar at Clay Street with granite markers to indicate the various sections of the cemetery. He stated that wooden posts would likely deteriorate. Chair Robertson showed photos of a columbarium in the Anchorage Memorial Park Cemetery which hold about 4,000 niches. He stated that the flat markers placed throughout the Anchorage Memorial Park Cemetery are becoming a big problem because they are sinking into the ground. He distributed other photos illustrating what he observed.

Ms. Castle shared her ideas on how to mark the various sections at the Clay Street Cemetery.

Mr. Stone asked for more information about a columbarium.

Mr. Erickson explained that a columbarium is made of two panels: a decorative granite panel and an inside, cement (or similar-style) panel. He stated that when an urn is placed in the columbarium, the inside panel is sealed and the decorative panel is placed over it with security screws. He stated that some structures have room for two urns in one space.

Chair Robertson stated that he would like to see the Commission come up with a similar pamphlet to make available at the cemetery.

NEW BUSINESS

a) Welcome to New Member Scott McCrea

Chair Robertson welcomed Mr. Scott McCrea as the newest member of the Commission. He asked Ms. Castle to forward the list of Clay Street Cemetery burials to Mr. McCrea.

Mr. McCrea provided a brief bio and background of himself to the Commission.

b) Information & Photos of Anchorage Cemetery/Ideas for Clay Street

This item was discussed under Unfinished Business, item (d).

OPEN AGENDA

Mr. Turney commended Ms. Castle and City Engineer Technician Winfred Hipp for their work on the GPS survey at the cemetery. He stated that he believes Chief Nagita is still buried at the Clay Street Cemetery in plot number 331. Mr. Turney expressed his belief that the family has a right to be compensated for the DNA test done on Chief Nagita and to take the true Chief back to Nenana if they wish. He indicated that he will be in communication with the Ketzler family; he questioned who may pay for another DNA test on the exhumed remains. Mr. Turney stated that he will also speak with City Attorney Paul Ewers about the issue. He stated that he believes the Chief is still buried at the Clay Street Cemetery and that the body exhumed belongs to August Anderson.

Ms. Castle stated that she was not present at the exhumation and does not know the exact location of the exhumation. She stated that she has to assume that the body is located where the maps indicate it to be; she stated that if that is not the exact location the exhumation took place, then she would conclude that Chief Nagita's remains are still in the cemetery. She again stated that she has no personal knowledge of the exhumation.

Chair Robertson expressed hope that UAF would do some ground penetrating radar (GPR) to see if there is a body in the spot. He stated that he feels the Commission needs to prove that there is actually a burial at that location.

Mr. Turney stated that UAF has indicated they want the remains removed from their custody.

Mr. Turney stated that he sent a message to Dermot Cole regarding the new headstone that will be placed for Private John White. He stated that he hopes Mr. Cole will do a story on it.

Mr. Erickson stated that the 2015 markers will be picked up for shipping very soon. He stated that the order should arrive in about a week.

Ms. Castle stated that her term will expire at the end of August and that she will not be reapplying for service on the Commission. She stated that she will finish the GPS survey that is already underway at the cemetery. She stated that she will try to keep a replacement in mind; she stated that the next regular meeting will be her official last meeting. Ms. Castle presented a color, aerial photo of the cemetery and explained the GPS project that she and the City surveyor have been working on. She stated that there have been a number of additional unknown sites identified and that she will have to add them to the burial database. She stated that next year, there should be an updated map to place in the kiosk at the cemetery. She stated that she has identified name errors and spelling mistakes on some of the gravesites.

Mr. Stone stated that since he is finishing out the remainder of Mr. Pruhs' term, his term will also be expiring at the end of August. He stated that because of the growing amount of work at his job, he will not be able to continue serving on the Commission. He stated that he would still be willing to serve as a contact between the Commission and the Boy Scouts.

Chair Robertson expressed concern with keeping projects at the cemetery alive and maintaining Commission members.

Members spoke to the temporary markers that were placed at the Clay Street Cemetery. Chair Robertson stated that he will contact David Van den Berg with the Fairbanks Downtown Association to see if he recalls anything about the marker project. Ms. Castle and Mr. Turney stated that Karen Lavery may have been involved or may know something about the markers placed in the 1990's.

NEXT MEETING DATE

The next meeting of the Clay Street Cemetery Commission is scheduled for August 5, 2015.

ADJOURNMENT

Ms. Castle, seconded by Mr. Stone, moved to ADJOURN the meeting.

Chair Robertson called for objection and, hearing none, so ORDERED.

Chair Robertson declared the meeting adjourned at 6:05 p.m.

The Finance Department is requesting to write-off debt owed by C & J Han's Corporation, dba Comfort Inn to the City of Fairbanks for hotel/motel sales taxes.

C & J Han's Corporation, through Attorney David H. Bundy, filed its Chapter 11 Voluntary Petition on May 12, 2010 as Case No. A10-00400-DMD. Attorney Bundy filed Motion for Joint Administration with Case No. A10-00399-DMD, the personal bankruptcy case for Choon S. Han and Jung H. Han, shareholders of C & J Han's Corporation. US Bankruptcy Court granted joint administration and ordered Case No. A10-00400-DMD as the subordinate case. On May 10, 2011, Case No. A10-00400-DMD was closed by the US Bankruptcy Court without further action. Pursuant to a telephone call to the US Bankruptcy Court, it was learned that the personal bankruptcy Case No. A10-00399-DMD was approved and went into effect January 2011. Another telephone call placed to Attorney Bundy revealed that City of Fairbanks was never listed as a creditor to either of the bankruptcy cases, the Hans never made payment to any of the listed creditors and the plan was stopped. Attorney Bundy also believed that the Hans left the State of Alaska.

C & J Han's Corporation was involuntarily dissolved on June 10, 2013. The City Finance and Attorney's offices believe all avenues of collection have been exhausted. The write-off amount is \$50,903 in unpaid taxes and \$11,371 in unpaid interest for a total of \$62,274.
