The City Council convened at 7:00 p.m. on the above date, following a 5:30 p.m. Work Session with Explore Fairbanks and a 6:10 p.m. Work Session with Fairbanks Economic Development Corporation (FEDCO), to conduct a Regular Meeting of the Fairbanks City Council at the City Council Chambers, 800 Cushman Street, Fairbanks, Alaska, with Mayor John Eberhart presiding and with the following Council Members in attendance:

INVOCATION

The Invocation was given by City Clerk Janey Hovenden.

FLAG SALUTATION

Mayor Eberhart led the Flag Salutation.

APPROVAL OF AGENDA AND CONSENT AGENDA

Mr. Matherly, seconded by Mr. Cleworth, moved to APPROVE the Agenda and Consent Agenda.

Mr. Cleworth pulled Resolution No. 4647 (Item 10(c)) from the Consent Agenda.

Mayor Eberhart called for objection and, hearing none, so ORDERED.

City Clerk Hovenden read the Consent Agenda, as Amended, into the record.

CITIZEN'S COMMENTS

Victor Buberger, PO Box 58192, Fairbanks – Mr. Buberger stated that he was raised in a city in California where the police department did not allow husbands and wives to work together. He stated that it seems as though 20 – 30% of Fairbanks Police Department (FPD) employees are related to someone else within the department. Mr. Buberger thanked the City for providing pothole repair training to Public Works employees. He commented that there are 45 City police officers who receive an annual wage of over \$100,000, with several exceeding \$150,000 annually. Mr. Buberger stated that he recently read an article in the Fairbanks Daily News Miner written by a City police officer who complained of how the City is not treating its Police Department employees very well. He stated that if FPD employees are that unhappy, he would recommend that they leave the department and find work elsewhere.

Don Seeliger, 3026 Riverview Drive, Fairbanks – Mr. Seeliger stated that he had the pleasure of serving on the City Council several years ago. Mr. Seeliger stated that FPD deserves a contract, but clarified that he believes the proposed contract is unaffordable. He spoke to his experience on the Council, stating that each year the Dispatch and Police Departments would ask for more staff. He explained that even when the Council would approve additional staff, the departments would come back the following year and request even more staff without showing any savings to overtime over the prior year. Mr. Seeliger expressed skepticism that FPD could successfully cut the hourly work week while reducing overtime. He stated that controlling overtime is not an option. He spoke against the proposed increase of the City's contribution to the Public Safety Employees Association (PSEA) health plan and stated that if the Council approves the increase, he will personally help the City's other unions obtain the same increase. Mr. Seeliger urged the Council to come to an agreement with PSEA but again expressed his lack of support for the proposed contract. He cautioned the Council on getting into a non-funding situation.

Jake Metcalfe, 621 West 15th Avenue, Anchorage – Mr. Metcalfe stated that he is the Executive Director of the PSEA Local 803. He gave a brief PowerPoint presentation comparing FPD's pay increases from 2008 – 2013 with that of other municipalities which showed that FPD employees have received a 6.5% raise over those five years while Juneau police employees have experienced a 17% increase over the same period of time. His presentation spoke to the economic trends published by the Department of Labor and showed that the Consumer Price Index (CPI) increased by 16.1% between 2008 and 2013. He pointed out that Fairbanks is one of the most expensive places to live in the state and provided a statistic registering Fairbanks at 36% above the national average and 9.4% above Anchorage. Mr. Metcalfe stated that FPD employees pay a total of \$667 per month in health care contributions, more than that of any other community PSEA represents. He stated that PSEA negotiated for 8 months in good faith to come up with a tentative agreement with the City of Fairbanks. Mr. Metcalfe stated that he does not want to file an unfair labor practice suit and encouraged the Council to support the PSEA contract.

Mr. Gatewood asked Mr. Metcalfe if he knows what the overall budget is for the City and Borough of Juneau.

Mr. Metcalfe replied that he does not know what Juneau's budget is but that he knows they have experienced a deficit in recent years. He stated that he understands the City of Fairbanks has carried a surplus over the past several years and that it also has a substantial Permanent Fund that the Council recently transferred \$4 million more dollars into. Mr. Metcalfe stated that the City of Fairbanks is doing very well and can afford the PSEA contract. He stated that the City of Fairbanks is not currently in compliance with the Affordable Care Act (ACA) which requires employers to pay at least 70% of employees' health care premiums. Mr. Metcalfe pointed out that about two-thirds of the increase in the proposed contract will go towards employee health care premiums because the City has failed to keep up with those increases. He expressed his belief that the proposed contract is reasonable and was reached by compromises from both negotiating teams. Mr. Metcalfe stated that the union is tired of year-round negotiations and estimated that negotiating for eight months costs the City about \$100,000. He reminded the Council that by rejecting the proposed contract, both parties would have to start negotiations from scratch. He added that if the negotiation process starts over, the morale of FPD employees will likely decline.

Mr. Cleworth asked Mr. Metcalfe if the PSEA medical coverage is still a 90/10 plan.

Mr. Metcalfe replied that the plan is now 80/20.

Mr. Cleworth asked if there were any savings in the premium when PSEA moved from a 90/10 plan to an 80/20 plan.

Mr. Metcalfe stated that he does not serve on the health trust and that Bob Thompson would be better equipped to answer questions pertaining to the plan. He stated that one of the reasons why the PSEA health plan premium is considerably less than those of other municipalities is because FPD's unit is made up of a younger, healthier group of individuals.

Gary Yamamoto, 911 Cushman Street, Fairbanks – Sgt. Yamamoto stated that he is a sergeant with FPD. He provided some history of his time with the department and stated that when he was hired in 1993, the salary of FPD officers was 5% higher than that of Anchorage police officers. Sgt. Yamamoto stated that the City/PSEA contract signed in 1993 was the last PSEA contract until late 2006 and that the City wages have not kept up with the ever-increasing cost of living in Fairbanks. He commented that he would likely work somewhere else if he had it to do over again. Sgt. Yamamoto spoke to how the City stopped funding portions of the PSEA contract, such as longevity pay. He stated that the Mayor's decision to hire an outside Chief of Police and the Council's redirection of the PSEA contract are two issues that he believes will have a catastrophic effect on morale and staffing at FPD. Sgt. Yamamoto stated that the City of Fairbanks is not competitive with other departments throughout the State of Alaska. He expressed concern with the difficulty that FPD has in attracting and hiring new police officers. Sgt. Yamamoto spoke to the large number of FPD employees that will be eligible for retirement within the next three years and stated that he fears there will not be anyone to take their places. He stated that the City Council cannot afford the consequences of denying the contract. He stated that there are things in the contract that he does not like but that he agreed to ratify it because it was the right thing to do and because he trusted those who negotiated it. He encouraged the Council to do the same.

Frank Turney, 329 6th Avenue, Fairbanks – Mr. Turney stated that the cost of living is increasing for everyone. He expressed concern with Officer Dupee’s comments which could be taken as threats against the City. He stated that whenever there is a morale problem within a law enforcement agency, there is an increase in the violations of civil liberties against citizens and expressed hope that the new Chief of Police could take care of the morale issue. He suggested that the Diversity Council investigate why there are no public restrooms in downtown Fairbanks.

Jason Avery, 1932 Kittiwake Drive, Fairbanks – Mr. Avery stated that he is the Manager at Pioneer Park and is representing the Fairbanks North Star Borough (FNSB). He expressed support for Ordinance No. 5960 and spoke to the bazaar held at the park each year around Thanksgiving. He stated that the event is free for the public to attend and that proceeds from the event go towards public entertainment at the park. Mr. Avery indicated that any permit fees imposed on the event by the City of Fairbanks would cause either an increase to vendor fees or the elimination of event activities. He stated that the City and the Borough often allow other agencies and instrumentalities of the state to use their facilities at no cost and expressed hope that the cooperation would continue. Mr. Avery spoke to other events that take place at Pioneer Park which are hosted by non-profit entities and expressed his belief that those organizations will choose to hold their events outside City limits if Ordinance No. 5960 does not pass.

Richard Sweet, 414 Le Ann Drive, Fairbanks – Ofc. Sweet stated that he is the second-least senior officer at FPD, having been hired less than three years ago. He explained that he is retired U.S. Army and that he chose to stay in Fairbanks because he and his family love Alaska. Ofc. Sweet spoke to the acceptance he has felt at FPD and spoke highly of their mentoring and training programs. He stated that his concerns are primarily with how the City will be able to recruit and retain police officers. Ofc. Sweet spoke to his experience with recruitment in the Army and stated that things like a 20-year retirement, competitive wages and the chance to serve community and country are all items that attract applicants. He encouraged the Council to approve the proposed PSEA contract.

Eric Jewkes, 911 Cushman Street, Fairbanks – Lt. Jewkes stated that he has been with FPD for over 20 years and distributed an article speaking to the outstanding work that FPD crisis negotiators did during the recent armed standoff in Fairbanks. He stated that the entire article is about negotiation and bargaining rules. Lt. Jewkes pointed out that both parties asked for several things during the standoff and that those requests were met as promised. He stated that even though there were loopholes and justifiable reasons for FPD to have not upheld their end of the agreement in the standoff, they were true to their word because it was the right thing to do. Lt. Jewkes stated that often there is a big difference between doing what is allowed and what is right. He stated that while he was not a part of PSEA’s negotiating team recently, he has been in the past and that he knows how the process works. He expressed that he is disheartened, both personally and professionally, by the Council’s reconsideration of Ordinance No. 5953. He stated that FPD officers are an outstanding group of individuals who hold themselves and each other accountable to do the right thing. He commented that the process that led the contract to where it now stands was not the right one. Lt. Jewkes stated that he believes in leading by example and that he does not demand any more of the Council than he demands of himself. He acknowledged the tremendous responsibility of the Council and joked that he would not want the Council’s job. Lt. Jewkes stated that the agreement was made and that breaking the rules to take

it back is hard for him to accept. He urged the Council to uphold the adoption of Ordinance No. 5953.

Peyton Merideth, 3017 Riverview Drive, Fairbanks – Det. Merideth stated that he is a detective at FPD. He congratulated Mr. Cleworth and Mr. Pruhs for their victory in the recent municipal election. He spoke to the proposed increase to annual leave for FPD officers with 10 years or more of service and clarified that the bump is not the same as the longevity pay that the City gave in the past. Det. Merideth compared the annual leave benefit of FPD with that of other municipalities around the state and pointed out that even with the proposed increase to senior officers' leave package, Fairbanks would still offer second to the lowest annual leave package for senior officers of those other municipalities. Det. Merideth stated that he has always wanted to be a police officer and that he still takes pride in his work, knowing that sometimes he can help change someone's life for the better. He stated that in his job, he must work within a set of rules set forth by case law, the court system, the State of Alaska Constitution and the United States Constitution. Det. Merideth explained that he was ecstatic when the Council voted to adopt Ordinance No. 5953 and disappointed when he heard that a Council Member wished to change their vote and bring the ordinance back to the Council for reconsideration. He expressed his belief that the reconsideration was fundamentally wrong and urged the Council to take this opportunity to make things right. Det. Merideth concluded with the words of former Police Chief Zager, "In my 30 years in this profession... I have found no organization more dedicated, more talented, or more resilient than the Fairbanks Police Department."

Lee Despain, PO Box 80647, Fairbanks – Mr. Despain stated that Donna Gilbert had planned to attend the meeting but was recently injured and opted not to speak at this time. He referenced a recent News Miner article where Ofc. Dupee claimed that FPD officers have been treated unfairly by the City Council. Mr. Despain stated that if you evaluate the City/Union negotiation process, you will find that each union puts the City's lead negotiator into public office. He indicated that there may have been some misrepresentation to the Council of the impact of moving to a 36-hour work week at FPD and that he just recently found out that it was the lead negotiator who proposed the shortened work week to PSEA. Mr. Despain expressed his opinion that the Council was lied to and applauded them for taking another look at the PSEA contract. He stated that it appears whoever briefed the Council on the proposed contract fudged the overtime costs. Mr. Despain asked whose dollars will fund the contract costs that are outside the budget. He stated that, to his knowledge, overtime costs have never been controlled by the Police or Fire Department. He stated that Ofc. Dupee's wages and benefits totaled \$118,000 in 2014 and that another senior officer's wage and benefit package for 2014 was over \$188,000.

Darlene Herbert, 906 Woodlawn Road, Fairbanks – Ms. Herbert stated that the Council was voted into office to make decisions that are fair to everyone. She commented that it seems that some officers are overpaid, but added that the job of a police officer is a very difficult one. She stated that there are many other jobs that are high-risk and reminded the Council that it is the taxpayers who pay FPD's wages. Ms. Herbert commented that if FPD officers feel that they are underpaid, they should look for work elsewhere.

Lake Williams, 945 Senate Loop, Fairbanks – Mr. Williams stated that he believes in good faith bargaining and expressed appreciation for both the City Council and FPD employees. He stated that only the Council can determine whether the City has bargained in good faith and whether

they feel they have been properly informed throughout the process. He congratulated the recently-elected Council Members. Mr. Williams expressed his opinion that granting the reconsideration was not an act of good faith on the Council's part. He stated that he does not enjoy seeing the negative part of the community displayed in City Council Meetings and expressed hope that the Council would make a decision they could live with.

Mr. Gatewood asked Mr. Williams to speak to the rumors he has heard.

Mr. Williams replied that he does not wish to partake in the rumors. He stated that there was a recent election and that there are some sore feelings around Fairbanks. He stated that he hopes Fairbanks can move forward as a community.

Hearing no more requests for public comment, **Mayor Eberhart** declared Public Testimony closed.

Mayor Eberhart called for Public Testimony and, hearing none, declared Public Testimony closed.

Mayor Eberhart declared the MOTION CARRIED.

MAYOR'S COMMENTS AND REPORT

Mayor Eberhart stated that November is Native American Heritage month, a time to reflect on the profound ways that early Americans shaped our nation's character and culture. He stated that

Native Americans' contributions continue to enrich communities and strengthen our country. **Mayor Eberhart** stated that he recently met with a number of community groups to explore the possibility of applying for a grant that would fund public restroom facilities in downtown Fairbanks. He spoke to the many activities, meetings and events that the Mayor's Office has been involved in since the last Regular City Council Meeting. He announced that there will be a community open house at the JP Jones Center for Bjerremark Subdivision Improvements on November 6, from 6 – 8 p.m. **Mayor Eberhart** stated that budget meetings with Department Heads and City Council Members have begun and will occur at 7 a.m. each morning throughout the week. He stated that the mill rate will go up due to insurance costs and a high number of workers' compensation claims. He shared that the 2015 draft budget shows a \$1.1 million surplus. **Mayor Eberhart** reminded everyone that Election Day is Tuesday, November 4 and encouraged everyone to get out and vote.

UNFINISHED BUSINESS

- a) Ordinance No. 5953 – An Ordinance Ratifying a Labor Agreement Between the City of Fairbanks and the Public Safety Employees Association, Fairbanks Police Department Chapter. Introduced by Mayor Eberhart. PUBLIC HEARING was held on August 25, 2014. POSTPONED from the Regular Meeting of September 8, 2014.

NOTE: Because Ordinance No. 5953 was postponed, the motion to ADOPT was already on the floor (the motion to ADOPT was made by Mr. Anderson, seconded by Ms. Staley, at the Regular Meeting of September 8, 2014).

Mr. Gatewood requested a staff report on the financial portion of the PSEA contract.

Mayor Eberhart announced that former Chief Zager is standing by if the Council would like to speak with him.

Mr. Gatewood stated that there has been quite a bit of discussion surrounding the cost of the PSEA contract. He asked Chief Financial Officer Jim Soileau to speak to the affordability of the contract.

Mr. Soileau went through the increased costs of the proposed contract line by line. He stated that the Finance Department has drawn up three different financial scenarios that include all PSEA employees. He spoke to the financial effects of the reduced work week, wage increases, leave banks, overtime and the increased leave for senior officers.

Mr. Gatewood asked Mr. Soileau to speak to the costs if a party chooses to opt out.

Mr. Soileau stated that neither party may opt out until 12 months into the contract. He explained that if the City opts out, PSEA will keep the retro pay and the City's increased healthcare contribution. He stated that the 10% wage increase would be reduced to a 3.36% increase, which would also reduce leave banks. He explained that if the City opted out of the contract, the cost compared to the previous three years would be \$559,000. He stated that if PSEA opted out, it would cost the City about \$500,000.

Mayor Eberhart clarified that the amount Mr. Soileau quoted is not a penalty, but would be the cost of the portions of the contract that the City would still have to fund.

Ms. Staley asked under what conditions the City may opt out.

Mayor Eberhart stated that Council may choose to opt out at their own discretion after a year. He again stated that former Chief Zager is standing by to answer questions if the Council so desires. **Mayor Eberhart** asked Chief of Staff Jim Williams if Mr. Zager intends on taking a position on the PSEA contract.

Mr. Williams replied that Mr. Zager does not intend to take a position.

Mr. Pruhs asked Mr. Soileau to speak to overages in budgeted overtime over the past year at the Police and Dispatch Departments.

Mr. Soileau stated that in 2013, FPD budgeted \$350,000 for overtime and came in about 7.5% below budget. He stated that in 2012, FPD exceeded the budgeted overtime by 6%, but still came in under budget in salaries for the year.

Mayor Eberhart asked Dispatch Manager Stephanie Johnson to come forward.

Mr. Gatewood asked how the proposed PSEA contract would benefit the Dispatch Center.

Ms. Johnson stated that the Dispatch Center is a separate department from FPD and spoke to the ways that the differences have been addressed in the proposed contract. She stated that the new working rules in the contract will allow her to maintain different shift schedules in her department than at FPD and will provide for more efficient staffing. Ms. Johnson indicated that the contract may also allow more flexibility and fairness in distributing forced overtime.

Mayor Eberhart asked Ms. Johnson to speak to the large amount of turnover in her department and to how the proposed contract may impact the retention problem.

Ms. Johnson stated that when she has spoken with former PFD dispatchers who have found employment in the same field elsewhere, they have said that they earn a higher wage at their new job with less out of pocket healthcare expense. She stated that it takes 8 – 10 months to train new dispatchers and that the City is losing a tremendous amount of money each time a trained dispatcher leaves. Ms. Johnson stated that the proposed contract should make the FPD Dispatch Center more competitive with other agencies.

Mayor Eberhart asked Mr. Williams who came up with the idea of the 36-hour work week.

Mr. Williams replied that the idea was introduced in the spring when the City and PSEA were nearly at an impasse. He explained that the idea was originally Chief Zager's and was presented to the Council in Executive Session, then introduced to PSEA after Council provided their input.

Mayor Eberhart asked Mr. Williams to comment on the notion that the hours lost in the reduced work week would cause excessive overtime.

Mr. Williams stated that the Police Department incurs overtime due to the nature of the job. He stated that the Finance Department estimated the overtime budget at a 50% rate. Mr. Williams stated that his research of payroll records indicates that the actual backfill rate at FPD is 13%.

Mr. Walley asked how much it would cost the City in the third year of the PSEA contract if the City opted out.

Mr. Soileau replied that for year 2016 it would cost the City \$452,843 if the City opted out and \$429,078 if PSEA opted out.

Mr. Matherly stated that, contrary to some opinions, he did not file a reconsideration of Ordinance No. 5953 because of the upcoming election. He expressed his respect for FPD and stated that he separated the PSEA contract issue from the hiring of the new Police Chief. **Mr. Matherly** explained that he felt the need to look at the contract again because of the financial effect it would have on the City of Fairbanks. He defended the Council's decision to suspend the rules to allow for the reconsideration by stating that the motion is within the rules set forth in the Code. He stated that he believes it would be nearly impossible to opt out of the 36-hour work week once it is in place. **Mr. Matherly** clarified that he still has great concern for the Dispatch Department. He stated that he received over 55 emails regarding the PSEA issue and that he responded to each one explaining his reasoning for the reconsideration.

Mr. Cleworth stated that he read Mr. Dupee's opinion in the newspaper and that he agreed with some of the statements made. He clarified that labor negotiations between the City and unions are always open to the public as mandated in the Fairbanks General Code. He spoke to his experience in negotiating with PSEA and stated that when he was City Mayor, it only took one week to come to an agreement between the two parties. **Mr. Cleworth** stated that as Mayor, he enjoyed working with FPD and had an open door policy. He explained that former Chief Zager came up with the concept of the 36-hour work week about five years ago in an effort to cut costs, but expressed his belief that it was not a good idea then and is not a good idea now. He stated that the shortened work week would equate to a reduction in the police force which would be regressive. **Mr. Cleworth** briefly spoke to the staffing history at FPD and stated that the department is currently above the national average for Fairbanks' size. He stated that every Police Chief he has known has asked for more staffing. He pointed out that five of the current 47 FPD staff are grant-funded positions. He opposed the notion that the reduction in the work week could be justified by an expanded Community Service Patrol (CSP). He stated that it is nice to have an expanded CSP, but indicated that the program is dependent on grant funding and donations. **Mr. Cleworth** spoke to overtime at FPD and stated that it is somewhat inevitable. In reference to the document he distributed to the Council, he directed the Council to review what it would cost the City to give all union employees the same proposed monthly increase to their healthcare premiums. He stated that the increased healthcare contribution would actually exceed a 2% package rate increase for City employees. **Mr. Cleworth** commented that by agreeing to the proposed contract, the City would be moving backwards in many ways. He stated that the City's annual leave policy is a good and liberal policy. He compared the proposed PSEA contract to the most recent contracts of other unions the City is under agreement with and to other government/union contracts in Alaska. **Mr. Cleworth** read aloud portions of the Fairbanks General Code pertaining to the Council's goals during labor negotiations. He commented that

the opt out clause is unaffordable and that the PSEA contract would bind the hands of future Councils and administrations. He stated that while agreeing to the PSEA contract would make a lot of people happy, it would make many people unhappy because the City cannot afford the same for the other unions.

Mayor Eberhart stated that he is unsure why CSP keeps being mentioned as a problem in terms of funding. He explained that there is \$115,000 in state and borough contributions set aside for the CSP in 2015 and that there is a total of \$275,000 in designated CSP funding for the next two or more years. **Mayor Eberhart** stated that in the meantime, there are efforts being made in conjunction with the Downtown Association to increase private donations to the CSP. He reminded the Council that the CSP's work is an unfunded mandate by the State of Alaska and indicated that some of the funding burden should fall on the state. **Mayor Eberhart** stated that the notion that a healthcare contribution increase for PSEA would mean an equal increase for the other unions is a fallacy because each union is different.

A ROLL CALL VOTE WAS TAKEN ON THE MOTION TO ADOPT ORDINANCE NO. 5953 AS FOLLOWS:

Mayor Eberhart declared the MOTION FAILED.

- b) Ordinance No. 5958 – An Ordinance Amending the 2014 Operating and Capital Budgets for the Sixth Time. Introduced by Mayor Eberhart. PUBLIC HEARING was held on October 20, 2014. POSTPONED from the Regular Meeting of October 20, 2014.

NOTE: Because Ordinance No. 5958 was postponed, the motion to ADOPT was already on the floor (the motion to ADOPT was made by Mr. Anderson, seconded by Mr. Hilling, at the Regular Meeting of October 20, 2014).

Mr. Cleworth, seconded by **Mr. Pruhs**, moved to SUBSTITUTE Ordinance No. 5958, as Amended, for Ordinance No. 5958.

Mayor Eberhart called for objection and, hearing none, so ORDERED.

Mayor Eberhart called for a five minute recess.

Mr. Cleworth stated that he is satisfied with the proposed numbers for the Dispatch Department. He indicated that he has a problem with Item 10 of Estimated Expenditures in the Fiscal Note pertaining to the retroactive health increase for the Fire Department. **Mr. Cleworth** asked City Attorney Paul Ewers if the Fire Fighters Union (FFU) will still head to court regardless of the Council's action on Ordinance No. 5958, as Amended.

City Attorney Ewers stated that FFU has been in court but that his plan is to head them off and take them in a different direction. He expressed hope that the issue would be out of court soon. He commented that the adoption of Ordinance No. 5958, as Amended, will likely make their claim irrelevant.

Mr. Cleworth asked Mr. Ewers what the City's position was regarding health care during the FFU arbitration last year.

Mr. Ewers explained that the 4.75% wage increase given to FFU up front for a three-year contract was actually a \$250,000 better deal for the union than what the IBEW and AFL-CIO received for their package rate increases in their respective agreements with the City. He noted that the FFU health care premiums went down during that time by \$200 - \$300 per month.

Mr. Cleworth asked Mr. Ewers if he was allowed to present the City's one request of FFU to the arbitrator.

Mr. Ewers stated that he was not given the opportunity to present the City's request to the arbitrator. He explained that when FFU rejected the City's offer and vice versa, all prior offers were no longer valid.

Mr. Cleworth stated that the fire fighters used to be under the PSEA health care program, but commented that it was not good for them or for the City. He stated that since then the fire fighters came up with their own plan. **Mr. Cleworth** stated that the fire fighters have always wanted the City to fund 80% of their health care premium and explained that the City cannot afford to do so for all union contracts. He stated that each union can structure their health plans however they see fit and spoke more to the history of negotiations with the FFU. **Mr. Cleworth** stated that FFU likes to go to arbitration because it is problematic for the City of Fairbanks. He read aloud portions of an article from *The Boston Globe* titled "Arbitration's Intolerable Bind" which spoke to how binding arbitration is not a good mechanism for drawing up binding contracts between unions and state and local governments. The article also spoke to how unions use binding arbitration to their benefit and to how the process erodes self-government. **Mr. Cleworth** stated that the City offered to pay the equivalent of 80% of FFU's health premiums and it was rejected and mentioned that FFU negotiations would be opening up in about six months.

Mr. Ewers pointed out that FFU also wanted \$60,000 for a health trust account in addition to the 80% health care contribution.

Mr. Cleworth, seconded by **Mr. Pruhs**, moved to AMEND Ordinance No. 5958, as Amended, by eliminating the \$57,432 increase to the Fire Department (Item 10 of Estimated Expenditures in the Fiscal Note).

A ROLL CALL VOTE WAS TAKEN ON THE MOTION TO AMEND ORDINANCE NO. 5958, AS AMENDED, BY STRIKING THE \$57,432 INCREASE TO THE FIRE DEPARTMENT AS FOLLOWS:

NAYS: Gatewood

Mayor Eberhart declared the MOTION CARRIED.

A ROLL CALL VOTE WAS TAKEN ON THE MOTION TO ADOPT ORDINANCE NO. 5958, AS AMENDED, AS FOLLOWS:

NAYS: None
Mayor Eberhart declared the MOTION CARRIED and Ordinance No. 5958, as Amended, ADOPTED.

- c) Ordinance No. 5959 – An Ordinance Amending Fairbanks General Code Section 14-176 Regarding Possession of Alcoholic Beverages. Introduced by Mayor Eberhart. SECOND READING AND PUBLIC HEARING.

Mr. Matherly, seconded by **Mr. Cleworth**, moved to ADOPT Ordinance No. 5959.

Mayor Eberhart called for Public Testimony and, hearing none, declared Public Testimony closed.

Mr. Cleworth asked for a report on the reasoning behind Ordinance No. 5959.

Mr. Ewers explained that police officers working in the downtown area noticed a loophole in City Code regarding possession of alcoholic beverages. He explained that while possessing an open container of alcohol and drinking in public are against City Code, the ordinance does not address unopened containers of alcohol. Mr. Ewers stated that the Borough prohibits alcohol in its parks downtown.

A ROLL CALL VOTE WAS TAKEN ON THE MOTION TO ADOPT ORDINANCE NO. 5959 AS FOLLOWS:

PASSED and APPROVED on the CONSENT AGENDA.

- b) Resolution No. 4646 – A Resolution Authorizing the City of Fairbanks to Apply for Funds from the United States Department of Homeland Security for Driver Certification Training. Introduced by Mayor Eberhart.

PASSED and APPROVED on the CONSENT AGENDA.

- c) Resolution No. 4647 – A Resolution Authorizing the City of Fairbanks to Apply for Funds from the United States Department of Homeland Security to Upgrade the Aerial Platform. Introduced by Mayor Eberhart.

Mr. Cleworth, seconded by **Mr. Matherly**, moved to SUBSTITUTE Resolution No. 4647, as Amended, for Resolution No. 4647.

Mayor Eberhart called for objection and, hearing none, so ORDERED.

Assistant Fire Chief Ernie Misewicz stated that the Fire Department is looking to refurbish one of the old platform trucks. He explained that when the grant terms came out, they noticed that the requirements did not allow for the refurbishing of existing apparatus. He stated that the more stringent requirements are the reason for the amended version of Resolution No. 4647.

Mr. Cleworth asked how often the City normally replaces the apparatus. He asked if the equipment is sellable and if obtaining parts is becoming a problem.

Mr. Misewicz replied that the City tries to replace the equipment every 20 years and rotate the old ones into a reserve status. He explained that parts are becoming difficult to find for both of the trucks that the City owns.

Mr. Cleworth asked who the engine manufacturer is for the truck the City is currently using.

Mr. Misewicz replied that the City is currently using two trucks. He stated that one of the truck's engines is made by KME and the other one is made by American LaFrance.

A ROLL CALL VOTE WAS TAKEN ON THE MOTION TO APPROVE RESOLUTION NO. 4647, AS AMENDED, AS FOLLOWS:

DISCUSSION ITEMS

Committee Reports

Fairbanks Diversity Council – **Mr. Gatewood** stated that he was appointed to the Diversity Council as former Council Member Anderson's replacement and attended the October 23

meeting. He stated that the membership is made up of an enthusiastic group of individuals and spoke to the Borough's appointments to the Diversity Council. **Mr. Gatewood** stated that at the last meeting Mae Marsh, the Director of Diversity and Equal Opportunity at UAF, performed diversity training for the group. He shared that the Diversity Council will participate in strategic planning with City Chief of Staff Jim Williams at the next meeting on December 9 at 5:30 p.m.

Permanent Fund Review Board – **Mr. Gatewood** shared that the Community Development, Inc. note for the Raven Landing project has been paid in full and the City will not be receiving any more payments to the Permanent Fund for that debt. He spoke to the status of the City's investments and indicated that stocks have been down. **Mr. Gatewood** stated that as of October 21, 2014 the Permanent Fund balance was \$120,307,000.00 and expressed satisfaction with where the City's portfolio is going. He asked Mr. Soileau when the annual report would be presented to the Council.

Mr. Soileau stated that the report would likely be presented in January 2015.

Mr. Pruhs asked Mr. Gatewood if he could provide him with information on how the Fund is managed and under what parameters it operates.

Mr. Gatewood replied affirmatively.

COUNCIL MEMBERS' COMMENTS

Ms. Staley stated that it is good to be back in Fairbanks but commented that she will have to call in for some of the Finance Committee meetings. She stated that she hopes to have Mr. Cleworth help with the Golden Heart Parking Services (GHPS) Board. She expressed her desire to remain on the Public Safety Commission (PSC) and thanked FPD for allowing her to participate in a ride-along to experience first-hand what police officers do on the job. **Ms. Staley** stated that the vote on the PSEA contract was a difficult one and indicated that there were too many unknowns for the Council to approve the ordinance.

Mr. Walley stated that it has been a long few months and expressed his appreciation to the Police and Dispatch Departments. He stated that there is a great deal of pressure on the Council during situations involving labor issues. He emphasized the importance of the fairness issue in regard to how the City bargains among unions and stated that the City must strive to be as fair as possible.

Mr. Gatewood echoed Mr. Walley's comments on the Council's goal to be as fair as possible in bargaining with the respective unions, but stated that each contract cannot be the same due to the varying nature of work between unions. He commented that the Council may have gotten caught up initially in the idea that the reduced work week for PSEA may save the City money and stated that he cannot blame the union for being upset with the Council. **Mr. Gatewood** stated that the PSEA labor contract is not just about the Police Department but is also about other City workers and the citizens of the City of Fairbanks. He expressed hope that PSEA and the City could come to an agreement that is palatable to both parties.

Mr. Pruhs thanked Mayor Eberhart, City Attorney Ewers and fellow Council Members for making his few weeks on the Council enjoyable. He commended Chief Financial Officer Jim Soileau for answering the Council's questions and providing valuable information in regard to the PSEA contract. He stated that he looks forward to continuing his work on the City Council.

Mr. Cleworth thanked Mayor Eberhart and City staff for the proposed 2015 budget and stated that it looks like a good starting point.

Mr. Matherly stated that he had to vote early in the State election and commented on the large early-voter turnout. He encouraged everyone to get out and vote and stated that this election will mark a big turning point for the State of Alaska. In regard to PSEA labor negotiations, **Mr. Matherly** stated that he feels he should listen harder, ask more questions and work harder as a City Councilman. He commended the Finance Department for their work on the 2015 budget and stated that he believes new IT Director Ben Barrio will make a fine addition to the City staff. **Mr. Matherly** expressed his interest in remaining on the Explore Fairbanks Board of Directors. He stated that there were about 40 people in attendance at the recent meeting regarding the new Club SinRock, including Council Members Staley and Cleworth and Chief of Staff Williams. He stated that the owner of the Club was also present and was very respectful and accommodating. He stated that it is an honor to serve with all his fellow Council Members.

Mayor Eberhart stated that he was unable to attend the Club SinRock meeting due to a scheduling conflict. He asked Mr. Cleworth if he is interested in becoming the Council representative to the GHPS Board or if he is just helping Ms. Staley on the Board.

Mr. Cleworth stated that he knows how busy Ms. Staley is and commented that he would be happy to help her on the GHPS Board.

Mayor Eberhart stated that the Fairbanks Downtown Association has requested a meeting to discuss parking and a couple other topics and asked Ms. Staley to forward the email she received about the meeting to Mr. Cleworth.

Ms. Staley stated that she would forward the information and shared that the meeting would take place on November 5 at 9 a.m.

CITY ATTORNEY'S REPORT

City Attorney Ewers advised that the City's Deferred Compensation Committee is in the process of finalizing a contract with MetLife. He stated that he hopes to present a full report and a resolution approving the contract soon.

CITY CLERK'S REPORT

City Clerk Hovenden advised that she included a written quarterly report from the City Clerk's Office in the Council's packets.

Mr. Matherly, seconded by **Mr. Pruhs**, moved to go into Executive Session for the purpose of discussing AFL-CIO and Public Safety Employees Association (PSEA) labor contract negotiations.

Mayor Eberhart called for objection and, hearing none, so ORDERED.

Mayor Eberhart called for a brief recess.

EXECUTIVE SESSION

a) Labor Contract Negotiations – AFL-CIO and PSEA

The City Council met in Executive Session to discuss AFL-CIO and PSEA labor contract negotiations. Direction was given to the negotiating team and no action was taken.

ADJOURNMENT

Mr. Pruhs, seconded by **Ms. Staley**, moved to ADJOURN the meeting.

Mayor Eberhart called for objection and, hearing none, so ORDERED.

Mayor Eberhart declared the Meeting adjourned at 11:10 P.M.

RESOLUTION NO. 4657

A RESOLUTION SUPPORTING THE REINSTATEMENT OF A FULL \$60 MILLION INTO THE REVENUE SHARING FUND ON A YEARLY BASIS WITH A ONE-YEAR APPROPRIATION OF \$8 MILLION TO THE FUND WITH AN EFFECTIVE DATE PRIOR TO JUNE 30, 2015

WHEREAS, all of Alaska's boroughs and cities are appreciative to the Governor and the Legislature for the continuation of the Revenue Sharing program; and

WHEREAS, since 2008, municipalities have received a total of \$60 million per year to be divided among all boroughs, cities and unorganized communities in the State; and

WHEREAS, this money is a small share of the resource funding that is provided to the State; and

WHEREAS, \$60 million is also a small part of the total state-wide budget for the year; and

WHEREAS, municipalities are political subdivisions of the State of Alaska; and

WHEREAS, boroughs and cities can only raise their own money through increased taxes and/or fees; and

WHEREAS, in the past 2014 Legislative Session, the amount deposited into the Revenue Sharing fund dropped to \$52 million; and

WHEREAS, the larger municipalities use these funds to keep taxes as low as possible; and

WHEREAS, the smaller municipalities use these funds to provide basic services, such as snow removal, public building maintenance, harbor upkeep, fuel and insurance.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the City Council requests the Alaska State Legislature to reinstate the amount of \$60 million on an annual basis into the Revenue Sharing Fund and also that the Alaska State Legislature appropriate an additional \$8 million to the fund with an effective date prior to June 30, 2015.

ORDINANCE NO. 5964

**AN ORDINANCE AMENDING FAIRBANKS GENERAL CODE CHAPTER
46 OFFENSES BY ADDING A NEW SECTION TO PROHIBIT THE
CONSUMPTION OF MARIJUANA IN A PUBLIC PLACE**

WHEREAS, Ballot Measure 2 – An Act to Tax and Regulate the Production, Sale and Use of Marijuana, codified as Alaska Statute 17.38, providing for the legalization of marijuana, was passed by the voters in the recent state election and certified on November 28, 2014, by the State of Alaska, Division of Elections; and

WHEREAS, newly enacted AS 17.38.040 states as follows:

Public consumption banned, penalty.

It is unlawful to consume marijuana in public. A person who violates this section is guilty of a violation punishable by a fine of up to \$100.

; and

WHEREAS, the state statute does not define “public”; and

WHEREAS, the state statute does not discuss or mandate any enforcement mechanism; and

WHEREAS, the proponents of the effort to legalize marijuana referred to themselves as the “campaign to Regulate Marijuana Like Alcohol; and

WHEREAS, the Fairbanks General Code, FGC Sec. 46-80, bans the consumption of alcohol in a certain public places; and

WHEREAS, the effective date of the legislation enacted by Ballot Measure 2 is February 24, 2015; and

WHEREAS, within the City of Fairbanks, the enforcement of the state’s smoking in public statute would be the responsibility of the Fairbanks Police Department; and

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ENACTED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF FAIRBANKS, ALASKA, as follows:

SECTION 1. Fairbanks General Code Chapter 46 Offenses is amended by adding the following section to Article II:

Sec. 46-44. Consuming marijuana in public place.

(a) It is unlawful for any person to knowingly consume marijuana when the person is:

- (1) On, in, or upon any public place, except as permitted by ordinance, regulation, statute or permit; or
- (2) Outdoors on property adjacent to a public place, and without consent of the owner or person in control thereof.

(b) For purposes of this section, the following definitions apply:

- (1) *Consume* has the meaning, in all conjugate forms, of “consumption” set forth in AS 17.38.900.
- (2) *Marijuana* has the meaning set forth in AS 17.38.900.
- (3) *Public place* means a place to which the public or a substantial group of persons has access and includes, but is not limited to, streets, highways, sidewalks, alleys, transportation facilities, parking areas, convention centers, sports arena, schools, places of business or amusement, shopping centers, malls, parks, playgrounds, prisons, and hallways, lobbies, doorways and other portions of apartment houses and hotels not constituting rooms or apartments designed for actual residence.

(c) Violation of this section is a minor offense punishable by a fine of \$100.00. Disposition of this offense may be without court appearance pursuant to AS 29.25.070 and the Alaska Minor Offense Rules upon payment of the \$100 fine and payment of the state surcharge required by AS 12.55.039 and AS 29.25.074. This fine may not be judicially reduced.

SECTION 2. That the effective date of this Ordinance shall be the ____ day of February 2015.

I have been offered a position with the State of Alaska in Juneau that is impossible to refuse. It will place me in a much better position to accomplish my long term goals.



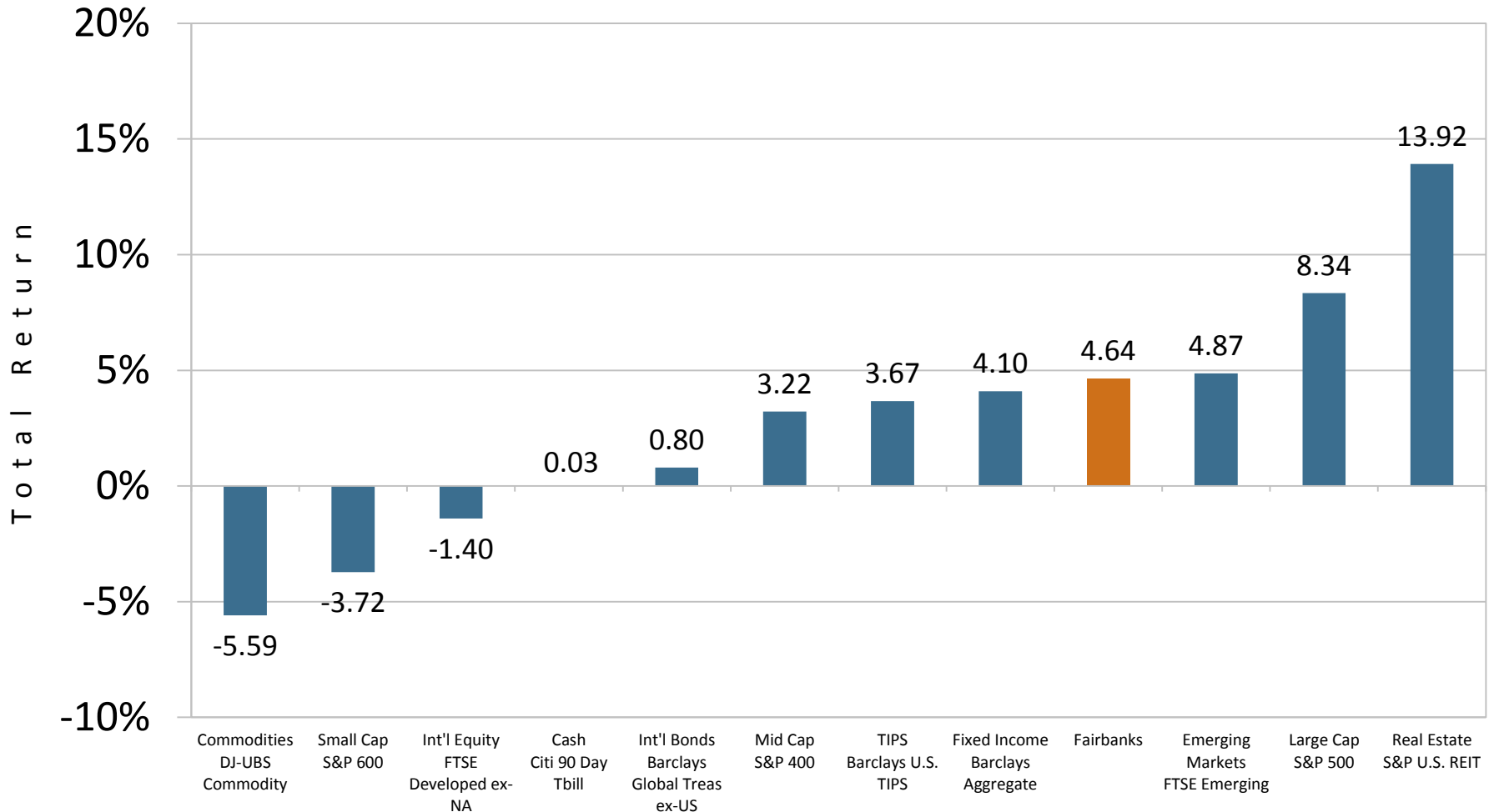

Asset Class Performance YTD as of September 30, 2014

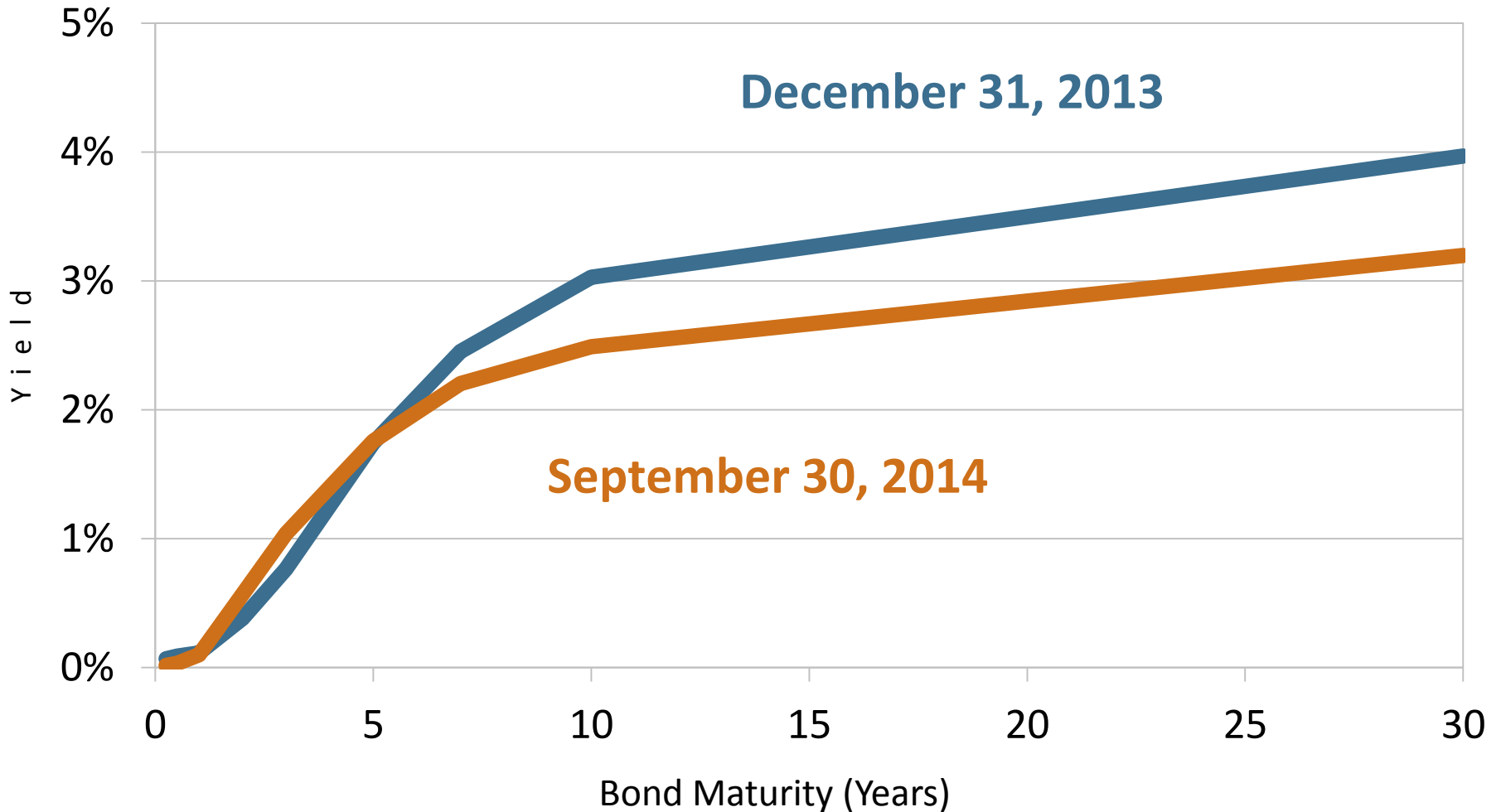

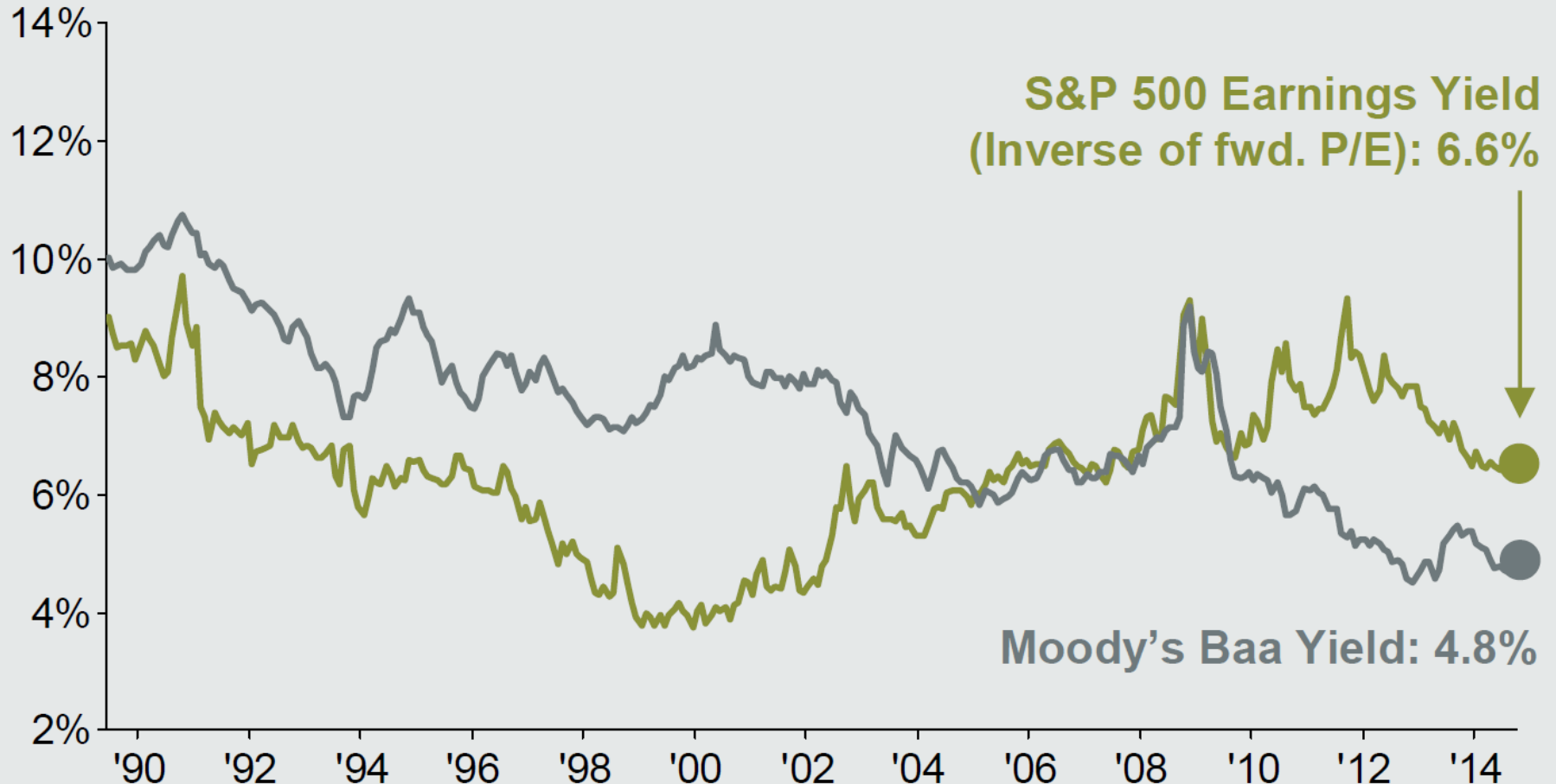
Bond Yields Have Fallen YTD

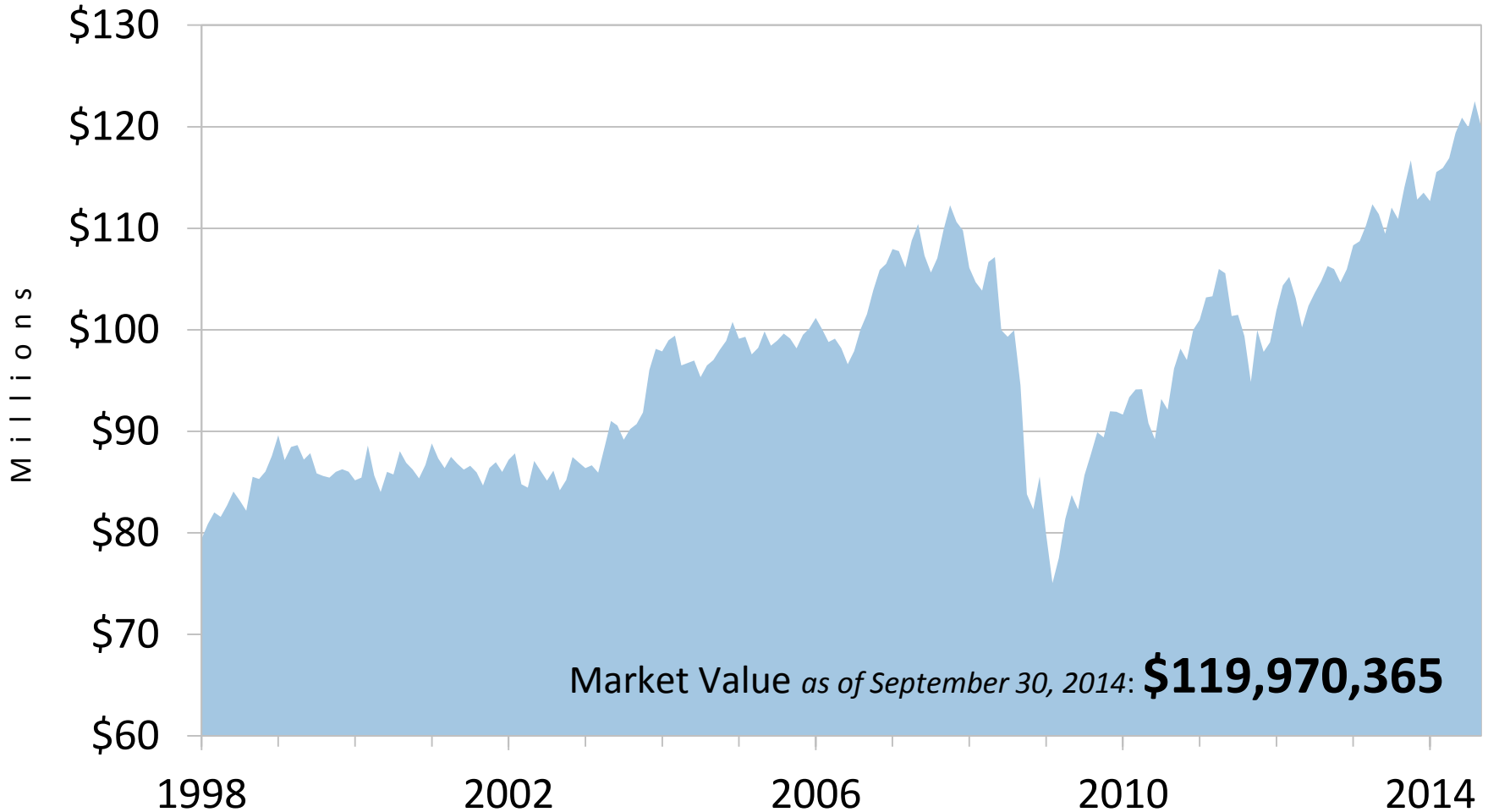
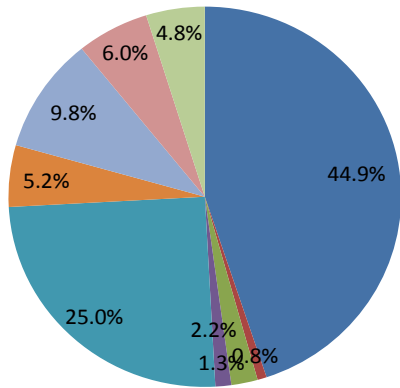


Chart shows month-end portfolio market value from January 1998 to September 2014.

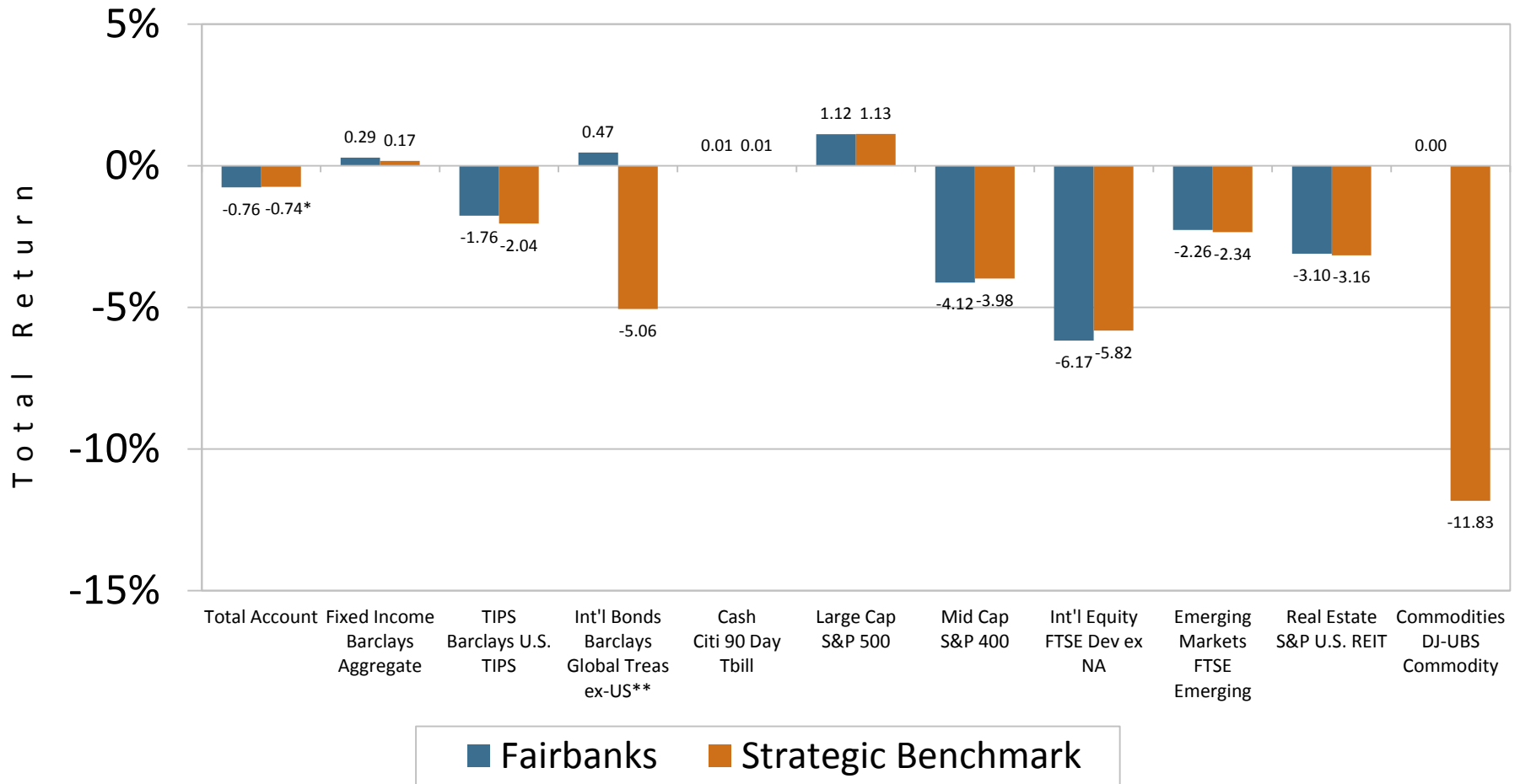

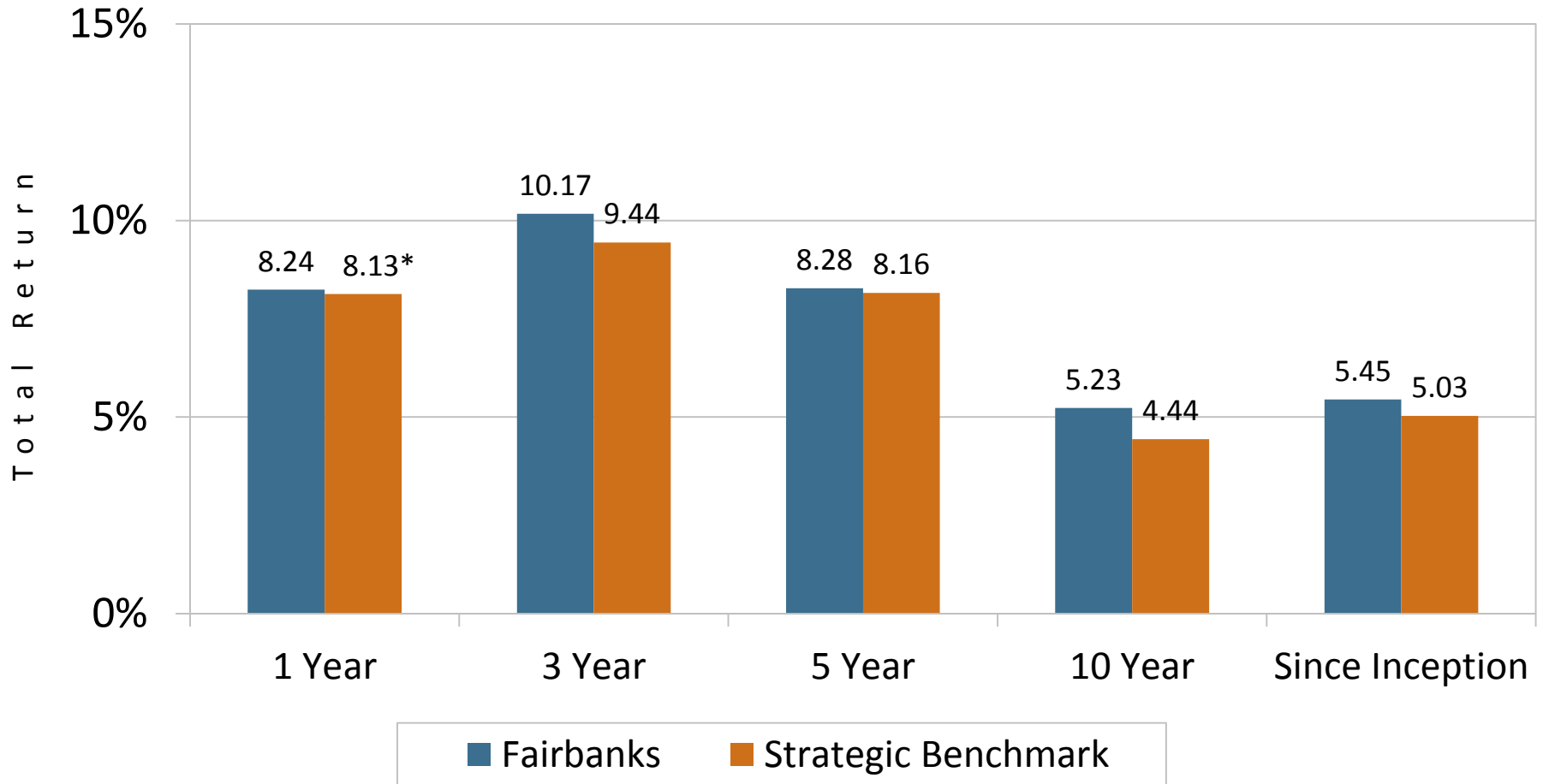

Subject: Compliance

During this year's audit of the Permanent Fund the question was raised as to exactly how does the Finance Department know the Fund was in compliance with the various restrictions contained in the authorizing ordinances and resolutions. While the auditor's questions were answered it became apparent that a more formalized compliance system would make this question mute.

Nine specific compliance questions have been identified and it is recommended that a compliance appendix be included at each quarterly meeting illustrating that the Fund meets all of the respective criteria. The identified nine items are as follows:

1. Equity and Fixed-income limitations as well as range limitations within the two categories.
2. Corporate debt limitation of 30% of total portfolio market value.
3. Limitation on the purchase of any bond in excess of 600 basis points above a comparable duration US treasury.
4. Limitation on the purchase of any CMBS after January 1, 2009.
5. Ratings and downgrade limitations on corporate securities.
6. Five percent limitation on any one security (total portfolio).
7. Ten percent limitation on Baa rated securities (fixed income portfolio).
8. Duration constraint of between 80-120 percent of the Barclays Aggregate.
9. Twenty-Five percent industry limitation (total portfolio).

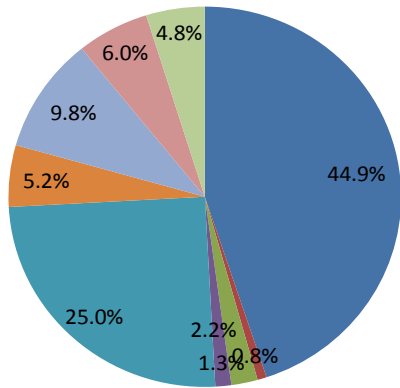

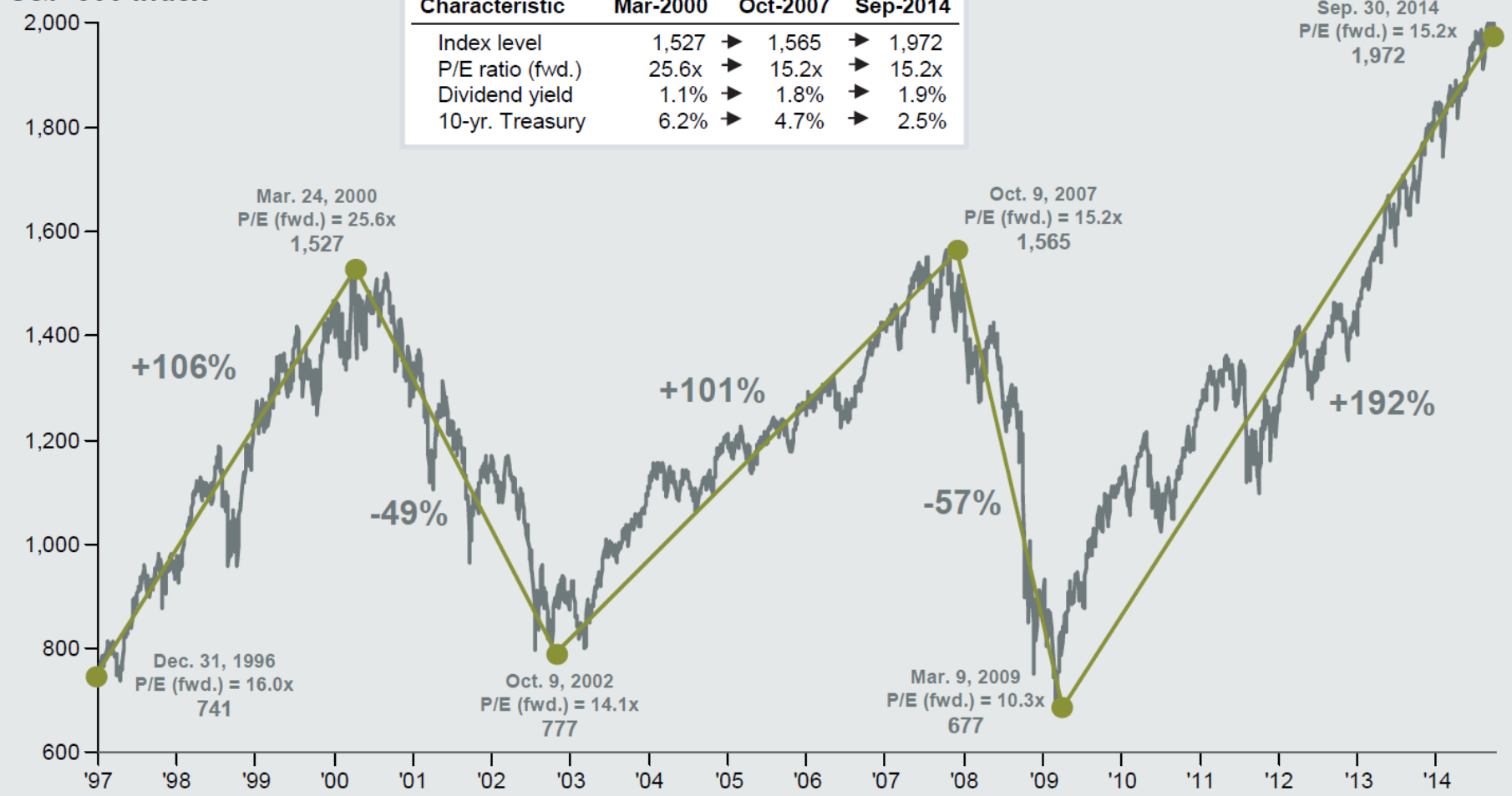

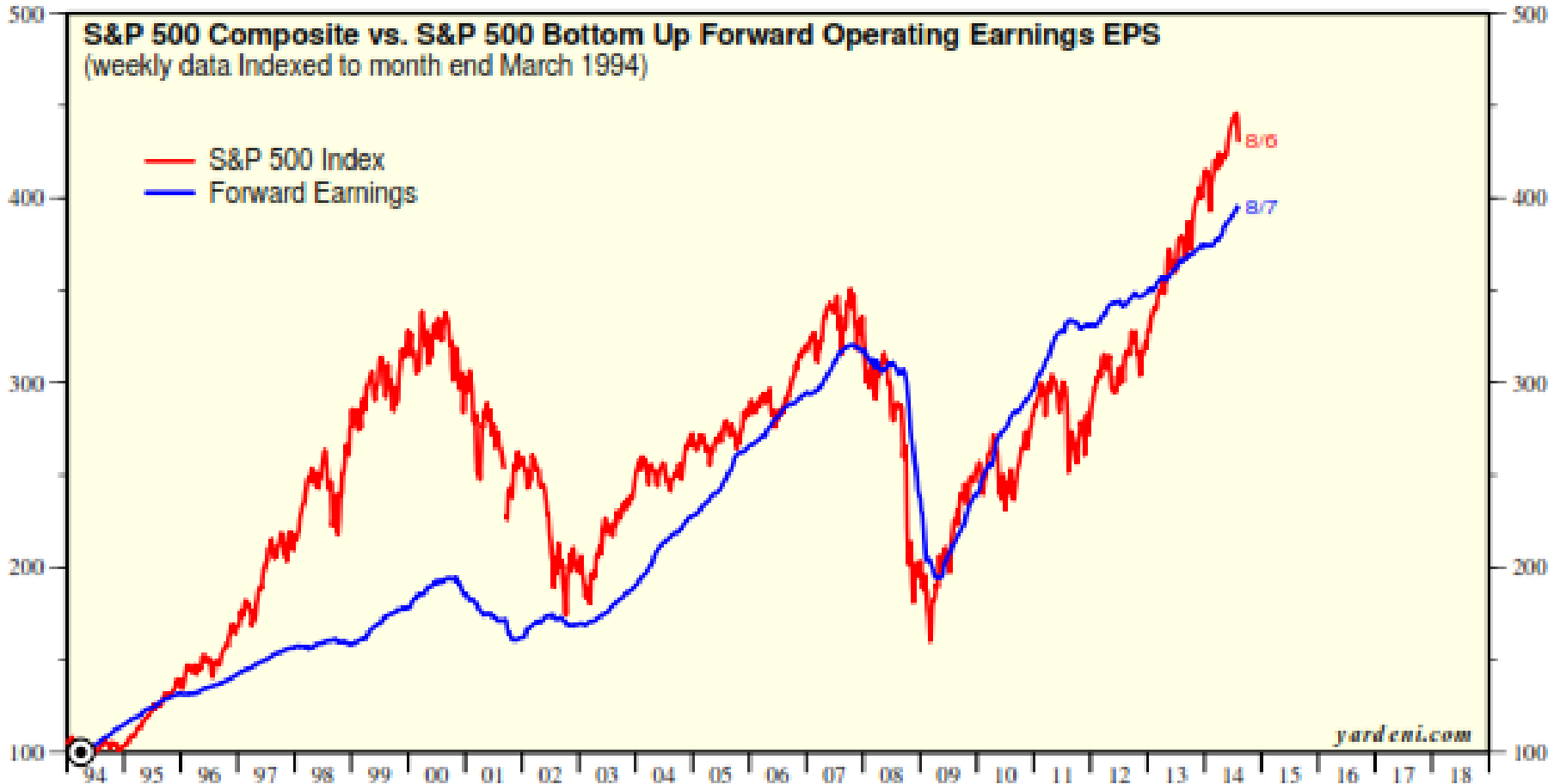
S&P 500 Index

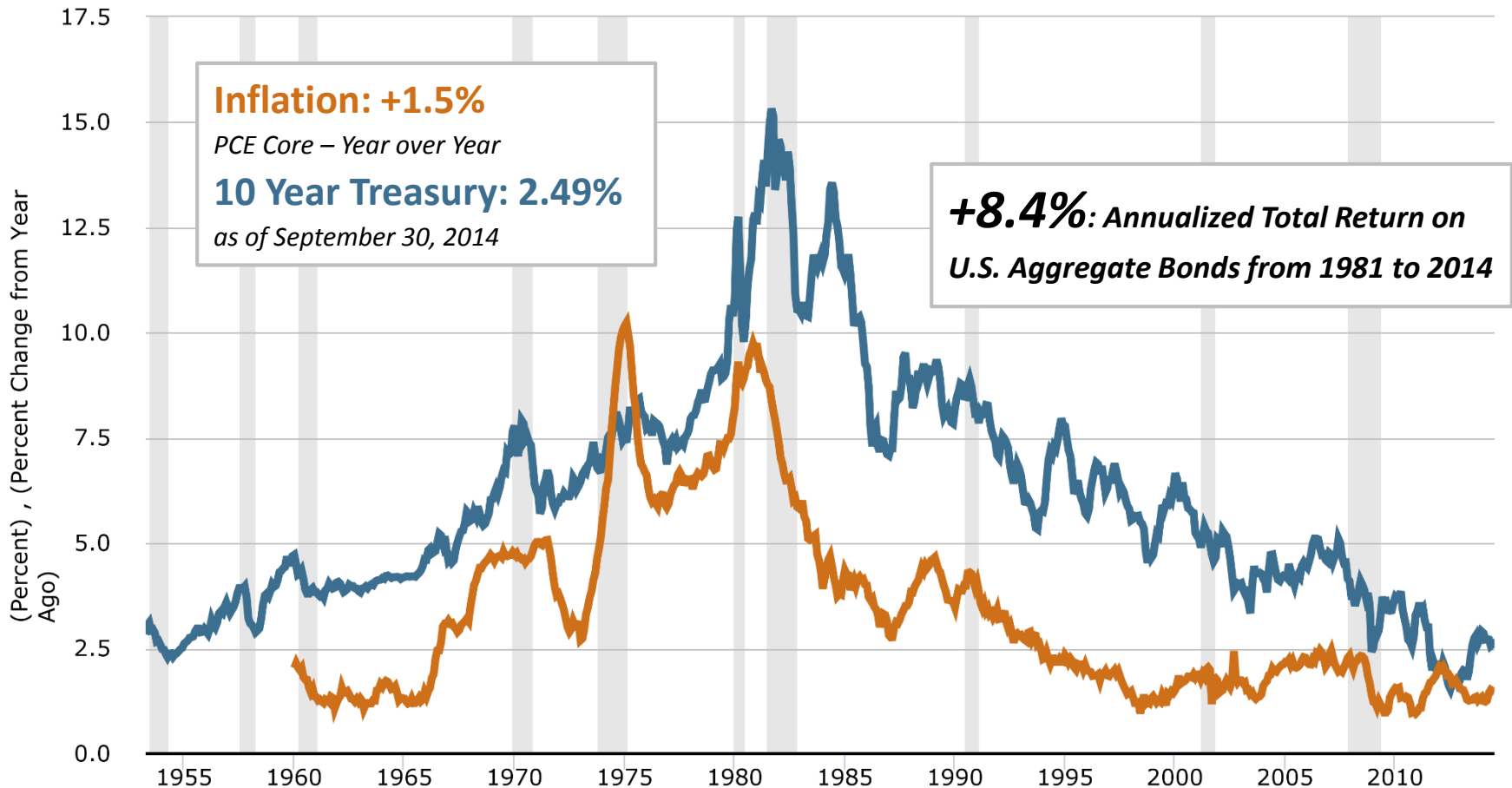

- Personal Consumption Expenditures Excluding Food and Energy (Chain-Type Price Index)

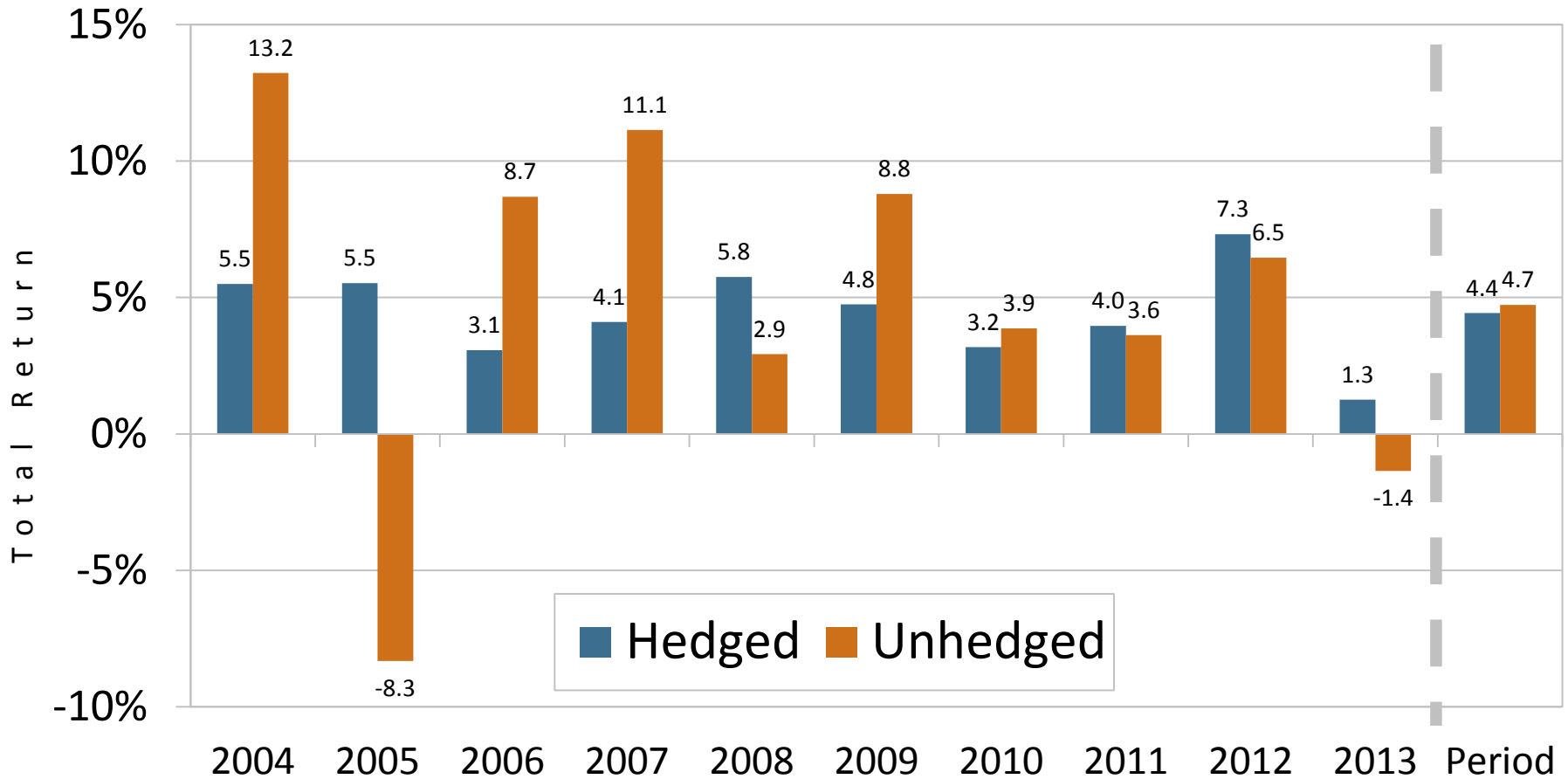

Public Works – Mike Smetzer, Director of COF PW

- Summer rains have caused a considerable amount of damage to area roads and will require a complete survey in the fall with a recommendation for priorities for next year.
- This is the third year in a row with over \$20 million in road construction (the average year being \$8-10 million) resulting in crews working 60-70 hrs a week.
- The 3rd Avenue widening project is stalled. South Cushman project is on schedule and the construction has been completed in the Lemeta area.
- Speed bumps in Aurora have been requested, with 75% of the people in the neighborhood in support. Will depend on funding by legislature.
- Big projects next year will be Cushman (Airport to River), along with 4th to 7th Avenues between Barnette & State

FECC – No representative

FPD – Chief Zager retired as of July 1st and has moved to Orlando. Acting Chief Brad Johnson reviewed the FPD stats. Two PSA's have been hired and are in training, with the 3rd position yet to be filled.

FFD – Chief Cummins reviewed the FFD stats. Other things of note:

- Seven fires have been caused recently by the improper disposal of smoking materials.
- Final physical abilities (CPAT) testing for recruit firefighters has been completed and will be forwarding recommendations for filling current vacancies to the Mayor.
- Heavy Rescue is expected to arrive by end of September, with the final inspection to occur by end of the month.
- Received a grant for 8 sets of cold weather gear and radio holsters. Also received a grant for smoke and CO detectors which are been targeted for installation in the Lakeview area. The City

has requested funding of various projects and training through the State Homeland Security Program grant – expect to have funding notification in September.

- AC Misewicz showed a short PowerPoint summarizing the Geraghty Street fire in January.

SRO's – There has been no word from the school district that they plan to continue the program. A motion by Chiu, seconded by Temple unanimously passed in support of the program, and the Mayor's office will be contacting them with that information, as well as that the COF through the FPD is willing to contract for SRO's.

FNA Detox – Steve Ginnis, Executive Director – Fairbanks Native Association

- Thanked the Mayor and the Council for expanding the CSP program
- FNA runs a variety of programs, with the Detox Center being one. These programs do not just serve the native population, but are open to everyone and in fact primarily serve non-natives.
- The program is state funded, but that funding has been flat for over 5 years. Difficult to raise any \$\$ from program as most cannot pay and without the Medicaid Expansion in Alaska, young people receiving services are not eligible for state assistance. Revenue from clients covered by state is very slow in coming as private contractor is handling billing.
- Detox Center is 16-bed facility but does not have sufficient staff to fill all 16 beds all the time. Also must serve the entire state. Also impacted by shut down of Fairbanks Behavioral Health.
- Increase in heroin use and limited resources for mental health are having an impact on demand.
- Significant gaps in continuity of care, sees need for coordination of agencies and governments. Need for transitional housing which does not exist in Fairbanks. Community approach needed with all stakeholders involved.

Surveillance & Swat Deployment – Acting Police Chief Brad Johnson

- The Fairbanks Police Department does not have any monitors installed across the city. Electronic monitoring is limited to a specific warrant for a specific case. FPD does have video cameras in its vehicles. There are private video cameras in the area, but no one has access to live feeds. The “cameras” at intersections are actually not cameras, they do not have any video or photo capabilities – they are motion sensors only to assist with traffic flow.
- SWAT team is used for warrant services when needed, and of course may be called to handle a specific scenario or event.

DEPARTMENT REPORTS:

FECC – Director Johnson reported that they have a new dispatcher starting training. The new system has increased reporting information, and she reviewed current stats. FFD is in the process of installing MCT's similar to what FFD has been using for several years. This will allow recording of times to be activated by the units, as well as provide them with up to date information and additional resources while in the field. Other area agencies being dispatched through FECC are implementing a similar program called Freedom App that runs on iPads.

911 Database is owned by the FNSB, and they are currently working with ACS to resolve issues related to fees for phone identification data. ACS currently provides about 30% of the caller information (landline) while the remaining 70% is free from wireless providers.

FFD – Chief Cumming reviewed the FFD stats. Other things of note: Lakeview free smoke/co detector installation project has been completed. Heavy Rescue has final inspection next month and should be here in December. A Ford F550 Truck has been purchased as a tow vehicle for various COF trailers. It will be housed at City Garage. FFD is changing from Firehouse to ImageTrend, with a target go-live date of January 1, 2015. Heavy rainfall has increased water levels, impacting hydrants & river rescues. The 2014 Preparedness Expo sponsored by the FEPC was attended by about 650 people and 38 vendors participated. This is an annual event to educate the community on preparing for disasters. The 2013 Annual report was handed out.

FPD – Acting Chief Brad Johnson reviewed FPD statistics. July and August saw significant traffic enforcement, however in September there was lots of leave and staff out of town. Discussion regarding certain types of events and how reported. The SRO program has been resurrected for the next four years. Officer Lewis will return to West Valley and a new SRO will be assigned to Lathrop. The new Police Chief will start December 1st.

OLD BUSINESS: None

CLOSING COMMENTS: Mayor Eberhart said that all vacancies for commissions and committees are being advertised. If your term is up and you are interested in continuing to serve on the Public Safety Commission, you need to reapply. Expanded role of CSP now covers from 8:00am to 3:30am, with September recording a historic high for number of CSP transports in a month. His hope is that this expanded service will relieve the police and fire departments of some of the Title 47 work load. Current funding for CSP is secure, but more work needs to be done to secure long term funding, rather than year to year.

Next Meeting: Special November 17th at FPD to discuss summarizing findings regarding impact of Chronic Inebriates on the Community and prepare a report for the Mayor and Council. Regular Quarterly Meeting on January 13, 2015 at Fairbanks Fire Department.

APPROVAL OF PREVIOUS MINUTES

a) Regular Meeting Minutes of October 1, 2014.

Ms. Castle, seconded by **Mr. Erickson**, moved to APPROVE the Regular Meeting Minutes of October 1, 2014.

Chair Robertson called for objection and, hearing none, so ORDERED.

APPROVAL OF AGENDA

Mr. Erickson, seconded by **Ms. Warbelow-Tack**, moved to APPROVE the Agenda.

Ms. Castle requested that the following items be added under New Business:

- Item (b) – Rex Fisher’s Miner List
- Item (c) – History of Clay Street Cemetery

No members objected to the proposed changes to the Agenda.

CITIZEN’S COMMENTS

Chair Robertson called for Public Testimony and, hearing none, declared Public Testimony closed.

COMMUNICATIONS TO COMMISSION

a) Resignation Letter from David Pruhs

Chair Robertson stated that Mr. Pruhs has resigned from the Commission because he has been elected to serve on the City Council.

b) Welcome Letter to New Member, Jevon Stone

Chair Robertson welcomed Mr. Stone to the Commission and thanked him for all the work he has done at the Cemetery.

c) \$2,500 Donation by Doyon Utilities

Chair Robertson stated that he still plans to do a “grip and grin” for the newspaper with Mayor Eberhart and a representative from Doyon Utilities.

Ms. Castle asked if there are any stipulations on how the funds may be spent.

Chair Robertson stated that the funds may be used to purchase markers and placement supplies.

d) Updated Member Roster

Chair Robertson stated that the roster includes updated information on all seven members.

UNFINISHED BUSINESS

a) Commission Rules of Procedure Draft (updated December 11, 2014)

Chair Robertson stated that he would like to postpone the Rules of Procedure Draft until the next regular meeting because he intends to discuss some of the items with Mayor Eberhart.

Chair Robertson, seconded by **Mr. Erickson**, moved to POSTPONE the Commission Rules of Procedure Draft until the Regular Meeting of February 4, 2015.

Ms. Castle stated that there are sections of the draft that have not even been discussed by the Commission. She inquired about Chair Robertson’s need to talk to the Mayor about the Rules of Procedure.

Chair Robertson stated that there may be some changes after he speaks with the Mayor and indicated that he would like to wait until after that discussion to adopt the Rules of Procedure. He stated that the Commission may still discuss the draft.

Deputy Clerk Snider stated that Ms. Castle listened to the audio from the meeting where the Rules of Procedure was discussed and incorporated the Commission’s changes into the presented draft. Ms. Snider distributed another copy of the draft showing her recommendations in red.

Ms. Castle pointed out that there was no “Officers” section in the original rules and that she drafted new language based on the members’ comments at the last meeting it was discussed.

Members reviewed the draft and incorporated Ms. Snider’s recommendations. Members agreed to require a majority rather than two-thirds of the membership for a quorum or to take action.

b) Pending Placement – April Schumacher

Mr. Turney reported that he contacted Donny Burnette regarding the Schumacher placement and shared that he will meet with him over the weekend.

Ms. Castle stated that she spoke with former Commission Member, Joanie Skilbred, who told her that the location of Schumacher's temporary placements may be accurate. She stated that Ms. Schumacher had spoken with Ms. Skilbred before placing the items at the Cemetery.

Chair Robertson stated that a burial needs to be confirmed at that exact location of placement before letting the issue rest.

Ms. Castle stated that there are two burials mapped at that location marked as "unknown."

Chair Robertson suggested that the Commission ask the University to help confirm burials that are in question.

Ms. Ripley asked if the Commission allows temporary placements and whether procedures have been established on how to deal with them.

Ms. Castle stated that the current placement policy addresses only permanent placements.

Ms. Ripley volunteered to revise the placement policy to address temporary items. She stated that she will present a draft at the February meeting.

Ms. Warbelow-Tack asked if the Commission sometimes replaces old markers and expressed concern that markers placed by next of kin are being replaced.

Members clarified that privately-placed markers are not being replaced and that any permanent markers placed by family members will remain in the Cemetery.

Ms. Warbelow-Tack asked if Ms. Schumacher would be permitted to place permanent markers if she wished to do so.

Members commented that Ms. Schumacher may do so if an application for placement is submitted to and approved by the Commission.

Mr. Erickson commented that the placement of private markers should be approved by the next of kin, if applicable.

c) Exhumation of Chief Nagita

Mr. Turney stated that prior to the establishment of the Clay Street Cemetery Commission, Chief Nagita was exhumed from the Cemetery. He stated that he recently spoke with Mr. and Mrs. Ketzler (relatives of Chief Nagita) who claim that the DNA from the body exhumed did not match Nagita's DNA. **Mr. Turney** stated that he is trying to identify where the remains of the exhumed body are located and that he has heard that the remains are at the University of Alaska,

Fairbanks (UAF). He commented that if that is true, it would have been nice if UAF would have notified the City. **Mr. Turney** stated that he believes the exhumed body is actually August Anderson.

Ms. Ripley suggested that the Commission send a letter to UAF to inquire about the exhumation and remains. She asked when the body was removed from Clay Street Cemetery.

Mr. Turney expressed his belief that it is the Commission's responsibility to replace the body at the Cemetery. He stated that the exhumation took place about 6 – 7 years ago.

Chair Robertson asked Mr. Turney to draft a general letter to the Ketzlers and UAF on behalf of the Commission requesting more information about the exhumation.

NEW BUSINESS

a) Standardized Letter for Unapproved Placements

Ms. Snider presented the draft of the standardized letter to the Commission.

Chair Robertson stated that the Commission can keep the letter on file for future use.

b) Rex Fisher's Miner List

Ms. Castle distributed a spreadsheet she created based on Mr. Rex Fisher's list of miner burials from 1917 – 1959. She explained her notations on the spreadsheet and stated that some of the miners on the list are buried at Birch Hill Cemetery or have unknown burial locations. She stated that Mr. Fisher has expressed interest in marker placement for the miners on the list. **Ms. Castle** added that Mr. Fisher also suggested using the old-style wooden markers for the miners and she distributed a photo of what the original wooden markers looked like. She stated that the list is for informational purposes only at this point.

c) History of Clay Street Cemetery

Ms. Castle stated that she has been going through historic City Council Meeting minutes starting with the year 1903 and has created a log of each time the minutes mention the Clay Street Cemetery. She distributed a copy of the log to each member. **Ms. Castle** indicated that the document will grow as she continues to research.

OPEN AGENDA

Ms. Castle stated that she has not heard any information about the Commission's application for Hotel/Motel Discretionary Funds.

Chair Robertson replied that the Commission requested \$15,000 and received \$7,500 in grant dollars. He stated that the stated purpose of the funds is for the purchase of granite markers and placement supplies. He commented that all donated funds are designated for the purchase and replacement of markers at the Clay Street Cemetery. **Chair Robertson** stated that he has submitted a request to the City's Public Works Department for concrete bases for future markers.

He stated that he is currently working on three more potential donors to the Commission. **Chair Robertson** added that there are forty markers in the shed at the Cemetery waiting to be placed in the summer.

Mr. Stone stated that there are two or three scouts that will need to work on an Eagle Scout projects this summer and that they all seem interested in working at the Cemetery. He explained that when the time draws nearer, the projects will have to be pre-approved by the Scout Council. **Mr. Stone** shared that one scout will reach his age limit deadline at the end of June and would like to complete his project in mid-to-late June.

Chair Robertson stated that he would like to talk to the Mayor about changing the name of the Clay Street Cemetery Commission to Clay Street Cemetery Restoration Commission. He commented that the name would draw more attention to the Commission and may also help increase donations.

Ms. Ripley stated that since she changed jobs, she will send new contact information to Members. She commented that she would like to give Chair Robertson's suggestion of a name change some more thought and expressed some support for the idea.

Ms. Warbelow-Tack stated that the suggested title seems temporary in nature because of the addition of the word "restoration." She commented that she is afraid that issues like the exhumation of Chief Nagita would be missed if the theme and purpose of the Commission was primarily restoration. She stated that the name change could have potential for a number of problems.

Members discussed ideas for events that may attract more attention to the Clay Street Cemetery Commission.

Ms. Castle stated that she has been talking to the Elks and reminded Members that there was discussion at a previous meeting about asking groups if they would be interested in marker placement for their respective areas at the Cemetery.

Members discussed activity on www.findagrave.com and the various groups represented at the Cemetery.

Mr. Turney reminded Members that Private John White's marker needs some repair.

Ms. Warbelow-Tack stated that she feels that she is not a great member of the Commission. She commented that she has frequently been absent and that she will be even busier during the summer months. She stated that if others are interested in serving she would like to give them the opportunity to take her place on the Commission.

Ms. Ripley requested that a permanent item be added to Clay Street Cemetery Commission agenda that would direct discussion towards the promotion of events and public relations. No members objected to the addition of a new agenda item titled "Events & Public Relations."

NEXT MEETING DATE

The next Regular Meeting of the Clay Street Cemetery Commission is scheduled for February 4, 2015.




