FAIRBANKS CITY COUNCIL REGULAR MEETING MINUTES, SEPTEMBER 8, 2014 FAIRBANKS CITY COUNCIL CHAMBERS 800 CUSHMAN STREET, FAIRBANKS, ALASKA

The City Council convened at 7:00 p.m. on the above date, following a 6:00 p.m. Work Session with the Interior Alaska Natural Gas Utility (IANGU) Board, to conduct a Regular Meeting of the Fairbanks City Council at the City Council Chambers, 800 Cushman Street, Fairbanks, Alaska, with Mayor John Eberhart presiding and with the following Council Members in attendance:

INVOCATION

The Invocation was given by City Clerk Janey Hovenden.

FLAG SALUTATION

Mayor Eberhart led the Flag Salutation.

APPROVAL OF AGENDA AND CONSENT AGENDA

Mayor Eberhart called for objection to the APPROVAL of the Agenda and, hearing none, so ORDERED.

City Clerk Hovenden read the Consent Agenda into the record.

CITIZEN'S COMMENTS

Frank Turney, 329 6th Avenue, Fairbanks – Mr. Turney stated that while he was in Reston, Virginia recently, he took the opportunity to go to the U.S. Congress. He thanked Oregon Senator Ron Wyden and Kentucky Representative Thomas Massie for sponsoring the House and Senate bills supporting the Industrial Hemp Act. He stated that the Fairbanks City Council was the first in the State of Alaska to pass a resolution in support of the use of industrial hemp. Mr. Turney commented on the photo that Clay Street Cemetery Commissioner Kate Ripley submitted to the News Miner and stated that the recent improvements to the cemetery, with the help of the community, have made a big difference. He thanked former Mayor Strle for creating the Clay Street Cemetery Commission. Mr. Turney spoke to the multiple calls of a shooting threat that were received by the Fairbanks Police Department (FPD) at the last regular Council meeting. He indicated that the inability of FPD to track the calls raises suspicion, since the calls were received during the consideration of the Public Safety Employees Association (PSEA) labor contract. He recommended that the Mayor and Council listen to the recorded calls. Mr. Turney asked Mayor Eberhart how much the City is willing to pay to defend him in the Alaska Public Offices Commission (APOC) v. Eberhart case, referring to the whole issue as a fiasco. He stated that he does not want the \$37.50 APOC fine to haunt Mayor Eberhart throughout his term as City Mayor. He spoke in favor of the production of industrial hemp.

Mr. Hilling asked Mr. Turney to elaborate on his comments regarding his suspicious of FPD due to the events at the last Council meeting.

Mr. Turney explained that he thought it was "convenient" that the shooting threat occurred during the consideration of the PSEA labor contract. He suggested that the threat was a ruse.

Mystiek Lockery, 1870 Dawson Road, North Pole – Ms. Lockery spoke in favor of the legalization of marijuana. She stated that she has created a website dedicated to the truthful information about marijuana titled, "Marijuana, the Truth of the Matter." She read aloud a handout she drafted for the Council speaking to the content of the website and the reliability of the information. She stated that she is promoting her ideas because she believes them to be true and encouraged everyone to view the website.

Barb Schneider, 1223 2nd Avenue, Fairbanks – Ms. Schneider stated that she has lived in Fairbanks for 63 years and that this is the first time she has felt compelled to attend a City Council meeting. She expressed her disgust with the APOC v. Eberhart issue. She stated that she was surprised to read in the newspaper that Mayor Eberhart had hired outside legal counsel that has already cost thousands of dollars to make a point about a \$37.50 APOC fine. Ms. Schneider stated that she is almost certain that there will be a much more considerable attorney bill over the course of the appeal. She stated that the appeal is frivolous and the fine picayune. She stated that having been a legal secretary for over 30 years, she understands what happens when one party has deep pockets. Ms. Schneider asked Mayor Eberhart why he did not use the City's Attorney if he thought it necessary to file the appeal. She asked Mayor Eberhart if his desire to be vindicated from a small fine overshadows the taxpayers' right to have their tax dollars handled in a responsible and prudent way. Ms. Schneider stated that any Council Member who voted to support the City's representation of Mayor Eberhart in the APOC case should be removed from office.

Candy Carroll, 1221 3rd Avenue, Fairbanks – Ms. Carroll encouraged the City Council to revisit the PSEA contract. She stated that she hopes the Council has been unaware of the Mayor's decision to spend over \$7,000 in taxpayer dollars in outside counsel to defend a \$37.50 fine. Ms. Carroll read aloud the City of Fairbanks' mission statement and emphasized the portion that speaks to the City's goal to provide "sound management of community assets." She spoke to the debate between Mayor Eberhart and Ms. Stiver during the 2013 Election campaign and to Mayor Eberhart's clear misuse of City resources during that time. Ms. Carroll expressed her belief that Mayor Eberhart should be recalled from his position for embarrassing the City of Fairbanks and for misusing City resources. She offered to write a personal check made payable to APOC in the amount of \$37.50 if it would stop the litigation. She guaranteed that if any of the seated Council Members attempt to run for public office in the future, she would make it a personal mission to remind the community of this specific misuse of taxpayer dollars by the City of Fairbanks. Ms. Carroll stated that if the litigation continues, City residents should start a recall petition to remove Mayor Eberhart from office before any more taxpayer dollars are wasted. She reminded elected officials that, "Just because you can doesn't mean you should."

<u>April Monroe Frick, 635 Fox Hollow Lane, Fairbanks</u> – Ms. Frick thanked Mayor Eberhart for taking the position that there should be a federal investigation of the Fairbanks Four case. She applauded the Mayor and the City Council stating that it was an honest and brave choice in the goal towards transparency. She stated that the action is also a financially responsible one in that honesty limits liability.

Michael Walleri, 2518 Riverview Drive, Fairbanks - Mr. Walleri stated that in his 35-year experience practicing law, he is always amazed at the media's coverage on cases such as this. He commented that press coverage is not always a good estimation of what is really happening. He stated that the APOC v. Eberhart matter is really about one of the major issues going on in the United States, the freedom of speech. He stated that two recent decisions of the Supreme Court stated that the "ankle-biting" going on in elections today is not necessarily constitutional. Mr. Walleri stated that the complaints filed with APOC and the Ethics Committee over minor matters discourage free speech. He commented that if Americans want to live in a country that honors free speech they need to stop government overreach. Mr. Walleri remarked that there have been more complaints filed with APOC than with the Federal Election Commission who is on a national level. He stated that the majority of APOC complaints are over minor matters with minor fine amounts, such as the \$37.50 fine discussed earlier. He spoke to the Lowell v. Hayes case several years ago in which a City of Fairbanks mayor made a statement to legislators accusing Lowell of perjury. He stated that the whole case came down to an apology, not money, and that the City's legal department defended the rights of that mayor all the way to the Alaska Supreme Court. Mr. Walleri suggested that the recent outcry from the public over the Eberhart v. APOC case may be politically motivated. He also suggested that Ms. Gilbert filed the APOC complaint in retaliation against Mr. Arnold and Ms. O'Neall.

<u>Vivian Stiver</u>, 523 2nd Avenue, Fairbanks – Ms. Stiver stated that she contacted the Alaska Municipal League (AML) and asked them about the law in reference to the APOC v. Eberhart case because she was curious whether AML was in support of an elected official using municipal equipment during a campaign. She addressed the public, warning them that they need to wake up. Ms. Stiver commented that Mr. Walleri's suggestion that the public outcry may be politically motivated is outrageous. She spoke to the filing of the APOC complaint by the Eberhart campaign right before the 2013 Municipal Election. Ms. Stiver stated that it made her

sick when the Eberhart campaign cast doubt upon her and implied that she was racially prejudiced. She spoke to the shame that Mayor Eberhart has brought upon the Fairbanks community on a national level and stated that she cannot tolerate the dismissal of public outcry.

Lee Despain, 352 Driveway Street, Fairbanks – Mr. Despain commended Mayor Eberhart for instituting the investigation into the Fairbanks Four case. He briefly spoke to the history of Mayor Eberhart's employment as an attorney for the City of Fairbanks. He stated that Mr. Eberhart spent millions of taxpayer dollars unsuccessfully defending the City in the City of Fairbanks v. Rice/Despain case a number of years ago. He referred to the APOC v. Eberhart case as a joke. He stated that although he is unsure of the dollar amount spent in the Rice/Despain case due to poor bookkeeping at that time, he is confident that it was millions of taxpayer dollars. Mr. Despain questioned why Mayor Eberhart is not personally funding his fight in the case against APOC, then request reimbursement from the City after it is over. He stated that Mayor Eberhart has a history of spending large amounts of taxpayer dollars on "goose chases" without apology.

<u>Tillila Beetus, 2225 Rickert Street, Fairbanks</u> – Ms. Beetus thanked Mayor Eberhart on behalf of her family and friends for supporting an investigation of the Fairbanks Four case.

Scott McCrea, 2965 Westgate Place, Fairbanks – Mr. McCrea stated that he is the Director of Tourism for Explore Fairbanks. He updated the Council on what has been happening in the tourism industry in Fairbanks. He spoke to how the tourism department operates and presented the most recent publishing of Explore Fairbanks' Group Tour Manual. Mr. McCrea spoke specifically to the rapidly-growing familiarization (FAM) tours and explained that these types of tours bring travel agents or group operators to Fairbanks to showcase what the community has to offer for their clients. He shared that Fairbanks has already entered the aurora season when the northern lights are visible. Mr. McCrea thanked the Council for reinvesting bed tax dollars into destination marketing.

Misty Nickoli, 320 Faith Lane, Fairbanks – Ms. Nickoli expressed thanks to Mayor Eberhart for supporting a federal investigation of the Fairbanks Four case. She stated that by doing so, it sends a message to Fairbanks citizens that justice is a primary concern of City government and that our freedom cannot be threatened without just cause.

Ron Kovalik, PO Box 72563, Fairbanks – Mr. Kovalik quoted H.L. Menckens' statement that "Decent men are ashamed of the government they live under." He stated that local government officials should quit pretending to serve the citizens and suggested that their mission is to abuse and enslave taxpayers by tightening the stranglehold on the ballot box. Mr. Kovalik spoke to the corruption in local elections stating that the "payrollees" decide who gets elected. He expressed his disgust that a citizen cannot get elected unless they violate the rules.

<u>Donna Gilbert</u>, 2223 South Cushman Street, Fairbanks – Ms. Gilbert stated that Eberhart's campaign started the retaliation when they filed an APOC complaint against her and Ms. Stiver during the campaign. She stated that when she and Ms. Stiver were each fined \$650 they willingly paid the penalties. Ms. Gilbert stated that it is illegal for a candidate to use City equipment in a campaign and suggested that Mayor Eberhart knowingly violated City Code. She stated that Mayor Eberhart should own up to his mistake and pay the fine. Ms. Gilbert stated that if City Attorney Ewers indemnified Mayor Eberhart for knowingly breaking a law then the City

needs a new attorney. She stated that indemnification should be reserved for those who have unknowingly made a mistake. She read aloud a portion of an emailed request from then mayoral candidate John Eberhart to the City Clerk.

<u>Chick Wallace</u>, 80 B Street, Fairbanks – Mr. Wallace spoke in shock that the City had already paid over \$7,000 to defend Mayor Eberhart over a fine of \$37.50. He chastised the City Council for being unwise stewards of City money and expressed his opinion that the issue is absurd and is not about the freedom of speech. He suggested that Mayor Eberhart repay the City for attorney fees in the APOC v. Eberhart case. Mr. Wallace expressed his outrage that the City Council is allowing the situation to perpetuate and asked who selected Mr. Walleri to defend Mayor Eberhart.

<u>Hazel Mayo, 1031 26th Avenue, Fairbanks</u> – Ms. Mayo thanked Mayor Eberhart for seeking justice in the Fairbanks Four case. She stated that she prays the City Council feels the same.

<u>Princess Lucaj</u> – Ms. Lucaj stated that she has never attended a City Hall meeting, but that she is giving testimony because she cares deeply about social justice. She commended Mayor Eberhart for supporting a federal investigation of the Fairbanks Four case. Ms. Lucaj stated that she wished the Fairbanks Four case had received national news coverage like the APOC v. Eberhart case because it is about the lives of four young men. She spoke to her own experiences with racism as an Alaska Native and spoke to racial injustice as being a statewide issue. Ms. Lucaj expressed disappointment that she had to hear all the personal accusations being delivered at her first City Hall experience. She stated that she hopes true justice is brought in the case of the Fairbanks Four.

Robert Fox, 843 5th Avenue, Fairbanks – Mr. Fox stated that earlier comments on the APOC fine reflect his feelings about the issue. He stated that City taxpayers have been unfairly put on the hook and that he does not believe it is an issue of free speech. He recommended that the Council and Mayor Eberhart take a step back and reconsider who should pay for the fine. Mr. Fox spoke briefly to labor negotiations, stating that he is strongly opposed to allowing the police department to move to a 36-hour work week.

Skye Malemute, 5095 George Nelson Avenue, Fairbanks – Ms. Malemute thanked Mayor Eberhart for speaking out on behalf of the Fairbanks Four, four men who have been behind bars for 17 years. She compared the amount of taxpayer dollars being spent on the current APOC v. Eberhart issue versus how much of the taxpayer's money was spent to wrongfully convict four innocent men. Ms. Malemute stated that she has fought for her country and has done two tours to Iraq. She stated that she is ashamed to have fought for a community of people who cannot come together and speak to each other with respect. She stated that the four innocent men in prison have missed out on their children and grandchildren's lives and suggested that those present put things into perspective. Ms. Malemute spoke to another case where a man was suspected of committing a murder in Anchorage although he was in Las Vegas with his family at the time of the crime. She thanked the media who come forward and respect all sides of a story and tell the truth. Ms. Malemute commented on the childish remarks being made in the room while other people were speaking during the evening's meeting and stated that people should respect one another even when they disagree.

<u>Terra Sipple, PO Box 83903, Fairbanks</u> – Ms. Sipple commented that anyone who runs for public office should expect criticism. She expressed her support and respect for Mayor Eberhart.

<u>Tim Staton, 4636 Fairchild Avenue</u> – Mr. Staton stated his support for Mr. Matherly's reconsideration of the police contract. He encouraged the Council to also support the reconsideration.

<u>David Pruhs, 324 Brandt Street, Fairbanks</u> – Mr. Pruhs spoke in support of Ordinance No. 5954. He stated that the Yukon Quest organization has taken good care of the City-owned property and that they represent the flavor of Fairbanks. He stated that the Yukon Quest deserves the opportunity to stay in the cabin.

Mayor Eberhart clarified that the Motion to Suspend the Rules and Ordinances 5954, 5955 and 5956 are up for second reading and will come up under Unfinished Business.

Adrienne Titus, 2345 Maria Street, Fairbanks – Ms. Titus read aloud a quote and commended Mayor Eberhart and everyone who supported the federal investigation of the Fairbanks Four case. She stated that she calls Fairbanks home and that she believes it is a safe place to raise a family. Ms. Titus expressed her belief that the movement will ground young men and make them feel secure that more injustice will not be done.

<u>Victor Buberge, PO Box 58192, Fairbanks</u> – Mr. Buberge stated that the potholes on 10th Avenue were repaired very quickly after the road reconstruction near Raven Landing was completed. He indicated that Gilmore Street needs a great deal of pothole repair and suggested that the repairs are not being done because it is a low-income housing area. Mr. Buberge stated that the \$37.50 APOC fine is pathetic and added that the City should not be liable for the litigation costs. He suggested that Mayor Eberhart should have struck a deal with APOC because of his experience in law and arbitration to save City taxpayers' money.

<u>Nate Brown, 1430 102nd Street, #3, Fort Wainwright</u> – Mr. Brown stated that he came to the meeting because he was concerned after reading some articles in the News Miner. He stated that he is humbled by those present who spoke on behalf of the Fairbanks Four and expressed agreement that there are bigger issues to be concerned with than a \$37.50 fine. Mr. Brown stated that he voted for Mayor Eberhart and that the APOC issue stinks of politics. He stated that he will support Mayor Eberhart until he is proven guilty and also expressed his support for the investigation of the Fairbanks Four case.

Gloria Desrochers, 113 Cowles Street, Fairbanks – Ms. Desrochers stated that someone in leadership seems to be hiding behind their power. She spoke against Mayor Eberhart's fight against APOC and stated that he should not be allowing City taxpayers to pay the bill.

Hearing no more requests for public comment, **Mayor Eberhart** declared Public Testimony closed.

MAYOR'S COMMENTS AND REPORT

Mayor Eberhart, in response to Mr. Turney's question about the threatening phone calls at the last Council Meeting, commented that the calls came from Google phone. He stated that the

police department has not been able to trace the calls but indicated that they are attempting to obtain a search warrant for Google. Mayor Eberhart addressed the APOC issue and stated that the matter is not about the \$37.50 but is about unrestrained government and an out-of-control government agency. He stated that the APOC staff report did not support Ms. Gilbert's allegations and commented that the matter should have been dismissed. He likened APOC's investigation to a fishing expedition, stating that they contacted the City Clerk and requested all his sent emails for a period of about six months. He explained that the Clerk fulfilled the request with 99 emails and withheld one as privileged. Mayor Eberhart stated that APOC staff focused on one email in which he had asked City Clerk Hovenden to produce a list of ordinances and resolutions that he and Ms. Stiver had sponsored, respectively. He explained that the APOC report stated that the email *could* have influenced the election, but that APOC did not find any evidence that he actually used the information during his campaign. Mayor Eberhart stated that he has tried numerous times to settle the issue for an amount in excess of \$37.50 without any admission of wrongdoing, but indicated that APOC has refused. He stated that the accusation against him could be considered quasi-criminal in nature and that he is choosing to fight it because he believes APOC was wrong, unreasonable and arbitrary and inconsistent in their decision-making. He commented that APOC has a pattern of levying small fines so that most individuals cannot afford to fight them. He stated that he agrees with Ms. Stiver that APOC should focus more on education and corrective action versus "gotcha politics." Eberhart stated that because APOC would not agree to settle without an admission of wrongdoing, he was forced to hire an attorney to represent him. He spoke to the meaning of deliberative process privilege and to the importance of protecting that privilege for elected officials. Mayor Eberhart stated that during the campaign some of his opponent's supporters began criticizing his record and comparing it to that of his opponent. He explained that he sent the email to the City Clerk because he wanted to refresh his memory and be better prepared for future attacks. He stated that it was Ms. Stiver's supporters who injected the issue of the candidates' voting records into City Council business. Mayor Eberhart explained that the City is paying for the outside counsel costs because he was a City Council Member at the time and the issue relates to City Council matters or actions. He stated that City Attorney Ewers has conflicts of interest and is unable to represent him in the APOC case. He provided examples of other cases where the City has indemnified and defended other Mayors and Council Members. Mayor **Eberhart** listed the important issues as such: 1) protecting the deliberative process privilege for all Mayors and Council Members, 2) protecting the free speech rights of public officials, 3) the use of the wrong standard by APOC, 4) his unwillingness to admit fault for an action he does not believe he committed. Mayor Eberhart commented that AML may hold a session on APOC at its annual conference in November. He expressed his intent to continue the fight against APOC and stated that he believes he will win the case. He related his plan to then seek collection of attorney fees against APOC to repay the City in full. He stated that APOC is unrestrained and out of control. Mayor Eberhart read aloud an Interior Alaska Community Preparedness Proclamation declaring September 2014 as National Preparedness Month and encouraging all citizens and businesses to develop their own emergency preparedness plan. He announced that the City hired a new IT Director, Benjamin Barrio. He listed the many events and activities of the Mayor's Office since the last Regular City Council Meeting.

Mayor Eberhart called for a five minute recess.

UNFINISHED BUSINESS

a) Request by Council Member Matherly to Suspend the Rules Concerning the Reconsideration of Ordinance No. 5953, an Ordinance Ratifying a Labor Agreement Between the City of Fairbanks and the Public Safety Employees Association, Fairbanks Police Department Chapter.

Note: The request was filed Wednesday, August 27, 2014, at 2:44 p.m. According to FGC Section 2-120(g), the request for reconsideration was not filed timely.

Mr. Matherly, seconded by **Mr. Hilling**, moved to SUSPEND THE RULES.

Mr. Hilling requested clarification on parliamentary procedure pertaining to suspension of the rules.

Mayor Eberhart, City Attorney Ewers and City Clerk Hovenden provided additional clarification on Suspension of the Rules per the Fairbanks General Code and Robert's Rules of Order. They stated that a motion to Suspend the Rules is not debatable.

A ROLL CALL VOTE WAS TAKEN ON THE MOTION TO SUSPEND THE RULES AS FOLLOWS:

YEAS: Gatewood, Walley, Matherly, Staley, Hilling

NAYS: Anderson

Mayor Eberhart declared the MOTION CARRIED.

Mr. Hilling, seconded by Mr. Matherly, moved to RECONSIDER Ordinance No. 5953.

Mr. Hilling asked how the Motion to Reconsider will work.

Mayor Eberhart explained that the vote on the Motion to Reconsider will take a simple majority. He stated at that point it will reopen Ordinance No. 5953 as if the original vote never occurred. He clarified, however, that if there are four or more votes against the Motion to Reconsider, Ordinance No. 5953 will remain ratified.

Mr. Anderson asked if an ordinance may be reconsidered more than once.

City Attorney Ewers replied that an ordinance may not be reconsidered more than once, even if the Council's action is different than it was originally.

Mr. Gatewood asked if the public will have an opportunity to speak to the reconsideration.

City Clerk Hovenden affirmed that the item is not up for public hearing.

Mr. Matherly stated that after the original vote on the ordinance, he looked at the contract more closely with the Finance Department and members of the Finance Committee. He stated that his concern is with the cost to the City and that he feels it was worth bringing back to the Council for discussion and reconsideration. **Mr. Matherly** indicated that he felt that his reconsideration was

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timely since the meeting where Ordinance No. 5953 was adopted did not adjourn until after midnight.

Mr. Hilling moved to allow Public Testimony.

Mr. Matherly asked if public comment could be permitted by the Council prior to the vote on the Motion to Reconsider.

Mayor Eberhart stated that he does not recall ever witnessing a Motion to Reconsider. He commented that it is somewhat unfamiliar territory and that the Clerk and Attorney are working to answer Mr. Matherly's question.

City Clerk Hovenden stated that it is the prerogative of the Council to allow public comment on the reconsideration.

City Attorney Ewers added that the Council is also free to request staff reports if they wish. He clarified that the FGC states that the public may make comment to the Council at any time by leave of the Presiding Officer or of the Council.

Mr. Hilling restated his motion to allow for Public Testimony and no members objected.

Mayor Eberhart called for Public Testimony.

Donna Gilbert, 2223 South Cushman Street, Fairbanks - Ms. Gilbert encouraged the Council to reconsider Ordinance No. 5953. She stated that she has nothing but respect for the employees of FPD. She spoke to the large number of military personnel and service industry employees in the Fairbanks community and stated that their wages are low in comparison to that of the City of Fairbanks' employees. Ms. Gilbert stated that she was offended recently when she filed a referendum at the City Clerk's Office. She explained that she was first questioned as to the number of signatures required then questioned as to why she was filing the referendum. She stated that the employee commented that City employees have been doing without for a long time. Ms. Gilbert stated that her nephew who served in the military had an increase of only \$5,000 over an eight year period and that the particular City employee she was speaking with had received \$10,000 in wage increases within two years. Ms. Gilbert stated that the community cannot afford large increases for City employees or the PSEA contract under consideration. She stated that many Fairbanks residents are relocating and many local businesses are closing their doors due to the high cost of living in the Interior. She stated that she has had to close the Ranch Motel because she could not afford the taxes and utility costs. Ms. Gilbert stated that her sisterin-law is the director for the Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI) and earns less than many of the City's police officers. She thanked Mr. Matherly for filing the Reconsideration.

<u>Jeff Johnson, 3283 Riverview Drive, Fairbanks</u> – Mr. Johnson stated that he serves on the City's Finance Committee. He stated that there are some items in the Finance Department's cost analysis of the PSEA contract that need to be clarified. He stated that he emailed three worksheets to the Council and distributed extra copies. Mr. Johnson spoke specifically to the estimated costs of the contract and the projection of hours worked. He spoke to the assumptions and calculations of the spreadsheets he provided and pointed out that his numbers differ from

those previously provided in the projected costs of the contract. Mr. Johnson estimated that the cost of the PSEA contract would be much higher than what the fiscal note indicated.

Mr. Matherly asked Mr. Johnson why he assumed 100% backfill of positions in his analysis.

Mr. Johnson explained that the increased annual leave of 60 hours per senior officer would have to be made up by backfilling. He stated that he assumes the police department will still have to have someone work those hours while an officer is on paid leave.

Mr. Hilling asked Mr. Johnson what he estimates the cost will be to have police officers backfill those hours in 2015.

Mr. Johnson stated that sheet two of the handouts details the estimate. He explained that the previous estimates only calculated backfill at a 50% rate, which he believes is inaccurate. He stated that for 2015, he believes the total increased cost to fund the PSEA contract would be about \$1,068,147.

<u>Victor Buberge, PO Box 58192, Fairbanks</u> – Mr. Buberge stated that he has never received paid overtime or a paid holiday in his life. He commented that the younger generation's goal is to get a high school diploma and find a government job so that they can receive good benefits without working very hard. Mr. Buberge stated that if City employees are not satisfied in their jobs they should find work elsewhere. He commented that officers should work 8 hours a day, five days a week with no overtime unless there is an emergency and that they should not be allowed to drive City vehicles home every night. Mr. Buberge stated that the City should file for bankruptcy, disperse the Permanent Fund to the taxpayers, get rid of all the unions and hire new staff that will work for a decent wage without complaining. He encouraged the Council to do the right thing for the community.

Ann Roberts, 2821 Totem Drive, Fairbanks – Ms. Roberts spoke to the \$500,000 penalty set forth in the PSEA contract that could be imposed upon either party should they not abide by the agreement. She expressed concern that it would bind a future Council and commented that she is confused as to how the language was even allowed.

Jerry Cleworth, 907 Park Drive, Fairbanks – Mr. Cleworth stated that the vote on the PSEA contract could be the most important vote some may ever make as Council Members. He explained that the contract will establish a precedent for other labor contracts. He focused on the increase to the City's healthcare contribution in the PSEA contract and stated that if the same healthcare increase is given to the other unions it will cost the City an estimated \$350,000 more per year in the next couple years. He stated that the PSEA contract is not affordable under the current revenue scenarios. Mr. Cleworth asked the Council where and how they plan to gain more revenue. He urged the Council to vote against Ordinance No. 5953 and go back to negotiations with PSEA.

<u>Lee Despain, 352 Driveway Street, Fairbanks</u> – Mr. Despain stated that he was a negotiator for the Fire Department for about 20 years and that he believes Mr. Cleworth, Mr. Johnson and Mr. Matherly deserve a vote of confidence for revisiting the PSEA ordinance. Mr. Despain indicated that there is no way to cut hours and maintain current staff levels without increasing overtime. He spoke to the compounded effects of the reduction in the hourly work week

combined with the increase to annual leave hours. Mr. Despain spoke against the ratification of the PSEA contract and expressed his belief that the Council has been lied to in regard to its overall cost.

Ron Dupee, PSEA President – Mr. Dupee stated that he is confused by Mr. Johnson's assumption that the increased annual leave hours would have to be backfilled by other officers. He stated that FPD does not backfill positions on leave with overtime. He clarified that there are provisions in place so that only a minimum number of officers may take leave at the same time. Mr. Dupee stated that three Certified Public Accountants (CPA's) crunched the numbers in the contract with confidence that the contract can work. He spoke to the importance of trusting the negotiation process and those who were involved. Mr. Dupee expressed his belief that the PSEA contract is fair for both parties, will attract new applicants to the police department, and will encourage the retention of employees.

Mr. Hilling asked Mr. Dupee if he is recommending a reduction in the police force.

Mr. Dupee clarified that he does not support backfilling positions when an officer is on leave. He spoke to the higher wages of police officers, dispatchers and supervisors in Juneau and stated that the PSEA contract will help to somewhat close that gap.

Mr. Anderson asked Mr. Dupee to compare annual leave between FPD and Juneau's Police Department.

Mr. Dupee replied that even if the City of Fairbanks increased its officers' annual leave to 300 hours per year, it would still be second from the bottom in the list of municipalities within the entire State of Alaska in regard to annual leave.

<u>Frank Turney, 329 6th Avenue, Fairbanks</u> – Mr. Turney expressed hope that the Council would take the advice of Mr. Johnson. He suggested that Mr. Dupee may try to create a morale problem within the police department and spoke to how he witnessed Mr. Dupee lie under oath. He stated that he would not trust Mr. Dupee.

Brenda Geier, FPD Dispatch Center Supervisor – Ms. Geier stated that she was on the committee that negotiated the PSEA contract. She spoke to the retention problem particularly in the Dispatch Department due to non-competitive wages and expensive healthcare. Ms. Geier stated that her department must be minimally manned with three people at all times and that it results in a great deal of overtime. She expressed frustration in the department's inability to retain trained employees and stated that the PSEA contract would help solve retention problems.

Hearing no more requests for public comment, Mayor Eberhart declared Public Testimony closed.

Mr. Matherly requested that City staff come forward to provide a staff report.

Ms. Randle stated that she agrees with Mr. Johnson's cost analysis based on different assumptions. She spoke to the two major differences in the cost estimate Mr. Johnson provided and the one drafted by the Finance Department: backfill of increased annual leave hours and the

reduction in the hourly work week. She stated that former Chief Zager believed he could manage the backfill of annual leave at a 50% rate instead of Mr. Johnson's 100% assumption.

Mr. Matherly asked Ms. Randle if she believes the Mr. Johnson's scenario could realistically play out.

Ms. Randle expressed her belief that Mr. Johnson's analysis is reasonable, but may illustrate a worst case scenario. She stated that if the administration can actively manage the backfill and limit the hourly work week to 36 hours there will be a savings. She indicated that she is unsure whether those are realistic expectations and that there are many unknowns. Ms. Randle stated that the actual costs will likely be somewhere in between the Finance Department's estimates and Mr. Johnson's projections unless there is very tight management at FPD.

Chief of Staff Jim Williams stated that the original fiscal note presented with Ordinance No. 5953 was researched and calculated very carefully based on a 36-hour workweek. He stated that the conflicting opinions presented are based on much different assumptions.

Mr. Matherly asked Mr. Williams if he believes the City can afford the PSEA contract.

Mr. Williams replied that he believes the City can afford the contract if it is tightly managed.

Mr. Matherly asked Mr. Williams how the City can ensure the proper management and control the 36-hour work week at FPD.

Mr. Williams stated that leave will have to be better managed and that shift lieutenants will have to be sure that officers go home when they reach 36 hours.

Mr. Matherly asked Mr. Williams if he believes the approval of the PSEA contract will add more pressure on the City from other unions.

Mr. Williams replied affirmatively.

Mr. Anderson reminded the Council that Dominic Lozano, President of the Firefighters Union, openly admitted that they would ask for similar items in the PSEA contract if it were ratified.

Mr. Walley asked Ms. Randle if she agrees that the numbers could be even more disastrous for the City if either party opts out.

Ms. Randle replied affirmatively.

Mr. Matherly stated that he considers the needs of the Dispatch Center more crucial than that of the Police Department. He spoke to the importance of employee retention and requested that Dispatch Manager Stephanie Johnson come forward to comment on the contract.

Ms. Johnson agreed with earlier comments that success of the contract will be very dependent on how it is managed by both the Police Department and the Dispatch Center. She stated that the contract outlines working rules relating to staffing and shiftwork unique to her department, where before Dispatch was lumped in with the Police Department. She explained that the new rules will allow her to create a blend of schedules: 8, 9 or 12 hour shifts. Ms. Johnson stated that three new dispatchers were just hired and that the technicalities of the job require a thorough and rigorous training process. She expressed her belief that she could make the contract work for her department and indicated that the Acting Chief and Deputy Chief at the Police Department have been looking at different schedules that would work under the new contract. She stated that letters of agreement have been implemented and other measures have been taken in the past to resolve shiftwork problems and overtime issues. She stated that overtime can be a good thing when it comes in small blocks, but shared that some dispatchers are working 20-30 hours per week in overtime and are having to work on their scheduled days off.

Mr. Anderson asked how many dispatchers Ms. Johnson would like to have fully trained and on staff.

Ms. Johnson replied that there are 18 1/2 employees in the Dispatch Center including herself, one full-time and one part-time employee that work the front desk of the Police Department and six who are currently in training. She stated her belief that her department should be staffed at about 20.

Mr. Anderson stated that he heard that in Detroit, Michigan it takes 48 hours for police to respond to a 9-1-1 call.

Ms. Johnson stated that the City of Fairbanks does better than that.

Mr. Walley asked Ms. Johnson if it would solve some of the problems within her department by amending the sections of the contract pertaining to the working rules of the Dispatch Center.

Ms. Johnson replied that changes to the contract would manage the problems in a more fair way, but would not completely solve her staffing and overtime problems. She clarified that some of the problems are unique to Dispatch and are not a problem for the Police Department.

Mayor Eberhart asked Mr. Williams if at one point during negotiations it appeared that the parties were at an impasse and would not reach an agreement.

Mr. Williams stated that early in negotiations it appeared that the parties were not going to agree on a contract. He explained that when former Chief Zager introduced the reduced work week concept, the numbers were crunched and progress started to be made. He stated that the City is seeing evidence of a savings of police officers' time through the expansion of the Community Service Patrol (CSP). He added that the new Public Safety Assistants (PSA's) will be taking over many of the administrative tasks of the officers which will also free up more of the sworn officers' time.

Mayor Eberhart asked Mr. Williams if the PSEA contract will save the City money on current wages and overhead.

Mr. Williams replied that if management sticks to the assumptions set forth, the contract will save the City money.

Mr. Eberhart asked if the City's healthcare contribution for PSEA employees is significantly lower than what other municipalities are paying on behalf of their public safety employees.

Mr. Williams replied affirmatively.

Mr. Hilling asked Mr. Williams if the estimated 16,000-hour annual reduction in work force would be completely offset by the addition of the PSA's and the expanded CSP.

Mr. Williams replied that some of the lost hours would be made up but that he could not quantify how much. At Mr. Hilling's insistence, Mr. Williams provided a rough estimate that 25-50% of the lost hours would be made up by the PSA's and CSP.

Acting Police Chief Johnson spoke to the implementation of the contract and stated that it is the department head's job to manage employees' hours within the parameters of the policies and contract in place. He stated that Mr. Johnson's assumption that employees would still be working 40 hours per week under the new contract is inaccurate. Chief Johnson explained that when there are extreme shift shortages, positions are backfilled but clarified that there are no established minimum staffing requirements in place for those situations. Chief Johnson further explained that the use of annual leave is also managed by policy to eliminate staffing shortages and the need to backfill. He stated that the department administration believes that the original fiscal note to Ordinance No. 5953 is based on sound and accurate assumptions.

Mr. Hilling asked Chief Johnson if he would agree that there will be an estimated 12% reduction in force by not backfilling the hours missed due to the reduced hourly work week.

Chief Johnson replied that he does not believe that operationally the change in hours will equate to a 12% reduction in force. He explained that the police department has developed a 9-hour/4-day weekly schedule with overlap periods built in that will not cause a big change to normal staffing levels.

Mr. Hilling commented that Chief Johnson's claim that staffing levels will not be significantly affected may be due to inefficient operations of the police department until now. He asked Chief Johnson to speak to that suspicion.

Chief Johnson clarified that the staffing levels may be different at FPD but not significantly reduced due to the shortened work week. He explained that the City could not afford both a bump in healthcare and a reasonable increase to employees so the reduced work week was a compromise. He stated that he does not believe that his officers are working inefficiently. He commented that the shortened work week will allow FPD to continue to provide good service to City of Fairbanks residents.

Mr. Matherly spoke to Ann Roberts' earlier testimony that the Council's decision on the contract may bind future Councils. He asked Mr. Williams what might happen if either party chose to opt out of the contract.

Mr. Williams stated that after one year, if either party feels that the reduced work week is not working, FPD will go back to the way it was. He explained that it would be more expensive for

PSEA to opt out than it would be for the City but that it will cost the City no matter who opts out.

Mayor Eberhart spoke to Section 11.14(e) of the contract which addresses the consequences of either party's election to end the 36-hour work week. He pointed out that there is a higher penalty for the City to end the shift schedule because the union was concerned that the City may take the decision to end the schedule too lightly.

Mr. Gatewood expressed his belief that the reduced work week concept introduced by Chief Zager is a best case scenario and that Mr. Jeff Johnson's assumptions are a worst case scenario. He agreed with Chief Johnson and Mr. Dupee that the City would not have to backfill positions 100%. Mr. Gatewood spoke with understanding to both sides of the issue and gave merit to each argument. He stated that when the contract was first presented with a cost savings to the City the Council thought it was very attractive even though it provided a 10% increase to wages. He stated that the Council has a responsibility to keep all the City's labor contracts as similar as possible and that if nothing else, the other unions will ask for a similar increase to the City's contribution to their individual health plans. Mr. Gatewood stated that the City cannot afford to contribute differing amounts to the respective union health plans. He commented that from a personal standpoint he would rather not entertain reconsideration, but that based on the feedback he has received from constituents he feels compelled to vote in favor of the reconsideration. He expressed his belief that the PSEA contract as it stands would hurt the City of Fairbanks.

Mr. Hilling stated that as an elected official, the most ethical and moral way to vote is according to what he believes to be right which may not always be what his constituents want. He spoke to the 10% reduction in work force and again suggested that there must have been a lack of efficiency at FPD up to this point if that 10% reduction will not equate to a lower level of staffing. Mr. Hilling stated that he does not believe that attrition is taking place at the Police Department on a large scale. He stated that if the dispatchers are not getting enough pay, the City may have to increase their wages in order to retain employees. He stated that it is imperative that the Council reconsider the PSEA contract. Mr. Hilling commented that just because other municipalities are paying their police officers a higher wage it does not justify an increase to the City of Fairbanks' police wages.

Ms. Staley stated that she is pleased that the contract is being brought up for reconsideration because she also received a lot of feedback from constituents. She reminded the Council that the CSP does not have a permanent funding source and could be at risk in the future.

Mr. Anderson stated that he has not had many phone calls from the public. He spoke to the City Fire Department's excellent Insurance Services Office (ISO) rating of level one in the early to mid-1980's when there were 80 fire employees. He stated that within three years, the rating fell to a level four or five which cost individuals \$600 each. Mr. Anderson stated that he would hate to see that kind of thing happen again. He commented that City employees are not line items or numbers on a spreadsheet. He stated that police officers work on the front lines in high risk jobs and that the City needs to maintain good public safety services by trained staff. He stated that wage parity matters to him and that he wants to take good care of City employees to retain them. Mr. Anderson spoke to the importance of bargaining in good faith and keeping morale up and stated that he will vote against the reconsideration.

Mr. Walley stated that the Council has been slammed with numbers over the past several months. He stated that the real question is whether the City can afford the contract, assuming the cost will fall in the middle of the worst case scenario and the best case scenario. He stated that the answer is no. He indicated that he would not support the contract.

Mr. Matherly stated that his intent is not to treat City employees like line items, but pointed out that the Council is elected to watch the bottom line. He commented that he also received a lot of calls from constituents and that he felt that filing the reconsideration was the right thing to do to gain more information. **Mr. Matherly** stated that he feels somewhat torn with the decision on the contract because he wants to trust the City's leaders. He stated that morale is very important, especially under the circumstances in the Dispatch Center.

Mayor Eberhart stated that the contract pertains to City employees that need to be valued and rewarded. He spoke optimistically about the future of the local economy. He stated that the negotiating team worked for many months to arrive at the PSEA agreement and reminded the Council that City department heads believe that the contract will work. **Mayor Eberhart** expressed his belief that the fiscal note on Ordinance No. 5953 is solid. He stated that if the contract does not pass, the issue will likely go to arbitration and the City would be faced with the possibility of non-funding. He stated that one of the fundamental rules of Robert's Rules of Order is to accept the will of the majority. He added that to undo the ratification of Ordinance No. 5953 would be very regressive and demoralizing.

A ROLL CALL VOTE WAS TAKEN ON THE MOTION TO RECONSIDER ORDINANCE NO. 5953 AS FOLLOWS:

YEAS: Hilling, Walley, Staley, Gatewood

NAYS: Matherly, Anderson

Mayor Eberhart declared the MOTION CARRIED.

Mayor Eberhart called for a five minute recess.

Mr. Anderson, seconded by Ms. Staley, moved to ADOPT Ordinance No. 5953.

Mr. Hilling, seconded by **Mr. Gatewood**, moved to POSTPONE Ordinance No. 5953 to the Regular Meeting of September 22, 2014.

Mr. Walley, seconded by **Ms. Staley**, moved to AMEND the motion on the floor by changing the postpone date from September 22, 2014 to November 3, 2014.

Mr. Walley expressed his belief that the Council needs more time to consider the new information before voting on the contract.

A ROLL CALL VOTE WAS TAKEN ON THE MOTION TO AMEND THE MOTION ON THE FLOOR BY CHANGING THE POSTPONE DATE FROM SEPTEMBER 22, 2014 TO NOVEMBER 3, 2014 AS FOLLOWS:

YEAS: Gatewood, Staley, Hilling, Matherly, Walley

NAYS: Anderson

Mayor Eberhart declared the MOTION CARRIED.

Mr. Hilling stated that the November 3 date will give the new members of the Council time to get up to speed before voting on the contract. He spoke in favor of the postponement.

A ROLL CALL VOTE WAS TAKEN ON THE MOTION TO POSTPONE ORDINANCE NO. 5953 TO THE REGULAR MEETING OF NOVEMBER 3, 2014 AS FOLLOWS:

YEAS: Hilling, Walley, Staley, Matherly, Gatewood

NAYS: Anderson

Mayor Eberhart declared the MOTION CARRIED and Ordinance No. 5953 POSTPONED until the Regular Meeting of November 3, 2014.

b) Ordinance No. 5954 – An Ordinance Authorizing the Lease of City-Owned Real Property to Yukon Quest International, Ltd. Introduced by Council Member Matherly. SECOND READING AND PUBLIC HEARING.

Mr. Anderson, seconded by Mr. Matherly, moved to ADOPT Ordinance No. 5954.

Mayor Eberhart called for Public Testimony.

<u>Marti Steury, 550 1st Avenue, Fairbanks</u> – Ms. Steury thanked the City Council for taking the lease into consideration. She pointed out that the lease is uncomplicated and that the Yukon Quest understands that they are stewards of City property.

Hearing no more requests for public comment, **Mayor Eberhart** declared Public Testimony closed.

A ROLL CALL VOTE WAS TAKEN ON THE MOTION TO ADOPT ORDINANCE NO. 5954 AS FOLLOWS:

YEAS: Matherly, Hilling, Walley, Staley, Gatewood, Anderson

NAYS: None

Mayor Eberhart declared the MOTION CARRIED and

Ordinance No. 5954 ADOPTED.

c) Ordinance No. 5955 – An Ordinance Amending the 2014 Operating and Capital Budgets for the Fifth Time. Introduced by Mayor Eberhart. SECOND READING AND PUBLIC HEARING.

Mr. Matherly, seconded by Mr. Anderson, moved to ADOPT Ordinance No. 5955.

Mr. Anderson, seconded by **Mr. Gatewood**, moved to SUBSTITUTE Ordinance No. 5955, as Amended, for Ordinance No. 5955.

Mayor Eberhart called for objection to the substitution and, hearing none, so ORDERED.

Mayor Eberhart called for Public Testimony.

Donna Gilbert, 2223 South Cushman Street, Fairbanks – Ms. Gilbert expressed confusion as to why the Council would adopt an ordinance to fund the contract if the contract itself is postponed until November. She read aloud a letter from her nephew who serves in the military. She stated that even when he wrote to her from overseas during a time of war he did not whine about his situation. She stated that she spoke with her nephew last week and that he said his regular base salary is \$45,760 a year or \$59,760 a year for hazard pay. Ms. Gilbert stated that he worked long days, seven days a week with little to no breaks in the desert heat. She explained the hard conditions soldiers endure with little monetary compensation and spoke against fully funding the PSEA contract. She asked again why the Council is considering funding a contract that has been postponed to November.

Hearing no more requests for public comment, **Mayor Eberhart** declared Public Testimony closed.

Mayor Eberhart explained the differences between Ordinance No. 5955 and Ordinance No. 5955, as Amended. He expressed his support for the as Amended version.

Mr. Anderson, seconded by **Mr. Hilling**, moved to AMEND Ordinance No. 5955, as Amended, by striking all items except for the last bullet of item eight and all of item twelve in the fiscal note.

He announced that FMATS will receive an additional \$32,000 in planning funds. **Mr. Walley** stated that the Unified Planning Work Program (UPWP) for 2015 – 2016 was also approved and that the Badger Road corridor study was placed in the contingency project section, with about half of it funded through the added planning funds. He reported that \$375,000 in additional funding was approved to complete the South Cushman Street Project. **Mr. Walley** stated that the Committee reviewed a memo summarizing public input from the open house on the College Road reconfiguration and approved a letter of support for the Fairbanks International Airport master plan. **Mr. Walley** announced that the artist of *The Polaris* would hold a presentation at the Morris Thompson Cultural and Visitors Center on September 14 at 3 p.m. and the unveiling of the sculpture would be September 17 at 7 p.m.

COUNCIL MEMBERS' COMMENTS

Mr. Matherly stated that he had no comments.

Mr. Hilling expressed appreciation for City staff and stated that they deserve to have good wages and benefits. He stated that he parked on 7th Avenue for five hours the Tuesday after Labor Day and did not receive a citation. He questioned the enforcement of parking rules by Golden Heart Parking Services (GHPS).

Mr. Anderson stated that the Diversity Council met for the first time on September 4 in the City Council Chambers. He indicated that he has never felt so welcomed or warmed by a group of people as he did with that particular crowd.

Ms. Staley, in response to Mr. Hilling's GHPS comment, stated that she is not sure why he did not receive a parking ticket. She thanked Deputy Clerk Snider for helping her get the word out through social media about the vacancy on the GHPS Board. **Ms. Staley** spoke to the discussion on the PSEA contract and expressed her agreement with Mr. Walley that the Council needs more time to ponder it.

Mr. Walley commented that the Council may feel rushed and not as clear in making decisions when a meeting runs very long. He stated that he believes that the issue deserves more consideration by the Council and that the Finance Committee is scheduled to meet four times before the November 3 meeting.

Mr. Gatewood pointed out that labor negotiations are generally discussed during Executive Sessions. He stated that he is unclear as to how it will work to discuss the issue in a public meeting.

Mr. Walley stated that he hopes to discuss the PSEA contract with Jeff Johnson during the Finance Committee meetings.

Mayor pro tem Gatewood led the Flag Salutation.

APPROVAL OF AGENDA AND CONSENT AGENDA

Mr. Matherly, seconded by Mr. Anderson, moved to APPROVE the Agenda and Consent Agenda.

Mr. Hilling pulled Item 12(c) under Communications to Council from the Consent Agenda.

Mayor pro tem Gatewood called for objection and, hearing none, so ORDERED.

City Clerk Hovenden read the Consent Agenda, as Amended, into the record.

CITIZEN'S COMMENTS

<u>Donna Gilbert, 2223 South Cushman Street, Fairbanks</u> – Ms. Gilbert questioned whether the vacancy on the Hotel/Motel Discretionary Fund Committee had been advertised. She also questioned the nomination of Mr. John Nobles, indicating that his experience may not be relevant to the Committee. Ms. Gilbert pointed out that Mr. Nobles' application states that he plans to build a home in Salcha, which is outside City limits. She stated that Hotel/Motel Discretionary Fund Committee members should be City residents since they are working with City bed tax dollars. Ms. Gilbert spoke to the purpose of the Discretionary Fund and stated that Mr. Nobles may not be eligible since he is new to the area.

Frank Turney, 329 6th Avenue, Fairbanks – Mr. Turney stated that he had hoped to receive an update from Mayor Eberhart on the Johnny Wallis case. In regard to the recent threatening phone calls to the police department, Mr. Turney asked whether a warrant had been issued to search Google phone records in an attempt to locate the caller. He stated that nothing has been forwarded to the District Attorney's office on the matter. Mr. Turney spoke to the large number of potholes in Fairbanks and thanked the City for repairing the ones Mr. Buberge mentioned at the last Council Meeting. He stated that he enjoyed the performance by Mike Schmetzer and other musicians at the unveiling of *The Polaris*. He mentioned that he would like to see a public restroom installed in that downtown area and commended the Borough Transit Station for eliminating the ID requirement to use their restroom facilities. Mr. Turney spoke to the unsolved murder of David McNulty that occurred at the Garden Island Party Store several years ago. He stated that he recently saw Ms. McNulty and that she mentioned that she has been trying to reach the Fairbanks Police Department (FPD) evidence room to obtain her late husband's wallet. He said that Ms. McNulty told him that FPD told her that they lost the wallet and stated that he hopes the evidence facility is more secure than that.

<u>Victor Buberge, PO Box 58192, Fairbanks</u> – Mr. Buberge expressed satisfaction with the Council's decision at the last meeting to take another look at the Public Safety Employees Association (PSEA) labor contract. He stated that it appears to him that the contract will cause an excessive amount of overtime that will cost City taxpayers. Mr. Buberge spoke to the testimony of a police officer at the last Council Meeting who stated that the Council should ratify the PSEA contract or there would be problems. He remarked that if he had an employee say that to him, he would have fired him immediately. Mr. Buberge stated that he has worked hard in his life for a decent wage and has never received overtime wages and commented that he does not look at firefighters or police officers as heroes.

Amy Geiger, 4400 Stanford Drive, Fairbanks – Ms. Geiger stated that she works for Explore Fairbanks and spoke to their complimentary Winter Guide which focuses on the winter months in the Interior. She read aloud the introduction in the guide and outlined the changes to the guide this year.

<u>Richard Lane, 3010 Picket Drive, Apt. A, Fairbanks</u> – Mr. Lane stated that this is the first City Council Meeting that he has attended and explained that he was invited by Victor Buberge. He stated that Mr. Buberge calls him Elvis because he is an Elvis Presley impersonator and a singer/entertainer. Mr. Lane expressed support for Mr. Floyd Terry's long time goal of having a roller skating rink in Fairbanks. He commented that with more family-oriented activities, a

community sees less crime and drug problems. Mr. Lane stated that he is from the Bay Town area and is new to Fairbanks. He spoke to his goals, both long-term and short-term, and spoke to his experience and background as an entrepreneur. He stated that he hopes to be a meaningful part of the Fairbanks community.

Hearing no more requests for public comment, **Mayor pro tem Gatewood** declared Public Testimony closed.

SPECIAL ORDERS

a) The Fairbanks City Council, sitting as a Committee of the Whole, heard interested citizens concerned with the following Appeal of Revocation of Chauffeur License.

Appellant: Mark Siivola

Mayor pro tem Gatewood pointed out to the Council that the appeal is different than those typically heard because it is a revocation appeal instead of an appeal for a new license. He explained that Mr. Siivola has had a City Chauffeur License since 2012, but has had a recent conviction that has made him ineligible to carry a Chauffeur License.

Mr. Anderson, seconded by **Mr. Hilling**, moved to GRANT the Appeal of Revocation of Chauffeur License.

Mayor pro tem Gatewood called for Public Testimony.

Mark Siivola, 2541 Goldhill Road, Fairbanks – Mr. Siivola briefly spoke to the incident that he had with Jeff Webster, someone he has known since he was a child. He stated that he regrets the incident and that he has never had a problem with any of his customers. He stated that he moved here from Arizona in 2007 and that he began driving cab because he has back, neck and hip problems. He stated that driving a taxicab is his livelihood and provided Jason Hite as a reference. Mr. Siivola spoke also to the DUI charge against him and stated that the case was dismissed and that the driver came forward and admitted that she was driving the vehicle at the time.

<u>Bryan Houghton, 2541 Goldhill Road, Fairbanks</u> – Mr. Houghton stated that he is the appellant's landlord and that Mr. Siivola is not a violent person. He stated that Mr. Siivola is a well-mannered individual.

Mayor pro tem Gatewood asked Mr. Houghton how long he has been Mr. Siivola's landlord.

Mr. Houghton replied that he has been Mr. Siivola's landlord for about nine months.

<u>Loren Boswell, 1390 Westwick Drive, Fairbanks</u> – Mr. Boswell stated that he has known Mr. Siivola for two or three years and that during that time, Mr. Siivola has had a few incidents with Mr. Webster. He stated that none of the incidents got Mr. Siivola into legal trouble except for the one. He commented that Mr. Siivola is not violent with anyone except the one man. He stated that the two men are legally not supposed to be around each other.

<u>Victor Buberge, PO Box 58192, Fairbanks</u> – Mr. Buberge stated that he does not know the appellant but expressed his belief that it is not the place of the City Council to deal with these types of issues. He stated that it should be up to the court system to determine whether Mr. Siivola is eligible to drive a cab. Mr. Buberge commented that the City should get out of the Chauffeur Licensing business.

Hearing no more requests for public comment, **Mayor pro tem Gatewood** declared Public Testimony closed.

CITIZEN'S COMMENTS

Anna Richards, 1244 Viewpointe Drive, Fairbanks – Ms. Richards stated that she supports the Police Chief selection. She commended Mayor Eberhart for stepping out of his comfort zone and reaching out to the community with an invitation to participate in the selection process. She spoke to the composition and diversity of the selection committee. Ms. Richards stated that the selection process was neutral with a focus based on the candidates' qualifications. She stated that Randall Aragon was the most qualified candidate with a strong belief in community inclusion and transparency in the police force. She encouraged the Council to support the appointment of Chief Aragon.

Kevin Ginley, 1485 23rd Avenue, Fairbanks – Mr. Ginley stated that he is a strong proponent of hiring locally. He expressed appreciation for the committee's selection process. Mr. Ginley stated that he spoke with several people from La Marque, Texas where Randall Aragon is from. He stated that he would like to have a police chief who does not agree with everything he says. He commented that in five years, Randall Aragon will be gone and will not be a long-term member of the community. Mr. Ginley stated that the best choice for a new police chief is Eric Jewkes.

Mayor Eberhart asked Mr. Ginley if he attended the forum where the candidates were interviewed.

Mr. Ginley stated that he was not at the forum but added that he did follow the process.

Mr. Hilling asked Mr. Ginley if he is privy to information about why Randall Aragon moved to different places.

Mr. Ginley stated that Randall Aragon seems to be a likeable person and that it is not his intent to speak ill of him. He stated that after doing some research, it appears that Randall Aragon has had a pattern of moving from place to place.

Steve Ginnis, 288 Shannon Drive, Fairbanks – Mr. Ginnis stated that he has lived in Fairbanks since 1999 when he became the president of the Tanana Chiefs Conference (TCC). He commented that he does not recall any other time when the public was involved in the selection of a police chief and thanked Mayor Eberhart for being transparent in the process. He urged the Council to support

Mayor Eberhart's recommendation, pointing out that the decision was not made by the Mayor alone. Mr. Ginnis stated that the community's voice should be heard as well. He spoke to the trust issues that the Alaska Native people have with the Fairbanks Police Department (FPD). He stated that he would like to see someone leading FPD who is willing to reach out to the community and address the issues. He cited unresolved FPD cases such as the Johnny Wallis case and the case of the Fairbanks Four. Mr. Ginnis stated that it is unfortunate that the Native people feel they cannot call the police for fear of possibly being arrested. He stated that he supports a change in the community and the Mayor's recommendation for a new police chief.

Reverend Joe Blackburn, 3030 Peger Road, Fairbanks — Rev. Blackburn encouraged the City Council to support the Mayor's nomination. He thanked the Mayor and Council for the opportunity to speak and offer his support. He stated that without taking anything away from Lt. Jewkes who has served the Fairbanks community for more than 20 years, he believes Chief Aragon is the best choice for a new Chief of Police. Rev. Blackburn stated that Chief Aragon will bring a balance of diversity to FPD that has been missing for a number of years. He commented that it is very important that FPD reflect the diversity of the Fairbanks community. He spoke also to the imbalance of those being arrested and incarcerated and stated that for the most part, the only time he hears of a minority talking to a police officer is when they are being stopped for a violation or when they are being arrested. Rev. Blackburn stated that in about five more years, he believes Lt. Jewkes will be better equipped to serve as Chief of Police.

Mayor Eberhart asked Rev. Blackburn if the panel of five interviewers and five community leaders unanimously supported the nomination of Chief Aragon.

Rev. Blackburn replied that all ten individuals unanimously supported the recommendation of Chief Aragon for the Chief of Police position.

Monique Duncan, PO Box 74469, Fairbanks – Ms. Duncan commented that she enjoys hearing the views presented by others in regard to the selection of the Police Chief. She stated however, that she does not support the selection of Chief Aragon. She spoke to the honor and integrity of FPD employees and to the intensive background checks they must pass in order to be hired. Ms. Duncan stated that police officers are often labeled as racists because people do not like cops and will say anything when they are being arrested. She suggested that the Council has been treating the City police force like criminals by consistently practicing unfair labor laws and wasting taxpayer dollars on negotiations and arbitrations. She asked the Council what the police employees are doing wrong. Ms. Duncan spoke to the accusation of nepotism at FPD and reminded the Council that the courts found that charge to be false years ago. She suggested that nepotism may have played a part in the hiring of the City's new Human Resources Director. She pointed out that the City hired the police officers that are serving and questioned whether the members of the Council could pass the same background check. She stated that she lost faith in Mayor Eberhart when he allowed a convicted criminal and known drug user to serve on the selection panel for the new Chief of Police. She urged the Council to reconsider the choice and undo the wrong. She closed by stating that the men and women of FPD have honor and integrity and that she expects the same of her City.

Nate Brown, 1430 102nd Street, Fort Wainwright – Mr. Brown stated that the selection is a delicate issue for the citizens of the community. He stated that he plays softball with many people in the area and that he has nothing derogatory to say about City police officers. He stated that he will pray

for the Council to have the wisdom to know how to keep Fairbanks the way a small community should be and, at the same time, how to move forward with change. Mr. Brown commented that effective change cannot be accomplished without reaching beyond borders to have a fresh look at a situation. He stated that the City of Fairbanks is an equal opportunity employer and that each applicant should have a fair look beyond politics. He stated that if the nominee is qualified, has nothing in their past that would bar them from doing the job, and has the vote of confidence from the mayor all the rest is simply politics. Mr. Brown stated that he has never experienced racism from the Fairbanks police force. He commented that the other applicant should not be given the job based solely on his longevity with FPD. He thanked Mayor Eberhart for taking a broad look at the selection and for trying to bring balance to the City of Fairbanks. He stated that although he is military and has only lived in Fairbanks for a couple years, he enjoys the community and would hate to see it torn apart by the issue at hand. He expressed his support for the Mayor's nomination.

Daisy Stevens, 1841 Hilton Avenue, Fairbanks – Ms. Stevens stated that she has been a resident of Fairbanks, off-and-on, since 1965. She stated that she is a voting community member. She thanked Mayor Eberhart for making the right decision in his nomination for the Chief of Police. She stated that she had never known racism until she attended Lathrop High School in 1966 and went home from school crying. Ms. Stevens spoke to the problems at FPD and expressed her belief that a change in leadership will help make corrections. She stated that an individual can feel the racism at FPD as soon as they walk through the door or speak on the telephone. She stated that nepotism in any organization makes working with its employees difficult and spoke specifically to that of the Acting and Deputy Police Chiefs. Ms. Stevens stated that she came before the Council some time ago to make a complaint and explained that the former Chief of Police for helping her resolve her problem. She commented that now it seems that no one at FPD has the time to care. Ms. Stevens stated that she plans to meet with the new Police Chief to welcome him and convey her problems to him. She encouraged everyone to vote in the upcoming Municipal Election.

Mr. Hilling asked Ms. Stevens what sort of problems she believes exist in the police department.

Ms. Stevens stated that she has a son who lives in the village. She explained that when he was in Fairbanks visiting he went out to the bar and was walking home in the middle of the night. She stated that two City police officers stopped him, questioned him and told him to start running. She stated that another man picked him up and explained to him that he should not be walking alone at night because that is how Fairbanks cops are.

Charlie Leonelli, 730 Hillcrest Drive, Fairbanks – Mr. Leonelli stated that he is a local business owner and has been a member of the Fairbanks community since 1986. He stated Fairbanks is a unique community, very different from suburbs and cities in the lower 48 states. He commented that it is almost as if Fairbanks is on an island because it is so isolated. Mr. Leonelli stated that while Chief Aragon may have experience in larger communities and may know the right things to say, Lt. Jewkes knows the Fairbanks community and has given more than 20 years serving it. He pointed out that by hiring from the outside, the City will squash the opportunity for upward mobility within the police department. Mr. Leonelli spoke to the strong and quiet leadership of Lt. Jewkes and expressed his support for the selection of Lt. Jewkes as the new Chief of Police. He stated that there is potential for 4 – 5 years of turmoil under the leadership of an outsider at FPD. He encouraged the Council to postpone the decision on the selection or oppose Mayor Eberhart's nomination.

Mayor Eberhart asked Mr. Leonelli if he attended the forum.

Mr. Leonelli replied that he was unable to attend due to work.

Mayor Eberhart asked Mr. Leonelli if he had heard that Lt. Jewkes stated that he would continue working at FPD even if Chief Aragon was selected.

Mr. Leonelli replied that he read about Lt. Jewkes' statement.

Mayor Eberhart asked Mr. Leonelli if he is aware that he recommended that Chief Aragon make Lt. Jewkes a Deputy Chief so that he can be mentored to one day take the position of Chief of Police.

Mr. Leonelli replied affirmatively.

Mr. Gatewood asked Mr. Leonelli to speak to his recommendation for postponement.

Mr. Leonelli stated that the subject is a delicate one. He stated that more time would allow for more citizen participation. He suggested that there may be some unflattering information on the web about Chief Aragon and that the Fairbanks community may have only seen a limited scope of information about him.

<u>Darlene Herbert, 906 Woodlawn Road, Fairbanks</u> – Ms. Herbert stated that she took a photo the other day of a sign that read, "Showgirls, Showgirls, Showgirls...fully nude." She asked if the Council approved of such a business and stated that it is a shame that it is in an area where so many kids pass by. Ms. Herbert stated that those kinds of places should be located outside of City limits. She expressed disappointment in the way people talk about Mayor Eberhart on Facebook. She spoke briefly to the selection of the new Chief of Police and also to the division between the Native people and the police. Ms. Herbert expressed her support for the nomination of Chief Aragon, stating that the police department needs change.

State Representative Scott Kawasaki, 2008 Carr Avenue, Fairbanks – Rep. Kawasaki stated that in going door-to-door, an issue was brought up in the Executive Estates Subdivision regarding a club that opened up in the old Klondike Lounge. He pointed out that the business is near a school bus stop, very close to a daycare center and near a family neighborhood. Rep. Kawasaki expressed his opinion that the residents of the area should have had an opportunity to comment and veto the new business coming to their neighborhood. He stated that other businesses like daycares and dog parks must go through a process before they can open for business. Rep. Kawasaki encouraged the Council to adopt an ordinance regarding adult entertainment establishments similar to the one he introduced when he served on the City Council. He spoke highly of Lt. Jewkes, stating that he is a hard-working individual of high moral fiber and impeccable ethics who may just be a victim of bad timing.

Mr. Matherly asked Rep. Kawasaki what he meant by "bad timing."

Rep. Kawasaki stated that there is a certain momentum in the community that may stop local people from rising up the ranks at FPD. He stated that he does not know much about Chief Aragon, but that he sees the community's outcry for change as bad timing for Lt. Jewkes.

Ruth L'Hommedieu, 3282 Adams Drive, Fairbanks – Ms. L'Hommedieu spoke against the establishment of the Sinrock Club in her neighborhood. She stated that there seems to have been some confusion at the City Building Department as to whether the structure was being torn down or not. She asked how the Planning Commission dropped the ball on the issue and stated that it is a shame that the adult establishment is in such close proximity to a residential neighborhood. Ms. L'Hommedieu commented that sometimes those types of businesses attract unfavorable people, drugs and crime. She expressed appreciation to Rep. Kawasaki for the steps he has taken to look into the issue. She stated that they have installed a fence behind the Washington Plaza, but have not placed a fence along Rewak Drive.

Mr. Matherly asked Ms. L'Hommedieu if she knew that the new fence belongs to the owners of the Washington Plaza Mall.

Ms. L'Hommedieu replied that she was not aware. She stated that as a resident of the neighborhood there was no opportunity to give public comment on the issue. She asked why the community was not involved in the process.

Mayor Eberhart stated that the Council may only ask questions to the public during Citizen's Comments. He stated that the Council would have to move to Suspend the Rules if they wished to provide an explanation to Ms. L'Hommedieu.

Mr. Hilling, seconded by **Mr. Matherly**, moved to SUSPEND THE RULES to allow open discussion with Ms. Ruth L'Hommedieu regarding the Sinrock Club.

Mayor Eberhart called for objection and, hearing none, so ORDERED.

Mr. Matherly explained that he works in the Washington Plaza Mall facing the Safeway store. He stated that he did not know what business was being built in the old Klondike Lounge even after attempting to catch someone on-site to ask several times. He stated that as soon as the mall owner found out that the business was an adult establishment, he immediately put up a fence. Mr. Matherly stated that he does not know what rights nearby property owners had in the process. He added that the mall owner plans to put up another fence on the other side towards Midas. He stated that the business opened on Thursday.

Mayor Eberhart explained that the City of Fairbanks does not have planning and zoning powers. He stated that those are functions of the Fairbanks North Star Borough (FNSB). He stated that the Fairbanks Building Department learned of the construction and contacted the owner, explaining that the building could not be open for business until a Certificate of Occupancy was issued. **Mayor Eberhart** stated that the City only inspects to ensure the safety and compliance of the structure itself and cannot look at planning or zoning regulations.

Mr. Matherly pointed out that the club does not serve alcohol. He stated that he will be keeping an eye on the property. He shared that he has had many constituents contact him asking about the new establishment.

Ms. L'Hommedieu stated that it seems like the business snuck in through the back door. She stated that she felt uncomfortable asking questions to workers at the location.

Mayor Eberhart expressed hope that the Borough would take up the issue. He stated that Rep. Kawasaki has written a letter to them and that the Borough is the entity who holds the zoning power.

Shirley Lee, 457 Cindy Drive, Fairbanks – Ms. Lee stated that she is speaking as the Chair of the Justice Task Force at Tanana Chiefs Conference (TCC) and on behalf of TCC President Victor Joseph. She stated that TCC is a non-profit organization that works toward meeting the health and social service challenges for 15,000 Alaska Native people in the region. Ms. Lee thanked Mayor Eberhart for allowing her to participate in the second round of Police Chief interviews. She commended both candidates on their dedication to law enforcement. Ms. Lee stated that the selection of Chief Aragon was an insightful choice and spoke to the fracture in the relationship between FPD and the Native community. She indicated that Chief Aragon would be the most effective agent for change at the police department. Ms. Lee stated that crime against minorities is ongoing and routine in Fairbanks. She stated that she works with homeless people and chronic inebriates in the community and that she hears of numerous assaults, rapes and robberies against those populations every month. She commented that most of those incidents go unreported to the police because of the lack of trust with the FPD. Ms. Lee stated that Chief Aragon has demonstrated a superior ability to bring a community together to enhance policing, a systematic change to police departments resulting in national certification, and a record of keeping communities informed and involved in police work. She commended Mayor Eberhart for his open approach to the hiring process and asked the Council how they could object when everyone was given an opportunity to provide input. Ms. Lee stated that she and TCC support the selection of Chief Aragon.

Esther Cunningham, 1417 22nd Avenue, Fairbanks – Ms. Cunningham stated that she has lived in the Fairbanks community for over 30 years and has been involved in a great deal of volunteer work. She stated that one of the best programs she was involved with was Volunteers in Policing (VIP). She expressed her belief that Chief Aragon is a good candidate for Police Chief because of his 25 years of experience in law enforcement, his ability to talk to people and his enthusiasm. Ms. Cunningham mentioned the question asked to candidates during interviews that stood out to her: "Have you ever been broken and what was your experience?" She stated that Lt. Jewkes took a full minute to answer the question and was nowhere near the mark. Ms. Cunningham stated that her own experiences with FPD have been positive, but explained that as a secretary and board member of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People (NAACP) she hears complaints of racial profiling by FPD quite frequently. She stated that her son was falsely accused and ambushed when he was arrested by FPD and was not told of the reason for his arrest until after he was put in the back of the police vehicle. Ms. Cunningham stated that the City of Fairbanks needs a fresh set of eyes and a Chief of Police who will have an open door policy with credibility in resolving matters in a fair and respectful way.

Glenn Carlo, 2365 King Road, Fairbanks – Mr. Carlo stated that he works with Denakkanaaga and Native Alaskan Elders. He stated that he attended the Police Chief interviews and expressed support for Mayor Eberhart's nomination. He apologized for an earlier testimony from a young lady who did not show respect for Mayor Eberhart. He stated that comments threatening mutiny if Chief Aragon is hired are proof that a change needs to take place at FPD.

Nancy Shafer, 1613 Madison Drive, Fairbanks – Ms. Shafer stated that she was concerned with Lt. Jewkes' transparency during the interviews. She stated that he did not answer some of the questions to her satisfaction. She commented that some people's resistance to change may be the reason that some do not support the nomination of Chief Aragon. Ms. Shafer spoke briefly to Chief Aragon's background. She expressed her belief that there is a lack of trust between FPD and all cultures and races in the Fairbanks area. She stated that her concern with Chief Aragon is that he seems to have a pattern of changing jobs but added that it could be because he enjoys a challenge. Ms. Shafer stated that she was a dispatcher with the Alaska State Troopers (AST) for eight years and with the Airport Police and Fire Department for four years. She stated that even police officers are not above the law and can sometimes make mistakes after they become police officers. She stated that she does not know Lt. Jewkes but indicated that he may not see a need for change since he has been working at FPD for so many years.

Mr. Hilling asked Ms. Shafer if there were any other instances in which she felt Lt. Jewkes did not fully answer an interview question.

Ms. Shafer replied that Lt. Jewkes' response to the question about being broken was lacking.

<u>Eric Hoffman, 2107 Hilton Avenue, Fairbanks</u> – Mr. Hoffman stated that he is a City constituent and a police officer for the City of Fairbanks. He commented that he has rarely felt as broken as he has throughout the evening while listening to all the negative comments about FPD. He stated that he grew up wanting to help people and that he feels he tries to do that every day in his job. Mr. Hoffman shared that he has been in contact with officers and staff at the Conway, Arkansas Police Department who had nothing positive to say about Chief Aragon. He added that he remains openminded.

Mr. Hilling asked Mr. Hoffman to elucidate what he had heard about Chief Aragon.

Mr. Hoffman stated that it has been 12 years since Chief Aragon worked at the Conway, Arkansas Police Department. He stated that he spoke to a training officer who told him that Randall Aragon had barely qualified as a police officer in that state at that time, after having supposedly been doing police work since the 1970's. Mr. Hoffman stated that the same officer claimed that Chief Aragon was the worst chief he had ever worked for. He stated that he also claimed that other departments within the municipality began tracking his progress and made it a point to warn potential employers about Chief Aragon.

Mr. Gatewood asked Mr. Hoffman if he has had contact with other police departments where Randall Aragon has been employed.

Mr. Hoffman replied that he has not made contact with any other department. He commented that he is very open to change and has hopes that Chief Aragon has good ideas to bring to FPD. He

encouraged the Council to do some of their own research about Randall Aragon. He stated that five years is a long time for a community to have a police chief that does not understand the issues.

Mayor Eberhart asked Mr. Hoffman if the training officer explained that the Conway Police Department had been trying to unionize the department before Chief Aragon arrived.

Mr. Hoffman replied that the unionization was not a part of his discussion with the training officer.

Mayor Eberhart asked Mr. Hoffman if it is feasible to believe that Conway Police Department employees may have been dissatisfied because of the failed attempt to unionize.

Mr. Hoffman replied that it is a possibility.

Mayor Eberhart cautioned an audience member who spoke out of order. He stated that comments from the audience that are not a part of Public Testimony will not be tolerated.

<u>Victor Buberge, PO Box 58192, Fairbanks</u> – Mr. Buberge stated that he supports Mayor Eberhart's selection. He stated when he attended the Police Chief interviews he saw only two of the Council Members present. Mr. Buberge stated that he has nothing against Lt. Jewkes, but indicated that he believes Chief Aragon is the best choice. He spoke to the differences between the previous hiring process and the recent hiring process for the new Chief and spoke highly of former Chief Zager. Mr. Buberge spoke to his own experiences with racism and police and commented that there are some liars on the Fairbanks police force. He stated that he believes it was good that Mr. Turney was selected to serve on the interview panel.

Frank Turney, 329 6th Avenue, Fairbanks - Mr. Turney stated that he has never been convicted of any drug offenses but admitted to having smoked herb on occasion. He read aloud the Law Enforcement Code of Ethics for the Fairbanks Police Department. He stated that of the two candidates for police chief, he believes Chief Aragon is the right choice to solve the problems with diversity in the Fairbanks community. Mr. Turney explained that under their union contract, City police offices may refuse to submit to a polygraph examination when being investigated for misconduct. He stated that Jewkes was opposed to these examinations while Aragon was in support of them. He thanked Mayor Eberhart for allowing him the opportunity to serve on the nomination committee. Mr. Turney commented that he has been aware of the nepotism at FPD for years and that he would see an issue with a Chief whose wife was employed by the same department. He spoke to the six threatening calls to FPD from an unknown caller and stated that the District Attorney's Office has not received anything from the City of Fairbanks regarding a warrant. He expressed hope that Mayor Eberhart would follow through on the issue and commented that he believes the calls were a ruse. Mr. Turney stated that upon hire at FPD, police officers are required to take a polygraph exam but that the exam is administered by a Fairbanks police officer. He expressed hope that the City would hire an independent professional to perform the examinations. He stated that in the many years he has lived in Fairbanks he has never witnessed this type of nomination process and thanked Mayor Eberhart.

<u>David Duncan, PO Box 74469, Fairbanks</u> – Mr. Duncan stated that he has been a police officer for the City of Fairbanks since October of 2005. He voiced his disgust over the recent actions of the Council in regard to the PSEA contract. He stated that the City's negotiating team bargained

according to the direction given by the Council. He clarified that it was the City—not PSEA—who proposed the 36-hour work week. Mr. Duncan stated that both teams spent months working out the details of the agreement with both sides making concessions. He stated that the Council adopted the contract by a 4-3 vote, which was later reconsidered by Council Member Matherly. He stated that the Finance Department provided a fiscal note to the Council on the PSEA contract. He suggested that the Council felt it necessary have an outside source check the work of the Finance Department. Mr. Duncan stated that although Council Member Matherly's reconsideration was ruled untimely by the City Attorney, the Council voted to suspend the rules and allow for the reconsideration. He questioned the legality of the Council's actions. He stated that he would like to propose a reconsideration of Mr. Matherly's election to the City Council, commenting that he has learned new information since that time and did not understand Mr. Matherly's views when he voted in the election. Mr. Duncan stated that the Council then voted to postpone the PSEA contract until the November 3 meeting to give new Council Members a chance to review and understand the proposal. He expressed his belief that the real reason behind the postponement was in anticipation that Jerry Cleworth would be back on the Council. He stated that some believe that Mr. Cleworth is the only one with the political and financial knowledge to run the City of Fairbanks. Mr. Duncan quoted Mr. Cleworth in a recent interview as stating that he "wants to work with the unions to form a partnership with them." He expressed doubt as to the sincerity of the statement, commenting that he has sat at the negotiating table with Mr. Cleworth. He spoke to the unique situations that police officers encounter on the job and asked the Council to consider that not all unions are the same and that they cannot all be treated the same. Mr. Duncan stated that Mr. Hilling made a recent comment that the City should not strive to have the best police department but the cheapest. He spoke against the notion that one year union contracts are the way to go. He reproved Mr. Gatewood for voting against the Firefighters' arbitration award because he did not like the tone of the arbitrator or the way the award was written. Mr. Duncan spoke to the Council's goal to be fiscally responsible and questioned how it is prudent to pay over \$7,000 to fight a \$37.50 fine. He expressed his feeling that the Council is immoral and unethical. He stated that he will no longer put his life on the line for a Council or a City that does not support its employees and stated that he has submitted his resignation.

Hearing no more requests for public comment, Mayor Eberhart declared Public Testimony closed.

Since there was no objection at the Approval of the Agenda and Consent Agenda to move Items 8 and 12(b) (Mayor's Comments and Report and Appointment to the Chief of Fairbanks Police Department, respectively) to be read after Citizen's Comments, the items were moved and the order of business was as recorded below.

MAYOR'S COMMENTS AND REPORT

Mayor Eberhart spoke to the threatening calls Mr. Turney mentioned earlier. He reported that a warrant has been served on Google in California to find out what computer was used to place the calls. He stated that police in Pennsylvania have identified the caller as a 14-year old boy with mental health problems. **Mayor Eberhart** referenced the handout detailing the September statistics for the Community Service Patrol (CSP) and pointed out that the calls for transport and service are at a historic high. He listed the numerous meetings and events that the Mayor's Office had

participated in since the last Regular Meeting of the Council. **Mayor Eberhart** introduced and welcomed new IT Director Ben Barrio.

Mr. Barrio expressed his excitement to be a part of the City of Fairbanks and the community. He stated that he is from New Mexico but fell in love with Alaska when the military brought him here and decided to stay.

Mayor Eberhart spoke to his nomination of the Chief of Police. He stated that most Fairbanks residents are from other parts of the United States and commented that the community needs to remain welcoming to outsiders. He spoke to the process to fill the position from the time former Chief Zager resigned in July. Mayor Eberhart stated that of the five applicants for Police Chief, one did not meet the minimum qualifications, two were from FPD and two were from Texas. He explained that the interview and hiring process did not have to be public, but that he wanted to involved the public and be as transparent as possible. He stated that the first interview panel unanimously narrowed the applicants from four to two, Chief Aragon and Lt. Jewkes. Mayor Eberhart explained that an extensive background check was done on Chief Aragon because the City of Fairbanks had limited knowledge of him. He read aloud the summary of positive comments prepared by individual who performed the background investigation on Chief Aragon. Mayor **Eberhart** read aloud comments about Chief Aragon from the mayor of Conway, Arkansas. He read aloud a newspaper article from Conway, Arkansas which talked about Chief Aragon's effectiveness and leadership during his six-year tenure as Chief of Police. He pointed out the positive recommendations send via email from individuals that have worked with Chief Aragon. He listed the names of the individuals that served on the selection panel and stated that the nomination was unanimous. Mayor Eberhart asked Chief of Staff Jim Williams to comment on the nomination.

Mr. Williams stated that one of Mayor Eberhart's goals has been to draw more public participation at City Council meetings. He stated that the audience at the meeting proves that goal to be coming to pass. Mr. Williams spoke to change management and accountability, stating that the reaction of individuals is normal given the uncertainty of FPD's future. He advised that when an organization fails, the senior executive is usually responsible.

Mayor Eberhart stated that he met one-on-one with both candidates before the second round of interviews. He spoke highly of Lt. Jewkes but commented that both on paper and in interviews, Chief Aragon was clearly the stronger candidate. Mayor Eberhart stated that significant changes need to take place at FPD. He stated that Chief Aragon has indicated that he may make Lt. Jewkes a part of his management team and that he has asked Chief Aragon to make Lt. Jewkes a Deputy Chief of Police. Mayor Eberhart expressed that the City of Fairbanks would be fortunate to have Randall Aragon serve as the Chief of Police. He urged the Council to respect the selection panel and process and trust his nomination. Mayor Eberhart announced that the school resource officers (SRO's) are getting close to coming to an agreement with the Borough School District so that officers may soon return to West Valley and Lathrop High Schools. He stated that the City recently signed a memorandum of agreement (MOA) with the School District formalizing the high school work/study program. He shared that the City now has six work/study students working or soon-tobe working in the following departments: Engineering, Clerk's Office, Information Technology, Dispatch, Fire Prevention Office and Mayor's Office. He added that this is the first agreement of its kind in Alaska between a municipality and a school district. Mayor Eberhart reminded everyone to vote on Election Day and emphasized the importance of citizen participation.

COMMUNICATIONS TO COUNCIL

b) Appointment of the Chief of Fairbanks Police Department

Mr. Anderson, seconded by **Mr. Hilling**, moved to APPROVE the Appointment of the Chief of Fairbanks Police Department.

Ms. Staley expressed appreciation for the open interview process and commented on the great amount of public involvement. She stated that she is unsure of how the interviews were advertised or how many people attended the interviews.

Mayor Eberhart explained that three large ads were placed in the News Miner and that the interview information was also posted to the City's website. He stated that about 75 members of the public were in attendance.

Mr. Anderson spoke to Lt. Jewkes' intention to stay with FPD even if he is not selected as the next Chief of Police. He spoke to Chief Aragon's pattern of taking on challenging positions and leaving police departments better than he found them. **Mr. Anderson** stated that he believes Chief Aragon will not leave the City of Fairbanks until he knows his job is done. He stated that the idea of certification is new to him.

Mr. Gatewood stated that he received a great deal of feedback on the issue of the new Police Chief. He commented that he heard support for both candidates and that he tries to keep an open mind on all considerations that come before the City Council. Mr. Gatewood stated that he believes Chief Aragon interviewed the better of the two candidates, both in the first round and the second round. He stated that just because the selection was unanimous by the panel, it does not mean that the selection was automatic from the first vote. Mr. Gatewood stated that Mayor Eberhart should be commended for the selection process and for putting a diverse interview panel together. He stated that he supports the Mayor's nomination.

Mr. Matherly echoed Ms. Staley's comments. He stated that he also received a lot of public feedback on the issue. He stated that he has tried to put himself in the shoes of both candidates. He expressed that the "cop-bashing" that occurred earlier in the meeting was inappropriate. **Mr. Matherly** listed good qualities about each candidate and the different skills and experiences that each would bring to the table. He expressed his struggle with the idea of bringing someone new to the department who has no intention to stay long-term. **Mr. Matherly** asked if there is a reason why FPD was not represented on the interview and selection panel.

Mayor Eberhart stated that he has known Lt. Jewkes for a very long time and that he felt that he did not need any more information from that sector to make a selection.

Mr. Matherly commented that he is still struggling with the vote.

Mr. Hilling stated that he was unable to attend the interviews due to a recent knee surgery and that he feels unprepared on the selection of the new Chief of Police. He expressed that the biggest considerations for him are whether to hire local and whether to hire from another state knowing that

the individual may only stay short-term. **Mr. Hilling** spoke to the pros and cons of the situations that each candidate represents. He asked Mayor Eberhart if he is aware of why Chief Aragon has a pattern of moving from department to department.

Mayor Eberhart replied that Chief Aragon was asked that question on more than one occasion and indicated that he had consistent responses. He explained that Chief Aragon enjoys challenges and takes pride in addressing the problems within a municipality or community.

Mr. Williams stated that Chief Aragon was labeled as a "change agent" during the background investigation because he goes into communities, makes changes and moves on.

He thanked the Council for their hard work and service. He stated that when the Borough's zoning code was proposed to include distilleries in the central business district, he spoke against it. Mr. Rogers stated that he supports the approval of the liquor license due to the decline in activity on that block. He mentioned nearby businesses that have closed their doors or plan to shut down in the near future. He expressed faith in Mr. Levy's ability to be a responsible business owner.

Mr. Anderson, seconded by Mr. Matherly, moved to APPROVE Resolution No. 4644.

Mr. Gatewood requested a staff report. He pointed out that the fourth whereas of the resolution speaks to a security upgrade at the Police Department, but indicated that under "Financial Detail" it speaks to a City-wide system upgrade. He asked a staff member to clarify the discrepancy.

Fire Chief Warren Cummings explained that under the grant program, the City applied for \$1.8 million in projects. He added that only three of the projects were fully or partially funded. He stated that the door security system upgrade is City-wide because the City would like to have one system to control all the buildings. Chief Cummings explained that the Police Department security will be addressed first since it is the highest priority. He stated that additional grant funding for the security upgrade at City Hall, Public Works and the Fire Stations may be requested at a later date.

Mr. Gatewood suggested that whenever a grant impacts multiple departments it be clarified in the fiscal note. He explained that it would allow the Council to have a much better grasp on the total cost of a given project.

Mr. Hilling objected to the approval of Resolution No. 4644, stating that he does not wish to saddle future generations with more debt. He spoke on the principle that the Fairbanks is a City of means and should not be taking borrowed money for something it can afford. He commented that he does not want to leave a legacy of government-dependency for his children. **Mr. Hilling** also spoke against allowing the federal government to have too much control.

DISCUSSION ITEMS

Committee Reports

<u>Explore Fairbanks Board of Directors</u> – **Mr. Matherly** stated that the Board recently met and discussed the concern that Frontier Airlines will not be flying to Fairbanks, the lease of the City's log cabin downtown, and the winter tourist season. He stated that the Board also welcomed a new employee.

COMMUNICATIONS TO COUNCIL

a) Memorandum Concerning the Northern Door Clubhouse

Mr. Gatewood expressed confusion with the purpose of the memo. He stated that when the Council approved a grant for \$58,000, he thought that the fiscal agent was Access Alaska. He asked for clarification.

Grants Administrator Margarita Bell explained that while Ordinance No. 5941 referenced Access Alaska, the fiscal agent was Fairbanks Community Mental Health Services. She stated that the two entities were working together in order to provide funds for the program. Ms. Bell explained that the Northern Door Clubhouse is now working with JP Jones to lease an area for their program and is requesting approval from the Council to change their fiscal agent.

Mr. Gatewood asked if the Northern Door Clubhouse is currently functioning.

Ms. Bell replied that the program is not currently active and that none of the grant funds have been expended. She stated that the City has been waiting for Fairbanks Community Mental Health Services to provide the necessary documentation in order to release the funds and indicated that they have not done so.

Mr. Gatewood asked what it will mean if the grant funds are carried into 2015.

Ms. Bell replied that once the Council approves Crossroads to be the new fiscal agent, the City may encumber the funds and roll over any unexpended funds to the following year.

Mr. Anderson, seconded by **Mr. Hilling**, moved to APPROVE the Memorandum Concerning the Northern Door Clubhouse.

Mayor Eberhart called for objection to Ms. Staley's request to be excused on October 20, 2014, and hearing none, so ORDERED.

Ms. Staley stated that the Golden Heart Parking Services (GHPS) Board is still looking to fill a vacancy.

Mr. Matherly reminded everyone to vote in the upcoming Municipal Election. He cautioned drivers to slow down and drive safely. He thanked all who attended the meeting and gave testimony. **Mr. Matherly** stated that while some of the discussion at Council Meetings can be tense, everyone is still a part of the same community. He commented that he will continue to work as hard as he can for Fairbanks citizens and that he will support the new Chief of Police. He expressed hope that trust issues and relationships could be restored in regard to the Fairbanks Police

Department. **Mr. Matherly** stated that he plans to talk with Rep. Kawasaki about what may be done about the Sinrock Club.

Mr. Hilling suggested that the Sinrock Club be sued for calling themselves a "gentleman's club" on the basis of discrimination. He stated that this meeting marks his last full meeting as a City Council Member. He spoke in support of Chief Aragon and commended Mayor Eberhart for the transparent selection process.

Mr. Anderson expressed excitement to bring the new Chief of Police on board. He reminded everyone to vote in the Municipal Election.

Mr. Gatewood echoed Mr. Matherly's comments regarding the mood of the meeting. He stated that he has concerns with the hiring of the new Chief of Police. He expressed hope that the Council does not believe that the new Chief will come in like the Lone Ranger and fix everything. He stated that there are much bigger issues in the community that the City needs to address, whether those issues are real or perceived. **Mr. Gatewood** stated that there is racism throughout the Fairbanks community in all different types of jobs and walks of life. He stated that the Council cannot leave it up to one man to fix the problems in Fairbanks. He suggested that the community come together to live Mayor Eberhart's motto of being "Stronger Together."

ADJOURNMENT

Mr. Anderson, seconded by Mr. Matherly, moved to ADJOURN the meeting.

The Invocation was given by City Clerk Janey Hovenden.

FLAG SALUTATION

Mayor Eberhart led the Flag Salutation.

APPROVAL OF AGENDA AND CONSENT AGENDA

Mr. Anderson, seconded by **Mr. Matherly**, moved to APPROVE the Agenda and Consent Agenda.

Mayor Eberhart called for objection and, hearing none, so ORDERED.

City Clerk Hovenden read the Consent Agenda into the record.

Mayor Eberhart presented awards to the following Fire Department employees for outstanding emergency response service in the Northward Building incident: Captain Sean Aldrich, Captain Tom Monicken, Driver Dominic Lozano, and Firefighter Shane Powers. He recognized Mr. Powers also for his life-saving actions in responding to the Geraghty Street Apartment fire and presented him with an award from the Office of the State Fire Marshal, naming Mr. Powers the 2014 Alaska Firefighter of the Year.

CITIZEN'S COMMENTS

<u>Darlene Herbert, 906 Woodlawn Road, Fairbanks</u> - Ms. Herbert congratulated the newly-elected officials and reminded them that they are supposed to work together.

<u>Daisy Stevens, 1841 Hilton Avenue, Fairbanks</u> – Ms. Stevens echoed Ms. Herbert's comments. She commended Chris Anderson for his time served on the Council and congratulated the newly-elected officials. She stated that she voted for Jerry Cleworth and that she expects him to do a good job on the Council. Ms. Stevens commented that she has seen a lot of fighting occur amongst the Council and emphasized the need for the Council to work together for the good of Fairbanks citizens.

Victor Buberge, PO Box 58192, Fairbanks – Mr. Buberge thanked Mr. Hilling and Mr. Anderson for their service on the City Council. He commended the Public Works Department and Director Mike Schmetzer for the work done on South Cushman Street. He spoke to the inflated wages of City police officers and pointed out that one officer is earning \$188,000 a year. Mr. Buberge stated that the officer's overtime wages alone were more than an average person's annual wage. He spoke in opposition to the 36-hour work week that was recently proposed in the Public Safety Employees Association (PSEA) labor contract. He sarcastically commented that maybe City police officers are so good that they should be earning \$1 million per year. He expressed distaste with hearing City police officers whine about their wages and suggested that they may be happier being employed elsewhere.

Frank Turney, 329 6th Avenue, Fairbanks – Mr. Turney stated that he hates to see Mr. Hilling not run again for City Council and expressed his belief that Mr. Hilling is a man with genuine principles. He thanked Mr. Hilling for introducing the first resolution passed in the State of Alaska in support of industrial hemp farming and for introducing a resolution opposing the United Nation's (UN) Agenda 21 Program. Mr. Turney thanked Mr. Anderson for his service on the Council and commended him for his consistency. In regard to citizen decorum at City Council Meetings, Mr. Turney quoted Harry S. Truman, "If you can't stand the heat, get out of the kitchen." He commented that the Council should be able to handle direct criticism from constituents. He stated that Mr. Matherly should not have criticized citizens for "cop bashing" during the process of selecting the new Chief of Police. Mr. Turney suggested that some Council Members may want to sweep issues of misconduct at the police department under the rug. He welcomed new Chief of Police Randall Aragon and stated that the people of Conway, Arkansas where Aragon used to work have had good things to say about him. Mr. Turney suggested that the City of Fairbanks install sanitizing machines in the halls of its buildings for the public to wash their hands.

<u>Floyd Terry, PO Box 73514, Fairbanks</u> – Mr. Terry stated that he has been sorting through 33 years-worth of collections representing the various activities he has been involved in since he has been in Alaska. He stated that he has lived with no running water for 33 years and that two of those years he had no electricity. Mr. Terry mentioned that he has been actively trying to promote a roller skating rink in Fairbanks for many years and stated that he has been unsuccessful in simply putting together a presentation meeting for his idea. He pointed out that he has never asked anyone for money to support his goal and that he has given thousands of his own dollars to promote his idea. He spoke out against local non-profits asking for money from other organizations.

Hearing no more requests for public comment, **Mayor Eberhart** declared Public Testimony closed.

MAYOR'S COMMENTS AND REPORT

Mayor Eberhart thanked Mr. Hilling for his service on the City Council and stated that he enjoyed his discussion and discourse. He thanked Mr. Anderson for being willing to serve on the Council again after having served several years ago. He expressed appreciation for Mr. Anderson's views, input and the diversity he brought to the City Council. Mayor Eberhart presented each departing member of the Council with a gold pan to commemorate their service. Mayor Eberhart congratulated Mr. Cleworth on his return to the City Council and shared that Mr. Cleworth has the most seniority of all time on the City Council of Fairbanks. He stated that Mr. Cleworth's accounting and budget experience will be very helpful in preparing the upcoming budget. Mayor Eberhart congratulated Mr. Pruhs for his election to the Council and stated that his background in real estate will be a welcome contribution to the body. He asked the Council to let him know if changes should be made to their Board/Commission assignments. announced that with Mr. Anderson's departure, he would like to appoint Council Member Gatewood to the Fairbanks Diversity Council. Mayor Eberhart shared that there are many upcoming vacancies for seats on City Boards and Commissions and encouraged members of the public to apply. He stated that all applications will be considered. Mayor Eberhart stated that the City signed an agreement with the Fairbanks North Star Borough School District (FNSBSD) for two school resource officers (SRO's) and another agreement with the School District for a work/study program for high school students. He stated that there are five high school students currently working at the City and participating in the work/study program and added that another student will soon start working. Mayor Eberhart referenced the handouts regarding the Community Service Patrol (CSP) and stated that the program is a terrific investment and offers a significant savings for the City of Fairbanks. He spoke to the many activities, events and meetings that he and others in his office have been involved in since the last Regular City Council Meeting. He shared that there is a tentative future plan to build an overpass at threemile Richardson Highway to improve driver safety at the railroad crossing. Mayor Eberhart stated that he attended a Celebration of Life for a man who was recently found deceased in a park earlier in the month. He explained that police are investigating the cause of death of the 39year-old man.

man who has always been respectful of his peers. He expressed hope that the outgoing Council Members would stay involved in City matters.

Mr. Gatewood echoed the sentiments of others in regard to Mr. Hilling and Mr. Anderson. He stated that he has known Mr. Anderson for a number of years and commended him for coming out of retirement to serve on the City Council. Mr. Walley expressed appreciation to Mr. Anderson for viewpoints and commitment to the Council. He stated that it has been an honor to serve with Mr. Hilling for two years on the City Council and commented that he will remember Mr. Hilling for sharing his knowledge. He thanked the families of the departing Council Members for their commitment to share Mr. Hilling and Mr. Anderson with the City. **Mr.** Walley acknowledged Mr. Hilling's strong belief against accepting federal grant dollars. He thanked both Mr. Hilling and Mr. Anderson for their service.

Mr. Hilling commented that he believes his fellow Council Members are principled and hardworking individuals. He stated that Mr. Anderson is a wonderful desk mate and has been an enjoyable person to get to know. He commented that Mr. Gatewood is a very wise man. Mr. Hilling stated that although Mr. Walley was new to the Council two years ago, he feels that he is a very dedicated man. He commented that Ms. Staley is a great public servant who is very involved in the community. Mr. Hilling also expressed appreciation for Mr. Matherly's dedication as a public servant. He commended Mayor Eberhart for being so involved in innovative processes and for opening his mind to new ideas. AN ORDINANCE RATIFYING A LABOR AGREEMENT BETWEEN THE CITY OF FAIRBANKS AND THE AFL-CIO CRAFTS COUNCIL

WHEREAS, the three-year collective bargaining agreement between the City of Fairbanks and the AFL-CIO Crafts Council, effective January 1, 2014 through December 31, 2016, includes "reopener" provisions for wages and benefits for years two and three (2015 and 2016); and

WHEREAS, the AFL-CIO and City Administration have reached a tentative agreement on 2015 wages and benefits, plus other administrative changes to the CBA which incorporate the labor goals of the City Council and are consistent with the terms of other recently adopted labor contracts.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ENACTED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF FAIRBANKS, ALASKA, as follows:

SECTION 1. That the attached Letter of Agreement, detailing wage and benefit terms for 2015 and other administrative changes to the original 2014 – 2016 collective bargaining agreement between the City and the AFL-CIO Crafts Council, is hereby ratified.

SECTION 2. That this ordinance becomes effective upon ratification of the Letter of Agreement by the AFL-CIO Crafts Council bargaining units.

SECTION 3. That once ratified, the terms of the Letter of Agreement are effective starting January 1, 2015.

Letter of Agreement

City of Fairbanks (COF)

and

Fairbanks AFL-CIO Crafts Council (the Union)

The three-year collective bargaining agreement between the City of Fairbanks and the AFL-CIO Crafts Council, effective January 1, 2014 through December 31, 2016, included "reopener" provisions for wages and benefits for years two and three (2015 and 2016).

The City Administration and AFL-CIO have reached a tentative agreement on 2015 wages and benefits, plus other administrative changes to the January 1, 2014 CBA.

THE CITY AND AFL-CIO HEREBY AGREE AS FOLLOWS:

Article 23. SCHEDULE "A" WAGES, Sections 23.1, 23.2, and 23.4 are amended as follows:

Section 23.1 – The following language shall be added to Section 23.1:

Effective January 1, 2015, employees will receive a 2.5% increase to the 2014 package rate.

Section 23.2 – The current provision shall be replaced with the following language:

- Application of the Package Rate Concept. The parties recognize that computing a full package rate, in which actual wages, health care, and pension costs are computed on the basis of annual compensable hours, is a more accurate method of reflecting the actual cost to the City. The parties agree that future percentage increases will be applied to the package rate. Except as provided in this section or in addenda specifically addressing allocation, each Local may allocate the package rate to wages, pension, and health and welfare as it sees fit.
 - (A) The Pension Protection Act of 2006 requires an annual actuarial status determination for multiemployer pension plans. An actuarial finding that a pension plan is underfunded can trigger, depending on the severity of the underfunding, the implementation of a plan to improve the funding and/or rehabilitate the plan. Because the funding improvement/rehabilitations plans mandated by the Pension Protection Act impose certain mandatory contributions to underfunded pension plans, the parties agree that the allocation discretion of Article 23.2 will need to be limited to insure compliance with the requirements of the Pension Protection Act and any improvement/rehabilitation plan.

- (B) Upon notification of a finding of underfunding, the parties agree to promptly meet and confer regarding the underfunded plan. Generally, the provisions of an improvement/rehabilitation plan must be implemented only after the CBA then in place expires. The parties may agree to implement the provisions of the improvement/rehabilitation plan earlier than required if the parties determine it would be advantageous to do so. The parties will prepare a separate addendum for each pension plan found to be underfunded. During the term of any addendum, the parties agree to meet and confer if either party believes there has been a change in circumstances that would warrant amendment of the addendum.
- (C) Any increase to the contribution rate for an underfunded pension plan required under an improvement/rehabilitation plan must be paid out of the package rate negotiated by the parties. The City will not be required to provide any additional funds or make any additional contributions to a pension plan above the negotiated package rate amount. No portion of the package rate may be allocated to any other purpose unless and until contributions and supplemental contributions to the underfunded pension plan have been satisfied.
- (D) If at any point, the underfunded pension plan emerges from its underfunded status and additional contributions under an improvement/ rehabilitation plan are no longer required, the allocation restrictions imposed by this section will be lifted.

Section 23.4 – the current provision shall be replaced with the following language:

23.4 Office Manager and Dispatcher Rates:

The Office Manager positions, if used by the City, will be paid at a wage rate to be agreed upon by the City and Union in light of the skills and qualifications of the selected employee(s). The IUOE Dispatcher shall be paid at ninety (90%) percent of scale. The assistant dispatcher will be paid at seventy (70%) of scale.

Article 3. EMPLOYER-UNION RELATIONS, Sections 3.2(a) and (b) are amended and Section 3.11 is added as follows:

3.2 (a) The Union assumes the responsibility to supply the City with competent qualified workers with no discrimination of race, sex, sexual orientation, age, color, religion, disability, genetic information or national origin for those classifications listed in Article 23 of this Agreement. Recognizing the mutual benefits

derived from the process of democratic collective bargaining, the City will not discourage new employees from joining the Union. The City may reject any employee it finds unsatisfactory.

- 3.2 (b) It is hereby agreed that there shall be no discrimination by the City, or the Union, against any employee because of race, sex, sexual orientation, age, color, religion, disability, genetic information or national origin or because of membership in or lawful activity on behalf of the Union. To the extent allowed by law, the City further agrees to give priority of hire and job tenure to residents of the Fairbanks, Alaska, area when such possess the requisite skills and abilities and are available.
- 3.11 Work-Study Job Training Program. Recognizing the value of the High School Work Based Learning programs, the parties agree to a partnership program by which the City with local high schools for the purpose of work-study job training. Students participating in work-study opportunities, whereby they work with City employees covered by this CBA, will be exempted from membership in the Union and will not be eligible for wages and benefits provided under this CBA. Participation in this program is viewed as a learning opportunity and is not intended to displace staffing levels. If the Work-Study Memorandum of Agreement between the City of Fairbanks and the Fairbanks North Star Borough School District is terminated, this Work-Study section will also terminate. Either party may propose termination of this Work-Study section at any time. The parties agree to accept termination proposals only after the Mayor (or designee) and the Union's primary bargaining representative have attempted in good faith to remedy the grievance related to the termination proposal.

The parties agree that the intent of this program is not to displace Temporary or Regular workers from the Public Works Department. This LOA shall remain in effect unless the AFL-CIO Crafts Council gives thirty (30) days written notice of its desire to cancel the agreement. The Crafts Council agrees that it will not arbitrarily cancel the LOA. Furthermore, before the Crafts Council may send a notice of cancellation, it agrees to meet with the City and make a 'good faith' effort to resolve problem(s).

Article 6. WORKING RULES, a correction is made to Section 6.3(d) and Section 6.11 is amended as follows:

6.3 OVERTIME

(d) In the last sentence, December 1st shall be changed to December 31st

6.11 <u>CALL OUT</u>. If an employee is called by a Public Works supervisor to report to work on a scheduled day off, the employee will be paid a minimum of two (2) hours at the applicable overtime rate. All work over 2 hours will be paid in ¼ hour increments. De minimis time (such as answering a phone call) will be paid in ¼ hour increments.

Article 7. HOLIDAYS, Section 7.1 is amended as follows:

7.1 The following days shall be considered holidays: New Year's Day, Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. Day (which shall be observed as a floating holiday in the same manner as a personal holiday), President's Day, Memorial Day, Fourth of July (Independence Day), Labor Day, Alaska Day (which shall be observed as a floating holiday in the same manner as a the personal holiday; not on the actual date of the State holiday) Veteran's Day, Thanksgiving Day and Christmas Day. Floating holidays must be used in the year accrued or otherwise lost without cash value, and such other days as the City Council, by resolution may fix for City employees.

ORDINANCE NO. 5962, AS AMENDED

WHEREAS, the AFL-CIO and City Administration have reached a tentative agreement on 2015 wages and benefits, plus other administrative changes to the CBA which incorporate the labor goals of the City Council and are consistent with the terms of other recently adopted labor contracts.

<u>WHEREAS</u>, the City 2015 operating budget will be amended to include the increased expenditures as reflected in the attached fiscal note.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ENACTED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF FAIRBANKS, ALASKA, as follows:

SECTION 1. That the attached Letter of Agreement, detailing wage and benefit terms for 2015 and other administrative changes to the original 2014 – 2016 collective bargaining agreement between the City and the AFL-CIO Crafts Council, is hereby ratified.

SECTION 2. That this ordinance becomes effective upon ratification of the Letter of Agreement by the AFL-CIO Crafts Council bargaining units.

SECTION 3. That once ratified, the terms of the Letter of Agreement are effective starting January 1, 2015.

Letter of Agreement

City of Fairbanks (COF)

and

Fairbanks AFL-CIO Crafts Council (the Union)

(Updated 12/31/2014)

The three-year collective bargaining agreement between the City of Fairbanks and the AFL-CIO Crafts Council, effective January 1, 2014 through December 31, 2016, included "reopener" provisions for wages and benefits for years two and three (2015 and 2016).

The City Administration and AFL-CIO have reached a tentative agreement on 2015 wages and benefits, plus other administrative changes to the January 1, 2014 CBA.

THE CITY AND AFL-CIO HEREBY AGREE AS FOLLOWS:

Article 23. SCHEDULE "A" WAGES, Sections 23.1, 23.2, and 23.4 are amended as follows:

Section 23.1 – The following language shall be added to Section 23.1:

Effective January 1, 2015, employees will receive a 2.5% increase to the 2014 package rate.

Section 23.2 – The current provision shall be replaced with the following language:

- Application of the Package Rate Concept. The parties recognize that computing a full package rate, in which actual wages, health care, and pension costs are computed on the basis of annual compensable hours, is a more accurate method of reflecting the actual cost to the City. The parties agree that future percentage increases will be applied to the package rate. Except as provided in this section or in addenda specifically addressing allocation, each Local may allocate the package rate to wages, pension, and health and welfare as it sees fit.
 - (A) The Pension Protection Act of 2006 requires an annual actuarial status determination for multiemployer pension plans. An actuarial finding that a pension plan is underfunded can trigger, depending on the severity of the underfunding, the implementation of a plan to improve the funding and/or rehabilitate the plan. Because the funding improvement/rehabilitations plans mandated by the Pension Protection Act impose certain mandatory contributions to underfunded pension plans, the parties agree that the allocation discretion of Article 23.2 will need to be limited to

insure compliance with the requirements of the Pension Protection Act and any improvement/rehabilitation plan.

- (B) Upon notification of a finding of underfunding, the parties agree to promptly meet and confer regarding the underfunded plan. Generally, the provisions of an improvement/rehabilitation plan must be implemented only after the CBA then in place expires. The parties may agree to implement the provisions of the improvement/rehabilitation plan earlier than required if the parties determine it would be advantageous to do so. The parties will prepare a separate addendum for each pension plan found to be underfunded. During the term of any addendum, the parties agree to meet and confer if either party believes there has been a change in circumstances that would warrant amendment of the addendum.
- (C) Any increase to the contribution rate for an underfunded pension plan required under an improvement/rehabilitation plan must be paid out of the package rate negotiated by the parties. The City will not be required to provide any additional funds or make any additional contributions to a pension plan above the negotiated package rate amount. No portion of the package rate may be allocated to any other purpose unless and until contributions and supplemental contributions to the underfunded pension plan have been satisfied.
- (D) If at any point, the underfunded pension plan emerges from its underfunded status and additional contributions under an improvement/ rehabilitation plan are no longer required, the allocation restrictions imposed by this section will be lifted.

Section 23.4 – the current provision shall be replaced with the following language:

23.4 Office Manager and Dispatcher Rates:

The Office Manager positions, if used by the City, will be paid at a wage rate to be agreed upon by the City and Union in light of the skills and qualifications of the selected employee(s). The IUOE Dispatcher shall be paid at ninety (90%) percent of scale. The assistant dispatcher will be paid at seventy (70%) of scale.

Article 3. EMPLOYER-UNION RELATIONS, Sections 3.2(a) and (b) are amended and Section 3.11 is added as follows:

3.2 (a) The Union assumes the responsibility to supply the City with competent qualified workers with no discrimination of race, sex, sexual orientation, age, color, religion, disability, genetic

information or national origin for those classifications listed in Article 23 of this Agreement. Recognizing the mutual benefits derived from the process of democratic collective bargaining, the City will not discourage new employees from joining the Union. The City may reject any employee it finds unsatisfactory.

- 3.2 (b) It is hereby agreed that there shall be no discrimination by the City, or the Union, against any employee because of race, sex, sexual orientation, age, color, religion, disability, genetic information or national origin or because of membership in or lawful activity on behalf of the Union. To the extent allowed by law, the City further agrees to give priority of hire and job tenure to residents of the Fairbanks, Alaska, area when such possess the requisite skills and abilities and are available.
- 3.11 Work-Study Job Training Program. Recognizing the value of the High School Work Based Learning programs, the parties agree to a partnership program by which the City with local high schools for the purpose of work-study job training. Students participating in work-study opportunities, whereby they work with City employees covered by this CBA, will be exempted from membership in the Union and will not be eligible for wages and benefits provided under this CBA. Participation in this program is viewed as a learning opportunity and is not intended to displace staffing levels. If the Work-Study Memorandum of Agreement between the City of Fairbanks and the Fairbanks North Star Borough School District is terminated, this Work-Study section will also terminate. Either party may propose termination of this Work-Study section at any time. The parties agree to accept termination proposals only after the Mayor (or designee) and the Union's primary bargaining representative have attempted in good faith to remedy the grievance related to the termination proposal.

The parties agree that the intent of this program is not to displace Temporary or Regular workers from the Public Works Department. The Work-Study Job Training Program This LOA shall remain in effect unless the AFL-CIO Crafts Council gives thirty (30) days written notice of its desire to cancel the agreement. The Crafts Council agrees that it will not arbitrarily cancel the LOA. Furthermore, before the Crafts Council may send a notice of cancellation, it agrees to meet with the City and make a 'good faith' effort to resolve problem(s).

Article 6. WORKING RULES, a correction is made to Section 6.3(d) and Section 6.11 is amended as follows:

6.3 OVERTIME

- (d) In the last sentence, December 1st shall be changed to December 31st
- 6.11 <u>CALL OUT</u>. If an employee is called by a Public Works supervisor to report to work on a scheduled day off, the employee will be paid a minimum of two (2) hours at the applicable overtime rate. All work over 2 hours will be paid in ¹/₄ hour increments. De minimis time (such as answering a phone call) will be paid in ¹/₄ hour increments.

Article 7. HOLIDAYS, Section 7.1 is amended as follows:

7.1 The following days shall be considered holidays: New Year's Day, Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. Day (which shall be observed as a floating holiday in the same manner as a personal holiday), President's Day, Memorial Day, Fourth of July (Independence Day), Labor Day, Alaska Day (which shall be observed as a floating holiday in the same manner as a the personal holiday; not on the actual date of the State holiday) Veteran's Day, Thanksgiving Day and Christmas Day. Floating holidays must be used in the year accrued or otherwise lost without cash value, and such other days as the City Council, by resolution may fix for City employees.

ORDINANCE NO. 5963

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING FGC SECTION 2-396 REGARDING THE FACT FINDING COMMISSION

WHEREAS, on February 24, 1992, the Fairbanks City Council established a Fact Finding Commission by adopting Ordinance No. 5038; and

WHEREAS, the purpose of the Commission is to assist the City Council in the investigation, collection, assessment and analysis of any issue referred to the Commission where facts are in dispute or are unknown; and

WHEREAS, the Fact Finding Commission has not been called upon to assist the City Council in many years, and FGC Section 2-396 has not been amended since it was adopted in 1992; and

WHEREAS, the Commission is still considered active, so members and terms must be tracked and maintained on a regular basis; and

WHEREAS, it would be beneficial to lengthen members' terms from two years to five years and eliminate the two alternate positions so that appointments will be needed less frequently and the City will save money on advertising; and

WHEREAS, it appears that the Commission may be better served by a cross-section of members from both inside and outside the city limits, and it has proven difficult to fill vacancies when all positions are limited to City residents.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ENACTED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF FAIRBANKS, ALASKA, as follows:

SECTION 1. Fairbanks General Code Section 2-396 is hereby amended as follows [new text in **underlined bold** font; deleted text in **strikethrough** font]:

Sec. 2-396. – Created Composition.

(a) There is created a fact_finding commission shall consisting of five members, serving without compensation, to be appointed by the mayor and subject to confirmation by the city council. At least three The members of the commission shall be residents of the city. The membership of the commission shall consist of two members who are recognized experienced in the fields of law or judicial enforcement and three members from the public at large. The initial chairman and vice-chairman shall be appointed elected by and from the fact finding commission members, the mayor subject to confirmation by the city council. Of the five members appointed, one shall be appointed to a term expiring December 31, 1993; and two shall be appointed to a term expiring December 31, 1994; thereafter,

Ordinance No. 5963 Page 1 <u>aAppointments</u> shall be for <u>twofive</u> years, except when an interim appointment is necessary to complete the term of a member who resigns, dies or is otherwise removed while in office.

(b) The mayor shall also appoint, subject to city council confirmation, two alternates who at the election of the chairman shall sit in the place of any absent regular or otherwise assist the commission as directed by the chairman. One alternate shall be a member who is recognized in the field of law or judicial enforcement, and one alternate shall be a member of the public at large. Of the two alternates, one shall be appointed to a term expiring December 31, 1993, and one shall be appointed to a term expiring December 31, 1994; thereafter, appointments shall be for three years.

SECTION 2. That the effective date of this Ordinance shall be the ____ day of January 2015.

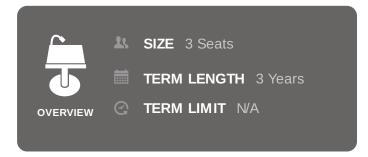

BOARD/COMMISSION CHARACTERISTICS

The FNSB Planning Commission shall consist of 11 members. Commission membership shall be apportioned so that the number of members from the cities of Fairbanks and North Pole reflects the proportion of the Borough population residing within those cities as determined by the Borough Assembly from time to time. Members shall be appointed by the Borough Mayor, subject to confirmation by the Assembly. The appointments of members from the cities shall be selected from a list of recommendations submitted to the Borough Mayor by the City Councils. Members appointed from outside the cities shall be as presentative of the various geographic areas of the Borough as practical. The Borough Mayor, Planning Director and Engineer shall be ex officio members of the Commission with privilege of the floor but shall have no vote on any matter.

MEETINGS

The Commission shall annually elect from its membership a chairman and vice chairman and shall adopt rules for the conduct of its meetings. Robert's Rules of Order (newly revised) shall apply unless different rules are adopted by the Commission and approved by the Assembly. Meetings of the Commission are public in accordance with AS 44.62 and minutes shall be kept. Minutes of the Commission shall be filed with the Borough Clerk. Records of the Commission shall be retained as public records within the Planning Department. In addition to the eligibility and qualifications requirements in FNSBC 2.21.040, the Assembly shall not confirm the appointment or selection of a local elected official serving on the Assembly or City Council, including a Mayor. Any sitting planning commissioner who is elected or appointed as an Assemblymember, Councilmember or Mayor shall resign as a planning commissioner on or prior to being sworn in to the new position. Six members of the Commission shall constitute a quorum. All Commission actions shall

be by vote of a majority of the Commission's membership \boldsymbol{w} ho are present and voting.

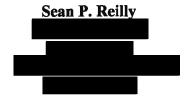

November 12, 2014

The Fairbanks North Star Borough/City of Fairbanks Chena Riverfront Commission (CRFC) met on Wednesday, November 12, 2014 with Commissioner Wright presiding. The following Commission members were in attendance: Julie Jones, Sue Rainey, Lee Wood, Carrie McEnteer and Bob Henszey.

Also present were: Christine Nelson, FNSB Community Planning; Lissa Hughes, TVWA; Carl Heim, DOT; Nancy Durham, FNSB Community Planning; Donna Gardino, FMATS; Ian Olson, interested resident and Laura McLean, FNSB Recording Clerk.

1. CALL TO ORDER

Wright called the meeting to order at 12:05 p.m.

2. APPROVAL OF AGENDA

A motion was made by Rainey, seconded by Henszey to approve the Agenda for November 12, 2014. There were no objections.

3. APPROVAL OF MINUTES OF October 8, 2014

A motion was made by Henszey, seconded by Wood to approve the minutes for October 8, 2014. There were no objections.

4. COMMUNICATIONS TO THE COMMISSION

6. NEW BUSINESS

None

7. UNFINISHED BUSINESS

A. Fort Wainwright presentation, McEnteer

Commissioner McEnteer gave an informative presentation on how Ft. Wainwright considers the Chena River when conducting business on Post.

B. Airport Way West Project Update, Committee report

Wright addressed the Commission. He stated that the last meeting that the subcommittee had was at DOT with the Acting Northern Regional Manager Rob Campbell and Mayor Hopkins. DOT is still saying that they can transfer ownership of land under certain circumstances and therefore he does not see why this land could not be transferred to the Borough. Mayor Hopkins is still interested in that as well. There is a concern about long term maintenance on the "park" part of this plan. The Borough is reluctant to take on something that they do not have the funding to pay for.

Wright commented that he still needs to contact Alaska Airlines, Sadlers and Riverboat Discovery and to Jay Ramras again to see if any of them have an interest in participating in funding for the Agenda Packet - January 05, 2015

maintenance. **Wright** further commented that they have talked about including in the design a "Welcome" sign and a "Thank You for Visiting." This concept has been added to the drawing that Schlosser drew. The funding for this is, he believes, outside of the responsibility of DOT but would have to be coordinated with them as part of their overall project. The question of whether or not something would be placed in the roundabouts was brought up. **Wright** responded that they, DOT, does not want to place anything in the roundabouts which will hinder a drivers' sight. They also do not want to put things such as seasonal flowers etc. in this area as this would require maintenance folks to have to cross the active roadways in order to get to them for maintenance. **Gardino** added that another thing is clearly separating out the park part, which is the river part, from the part between the curb. She added that DOT is not opposed to some sort of capital investment in what goes in the center area.

Carl Heim, DOT Engineer, concurred with Wright and Gardino.

Wright continued that one of the other things that came up was who could act as a coordinating entity so that all these different things happen in a coordinated fashion. He stated that Plager went to the last Chamber of Commerce Transportation Committee meeting and this roundabout was on their agenda. He questions if since they have an interest in this, could they take this project as main coordinator. He commented that he has twice tried to get with Lisa Herbert the Executive Director but has not been able to do so to date.

Jones asked if Wright was talking about the construction phase of this project or for long term. Wright replied "both." In the construction phase we would hope it would be done in a way that everything is compatible and then once it is done we would hope that there is some sort of a plan so that it is well cared for. Jones continued that one of the things that Schlosser mentioned when he put some of the photos together was that some of the photos that he included were of improvements that were so natural that he felt that there would not be a maintenance issue. She further commented that having that maintenance agreement may be a back-up plan should something go awry. Gardino added that if the property is turned over to the Borough, ultimately the Borough will have to do the maintenance. It is her thought that the Borough doesn't want to take the property until they have assurance that they have entities that can assist in the maintenance.

Wright continued that there was one other meeting that the subcommittee had since the last CRFC meeting and that it included the Mayor, a representative from Fish and Game and Fish and Wildlife and the purpose of that meeting was to talk about the riverbank.

Heim asked for clarification that the Borough Mayor is open to the idea but does not want to sign a maintenance agreement therefore, if the property is given to the Borough, the Borough will have to find someone to maintain it. Is this correct? **Wright** clarified that the Borough does not want to take on something that they can't afford to fund the upkeep on. That is what they are trying to figure out before they take it on. Gardino added that if the Borough were to accept the property, the maintenance would fall to Parks and Recreation as this would be a Borough park. **Heim** concluded that all of the outside maintenance issues need to be taken care of before the Borough would take the property. **Wright** and **Gardino** concurred.

Wright asked Heim if there was any update on the timing of DOT for this particular project. **Heim** stated that he plan to be able to have plans in hand by early spring. He further commented that he would like to see the project built by the summer of 2016. **Gardino** asked Heim if he has been directed at all to work with a landscape architect and develop the greenspace. **Heim** replied that they have talked about it a little bit. **Wright** added that it would be nice if they could include a landscape architect at some point in the process. **Gardino** suggested that the Commission could write a letter to DOT outlining the results of the discussions that have been. That way it is written what each party has understood do date regarding the responsibilities of this project.

Nelson suggested that she and Durham meet with the Mayor and find out where he is on this and then they can report back at the next meeting. At that point the Commission might or might not proceed with the letter. It would also clarify what role the Borough plans to play in this project. She further commented that she is not sure how things have been done in the past. **Gardino** answered that for every project that the DOT constructs, if the Borough is going to participate in the maintenance, it is all defined in the project agreement. It would be a separate memorandum of a maintenance agreement. **Heim** commented that they would like to have that all spelled out in an agreement before they go spending taxpayer dollars for a landscape architect.

Wright suggested that the subcommittee (Schlosser, Henszey and Wright), DOT, Gardino and Parks and Rec all meet and get a lot of things understood so that everyone is on the same page. Heim commented that this project is about 30-40% designed. A lot of times these things get worked out as the project moves along. **Wright** added that the Commission has concerns about when do we offer our thoughts. If we do it now, we might be in the way but if we wait until another time DOT may say it is too late. **Heim** responded that earlier is definitely better.

C. Chena Riverfront Plan Update

Durham addressed the Commission and stated that the Draft Chena Riverfront Plan Update was sent to the Legal department. They made several small changes to the document. Therefore, it missed the deadline to go before the Assembly at their next meeting. It is being resent to Legal for their review. Durham stated that she will let the Commission know as soon as it is scheduled to go before the Assembly.

D. Election of Officers (Chair, Vice-chair)

Jones asked if there was a limit to the number of term that a Commissioner can serve in a particular position. The answer was not known but McLean and Durham will find out.

A motion was made by **Rainey**, seconded by **Jones**, to re-elect Plager as Chair. There were no objections.

Jones nominated Wright as Vice-Chair. Wright declined.

Jones commented that she would like to take on the task however she is unable to do so at this time.

Hegarty-Lammers had previously declined to serve as Vice Chair in the future for personal reasons.

It was decided, unanimously, that the position of Vice Chair will be addressed at the December meeting.

8. STAFF AND LIASION COMMENTS

Nelson commented that she enjoyed meeting everyone on the Commission.

Gardino passed out postcards for several Open Houses to be held next week about the FMATS Long Range Transportation Plan.

9. COMMISSIONERS COMMENTS

Jones commented that the greenspace got the Polaris sculpture up. Festival Fairbanks is holding a photo competition. If anyone is interested in voting for a submission, they can go to fairbanksalaska.com and place their vote. Voting closes on the 15th of November.

Jones also stated that Festival Fairbanks did get approved for funding from the U.S. Fish and Wildlife for the new Golden Heart Plaza dock next summer. They will have to obtain matching funds. They are in need of approximately \$20,000 so if anyone has any ideas, let her know. Also, the winter lighting program along the river is being expanded this year.

Jones commented that the wetlands work along the Chena Riverwalk was done this fall so if anyone has ideas where funding might be obtained for this project, please let her know.

Finally, **Jones** announced that Festival Fairbanks is starting a new festival next summer called the Bacon Festival. It is based on the 1906 fire that devastated Fairbanks. Legend is that they threw slabs of bacon into the boilers of the pumps to bring the water pressure up to Agenda Packet - January 05, 2015

put the fire out. The festival will be held on May 23, 2015. **Wright** added that a re-enactment could be held at the power plant!

Wood asked if this was something that Festival Fairbanks perhaps thought about coordinating with Ice Alaska. **Jones** reiterated that they are open to anything. This festival will be a fund raiser for the Chena Riverwalk.

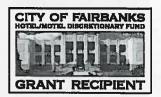

NEW BUSINESS

Introduction of Committee Members

He stated that the Committee Members know the general procedures of the Presentation Meeting and asked the Members to arrive ten to fifteen minutes prior to the start of the meeting to ensure the meeting beings on time.

Mr. Matherly stated that he will contact Mr. Nobles and inform him of the procedures of the meeting.

Committee Policy on Tardiness and Absences

Mr. Matherly spoke to a Motion made at the 2013 Preliminary Meeting for Mr. Matherly to introduce an Ordinance amending the Fairbanks General Code regarding Committee Members who are late or tardy to the Presentation Meeting. Mr. Matherly spoke to the procedure of Committee Members arriving late to the Presentation Meeting and asked for clarification from the Committee as to the scoring procedure if a Committee Member was tardy and missed the first several presentations.

The Committee discussed tardy and absence procedures for Committee Members and agreed that a Committee Member may not vote to allocate funds unless they attend all presentations.

Ms. Stiver suggested that a Hotel/Motel Discretionary Fund Committee Policy and Procedure booklet be assembled and adopted by the Committee. Ms. Stiver stated that having such a booklet would allow new Members to be treated consistently.

Mr. Matherly spoke to the booklet and expressed an aversion to receiving reading material. He spoke to the appointment of Mr. Nobles to the committee and pointed out that no one else applied for the vacant seat on this committee.

Ms. Stiver requested a copy of Mr. Nobles' committee application.

The Committee discussed Mr. Nobles' appointment and background.

Ms. Stiver volunteered to create a procedural outline for the Committee.

Ms. Fox and Mr. Matherly spoke in support of the outline.

Presentation Meeting

Mr. Matherly asked the Committee if there were any conflicts with the tentatively scheduled December 10, 2014 Presentation Meeting. No Members objected.

Ms. Stiver stated she wanted to confirm with Margarita Bell that the December 10 date does not interfere with the required annual report filing. Ms. Stiver requested to know how many annual reports the City was still waiting on.

Ms. Clooten stated she had checked with Ms. Bell in mid-October and that nine Annual reports had not yet been filed.

Ms. Stiver expressed concern awarding monies to an applicant who has not filed their annual report from the prior year. Stating if the Committee awards grant monies to an applicant that does not get their annual report filed, the grant monies that were allocated for the non-filing applicant could have been distributed to other applicants.

Ms. Fox requested that Ms. Clooten contact the nine entities that have not filed to make sure they get their report filed.

Mr. Matherly volunteered to call the nine entities to ensure they each get their annual report filed.

The Committee discussed adjusting the due date for applicants to file their annual report in future years.

Ms. Carter stated applicants have mentioned that they were glad to know their grant award early allowing them to apply for other grants. She proposed awarding the grant monies in November.

Mr. Matherly stated he prefers continuing to keep the application deadline October 31 and meeting time frame as it is and awarding grant monies in December.

Ms. Stiver stated she would be concerned that moving the application deadline to October 15 would result in several applicants forgetting to file their application.

Ms. Carter proposed having the first organizational meeting in November and awarding grant monies the first week of December.

Start Time, Scheduled Presentation Times

The Committee discussed presentation time frames and agreed that each presenter should receive three minutes to present and two minutes for questions and responses.

Committee Policy on "Zeroing out" Applicants

Mr. Matherly stated that at the end of the presentation meeting, if three or more Committee Members have allocated zeros to the same applicant, the applicant will not be considered for funding.

The Committee discussed whether or not education-based entities should be considered for grant funding. The Committee discussed possibly focusing more on encouraging tourism-based applications.

Ms. Fox stated educational programs do not promote tourism or economic development.

Ms. Stiver stated education-based entities can promote a tourist's experience, but have access to other avenues of funding that other grant applicants do not have access to.

Ms. Clooten stated that Ms. Bell confirmed only 2 grant recipients from 2014 have not filed their annual report.

Ms. Carter inquired if there was a policy that an applicant must be a non-profit agency.

Mr. Matherly stated he would like the opportunity to consider all timely-filed applications, as opposed to not giving someone the opportunity to apply.

Ms. Fox stated that the Committee must consider all timely and complete applications filed this year.

Mr. Matherly read Fairbanks General Code 74-117(a) out loud and stated that applicants whose primary purpose is not to promote the tourism industry or other economic development will not be considered.

The Committee discussed whether or not the Committee should consider awarding grant monies to state-and federally-funded programs.

City Clerk Janey Hovenden stated that Fairbanks General Code 74-117(b) allows for any person or organization to apply for grant monies, including non-profits.

Mr. Matherly thanked Ms. Hovenden for answering Ms. Crawford's question.

Ms. Stiver and Mr. Matherly stated that that section of the Code might need to be reevaluated.

Ms. Hovenden stated that in years past there has been discussion about being more restrictive as to which individuals and organizations could apply for grant monies, but that it was left more broad as it is currently written to promote diverse ideas and economic growth.

Ms. Carnahan stated that limiting the persons and organizations that can apply in the future as discussed could make it so the Committee would no longer be able to support some of the organizations the Committee currently supports annually.

The Committee discussed whether or not organizations needed to be based within city limits, and determined as long as the applicant promotes tourism or economic growth for the City, they do not need to be based within city limits.

Ms. Fox, Ms. Stiver, and Mr. Matherly agreed that an Ordinance should be introduced to amend Fairbanks General Code 74-117(g)(3), which would make it such that grant funds cannot support State and Federally sponsored programs.

Ms. Hovenden suggested that Mr. Nobles listen to the audio recording of the Preliminary Meeting.

Ms. Fox reminded the Committee that no applicants are permitted to hand out any paper copies the night of the Presentation Meeting.

Mr. Matherly stated he will make an announcement at the start of the Presentation Meeting to remind presenters not to hand out any material to the Committee Members.

Ms. Fox requested that Mr. Matherly also announce to the presenters that the applicants have requested over \$750, 000.00 and the total grant monies to award is \$270,000.00, and that no one will get near the amount they are requesting.

Mr. Matherly summarized the procedures of the Presentation Meeting stating Committee Members that miss any presentations will not be permitted to allocate any grant funds, that presentations will be held to three minutes with a two minute question and response period, and that no additional handouts are permitted to be distributed to the Committee by the presenters.

The Committee discussed the procedure if a presenter is unavailable when they are called to present. The Committee agreed the presenter be allowed to present in an order other than scheduled. It was further clarified that Ms. Clooten notify the applicants by mail and email the order of the presentations prior to the meeting.

The Committee agreed that applicants who do not attend the Presentation Meeting will not be considered for grant funding. The Committee again discussed the need for a Policy and Procedure booklet, and Ms. Clooten volunteered to put together the Policies and Procedures for the Committee.

NEXT MEETING

Mr. Matherly stated the Distribution Meeting is tentatively scheduled for December 19, 2014 at 12:00 P.M., and asked Committee Members for their input.

Ms. Fox suggested December 12, 2014 as sufficient amount of time to allocation funds.

The Committee agreed on Monday, December 15, 2014 at 12:00 P.M. as an acceptable date and time for the Distribution Meeting.

Mr. Matherly reminded the Committee that at the Distribution Meeting each Committee Member will read their individual allocations into the record.

ADJOURNMENT

Ms. Stiver, seconded by Ms. Carnahan, moved to ADJOURN the meeting.

Mr. Matherly declared the meeting adjourned at 12:47

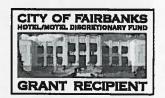
